- Add the total number of girls and boys enrolled to determine total enrollment, (place in Row 3, Column 1).
- Calculate the percentage of total enrollment that is female. (Divide Row 1, Column 1 by Row 3, Column 1 and place in Row 1, Column 2.) Calculate the percentage of total enrollment that is male. 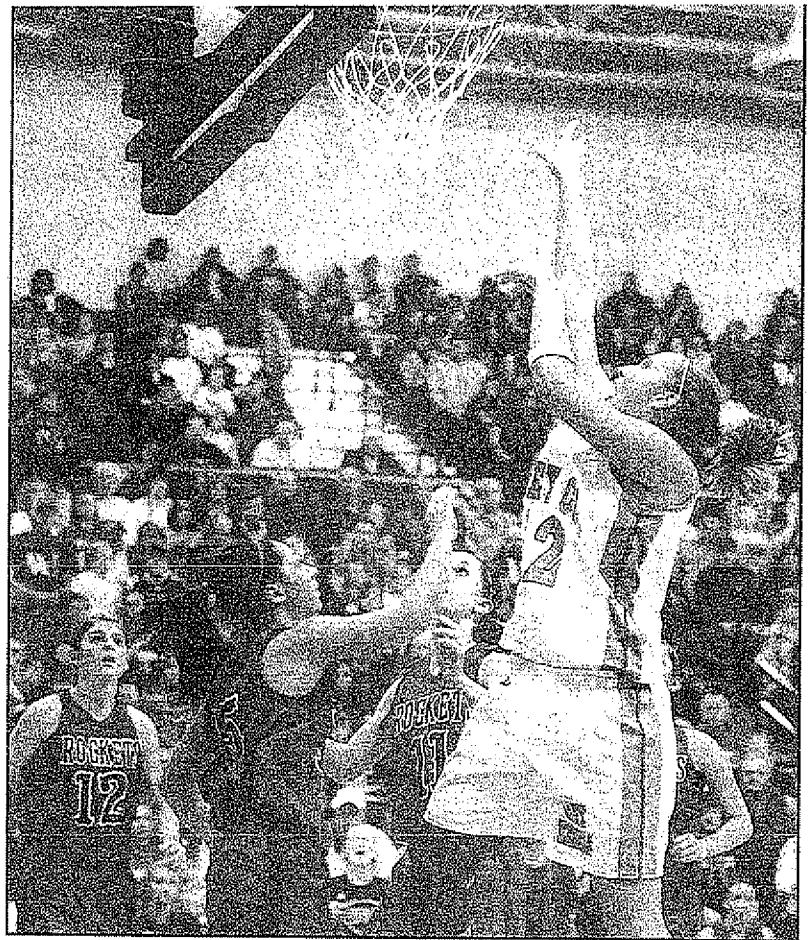

