- Ask the head coaches to review the most updated eligibility or squad lists for their teams. Ask coaches to confirm the names of those individuals who are on the team as of the first date of competition, and cross out the names of those who were cut from the team or quit the team prior to the first competitive event. Determine the total number of interscholastic athletics participants that are girls. In order to determine the total number of athletics participants an individual should be counted each time he or she participates on a team. For example, if Jane Doe competes on the varsity volleyball team, the junior varsity volleyball team, the junior varsity basketball team, and the varsity softball team, she should be counted as four participants (do not include club or intramural sports participants or cheerleaders). Calculate the same way for boys and girls. * In addition, should 8th grade students and below play on a Freshman, Junior Varsity, or Varsity team, they should also be counted for each team and sport they participate in. - 2) Calculate the number of interscholastic teams that have been added in the last five years at each competitive level.
- 3) Determine the total number of participants that are currently on the teams that were added in the last five years.
- Calculate the percentage of participants that have been added in the last five years. For example, if girls' varsity soccer (22 participants), junior varsity soccer (18 participants), junior varsity golf (8 participants), and freshman softball (15 participants) have been added in the last five years, then 63 participation opportunities have been added for girls. If the total number of female participants in the program is 300 (taken from Form T-1, Column 4), then 21% of the current opportunities (63 of 300) have been added in the last five years. Note: The total number of male/female participants should be the same as Column 4 on Summary Program Chart 1 on Form T-1.

Note: If the percentage of current female participants added in the last five years is 25% or greater, compliance with test two may be possible. If less than 25%, then compliance with test three should be analyzed. <u>CAUTION</u>: 25% is <u>not</u> a formal compliance standard. The count shall be taken on the first day of competition for students that are officially members of the team.

- 2) Determine the total number of participants for boys and girls at each competitive level. (#2, 5, 8)
- Calculate the percentage of female and male participants at each level. (3, 6, 9)

 Example: Take the total number of female participants from the Summary Program

 Chart 1 (Form T-1) and divide it into the number of total participants for each varsity, junior varsity and freshman level. Perform the same calculation for male participants. For example, if there are a total of 300 female participants, and 180 girls are on varsity teams, 80 girls on junior varsity teams, and 40 girls on freshman teams, then 60% of girls' participation opportunities are at the varsity level (180 divided by 300), 27% are at the junior varsity level (80 divided by 300), and 13% are at the freshman level (40 divided by 300). If there are a total of 400 male participants, and 250 participate at the varsity level, 100 boys participate on junior varsity teams, and 50 boys participate on freshman teams, then 63% of boys participate at the varsity level (250 divided by 400), 25% compete at the junior varsity level (100 divided by 400), and 13% compete at the freshman level (50 divided by 400).
