*Number of 8th grade students & below used in Column 3 and Column 4 calculations:

- 1) Determine the total number of girls enrolled, (place in Row 1, Column 1). Determine the total number of boys enrolled, (place in Row 2, Column 1).
- 2) Add the total number of girls and boys enrolled to determine total enrollment, (place in Row 3, Column 1).

Calculate the percentage of total enrollment that is female. (Divide Row 1, Column 1 by Row 3, Column 1 and place in Row 1, Column 2.) Calculate the percentage of total enrollment that is male. (Divide Row 2, Column 1 by Row 3, Column 1 and place in Row 2, Column 2.) Note: Row 1, Column 2 plus Row 2, Column 2 should total 100%.

Ask coaches to confirm the names of those individuals who are on the team as of the first **date of regular season competition**, and cross out the names of those who were cut from the team or quit the team prior to the first regular season competitive event. Note: While being within three percent is <u>not</u> a formal compliance standard; if the percent listed in Row 1, Column 4 is within 3% of Row 1, Column 2, then it provides a good target within which compliance is likely.



(It was found that not having a facility for practices and games could be a viable reason but not the affect a new sport would have on a current team)
 - Issues with adding volleyball is that it will have an adverse affect on field hockey participation numbers. The committee would like to see the number of field hockey players interested in changing sports.

Explanation of Advantages

The committee determined that no advantages were given to either the boys' or girls' programs. Though it appears a significant financial advantage went to the boys in the areas of equipment and supplies, travel, and coaching there were several reasons we reported no advantages for either program. The girls' basketball season was canceled prior to the beginning of the season. The school does not provide bus transportation to any contests inside the city limits. There were also more boys' teams meaning more coaches salaries.

The decision to cancel the girls' basketball season was made due to injury and a lack of players. Participation numbers dropped dramatically as only 6 girls started the season. After a few weeks of practice the team participated in their first scrimmage of the season during which a player suffered a season ending injury. After numerous meetings the team members, coaches and administration decided it was unsafe to continue a season with only 5 players. At that point the season was canceled, coaches received pay for their work to that point and plans were made to revive the team the following season. The difference in pay between boys and girls coaches was \$6865. The girls' basketball coaches were scheduled to receive an additional \$3000 by the end of the season. An additional \$2500 more in coaches salaries showed up on the boys' side due to lacrosse a sport which there is no matching girls team. The remaining difference exists because our boys' coaches have been in their positions for a number of teams.

School policy states that travel to away games is provided only for teams that play outside of the city. We offer girls the sports of field hockey, bowling, basketball, tennis and track and field. Of those teams only the basketball team would have traveled outside of the city to play comparable competition. The availability of comparable local competition and team size play a part in the others limited travel. Field hockey and bowling play a local schedule because both leagues are self-contained inside the city limits. Tennis and track and field compete locally for matches and do not require the need of transportation unless there is a large group involved in a post season event outside of the city.

Our 2008-09 Title IX Report shows that we had 4 girls' teams and 6 boys' teams. We have three coaches that have coached both boys' and girls at least 3 years. Our field hockey coach is one of the highest paid on our coaching staff because of experience and time with the school.

Although we had more boys' teams and boys' had the opportunity to participate on more levels than the girls this was only the case in basketball. Boys' who played freshmen and junior varsity basketball played at all three levels during the season. Our girls participated at an overall higher level than the boys, 58 girls accounted for 70 participation slots where as 67 boys' accounted for 73 participation slots. The girls participated at a rate of over 120%, twelve percentage points higher than the boys.
