

Solar Eclipse and Eye Safety April 8, 2024 Abbreviated

On April 8, 2024, a historic total solar eclipse will cast a shadow over parts of the United States, including Kentucky. A total solar eclipse occurs when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, completely blocking the Sun's face. Even though the Moon blocks the Sun's bright light, it is important to remember that improper viewing of the Sun, even during an eclipse, can result in severe eye injuries. Looking at a solar eclipse without proper safety equipment or techniques is unsafe.
