Dear Sir:

I enclose check for the amount allowed by S.A. Boles, as your share of the balance left from the receipts of the state tournament after paying overhead and entertainment. Mr. Boles explains:

"In pro-rating the money I did not take into account meals on trip to and from Lexington, I just figured actual mileage by rail. The net amount will about pay one-fourth of the railroad fare. We took in less than last year due to the financial situation. It seems to me that if the teams who attend the tournament expect their fares to be refunded, they will have to agree to leave next day after breakfast when they lose. If they had done so this year, the local expenses would have been \$1200 less. This would have brought us within about \$600 of paying all railroad fares. The complimentary tickets to superintendents, principals, coaches, and athletic directors and coaches of colleges, amounted, I believe, to more than this \$600.

The University Athletic Association furnished trophies at a cost of \$263.67, and furnished the building, heat, lights, and a part of the labor, without charge."

The above from Daddy Boles, together with his financial report shown at the bottom of this page, cover the situation. If there is any thing about this settlement which you do not understand, please take it up with Mr. Boles.

I am greatly disappointed in the refund, and I know you are also. I believe Mr. Boles' suggestions are worth considering: namely, that teams leave after they are eliminated, and that all these complimentary tickets be discontinued. I hope you will be able to attend the annual meeting on Wednesday night, because Mr. Boles' suggestions and other important matters will come up for decision.

SECRETARY-TREASURER'S REPORT

To Members of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association for the Year 1931-32:

Our membership this year is 541, which includes 34 new members, and 507 old members, 84 of which paid reinstatement fees, 70 on last year's list and 14 from previous years. 26 of last year's 519 members dropped out. Two schools applied for membership and did not join: one was not approved by the State Department, and the other applied too late to play a schedule of six games before the tournaments.

No schools were suspended this year.

The Board of Control found the arrangement of the 64 districts a much more difficult job than was anticipated, due to geographical and road conditions. Some districts are too small and several are unavoidably too large. A few readjustments should be made.

The books for 1930-31 were audited and the accounts were verified and found to be in good order, as shown in the annual audit report that was sent out last October. The audit for this year will be made in July by a firm of Public Accountants, and the report will be sent to members next October 1st.

A year ago the State tournament lacked \$693.95 of paying all traveling expenses, and Mr. Boles was able to pay 74.7 % of the travel claims allowed. This year there was a deficit of \$1773.53, and he was able to pay only 27.9 % of the claims allowed. Mr. Boles made the following explanation:

"In pro-rating the money I did not take into account meals on trip to and from Lexington, I just figured actual mileage by rail. The net amount will about pay one-fourth of the railroad fare. It seems to me that if the teams who attend the tournament expect their fares to be refunded, they will have to agree to leave next day after breakfast when they lose. If they had done so this year, the local expenses would have been \$1200 less. This would have brought us within about \$600 of paying all railroad fares. The complimentary tickets to superintendents, principals, coaches, and athletic directors and coaches of colleges, amounted, I believe, to more than this \$600. The University Athletic Association furnished trophies at a cost of \$263.67, and furnished the building, heat, lights, and a part of the labor, without charge."

The added number of tournaments naturally has increased the amount of work involved in determining tournament centers, sending out instructions, and checking up reports. However, we had better cooperation and more prompt reports from the tournament managers this year than ever before. In fact, we find each year that every one knows the rules and procedure better than he did the year before and it seems that the affairs of the association move more and more smoothly.

A good many compliments have been paid to the little booklet. The notes therein printed are very valuable and now cover practically all situations that can arise. This is shown by the fact that President O'Donnell has had to make very few new rulings or interpretations this year.

We now have a balance in the bank of \$1467.13, and at the end of the year we will carry over somewhere around \$1000. This is too large an account to be lying in a checking account and not drawing interest. A savings account should be opened in which a large part of the funds of the association should be kept so as to draw interest.

For three years we have held a joint meeting with the principals' association. Opinion is divided as to the wisdom of this action. Many of our members feel that our business meeting has to begin too late on account of the principals' program and would prefer that the meeting be held separately. On the other hand, many feel that the two associations are mutually helpful and should have a common interest. The athletic association attendance helps the attendance of the principals' association, and many principals are present at the association meeting who otherwise would be absent. The Board of Control felt that it was following the wishes of the majority of our members in continuing the joint meeting for this year. I think we should have a definite action by this body as to whether the joint meeting should be continued.

The Board of Control has found several ways in which it thinks our rules and procedure may be improved, and these suggestions are now in your hands. President O'Donnell will submit them to you for action later on in the meeting. I can not refrain from again congratulating the association on the rules under which we operate. I do not think there is any question that they are superior to those of many other states. This is of course due to the patience of the members of the association in working out these rules to meet our problems in these annual meetings. We have never copied after the rules of other states and the policy has justified itself.

MINUTES

The fifteenth annual banquet and business meeting of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association was held jointly with the Kentucky Association of Secondary School Principals in the Roof Garden of the Brown Hotel, Wednesday evening, April 13, 1932, President W.F. O'Donnell, presiding.

After the dinner President O'Donnell introduced Mr. J.B. Holloway of the State Department of Education, and Mr. Holloway introduced Dr. Wm. A. Cook of the University of Cincinnati, the speaker of the evening. Dr. Cook spoke for thirty minutes on "The Associational Problem of the High School".

Mr. Edgar S. Lotspeich of the State Y.M.C.A. expressed his delight at being present.

Harry Gamage, Football Coach at the University of Kentucky, was presented to the members.

The secretary read a letter from Daddy Boles, Athletic Director of the University of Kentucky, relative to the Tax Bill now before the Senate which places a 10 % tax on athletic goods and also on tickets for athletic contests, urging the schools to write to Senator Barkley asking him to vote against the inclusion of this tax. The secretary also advised schools to purchase fall athletic supplies at once, before the tax goes on, if it should be passed.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were approved.

The secretary-treasurer's report was read and accepted.
