Henderson and the State of Kentucky have produced many outstanding athletics in the last 50 years. Many of the elite group have been honored and inducted into the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame. However, there is one outstandingly versatile athlete which has been overlooked or delayed in receiving state wide recognition he has so rightly earned.

The ATHLETIC is Pascal Benson.

The pinnacle year in the annals of Kentucky High School Athletics was the school year of 1955-56.

The school was Henderson City High School which was formerly Barret High School.

Pascal Benson was a three sport extraordinary athletic throughout his varsity career at Henderson City and Barret High School in the school years of 1953, 54, 55 and 56. However, Pascal's apex year which I wish to highlight and emphasize was the 1955-56 school year.

Consider:

*All State Football – Henderson City undefeated championship team winner of Western Kentucky Conference and a claim to the State Mythical Championship (four years prior to the playoff system). Pascal was the center and inside linebacker on this championship team. He was also All Southern & Honorable Mention All American Football for 1955-56.

*All State Basketball - Henderson City Runner up State Tournament Team which lost to Carr Creek 68-72 in the State Championship. Won the Western Kentucky Conference two years in a row. (1955-56) Pascal was a 6' stalwart forward guard on Henderson's team which finished 2nd in 1956 and 3rd in 1955 Tournaments.

* All State Baseball – Henderson City (18-2) Semi Finalist State Tournament. Pascal was the ace pitcher (9-1) and leading hitter (.446) plus a super 1st baseman which attracted professional scouts.

* Henderson's first ever Sports Hall of Fame started in 1988 – Pascal was one of the top two inductees.

Pascal Benson

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The author of the following account was both a teammate and opponent of the subject of the story, having played with the subject as a Barret High underclassman and against him as an upper classman at Morganfield High. The article includes the observations of the writer.)

Who is the greatest all-around athlete in the history of Henderson prep sports?

That kind of question will send the spirits soaring in those sports trivia buffs who think of themselves as experts on Henderson's rich sports history.

However,

If records and all-state honors are used as the criteria, one person heads the achievement list in the annals of local sports.

Pascal Benson.

He is believed to be the only athlete in Henderson's prep history to be named to nonafide all-state first teams in three sports: football, basketball and baseball.

The school year was 1955-56 and the City High teams he played on were no lukes, either. In fact, that school year is generally recognized as the richest in local prep sports history.

The City High football team, under the coaching of Don Shelton, went 10-0, won the Western Kentucky Conference and lay claim to the mythical state

championship (this was four years before the playoff system began).

The City High basketball team, under the guidance of T.L. Plain, was 29-3 and came up just one victory short of a coveted state tournament title, losing 68 to Carr Creek in the championship game.

The baseball team, also coached by Plain, posted an 18-2 won-lost record and reached the semifinals in the state tournament before losing to Murray High, 5-4.

The track team, which did not have the services of Benson, finished seventh in the state meet.

Except for the conflict in scheduling Benson easily could have been a factor on the track team. He was a natural in the shot put and discus.

"Natural" is the appropriate word to use in describing Benson's athletic ability.

He was a gifted athlete who performed with such grace and ease that an opponent's first impression was that he was lazy.

Far from it.

As center-linebacker on City's football team, he was a perfectionist as a blocker and a tackler. Take my word for it. When Morganfield and City High clashed in 1955 in a battle of unbeaten before an overflow crowd at Barret Stadium, it was Benson who came up with the big

stoppers in a 7-6 City victory. With legs like tree stumps, he was indeed an immovable force as a 195-pound middle linebacker.

In basketball, his physical appearance was a deceptive factor which caught many an opponent off guard.

At 5-11, the robust southpaw was used at either guard or forward on a team which included 6-3 Byron Pinson, 6-2 Fred Schuette, 6-0 Sammy Joe Shelton and 5-9 David Eakins.

If he didn't have blinding speed, he had uncanny quickness and a deft shooting

touch.

