Dear Mr. Stout,

In our Title IX Final Audit Report for the 2000-2001 School year we were asked to address two items as of April 15, 2001, in addition to the Title IX Report. The two items of selection of cheerleaders and prime time contests of girls' basketball are addressed below.

For the past three years we have had only one cheerleading squad for our school. The number on this squad has ranged from 16 to 18 cheerleaders. The cheerleaders must be in grades 9-12 and are selected in the previous spring based on all aspects of cheerleading ability. These cheerleaders cheer at all football games, all home boys' basketball games, all home girls' basketball games, and all basketball district and regional tournament games for both the boys and girls teams. If one basketball team has more home games than the other then the cheerleading squad will cheer at some away games to equal the home games of the other team. Having only one cheerleading squad has worked very well for us and we plan to continue these same procedures and guidelines in the future.

For the 2001-2002 school year the boys' basketball team will have 11 games on Friday/Saturday nights and the girls' basketball team will have 11 games on Friday/Saturday nights. We will have 4 Friday/Saturday nights of home double-header games. One of these double-headers will be used for senior recognition, one used for homecoming, and one used as the season opener for both teams. Two of these double-header games will be played in the high school gym where the boys play most of their home games and two will be played in the elementary gym where the girls play most of their home games. The girls will play the first game of the double-header in the high school gym and the boys will play the first game in the elementary school gym. We will continue to see that these prime time games are equal between the boys' and girls' basketball teams.

For example, if Jane Doe competes on the varsity volleyball team, the junior varsity volleyball team, the junior varsity basketball team, and the varsity softball team, she should be counted as four participants (do not include club or intramural sports participants or cheerleaders). Calculate the same way for boys and girls.
- 5) Calculate the percentage of female participation (column 1) based on information from (column 4).

Calculate the percentage of male enrollment (column 1) based on information from (column 4).

Note: While being within three percent is <u>not</u> a formal compliance standard; if the percent listed in column 5 is within 3% of column 3 then it provides a good target within which compliance is likely.
