



- 1) Determine the number of teams at the varsity, junior varsity, and freshman levels for boys and girls. (#1, 5, 8)
- 2) Determine the total number of participants for boys and girls at each competitive level. (#2, 6, 9)
- 3) Calculate the percentage of female and male participants at each level. (3, 6, 9)
Example: Take the total number of female participants from the Summary Program Chart 1 (form T-1) and divide it into the number of total participants for each level, varsity, junior varsity and freshman levels. Perform the same calculation for male participants. For example, if there are a total of 300 female participants, and 180 girls are on varsity teams, 80 girls on junior varsity teams, and 40 girls on freshman teams, then 60% of girls' participation opportunities are at the varsity level (180 divided by 300), 27% are at the junior varsity level (80 divided by 300), and 13% are at the freshman level (40 divided by 300). If there are a total of 400 male participants, and 250 participate at the varsity level, 100 boys participate on junior varsity teams, and 50 boys participate on freshman teams, then 63% of boys participate at the varsity level (250 divided by 400), 25% compete at the junior varsity level (100 divided by 400), and 13% compete at the freshman level (50 divided by 400).

Title IX/Gender Equity Committee: Program Evaluation 1999-2000

June 2000

- #1. That the school add girl's volleyball to the sports offered to the school's student body beginning in the 2000-2001 school year.**

On-Going

--Proposal has been approved by school administration & Site-Based Council waiting for Board of Education approval and funding.

- #2. That the head coaches of girl's golf, girl's softball and girl's track work with the school's administration and athletic director to explore ways to increase the number of girls participating in these sports. Noted that two of these three coaches do not work in the building during the day making communication with students difficult.**

2000-2001 School Year and On-Going

-Coaches and administration will work to develop possible ways to address this issue.

- #3. That the athletic director, address the issue of scheduling in regards to times and days of games played for the girls and boys basketball programs.**

During 2000-2001 Season

-Athletic Director & Girl's Coach will discuss issue with players and parents to get their opinions.

Spring 2001

-Athletic Director will work with other schools to see that some varsity doubleheader games will be reversed in regards to start times and that JV-V dates will alternate Monday/Thursday and Tuesday/Friday.

- #4. That the school administration and athletic director work with the Band Director and JROTC instructor to assure that support services provided by the band and JROTC program are equal.**

2000-2001 School Year

-School Administration and Athletic Director will discuss the issue with Band Director and JROTC instructor and have them select dates that they will provide support to athletic events that are equal for both sports.

- #5. That the school administration and athletic director continue working with the Athletic Booster Club in assuring that all athletic programs at the school are given the opportunity to receive benefits and services from the Club.**

On-Going

-The Athletic Booster Club is aware of the issue and completely supports the issue. Current history and practices of the club support this thought. This issue will continue to be addressed by educating club members concerning Title IX guidelines and intent.

- #6. That the school administration and athletic director work with each sport's head coach to assure that opportunities for fund-raising on the individual sport level are carried out and that such fund-raising is comparatively equal to that of a similar sport.**

On-Going

-The school's administration and athletic director will continue to closely monitor all fund-raising activities of each sport.

-Encourage teams to jointly raise funds where possible.

-The Athletic Director will work with head coaches whose sports are not at a comparative level in regards to fund-raising to explore ways to increase such opportunities and outcomes.

- #7. That the school's athletic director work closely with the coaching staff to increase the lines of communication between coaches with regards to use of facilities. Especially the weight room, facilities used for pre-season conditioning (i.e. Commons, Gym, etc.) and practices on rain days.**

On-Going

-Encourage coaching staffs to explore additional ways of increasing communication between staff members in regards to the use of facilities. E-mail and improved advanced planning have been suggested.

- #8. That the school administration, athletic director and coaching staff continue to work with the superintendent and Board of Education in finding ways to address the problems regarding "space limitations" at the school (indoor facilities). Especially in regards to weight room space and the crowded conditions in the gym.**

On-Going

-Facility plans submitted by the school to the Board of Education (June 1999) indicated the need for improvements to the facilities in this area. However, other priorities and funding limit possible facility improvements in the near future in this regard.