Many a time he awed the packed City High gym crowds with his long-range, high-arching shots which at first looked as if they would barely leave his hand before settling ever so softly in the netting which laced the rim.

Benson had a strong competitive character which came home to this writer just a few hours after City High had lost to Carr Creek in the state basketball tournament championship.

He was sprawled on his bed in the Phoenix Hotel in Lexington when I went by to congratulate him and the rest of the team on their fine showing.

"Good job nothing," he said, "we came up here to win this thing."

He found little consolation in the fact that he, Pinson and Eakins had been named to the all-tournament team that included the Wayland Legend, King Kelly Coleman.

His prep basketball career over, Benson turned to baseball, a sport in which he excelled as a pitcher, fielder and hitter.

As a pitcher he had the same effortless style which marked his all-state performance in football and basketball. His easy motion belied the steam that was to catch many batters rocking on their heels.

When the season ended, Benson had

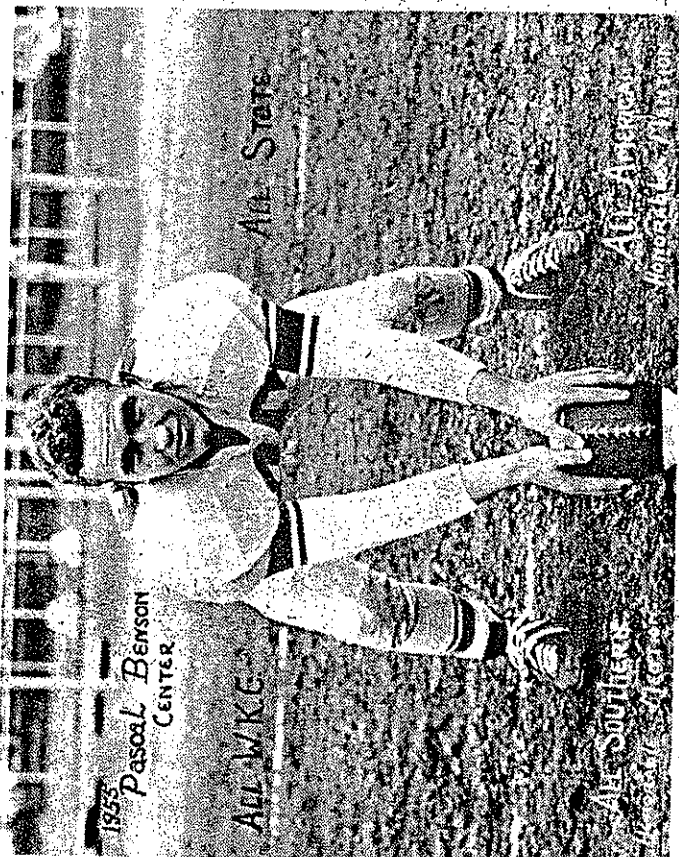
posted a 9-1 record to Owensboro and a 446 batting his pitching victory — a 12-0 victory district tournament.

