Originally school personnel did not calculate the number of participants correctly. The percent of total participation by sex was also not correct on the original self-evaluation or on the last annual report. Corrections were made and the calculation process was explained. The school appeared to meet the criteria in 2000-2001.

Equipment and Supplies		X	 Expenditures were not delineated on Forms T- 35 and T-36. The data entered on Forms T-8 through T-10 were not consistent with the information listed on Forms T-5 submitted by the coaches. The quality of uniforms rated "excellent" on Form T-6 showed 49% of the boys inventory were rated as such compared to only 17% of the girls' uniforms. Volleyball uniforms need upgrading. Practice uniforms were provided to 31% of the male participants (basketball & football) and only 15% of the female participants (basketball). Shoes were provided for 23% of the male athletes and only 10% of female athletes. Some sports specific equipment was not available for review due to random storage

Games and Practice Time			schedule prime-time games for girls' basketball. During the 2000-2001 season, only one away game was scheduled for either Friday or Saturday night. For the 2001-2002 season, four games, two home and two away (not including tournaments) were scheduled. One home game is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Not including tournament play, four prime time games represent 19% of the total games to be played.
Travel and Per Diem Allowances	X		It was not clear as to how meals were provided for home and away competitions. The Gender Equity Review Committee was advised to review current practices in this regard and to

		consider a policy that will ensure this benefit is not provided to a disproportionate number of male to female athletes.
Coaching	X	Data provided on the original self-evaluation document indicated that 48% of the coaches for male teams had overlapping coaching responsibilities and 91% of the coaches for female teams had overlapping coaching assignments. For basketball, only one coach for the boys' team held overlapping coaching duties while four out of the five coaches for the girls' team held other coaching positions. Four out of five coaches signified that they sometimes miss practices. Coaches of boys' teams had three times the coaching experience at the school than those of the girls' teams and almost two-thirds had more coaching experience overall.
Locker Rooms, Practice and Competitive Facilities	X	Two male teams (basketball & football) have permanently assigned locker rooms. The girl's teams have only one (basketball). The locker rooms for boys are either new or have been recently remodeled. The girl's basketball locker room is smaller than the coach's office and adjoining weight training area. It is also not as well furnished.
		The remaining boys' sports teams (Spring Sports) share a locker room with the physical education classes, and the visiting football team use it in the Fall. The same is true for girls' teams and their locker room. In addition, the girls' locker room serves visiting football teams and the school's volleyball team.
		The facility serving the volleyball team and also the girls' basketball team for some of the practices has a tile over concrete floor as opposed to the basketball arena which has wooden floors. Since volleyball and basketball are considered contact sports, the potential for chronic or accidental injury is greater for these teams than they are for the boys' basketball teams.

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Ň			The school appears to have sufficient storage space available for all of their teams, however it is randomly utilized. It is recommended that school personnel and the Gender Equity Review Committee review the space that is available and assign each team adequate space and accessibility for storing equipment in an equitable manner for both in season and out of season.
Medical and Training Facilities and Services	X		It is recommended that the school personnel, with the assistance of the Gender Equity Review Committee, work towards more integration of the weight room for use by all teams, taking into consideration the various means of physical training in order to accommodate both male and female athletes. This could free-up space for updating the girls' basketball locker room.
Publicity	X		It is recommended that the Gender Equity Review Committee monitor the cheerleader selection process to assure that the members of the two squads continue to have comparable talent, enthusiasm, and benefits. It is also suggested that efforts be made by the girls' squad to widen promotion and support for girls' sports other than basketball. This could offset the imbalance of active cheerleader support for two male teams and only one girls' team. It was not possible to assess the equivalency of printed promotional material provided for teams and games. This should be undertaken by the Gender Equity Review Committee.

5. Brief Summary/Analysis of The Corrective Action Plan (T-60)

Primarily the Corrective Action Plan addressed the problem areas directly or indirectly. However, the timetable listed for completing the corrective projects was not definitive.