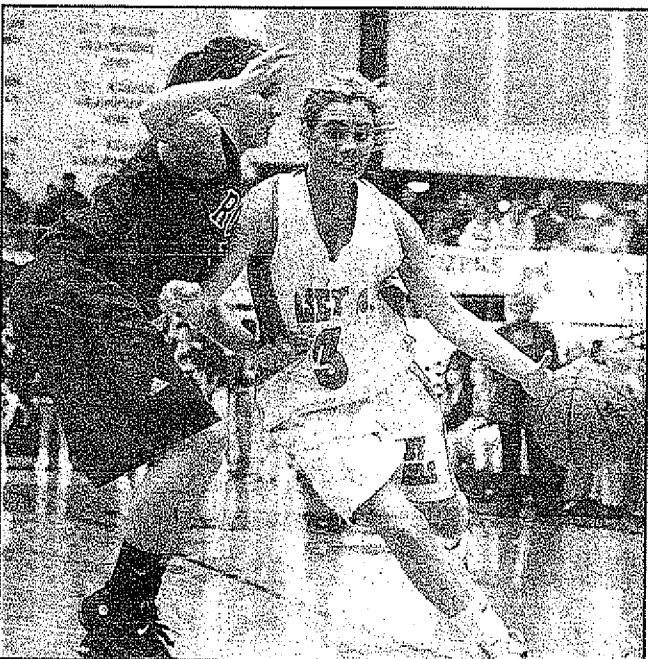

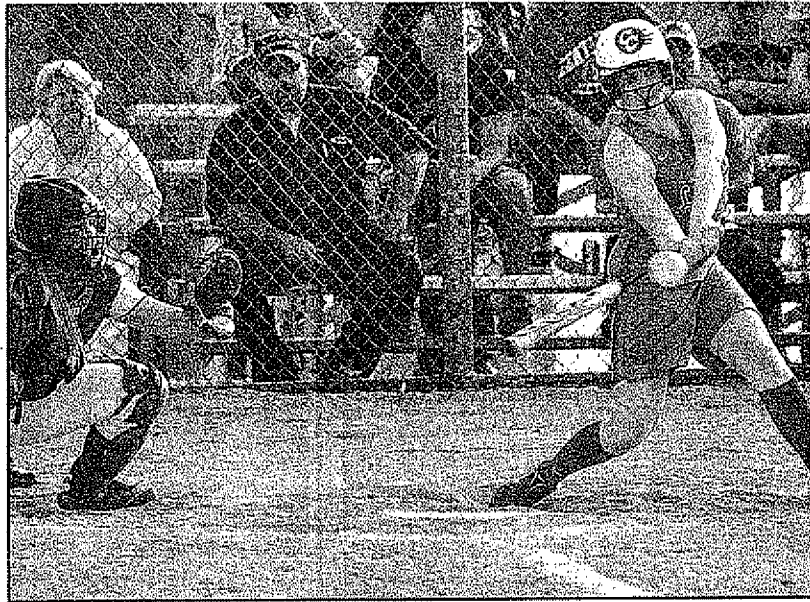
Hunter Christian, a freshman on the Rebels' baseball team, is battling an infection that has affected his vision.

Swimming, wrestling interest from parents lags at CCHS

The potential for expanded athletic offerings at Casey County High School took a dive last week as the next step in the process is pinned to parental interest that doesn't appear to be there.

Swimming/diving and wrestling were both identified by students in a December Title IX survey, taken bi-annually, as sports they would most like to see at CCHS. While the initial survey showed a strong interest in both sports — swimming/diving received votes from 71 girls and 22 boys, wrestling was selected by 49 boys — the after school meeting for students held Jan. 4 was only attended by four boys.

Step three in the process was an open meeting for students and parents March 15 and that meeting was attended by only one family whose children are still several years away from entering high school.

"In December we sent out 712 surveys and received 669 back from students in grades 8-11," said CCHS Athletic Director Victor Black. "We have to have 85 percent of the student body participate in the survey to progress to the after school meeting for students, and we met that threshold."

After the student survey and meeting Black met the KHSAA requirement of advertising a

public meeting.

Black said based on the capital investment, wrestling has the greatest chance of becoming a reality as existing facilities could be used with only a minimal investment in mats, uniforms, protective gear and coaching staff.

Swimming would require the rental of a pool and significant transportation costs along with the basic needs.

Both sports are considered part of winter athletics and would take place from mid-October through February, the same time period as basketball.

"If we had 10-15 parents here I'd take this to the board of education and then they would do a feasibility study to see if this is something they can afford to offer," Black said.

While he believes there is real interest on the part of both students and parents, the turnout for the most recent meetings hasn't reached the point to take things to the next level.

"When we did this for soccer two years ago we had 70-some kids wanting soccer. We did the after school meeting to see if there was true interest and had seven show up. We did the parent meeting and had one parent and one child show up," Black said.

He suggested that perhaps a grassroots effort by interested parents would be needed to build momentum and get their voices heard.