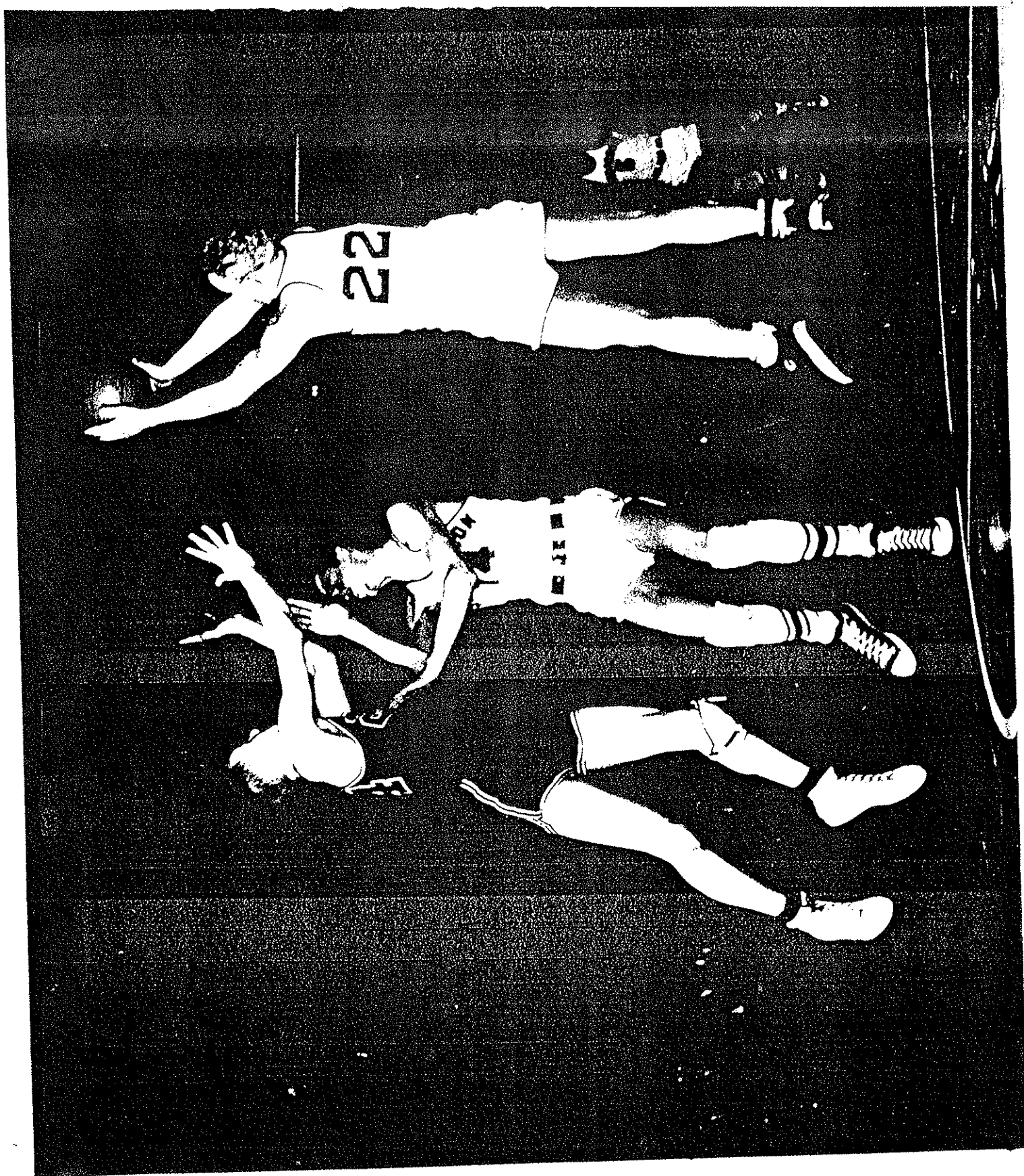

Without a doubt Pascal Benson is the most gifted athlete to ever hail from Henderson, KY.

Pascal Ray Benson still stands today as the only athlete in Kentucky history to make 1st team all-state in 3 sports in one year. A feat that is so rare, I was not able to find any other athlete that accomplished that feat.

Pascal was a southpaw pitcher-first baseman on the City High Flash baseball team that went undefeated in regular season, and finished 3rd in the state baseball tournament after losing to Murray High School, and then defeating Bell County in the consolation game. Pascal finished his junior year with a 9-1 record, which included a rare perfect game in a 12-0 victory in the district

tournament over rival Henderson Holy Name. Pascal also went 5 for 5 at bats in that victory, knocking in 3 base runners to help his own cause.

