3) Calculate the percentage of female and male participants at each level. $(3,6,9)$ Example: Take the total number of female participants from the Summary Program Chart 1 (form T-1) and divide it into the number of total participants for each level, varsity, junior varsity and freshman levels. Perform the same calculation for male participants. For example, if there are a total of 300 female participants, and 180 girls are on varsity teams, 80 girls on junior varsity teams, and 40 girls on freshman teams, then $60 \%$ of girls' participation opportunities are at the varsity level ( 180 divided by 300 ), $27 \%$ are at the junior varsity level ( 80 divided by 300 ), and $13 \%$ are at the freshman level ( 40 divided by 300 ). If there are a total of 400 male participants, and 250 participate at the varsity level, 100 boys participate on junior varsity teams, and 50 boys participate on freshman teams, then $63 \%$ of boys participate at the varsity level ( 250 divided by 400 ), $25 \%$ compete at the junior varsity level ( 100 divided by 400), and 120 compete at the freshman level( 50 divided by 400 ).
