This year's membership shows a gain of eighty-five members over last year, which is the largest yearly increase in the history of the association. The year's membership includes the following: 112 new members, 8 of which were members in previous years, but dropped out and were counted as new members this year; 289 old members, 54 of which paid reinstatement fees. 23 members on last year's list failed to join this year. Again this year all schools failing to pay their annual dues were dropped on October 1st. Two of this year's members were permitted to join after February 1st in order to participate in baseball.

Seven schools applied for membership, but did not enter for the following reasons: Four schools were rejected because they were not approved, one school found that it was approved too late to meet the requirements of the association, one found that it was too late to enter the tournaments, and another mailed its check and later decided not to join.

Membership lists were mailed out each month in order to keep each school well posted as to new memberships.

Changes were made in the By-Laws, Constitution, and Tournament Rules according to the decisions made at the last annual meeting.

The state is now divided into thirty-two basket ball districts and the following table shows the result of this year's proceedings:

Membership by districts and regions

The figures in the preceding tables show that in one or two cases some redistricting must be done. Also by looking over our tack map you will see that some changes must be made, although very little complaint has been reported to the Board of Control. Special attention is called to District 8.

On account of some schools misconstruing the meaning of some of our rules the Board of Control has mailed out a list of "proposed changes" for the members to vote on at this meeting. (Copy of which is attached.)

Other rules seem to be misunderstood, but ought not to need more than careful interpretation; others need to be emphasized. Section I of Article VIII of the Constitution says "No member school shall engage in any athletic contest with any non-member Kentucky secondary school". This means that our members may play any other sort of team in the world except a non-member Kentucky secondary school that is eligible for membership. Rule IX of the Tournament Regulations says "Immediately after receiving the February 1st membership lists, each school shall within two days mail to each other member school in its district a complete preliminary list of all its players." Many schools failed to do this. Attention should be called to the last sentence of the same ruling, stating that any school failing to follow the provision of this rule shall be barred from the tournaments. This penalty should be strictly enforced next year. It was not this year because it was a new rule and apparently a great many principals are not familiar with it. In this connection, let me say that it is the duty of every

principal to read and study all of the rules, because more and more it is clear that as the association grows in numbers, we can not make exceptions to any of our rules, and each principal will have to be held accountable whether he knows the rules or not. The custom of throwing communications from the secretary and copies of the rules, unread, into the waste basket, can be continued, but even being only at their peril. As clearly as Rule I of the By-Laws is stated, many requests have come in as to whether grade players can participate, and if so, whether years so played are counted on the four year limit. Of course, the answer is that grade players may compete and the years so played are not counted. Rule VI of the By-Laws means, as quoted from the By-Laws of the National Federation, that a student to be eligible shall be doing passing work and shall have passing grades from the beginning of the current semester in at least three full time studies. To my amazement, I have been told that some schools interpret that rule as requiring that a student shall be passing only in the week preceding that in which the contest occurs. Section IX means that any high school boy or girl who takes part in any game on any team other than a secondary school team becomes ineligible; this does not have to be a regular, or "so-called" scheduled game, or an organized team representing any institution. It means that a high school player must limit his activities to his school team. Rule XII means that if a player enters a game when his name is not on the eligibility list, or if his name is on the eligibility list when he is ineligible and when his religibility could have been ascertained by such investigation as a principal is supposed to make in the case of each of his players, then the team or school, or both are supposed to be penalized. The forfeit, however, can not be imposed in the case of tournament games where the ineligibility is discovered after the tournaments have started because it is manifestly impossible to play the tournaments over.

The following schools were suspended from the association for the remainder of the year on account of violating the rules: Newport, Onton and Wheatcroft.

As usual there will be a baseball tournament at Western Kentucky Teachers College and for full particulars write to Mr. E.A. Diddle, Athletic Director.