6. Observed Deficiencies in Overall Girls and Boys Athletics Programs

The compounding effect of overlapping coaching positions appeared to impact the girls' sports program more than the boys program. Provision of meals seemed to be unequal based on observations during the on site visit. It appeared that football athletes had more benefits than those on other teams.

7. Facility Recommendations or Concerns

The baseball infield is in need of repair. The cause of the excess wear and tear appear to be caused by its use as a practice field by the football team. If there is no site off campus to conduct football practice, it is recommended that the infield not be used in that capacity and be cordoned off during football season. Outfield repair should begin at the earliest possible date following football season.

Softball, golf, tennis, and track practice compete at off-campus sites. Since this inconvenience affects more girls than boys, it could become a Title IX issue. Because of this and liability concerns, it is recommended that school personnel look into the possibility of running activity busses to these outlying areas. (One of the suggestions listed on the latest student interest survey was that the school provide transportation to practice and games as a means of increasing participation.)

It is recommended that the girls' basketball locker room be remodeled to permit more dressing area for the athletes and that a visiting team locker room in the arena be converted to a locker room for volleyball. Since overlapping seasons is not a problem, it could still be used as a visiting team locker room during basketball season. More importantly, in order to rectify the inequity in the indoor playing facilities, it is recommended that the arena be equipped for volleyball play.

School shall submit the following additional information:

(Prime Time Contest/Girls' Basketball) On or before April 15, 2002, the school is requested to provide information to the KHSAA concerning the number of "prime time" games scheduled (games to be played on Friday and/or Saturday nights) for its girls' varsity basketball team during the 2002-2003 season. To the extent that a fewer percentage of girls' games will be played during prime times (when compared with the percentage of boys' games scheduled for prime times), the school will note any progress made towards providing more prime time games for girls' basketball.

(Support Services – Budget) On or before February 1, 2002, school personnel shall resubmit Forms T-35 and T-36 to the KHSAA office for the 1999-2000 and 2000-2001 school years making certain that funds or services "in kind" from all sources are included.

(Coaching) On or before February 1, 2002, school personnel shall resubmit Forms T-18 through T-25 to the KHSAA office for either the 1999-2000 or the 2000-2001 school year, making certain that salary amounts reflect money earned for extended days and or any bonuses awarded. As an attachment to its 2001-2002 annual report, school personnel shall list coaching assignments for the 2002-2003 school year to the extent possible, outlining its attempts to reduce overlapping of coaching positions.

(Equipment and Supplies) As an attachment to the 2001-2002 annual report, the school shall submit a report of its review of the quality and quantity of personal equipment provided to male and female athletes. It shall also note any corrective action that will be taken to rectify any inequities. It is suggested that the Gender Equity Review Committee be involved in the process.

(Facilities) On its 2001-2002 Corrective Action Plan (Form T-60), the school shall address the remodeling of the girls' basketball locker room, the provision of a volleyball locker room and suitable playing surface, and accompanying equipment for volleyball.

NOTE: School personnel shall indicate on its' 2001-2002 Corrective Action Plan, to be submitted on April 15, 2002, that the original self-evaluation document has been amended for accuracy and placed in the school's permanent Title IX File.

10. Comments

There have been several turnovers in coaching positions as well as other school positions since the original self-evaluation was submitted to include the superintendent's office. The original data submitted was incomplete and inaccurate in some instances, however it is fully anticipated that completion and corrections of baseline data will take place and be a valid resource for further evaluation. The Gender Equity Review Committee appeared to be very interested in the role it plays at the school and its involvement was apparent.

There were two members of the community and two members of the Gender Equity Review Committee who attended the meeting scheduled for 6:00 p.m. No Title IX inquiries were made. The two topics of interest were the provision of baseball uniforms and the condition of the baseball field, which was referred to the school personnel.
