He also won Coach of the Year in 1975. At Paris High School he won 2 State football championships in 1981 and 1982. He was State Runner-up at Paris in 1984. He had a 38 game win streak at Paris which was the longest at that time. Head Football Coach at Henderson Co. where he won 5 District Championships. Was in the top 10 in the state every year. Head Football Coach at Warren East 1995-1998. Came back to Paris High School from 1999-2003. One of only 3 coaches to ever win State football titles at 2 different high Schools in Kentucky. Also Athletic Director and served as Principal in 1991-1993 at Paris Middle School.

### To the Dawahares/KHSAA Hall of Fame Committee:

I am writing to you to place Coach Randy Reese in nomination for the Dawahares/KHSAA Hall of Fame Award for the class of 2011. We were very fortunate to have had Coach Reese as our Head Football Coach at Paris High School from 1979 to 1986. When you mention Paris High School, people remember Blanton Collier, Bill Arnsparger, Harry Lancaster, Dick Butler, Dude Hennessey, Homer Goins and Randy Reese as men who were the foundation of our school and its athletic tradition.

Randy Reese won his first Class A State football championship at Ludlow High School in 1975. At that time he was the youngest coach to win a State Championship and was also named Class A Coach of the Year. After coaching three years at Ludlow, Coach Reese moved on to Paris High School where he coached from 1979 to 1986. During this time Coach Reese was one of the most successful coaches in the state of Kentucky as he won two Class A State football championships in 1981 and 1982. He also guided the Greyhounds to a state runner-up in 1984. The Paris High School football program was one of the most respected and feared in the state as they won 38 consecutive games in a row, the longest winning streak in Kentucky at that time. The Greyhounds only lost six games in a six year span which is quite an accomplishment for a Class A school. Coach Reese also served as Athletic Director for PHS.

After leaving Paris, Coach Reese was hired at Henderson County High School where he won five District championships and was rated as one of the top teams in the state every year at Henderson County. In 1995 Coach Reese became the Head Football Coach at Warren East High School where he led them to several state playoffs. In 1995 Coach Reese returned to Paris High School to rebuild the football program. He took over a once proud program and returned it to respectability winning a District championship in 2002. He also was Principal of the Paris Middle School for several years before retiring in 2003.

Randy Reese has received many honors as a coach and as a person. To me his greatest assets are his faith and his love for the game of football and what it can do for young people. He was a coach who enjoyed working with kids and taking them and making them honorable young men. He taught the game of football as it should be taught. He placed many players in college. He always gave of his time and effort to help a young man in need. He taught his players how to compete and that the good morals of faith, character and sportsmanship would help them in life. He was a leader in the community of Paris Kentucky.

Coach Randy Reese is one of the most respected high school football coaches in the state of Kentucky. His hard work, his character and his success are what make him a great candidate for this award. I have enclosed letters, from former players, coaches, Superintendent of Paris High School, former NFL Coach Bill Arnsparger. I have also sent some clippings from our school. We feel that Coach Randy Reese should be elected to the Dawahares/KHSAA Hall of Fame that honors so many great people. Paris High School will always be grateful to Coach Randy Reese. His Ludlow team won a state championship in the 70's, and two of his Paris teams were state champions in the 80's.

His Henderson County, and Warren East teams were also very successful.

Randy's Paris teams were on the nation's longest winning streak at one point in the mid 80's.




# District Title Back Where It Belongs


The Paris Greyhounds football team had a successful season this year. During the 1980 season, the Hounds won 6 games and lost 6, had a four game winning streak, won their first District Title since 1974, and went undefeated in CKC play at 4-0. The Hounds had a tough schedule this year playing four teams that were at one point ranked No. 1 in Class A and two teams ranked as high as No. 2 in the state. The Hounds also played two 3-A schools.


Paris did manage some glory moments during the year. The team's great comeback against Harrodsburg to win 22-20 and their almost upset of Paintsville (ranked then No. 1) are just two of the high points. Paris managed a big win over No. 2 Berea and a beautiful victory over always powerful Richmond Madison. The individual highlights of this 1980 season were Timmy Dale's 204 yards rushing against Nicholas County and Dwayne Duncan's fumble recovery against Bourbon County.










CLEAR THE WAY, FELLOWS! James Clark is hoping his blockers can give him room to run for the first down or even more. What's a runner without blockers?




Hounds Reach Championship; Bring Home Title

The Hounds went undefeated and secured the state title for the first time since 1973. Paris is the only high school ever to win the state championship and go undefeated in the same season.

The Hounds got the season off to a good start by defeating Owen Co. 27-6, this is the same team that beat us in '80 in the state playoffs. As the season progressed, the Hounds crushed the arch rival Colonels by an astounding score of 34-7. Dedicated spirit and continous optimism led the Hounds to a 'dream come true' victory over Bellevue by a score of 19-7 to become the 1981 state champs.




Brian Wall lays on one of his famous tackles.





Terry Rice heads for his last career touchdown. He gained 551 yards rushing on attempts this year.









I was disappointed to see that my old high school coach, Randy Reese, was not qualified enough to be inducted into your Hall of Fame. Beyond the fact that this true Christian won 3 State Championships for 2 different teams in the State of Kentucky and has the record for the 5th highest consecutive wins to date, I don't believe on the field records even mirror the personal attributes of this gentle man.

I was a Senior at Ludlow High School during the 1975 KHSAA football season, and was fortunate enough to play under the tutilage of this great coach, as were many of my friends who I'm sure would echo my statements described herein. Ludlow is a small community in Northern Kentucky who had never had a large turn out for football, which also meant we always had less talent than other teams, that is until 1975. Mr. Reese brought an electric excitement to our school, and we were fortunate to have the largest turnout ever that summer of 1975. Young men who never knew they could play football were finding out they could. Those that could play were finding out they could play better. In my youth, coming from a broken home without a father present during my later teen years, Mr. Reese introduced me to the Christian Athletes philosophy. He took us to church on Sundays for Sunday mass. He was the father some of us never had. I believe we won the State Championship in Class A not necessarily for ourselves that year, but more for Coach Reese and the other coaches and our city.
