Accommodation of Interests and Abilities		X	According to the documents provided and evidence gathered during the school visit, the school does not meet the standards established in any of the three opportunities tests. (See KHSAA Recommended Action). Proper methods of counting participants and the calculations of Title IX forms were discussed with school officials. Various methods of pursuing athletic interests indicated on the student surveys were also discussed. School officials were alerted to the fact that the school's corrective action plan should reflect major areas of need related to equity.
Equipment and Supplies	X		The school currently has a uniform replacement plan based on a six-year rotation for a complete uniform (home and away). The school visit showed that athletes are provided with a good quality of uniforms and equipment.
Scheduling of Games and Practice Time	X		The school visit provided information which indicates that the school's practice facilities are shared in an equitable manner. "Prime time" basketball play was discussed. The school's 2002-2003 basketball schedule shows that 54% of the total girls' basketball games were played in "prime time" and 50% of the girls' home games were in "prime time". The school's 2003-2004 schedule shows 40% of the total girls' basketball games are to be played in "prime time" while 33% of the home games are in "prime time". School officials were encouraged to strive for a consistent 50% of "prime time" girls' basketball games each year.

Travel and Per Diem Allowances	X	Information provided at the school visit indicated equity in this area.
Coaching	X	Coaches' salaries appeared equitable. The school report for 1999-2000 showed that 60% of the girls' coaches were employed off the school campus while only 25% of the boys' coaches were employed off campus. School officials were encouraged to take this benefit into consideration when hiring coaches in the future.
Locker Rooms, Practice and Competitive Facilities	X	School officials were requested to place a separate Form T-26 for each of their athletic locker rooms in their permanent Title IX file as well as a separate Form T-27 for each of their practice and/or competitive facilities. The school visit showed a great need for a general upgrading of athletic locker rooms.
Medical and Training Facilities and Services	X	It was suggested to school officials that there be a posted weight training schedule in the school's weight room.
Publicity	X	Cheerleading was discussed. The school currently has one cheerleading squad which cheers at all boys and girls varsity games both home and away. It was suggested that the Gender Equity Review Committee look into the feasibility of developing a policy for the posting of forms of recognition in the school gymnasium.
Support Services	X	An analysis of athletic spending shows the school spends more per female athlete than per male athlete. Booster clubs were discussed. School officials appear to have a positive working relationship and proper administrative control in regard to the athletic booster club.

5. Brief Summary/Analysis of the Corrective Action Plan (T-60)

The school's most recent Corrective Action Plan calls for an increase in girls' "prime time" basketball games, upgrading the boys' and girls' dressing facilities, and improvements in the softball and baseball facilities.

6. Observed Deficiencies in Overall Girls and Boys Athletics Programs

The major deficiency observed during the school visit was the school's inability to meet the standards in any of the three tests for athletic opportunities. (See KHSAA Recommended Action)

7. Facility Recommendations or Concerns

The major facility observed to be in need of upgrading was the school's locker rooms.

(Accommodation of Interest and Abilities) On or before November 30, 2003, school personnel are to submit to the KHSAA a letter describing in detail the steps to be taken by the school in order to meet the standards established in at least one of the three tests for opportunities. These steps should also be reflected in the school's April 15, 2004 Corrective Action Plan.

(Selection of Cheerleaders) On or before April 15, 2004, school personnel are requested to provide information to the KHSAA concerning the manner in which cheerleaders are selected for boys' and girls' teams. If cheerleaders are selected in such a way as to result in arguably better (i.e. "A" team vs. "B" team) cheerleaders performing at boys' events, the school shall also submit a plan under which cheerleaders of equal ability shall perform at an equal number of boys' and girls' games in comparable sport (i.e., boys' varsity and girls' varsity basketball game).

(Prime Time Contest/Girls' Basketball) On or before April 15, 2004, school personnel are requested to provide information to the KHSAA concerning the number of "prime time" games scheduled (games to be played on Friday and/or Saturday nights) for its girls' varsity basketball team during the 2004-2005 season. To the extent that a fewer percentage of girls' games are played during "prime times" (when compared with the percentage of boys' games scheduled for "prime times"), the school shall advise the KHSAA of action it intends to take to immediately correct the difference.
