Comments: According to the data and calculations submitted by the school and corrected by KHSAA representatives, the school has met the standard established in Test 1 for the provision of athletic opportunities during one of the past three school years (2007-08) but is not currently meeting that standard.

Comments: According to data and calculations submitted by the school and reviewed by KHSAA representatives, the standard established in Test 2 for the provision of athletic opportunities has not been met during any of the past three school years.

Comments: According to data and responses submitted by the school, it has met the standard established in Test 3 for the provision of athletic opportunities during each of the past three school years and is currently meeting that standard.

Comments: Documentation submitted by the school indicates that an 81% return rate was received on the most recent student athletic interest survey.

Accommodation of Interests and Abilities	X		According to the data, calculations, and responses submitted by the school, it has met the standard established in Test 3 for the provision of athletic opportunities during each of the past three school years. The most recent student athletic interest survey appears to support the responses given on the T-3 form. The re-visit form indicates that the school is offering all KHSAA sanctioned sports for girls at the varsity level except golf. There are a total of 16 team opportunities for both male and female athletes. School officials were commended for the wide array of athletic offerings for the size of their school population. KHSAA representatives reviewed the school's Title IX file. It was found to contain the original Title IX audit report from February 25, 2003, all annual reports to KHSAA since 1999-2000, an approved salary schedule for coaches, sample game schedules for all athletic teams, a school-generated athletic handbook, written guidelines and oversight procedures for booster clubs, written usage schedules for all shared athletic facilities, written guidelines for earning bars and letters and the posting of banners for athletic recognition, a written designation of locker room space assigned each team, written minutes for all Gender Equity Review Committee meetings for the past five years, a written uniform review, rotation, and /or replacement plan, and written guidelines for the provision of travel and per diem. School officials were commended on the development and maintenance of a comprehensive Title IX file.
Equipment and Supplies	X		The February 25, 2001 audit report rated the school as satisfactory in this area but did request the school to develop a written uniform review, rotation, and/or replacement plan. The recent visit showed that plan had been developed and was based on a four-year rotation. The uniforms and equipment seen during the 2010 visit appeared to be of high quality and provided on an equitable basis.

Equipment and Supplies (cont.)		According to the re-visit report and the 2009-1 annual report, the school was spendin approximately \$101 per female athlete an approximately \$69 per male athlete for the provision of equipment and supplies.
Scheduling of Games and Practice Time	X	At the time of the February 25, 2003 visit, the school appeared to be meeting the minimum standard established for prime date and prime time play for girls basketball. According to the school's 2009-10 results posted on the KHSA web site, 60% (6/10) of their home basketbal games were played on prime dates. A revier of posted game times showed that the standard established for prime time play we also being met. According to the re-visit report the number of competitive events schedule for "like" sports showed parity. The school vis revealed that the scheduling of shared practic facilities was equitable.
Travel and Per Diem Allowances	X	According to the re-visit report and the 2009-1 annual report, the school was spendir approximately \$16 per female athlete ar approximately \$14 per male athlete for th provision of travel and per diem. The school Title IX file contained written guidelines for th provision of per diem which indicated equity.
Coaching	X	The February 25, 2003 audit report found th area to be satisfactory but encouraged scho personnel to work to provide an equivalence accessibility to coaches for both male an female athletes. According to the 2009-1 annual report, the number of coaches provide for "like" sports appeared to show parity. Base on the re-visit report, 12.5% (1/8) of the gir head coaches are employed on campus whi 44% (4/9) of the boys head coaches are of campus employees. <u>KHSAA representative</u> <u>requested that the Gender Equity Revie</u> <u>Committee consider this situation and attem</u> to implement any programs necessary in order to provide student athletes equal access their coaches. According to the re-visit for and the 2009-10 annual report, the tot amounts of money expended for coache salaries for "like" sports is comparable. review of the school's extra service pa schedule for coaches showed parity.

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Medical and Training Facilities and Services	X	The February 25, 2003 report rated this category as satisfactory but requested that three items be addressed in order to bring about more equivalence. Those were: attempt to make the weight training room more user friendly; post an equitable facility usage schedule at the weight training facility; and insure that athletic physical examinations are provided on an equitable basis. The most recent visit showed that a new weight training/fitness center has been opened. The facility has state of the art equipment much of which is suitable for use by females. The fitness center has a posted schedule which allows equal access for female athletes. All student athletes are responsible for their own athletic physical examinations and have equitable access to a trainer through a contract with K.O.R.T.
Publicity	X	According to the re-visit form and the 2009-10 annual report, the school was spending approximately \$35 per female athlete compared to \$16 per male athlete for promotions/recognition, publicity, awards, and banquets. The school currently has one cheerleading squad that cheers at all home and post season games for football and boys and girls basketball. The cheerleaders also lead "spirit activities" for the boys and girls soccer and volleyball teams. The dance team performs at all home games for the boys and girls basketball teams.
Support Services	X	The February 25, 2003 audit report requested that the school's Gender Equity Review Committee monitor the amount of athletic spending in regard to the participation ratio for boys and girls. According to school officials, booster club support currently exists for almost all teams. School policy requires that all booster funds be housed in school accounts and that the spending of booster funds follows the purchase order process as is the case for other school funds. According to

Support Services continued		documentation provided by the school for 2008-09, athletic spending was within acceptable parameters on a per athlete basis but slightly outside those parameters on a percentage basis. In 2009-10, spending was within acceptable guidelines on both a percentage and per athlete basis.