- #9. That the school, athletic director, coaching staff and the Athletic Booster Club continue to work on development of the outdoor facilities to bring said facilities up to comparable levels.**

On-Going

-All parties will continue to work to improve facilities

- #10. That the athletic director work with the girl's softball coach in scheduling in order to maximize the opportunities for competition at levels which are equal to baseball at both the varsity and JV levels.**

Fall 2000

-The Athletic Director and Softball Coach will jointly work to contact other area schools to complete a schedule that maximizes the opportunities for participants.

Item #1: The school added girl's volleyball (varsity and junior varsity) during the 2000 – 2001 school year with 28 girls participating and a total of 33 participation slots. Our season consisted in a fifteen match schedule.

Item #2: The school administration, athletic director and coaches worked to increase the number of participants in these three sports. The results were as follows:

	1999-2000	2000-2001
Girl's Golf	5	6
Girl's Softball	19	26
Girl's Track	4	15

The school plans on continuing to pursue ways to increase the number of participants in these sports.

Item #3: The school continues to attempt to schedule varsity basketball games on "prime time" nights on an equal basis. The school believes that this will be a process that will take two to three years to fully implement due to a variety of factors. (Existing contracts, opponents who don't want to schedule contest with both programs, opponents who schedule differently than LCHS, etc.) The school during the 2000-2001 season scheduled two nights in which the boy's varsity game preceded the girl's varsity contest. The school while developing the 2001-2002 schedule is making strides to equalize "prime night" dates.

Item #4: The band and JROTC program have agreed to provide support services to similar programs on an equal basis. This support is being documented and evaluated each year.

Item #5: School and Athletic Booster Club continue to work to maintain equitable funding for all sports programs. The club has developed a document for monitoring contributions to all programs. The club feels that over a two – three year period that funding and support equal out.

Item #6: The school continues to monitor and address concerns with individual sports fund-raising. Where possible coaches are encouraged to jointly raise funds for their programs.

- Item #7: Efforts to improved communication between staff members have been accomplished. The school plans on documenting policies, procedures and facility use guidelines during the next eighteen months.
- Item #8: Board of Education is aware of facility needs and space limitations, an academic addition to the school is on-going which may provide limited assistance to some of these problems.
- Item #9: No action was taken to specifically address this issue with the exception of the problem being noted in the 2000-2001 Title IX Recommendations—Timeline Report.
- Item #10: The school made the following developments in the scheduling of softball games giving participants equal opportunities to baseball.

SUMMARY

Based on the responses to the survey, the following observations have been made.

- Interest among boys appears to be in wrestling (134 responses) and soccer (77 responses) among current students. It should be noted that a large number of the responses for wrestling are from 8th and 9th graders (61 responses). The question is raised as to whether or not these students understand what the sport of wrestling involves –vs- WWF style wrestling that they are exposed to on TV.

Interest in soccer, among boys, appears consistent across grade levels. Yet closer examination of the 8th grade surveys indicate very few students are participating in organized soccer prior to arriving at high school nor are current students involved in soccer outside the school. Upon examining community programs that are available, this lack of experience with regards to soccer is understandable)

- Interest among girls appears to be in the areas of soccer (127 responses) and gymnastics (81 responses). With both sports, interest appears to be evenly balanced across all grade levels. As with the boys, opportunities for participation in soccer in the county are limited for this age group.
- When one examines the reasons for not participating in athletics, the categories of time (110), transportation (64) and work (55) lead the way. The reason “sport not offered” ranks 4th. Questions are raised as to the need for the addition of other sports when the ranking for “sport not offered” is so low.
- Upon closer examination of the totals regarding interest in sports not currently offered at LCHS, one will realize that about 50% of the responses are from students who are already involved in athletics. The questions of “time” to participate in both due to conflicts in season can easily be raised.
- It should be noted that at the present time, the school does not have the facilities/land necessary for the addition of soccer, gymnastics and/or wrestling. Additional land would need to be purchase for soccer and additional facility space would have to be added to address gymnastics and/or wrestling.

