School officials were alerted to the fact that offering co-ed soccer would not meet the requirements if there was enough interest to offer a separate girls team.

Students Accommodation of Interests and Abilities	Χ		According to data provided by the school personnel at the time of the September 23, 2003 original audit visit, the school was not meeting the standard established in any of the three tests for provision of athletic participation opportunities. School personnel have added a volleyball program at the varsity and junior varsity levels and are offering <u>co-ed</u> soccer (two girls participated in 2005-2006). With this increase in the provision of athletic participation opportunities, the school appears to be meeting the standard established in Test #3. School officials were alerted to the fact that the interest in girls' soccer should be monitored very closely. It was suggested to school officials that they administer the Student Survey every school year in order to properly monitor this interest. KHSAA Audit Team reviewed the school's Title IX file. The file contained Gender Equity Review Committee Meeting minutes from 1999 through 2005, printed athletic schedules, fall and winter sports programs, an extra service pay schedule, a locker room assignment sheet, a gym usage schedule, and all district policies relating to
			equity. KHSAA Audit Team discussed the
			proper development of and a follow up to a Corrective Action Plan with school officials.

Equipment and Supplies	X	According to the September 23, 2003 original audit report, the girls' softball uniforms appeared to be of inferior quality. The softball uniforms viewed at the most recent school revisit appeared equitable. The interview with the school's softball coach indicated parity. The September 23, 2003 original audit report listed athletic storage as a major need. The most recent revisit showed adequate storage space now provided for all athletic teams. The September 23, 2003 original audit report suggested the school develop a written uniform rotation and replacement plan. According to the school's Title IX file and interview with school officials, this plan has not been developed. (See KHSAA Recommended Action.) According to the school's April 15, 2005 Annual Report submittal, it is currently spending approximately \$98 per female athlete and approximately \$129 per male athlete for equipment and supplies.
Scheduling of Games and Practice Time	X	The September 23, 2003 original audit report stated that the school was currently meeting the minimum standard for provision of prime date playing opportunities for girls' basketball by playing 44% of their girls' home games on prime dates. The school also met the standard during the school year 2004-05. According to the school's 2005-06 Girls' Basketball Schedule posted on the KHSAA web site, it is playing 43% (3/7) of the girls' basketball home games on prime dates and is again meeting the current standard established by KHSAA. All the shared athletic facilities at the school appeared to be scheduled equitably.

Travel and Per Diem Allowances	X	KHSAA Audit Team discussed the need for a written school travel and per diem policy with school personnel. The September 23, 2003 original audit report indicated parity in this area. The school's April 15, 2005 Annual Report submittal to KHSAA shows that the school is spending approximately \$70 per female athlete as compared to \$46 per male athlete for athletic related travel expenses.
Coaching	X	A review of the school's Extra Service Pay Schedule for Coaches appeared to show parity. The benefit of "coaching accessibility" was discussed with school personnel. The school Revisit form indicates that 14% (1/7) of the current girls' head coaches are employed off the school campus while 38% (3/8) of the current boys' head coaches are employed off campus.
Locker Rooms, Practice and Competitive Facilities	X	As was the case at the time of the original school visit, one locker room was provided for all boys sports and one locker room was provided for all girls sports. These locker rooms appeared to be equitable. All competitive facilities that are shared seem to be shared equitably. As was true in the September, 2003, original visit there is a general need for improving and upgrading locker room facilities. The school is currently in the process of adding lights at the baseball and softball fields.

Medical and Training Facilities and Services	X	The original school visit report of September, 2003 requested that the school have a posted weight training schedule and invest in some weight training equipment that was suitable for use by female athletes. The school has exceeded these recommendations by constructing a new weight room with state of the art equipment of which much is appropriate for use by females. The school's weight room usage schedule was posted in the weight room during the revisit. According to school personnel, no athletic training services are offered to any athletes at the school.
Publicity	X	According to the school's Revisit Form as well as interviews with school personnel, Russellville High School currently has one cheerleading squad which cheers at all home and away football games. During the basketball season, the squad cheers at all home boys' and girls' varsity games. They also cheer at all <u>away district games</u> for both the boys' and girls' teams. These current assignments appear to be equitable.
Support Services	X	The current situation at the school in relation to provision of clerical assistance, technical assistance, and office space for coaches appears to show equity. Athletic Booster Clubs were discussed. According to School Administrators, only one Athletic Booster Club exists at this time. The club's funds are housed outside the school accounts. The Booster Club is not allowed to buy items for school teams directly, but must deposit the money in the School Athletic Account and then a Purchase Order System is used for the actual purchase. School personnel were encouraged to look into the feasibility of having a written Booster Club Agreement. According to the school's April 15, 2005 Annual Report submittal to KHSAA, it is spending approximately \$330 per female athlete and \$382 per male athlete for total athletic support.

5. Brief Summary/Analysis of the Corrective Action Plan (Form T-60)

The school's most recent Corrective Action Plan calls for upgrading the tennis courts and the track and increasing the number of prime date girls' basketball games to 50%.

6. Observed Deficiencies in Overall Girls and Boys Athletics Programs

Although no deficiencies were designated during the most recent school revisit, school personnel are requested to very closely monitor the area of Accommodations of Interests and Abilities. Students should be <u>accurately surveyed and accurately counted</u> in relation to the Participation Opportunities Tests. Indicated interests on the student survey should be properly pursued.

7. KHSAA Recommended Action in relation to new deficiencies

While no new deficiencies were designated by the most recent school revisit, school personnel should provide the following to KHSAA since it has not developed or implemented the written plan requested in the September 23, 2003 original report.

(Equipment and Supplies) On or before <u>March 15, 2006</u>, the school personnel are tosubmit to KHSAA a written Uniform Rotation and Replacement Plan. This plan is to be approved both by the school's Gender Equity Review Committee and by the school's Site Based Decision Making Council.

8. KHSAA Recommended Action in relation to reoccurring deficiencies

The deficiency in the area of Accommodation of Interests and Abilities designated by the September 23, 2003 original Audit Report has been addressed by the addition of a varsity and junior varsity volleyball team and the continued provision of a co-ed soccer team. School personnel are again cautioned to monitor this area very closely by accurately surveying students, accurately counting the number of athletes, and properly pursuing indicated athletic interests. This monitoring should be reflected on the school's Participation Opportunities Tests to be submitted to KHSAA by **April 15, 2006**.
