- 2) Determine the total number of participants for boys and girls at each competitive level. (#2, 5, 8)
- 3) Calculate the percentage of female and male participants at each level. (3, 6, 9) Example: Take the total number of female participants from the Summary Program Chart 1 (Form T-1) and divide it into the number of total participants for each varsity, junior varsity and freshman level. Perform the same calculation for male participants. For example, if there are a total of 300 female participants, and 180 girls are on varsity teams, 80 girls on junior varsity teams, and 40 girls on freshman teams, then 60% of girls' participation opportunities are at the varsity level (180 divided by 300), 27% are at the junior varsity level (80 divided by 300), and 13% are at the freshman level (40 divided by 300). 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KENTUCKY SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND EXPLANATION OF VERIFICATION OF TITLE IX COMPLIANCE Kenneth W. Jones KSB Athletics Director

The committee established to determine the Kentucky School for the Blind's (KSB) compliance with Title IX unanimously agreed to attach an explanation with its documentation. This was decided because KSB is atypical of most public and private schools in its ability to offer the array of athletic opportunities our students may compete. KSB is unlike the traditional public or private school that has the student population to compete in the variety of sports sanctioned by the Kentucky High School Athletic Association (KHSAA).

The Title IX compliance committee consists of Richmond Marcy (Compliance Coordinator), Eric Emberg (Principal), Kenneth Jones (Athletic Director), Lisa Dickens (Counselor), Maury Weedman (Parent), Lori Johnson (Recreation Director), Jerry Ennis (Coach), and Jamie Dunham (Student). We have met on three occasions as mandated by KHSAA regulations.

Besides membership in KHSAA, KSB is a member of the North Central Association of Schools for the Blind (NCASB). Established in 1956, this conference offers opportunities for athletic competition in Girls and Boys Track and Field (Fall), Wrestling and Cheerleading (Winter), and Boys and Girls Swimming (Spring). The only sport KSB athletes compete against public and private schools is in wrestling.

KSB follows the eligibility requirements of the NCASB and KHSAA. Athletic competition is available for boys and girls 14 years of age or in the seventh grade by September 1 in all sports. Wrestlers can not compete against public and private high school wrestlers in Kentucky until they are in the ninth grade. Due to our small population eligible to compete in athletics (54), we do not offer junior varsity or freshmen sports opportunities.

The Title IX compliance committee strongly believes KSB provides equity in all areas indicated on the Athletic Audit Checklist. A description of how equity is achieved is listed below.

Equipment and Supplies

Equipment and supplies are ordered on an as need basis for our athletic programs. Usually boys and girls teams order equipment at the same time. Boys and girls have similar numbers in uniforms and share similar warm-ups in track and field and swimming. Females who compete in wrestling wear the same style team uniform and warm ups as boys. Teams utilize the same equipment and medical supplies.

Scheduling of Games and Practice

All varsity teams regardless of sex practice at the same time, from about 3:30-5:30, Monday through Thursday. Athletes practice together using the same facilities and equipment. Athletic trips in the NCASB are scheduled in the spring with boys and girls teams traveling together. Girls who compete on the wrestling team practice and compete as equal members of the team.

Travel and Per Diem Allowance

Boys and girls track and field and swim teams travel together and have equal allowances for meals. KSB uses chartered busses for out of town trips. Girls who compete on the wrestling team travel with the team.

Coaching

KSB has traditionally offered one head coaching position to coach the girls and boys swim team, however two assistant coaches are usually hired. The current head coach is the most experienced and senior coach on the staff. He also coaches the girls' track and field team. When a head coaching vacancy becomes open, the position is posted and filled according to KHSAA guidelines. Every athletic team has a minimum of one assistant coach.

Locker Room, Practice and Competitive Facilities

Although girls and boys dress in separate locker rooms, they are equal in all aspects being located in the same building. The most recent updates have included painting and replacing the tile on the locker room floor. These updates occurred in both locker rooms at the same time. Varsity teams compete using the same facilities.

Medical and Training Facilities and Services

We do not have medical facilities at this time. We have exercise facilities which girls' and boys' teams have equal access. KSB has nurses that can provide services 24 hours a day when needed who are available to boys and girls. <u>All</u> coaches are certified in CPR and First Aid as mandated by KHSAA guidelines.

Publicity

KSB has a staff person designated to provide press releases to local media for purposes of publicity. This is done when we host a major event such as the conference championships in wrestling and cheerleading that were held on our campus in January. This same person publishes the school newsletter and keeps parents informed of athletic and other events. Coaches submit results of athletic competitions. The results are provided more on the basis coaches distribute information rather than gender.

Support Services

KSB's support services include the business office, housekeeping, maintenance, residential services, food services, and health center. Upcoming athletic information is provided to them through the Athletic Director with boys and girls listed on the same form. Services are provided from these services on an equitable basis.

<u>Tutoring</u>

All KSB students have the opportunity for assistance from their teachers after school or the Learning Media Center from 6:30-9:00 Sunday through Thursday evening.

Housing and Dining Facilities and Services

Since students who attend our school are from all parts of the state, KSB provides residential facilities. Although boys and girls are housed in separate facilities, they are equal in terms of appearance. Boys and girls dine in the same facilities

KSB has an appropriately adapted Physical Education and Recreation program that offers students a wide array of activities. Some of these include bowling, roller skating, ice skating, skiing, soccer, football, and volleyball. Dialogue is currently taking place with golf pros across the state to offer our students golf.

We hope this attachment is beneficial in determining whether our school is in compliance with Title IX. It is our goal to offer KSB students and visually impaired students statewide the opportunity to compete in athletics regardless of race, sex, or origin.
