- 3) Determine the total number of participants that are currently on the teams that were added in the last five years.
- Calculate the percentage of participants that have been added in the last five years. For example, if girls' varsity soccer (22 participants), junior varsity soccer (18 participants), junior varsity golf (8 participants), and freshman softball (15 participants) have been added in the last five years, then 63 participation opportunities have been added for girls. If cheerleaders are selected in such a way as to result in arguably better (i.e. "A" team vs. "B" team) cheerleaders performing at boys' events, the school shall also submit a plan under which cheerleaders of equal ability shall perform at an equal number of boys' and girls' games in comparable sport (i.e., boys' varsity and girls' varsity basketball game).
