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

2000-2001 Title IX Requirements Page 2 of 2

A re-cap of the KHSAA requirements for Title IX are as follows:

- 1. Gender Equity Review Committees shall be in place to address local concerns and meet a minimum of three times each year with minutes of the meetings kept in the school's Title IX File. The committee shall monitor progress with regard to the school's Corrective Action Plan goals and address Title IX issues at the school.
- 2. Schools need to keep their permanent Title IX File current to include copies of all information submitted to the KHSAA.
- Schools must currently conduct, a Student Interest Survey (Form T-61), on an annual basis. Student Interest Surveys must be kept on file for the previous two years and may be examined by the visiting KHSAA Audit Team. The Student Interest Surveys shall include students in Grades 9, 10 and 11. Grade 12 may be included as well. Grade 8 students may also be included if they are in middle schools that feed into the high school.

The KHSAA Audit Team members will continue to visit 20% of the membership this year to assist schools with their compliance program. The KHSAA Annual Delegate Assembly Meeting scheduled for January 9, 2001 will once again include a workshop on Title IX requirements and current issues.

The KHSAA remains available at any time to assist you with this important project.



MADISON SOUTHERN HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC/GENDER EQUITY COMMITTEE PREAMBLE AND BY-LAWS

PREAMBLE

The Athletic/Gender Equity Committee shall provide <u>oversight</u> for the Athletic Department and shall establish policy as necessary and proper to meet the needs of the student athletes at Madison Southern High School.

BY-LAWS

- I. The Athletic/Gender Equity Committee of Madison Southern High School will be composed of the following:
 - 1) Athletic Director/Chairman
- 6) Ten (10) parents
- 7) One (1) Community Leader8) One (1) SBDM Council Member

3) All Head Coaches

2) High School Principal

- 4) One (1) Teacher (appt. by A.D.)
- 5) One (1) Middle School Administrator
- The Committee shall represent gender equity and racial balance.
- II. The Madison Southern High School Athletic Director will be chairman of the committee. The Community Leader will have a one year term. Parent members must have a student athlete to serve on the committee.
- III. The Athletic/Gender Equity Committee shall meet three (3) times each year, in the fall, winter, and summer. Special meetings can be called by the chairman.
- IV. Minutes of each meeting are to be sent to each Committee member within two (2) weeks of the last meeting date.
- V. The regular meeting agenda is to be prepared by the Athletic Director and must have a Financial Statement for review.
- VI. Athletic/Gender Equity Committee members are to be made aware of the next meeting, via the mail, one week prior to it's set date and time.
- VII. The Athletic/Gender Equity Committee shall be a standing SBDM Committee as approved by the SBDM Council.
- VIII. To amend the By-Laws requires a 2/3 vote of all members of the committee.

The Athletic/Gender Equity Committee in no way supersedes the Board of Education or SBDM Council. The primary function of the committee is to see that the policies and regulations that are approved by the Madison County Board of Education and the SBDM Council are carried out.