Pascal was a guard on the 1954-55 Barret Manual basketball team that finished third in the state, and was a center-linebacker on the undefeated City High team in 1955 (10-0) that won the Kentucky state football title. Pascal was a starting guard-forward on the City High basketball team that 29-3 and runner-up in the state tournament, and a starting guard on the Barret Team that finished third in the 1954-55 sweet 16.

He went on to become a starting lineman at the University of Kentucky and later coached baseball and football at Henderson County High School.

Pascal turned down a contract with the Milwaukee Braves in 1956, so he could play football for Blanton Collier at the University of Kentucky. Pascal said his only two regrets were not winning the state basketball title, and not playing basketball for Adolph Rupp at the University of Kentucky. He says he was just too beat up to try and play basketball too.

Pascal received his bachelors degree in Physical education at UK and obtained his masters degree at Murray State, and his first rank also at Murray State. Elaine, (a 1960 Henderson Holy Name graduate) & Pascal married in 1962 and have 3 children. They have two sons Tracy, Edward, and daughter Jodie. Both sons reside in Henderson and daughter Jodie resides in Louisville KY. His favorite memories of Henderson as a student were obviously his sports prowess and the sock hops at City High Gymnasium after the home games.

Benson said that Bill Haley & his Comets were his favorite group. Pascal retired as a teacher at Henderson County High School in 1988, and operated his own driving school the same year. Pascal and his wife Elaine teach ballroom dancing today.

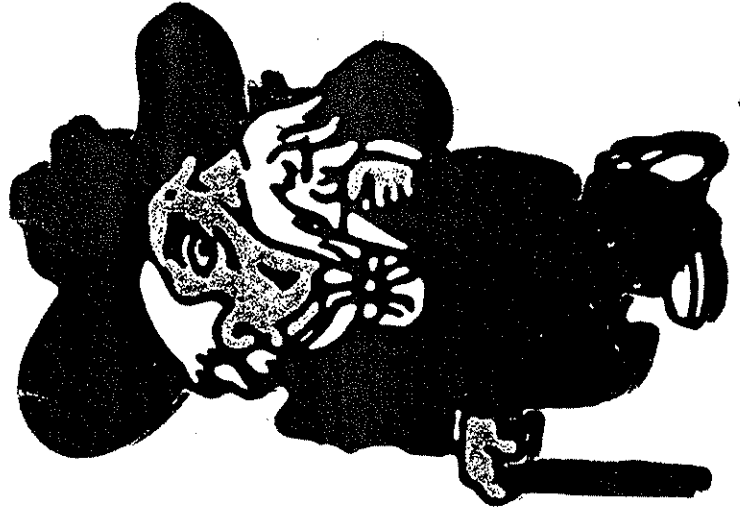

Fails To Get All Votes

Lexington, Ky., March 17, 1956

Record-husht King Kelly Coleman still has one skeptic.

The talented Wayland guard, who either broke or helped break eight records here tonight, missed by only one ballot of being a unanimous selection for the All-State Tournament team picked by coaches, officials and members of the press and radio.

Central City's Corky Withrow and Henderson's Byron Pinson, both of whom made all-tourney last year, also made the honor team.

State champion Carr Creek placed E. A. Couch and Bobby Shepherd on the team.

In addition to Pinson, runner-up Henderson landed David Watkins and Pascal Benson.

Completing the star selections were Harry Todd of Earlington, Billy Lickert of Lafayette and Rex Story of Mayfield.

Todd is only a sophomore and Lickert is a junior. It was learned today that Lickert played most of the game against Bell County Friday night with a broken left wrist.

Here are the records King Kelly either broke or shared:

1. Most points in one state tourney game, 68, breaking his own record of 50 set against Shelbyville in the opening game.
2. Memorial Coliseum one-game record, breaking Cliff Reagan's mark of 51, set against Temple for Kentucky.
3. Four-game individual total of 185 points, breaking the 127 scored last year by Hazard's Johnny Cox.
4. New individual points-per-game average of 46.25, breaking Cox's mark of 31.75 set by Cox.
5. Wayland and Bell County set new two-team total of 211.