“The guys were excited to win their season-opener,” Coach Todd Carman said. “Justin (Cox) pitched a nice game from the mound.”

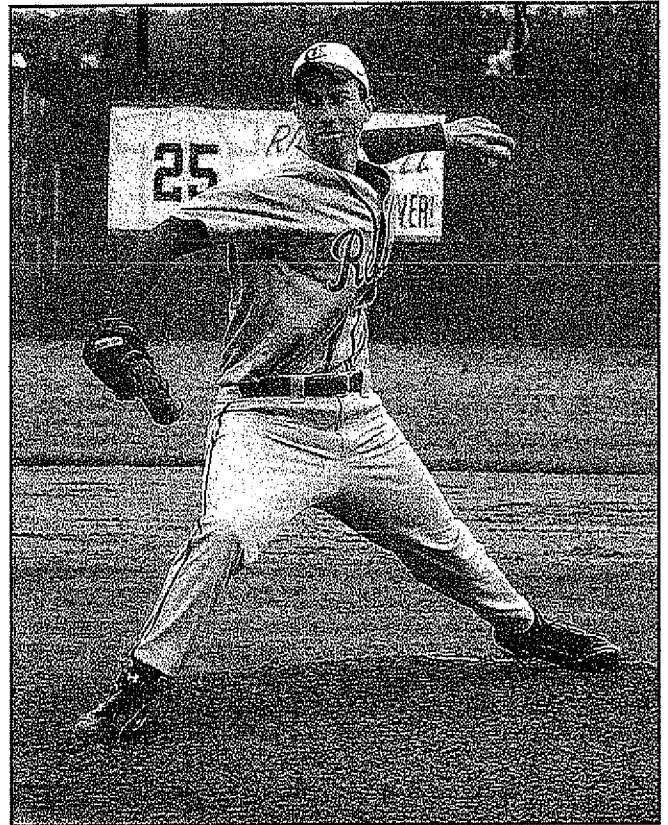
The first inning ended 1-1 but then things were quiet until the fifth when Casey brought in four runs. That started a rally that the Bull-

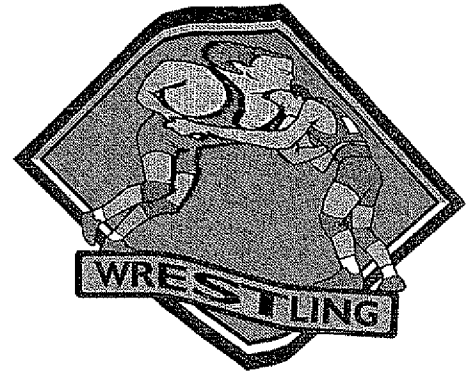
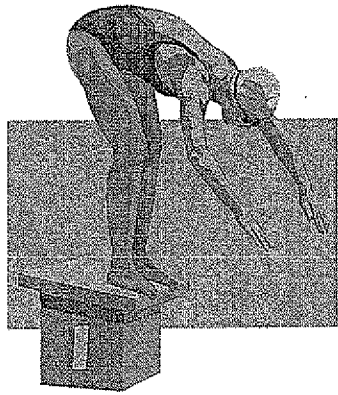

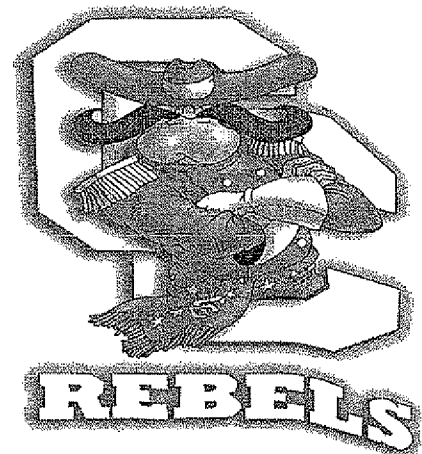
