For example, if there are a total of 300 female participants, and 180 girls are on varsity teams, 80 girls on junior varsity teams, and 40 girls on freshman teams, then 60% of girls' participation opportunities are at the varsity level (180 divided by 300), 27% are at the junior varsity level (80 divided by 300), and 13% are at the freshman level (40 divided by 300).