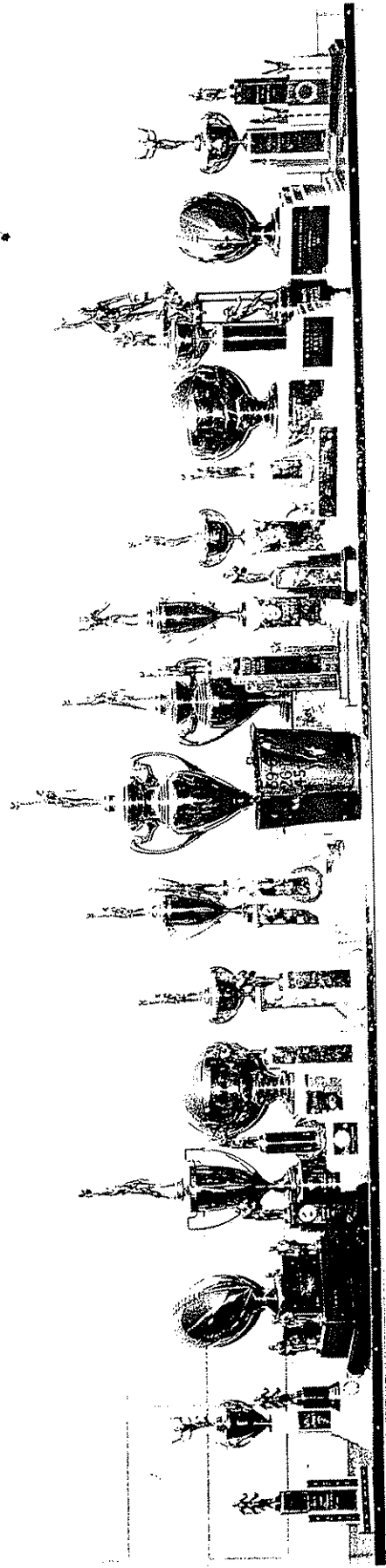

Finally in the College of Engineering.

PASCAL (Lord) BENSON—Junior—Henderson, Ky.

Along with Bob Talamini, Benson could possibly present the closest battle for a starting berth of any one single position on the team. An added year on Talamini and bigger size may give the former Henderson High All-Everything a slight edge on his competitor. Started the opening game at guard against Georgia Tech last season and saw action in eight games for a total playing time of 116:16. One of only four returning lettermen at the thinly manned guard slots. He's the best when the going is the toughest and seems to thrive on contact. May be called on for some kickoff, extra point or field goal duty.



ROBERT (Bob) EAMES—Sophomore—Clifton Forge, Va.

UK coaches, feeling the strain of a lack of desirable strength at the guard positions, have reached down into the fullback ranks to pull out an impressive guard candidate in the person of Eames. Physically equipped for the position as he stacks up at a stocky 5-11, 203. Saw extensive action in the spring intra-squad tussle where he was the number-one replacement at left guard for the White's starter, Pascal Benson. Entered in mid-year (February, 1956) and that extra semester he had to adjust has seemed to make Eames one of the more matures youngsters on the squad. Came to UK via Clifton Forge High and Fishburne Military School. Played halfback and captained the All-State team. Also took part in basketball, track and was state schoolboy boxing champion in baseball with a .462 average as a catcher-third baseman. Bob was regular catcher and one of top hitters for Coach Lancaster's baseball nine. Has better than average speed for linemen. A red-shirt in '57.

