E. APPROVAL OF A BG-1 PROJECT APPLICATION FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A GIRLS SOFTBALL FIELD ON LAFAYETTE HIGH SCHOOL CAMPUS

BACKGROUND:

On September 27, 1999, the coaching staff and girls softball booster club brought to the Board of Education a request to construct a softball field on the Lafayette High School campus. At that time the booster club was stating that they would fund the project. Based on the recommendation of the staff and in light of Title IX requirements, the Board approved the project. During a recent meeting with the Lafayette principal, the High School Director, members of the Lafayette Girls Softball Booster Club, and the Director, Physical Support Services, The boosters stated that their attempts to raise the necessary funds had fallen far short of the funds needed for the project. They attributed this to visibility and attention that has been focused of late on Title IX. Not withstanding, the need for a softball field still exists to bring the District closer to compliance. The boosters requested that the District construct a basic softball field and they would undertake responsibility for further enhancements. A large portion of the driveway and additional parking in Phase I is needed due to the construction of SCAPA to separate traffic.