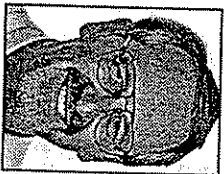

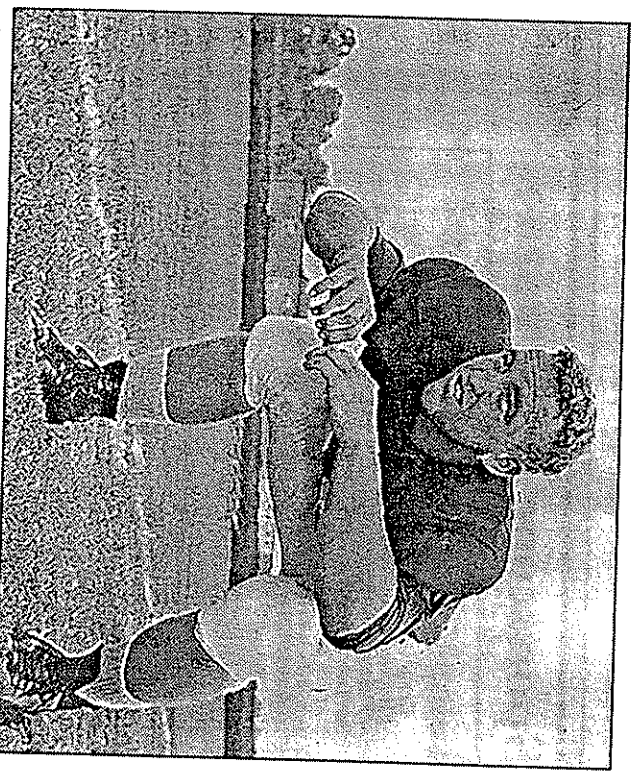
Names in sports

My excitement and passion for Kentucky Football, specifically UK football, was overshadowed by my disappointment in not honoring the 1959 UK football team for their accomplishments during Saturday's game versus Tennessee. (letter sent to Benson e-mail right after KY-TN game, Fall of 2009)
 Shortest version I can muster from a long story.....

The 1956 UK freshman football team defeated UT's freshman. They went on to win the next 3 years as the Varsity team. Kentucky only one six and tied one game over the next 28 years. The record since 1984 is well-documented (0-26).

Here's my passion for Mr. Benson. He was kind enough as a young 22-year-old to give the 1959 UK / UT game ball he earned to my uncle. The ball was passed along to me and has been a cherished artifact in my home.

The players at UK from 1956-1959 deserved to be honored in Lexington last night. Pascal Benson was the Most Outstanding Player (MOP) in the game 50 years ago. He should have been a part of getting the kids motivated last night with his story.

Pascal was not MOP

Unfortunately, the UK staff wasn't interested in making this happen. I know - I have pushed for such an honor for the past 2 years. I even offered the University the ball to be used as part of the potential ceremony.

His accolades at Henderson County speak for themselves - yet to give an earned ball to a young man says a ton more about a person and goes way beyond the game of football.

My disappointment in the UK staff is only brightened by knowing Mr. Benson's character and generosity.

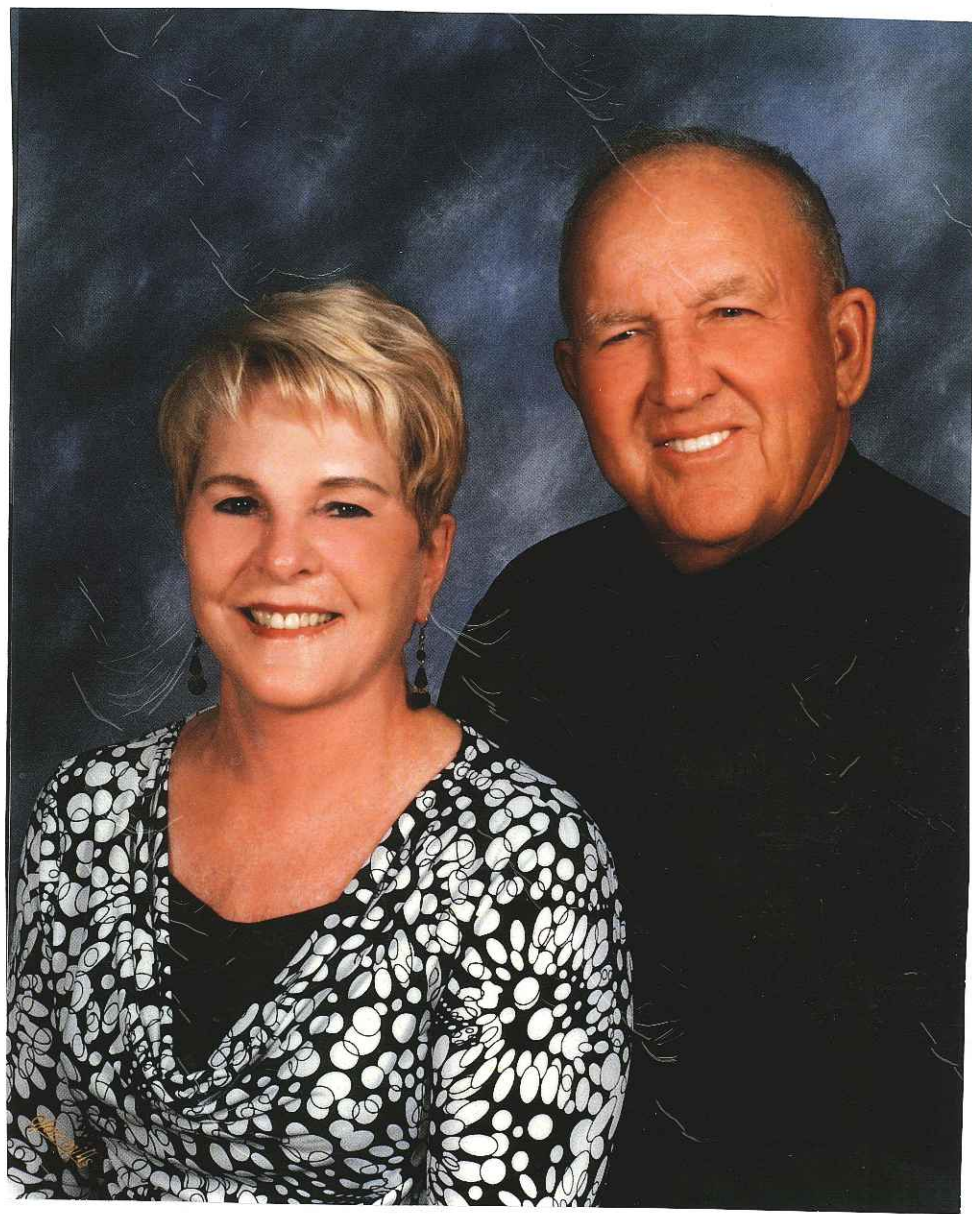

I write in support of one of Kentucky's greatest all-around prep athletes, Pascal Benson (Henderson City High Class of 1956), as a very worthy candidate for the Dawahares KHSAA Hall of Fame.

I understand from T.L. Plain, his former basketball-baseball coach at Henderson, that you already have in hand the background information on his achievements.

Just in case, it should be noted that he was a legitimate All-State selection in THREE sports: Football, basketball and baseball as a star player on the undefeated Henderson City High football team (10-0) that claimed the mythical state championship; a guard-forward on the Flash basketball team that was runnerup to Carr Creek in the State Tournament and a pitcher-first baseman on the Flash team that finished third in the state baseball tournament.

"Legitimate" is the key word here, as records on file with your organization will document.

My support of his selection to the Hall of Fame comes from a unique perspective: 1. I was quarterback of the Morganfield High team that lost, 7-6, to the 1955 Flash. 2. I was a starting guard on the Morganfield High basketball team that lost to the 1955-56 Henderson squad; and (3) I was the losing pitcher on the Morganfield High baseball team eliminated from District play by the Benson-led Flash.