RECOMMENDATIONS / FINDINGS

1. The school should continue to monitor student interest in sports not currently offered at the school. It is recommended that the 2001-2002 survey be developed in an open-ended question format to that students will have to list areas of interest instead of checking available options. It is felt that this may give a truer picture of student interest.
2. With regards to the findings that a large number of students have trouble with transportation, the school should continue to identify possible ways to eliminate this hurdle to participation for students.

5. Brief Summary/Analysis of The Corrective Action Plan (T-60)

The school has ten recommendations listed in their Corrective Action Plan.

- Volleyball has been added; therefore, this recommendation has been accomplished.
- The issue of increasing the number of girls participating in sports was discussed at length during our meeting with the Gender Equity Review Committee. The county is very large, and some students live 35+ miles from the school, which makes it difficult for them to stay for practice. Coaches and the administration are working to develop possible ways to address this issue.
- The school has addressed the issue of scheduling in regard to times and days of games played for girls' and boys' basketball.
- Dates have been selected that provide support from the band and JROTC to athletic events that are equal for both sports.
- The school has one booster club that assures that all athletic programs are given the opportunity to receive benefits on an equal basis.
- Fund raising by individual sports groups is causing an unequal amount of money among the various athletics programs. This is a concern, and the school administration and athletic director will need to continue to closely monitor all fund raising activities for each sport, ensuring that fundraised dollars do not result in disparate benefits to student athletes on the basis of gender. Teams are encouraged to jointly raise funds where possible.
- The school is working on ways of increasing communication in regard to use the of facilities.
- The new addition being built will help solve the current problem with space limitations, especially in regard to the weight room.

- There was a recommendation concerning bringing facilities up to the same comparable level. This was discussed in Item 4 (components of the interscholastic program) of this report under locker rooms, practice and competitive facilities.
- The athletic director and the girls' softball coach are working to schedule varsity and junior varsity softball and baseball games so that opportunities for participants are maximized.



Participation Opportunities Test Two



LOGAN COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL

CHEERLEADER SQUAD INFORMATION

Logan County High School has two cheerleading squads at the school. They are:

- 1) Football Cheerleaders
- 2) Basketball Cheerleaders

Both squads consist of fourteen (14) girls each. Selections, for the upcoming year, are based on publicized tryouts for students in grades 8 – 11 during the last two weeks in April. Those students interested may try out for either squad or both squads. Selection is based on a point system and judging done during tryouts. Judges are brought in from area colleges and are unfamiliar with the school or anyone trying out.

The football squad begins practice on July 15th and its season concludes with the end of football season. At the current time, the sole purpose of this squad is to provide support for the football team. The issue of this squad providing some support at volleyball matches is being explored. The Football Cheerleader squad did not provide any direct support to volleyball during the 2000-2001 volleyball season, the school's first. The main reason for this is that no one really thought about the issue.

The basketball cheerleaders begin practice October 15th and their season concludes with the end of basketball season. This squad also is our competitive cheer squad. All fourteen cheerleaders cheer at home boys and girls varsity basketball contests. For away contest, the squad is divided into two traveling squads of seven members each. One of the two traveling squads will cheer at away boy's and girl's varsity basketball contests. The one exception to this is that cheerleaders do not cheer at away Christmas tournaments for either basketball team. Away dates, for each squad are equally divided based on particular type of games being played. (GV-BV, GJV-GV, or BJV-BV nights) The entire squad cheers at all post-season tournament play. **(NOTE: A copy of the 2000—2001 away varsity basketball cheer schedule is attached for review)**

The two traveling cheer squads are split by the cheer coach based on balance with regards to needs of each squad, geographical location of where cheerleaders live and cheerleader personalities.

The decision to split into a football and a basketball squad was made to increase the potential opportunities for girls. **(NOTE: A copy of the original proposal is attached for review.)** At the time this decision was made, following the 1994-95 season, we had several girls who expressed an interest in cheering for one squad or the other but not both. We also had several girls interested in competitive cheer but others who were not. This was the solution that the school developed with the help of a group of parents. Over the last 4-5 years we generally have 4/5 girls on one squad but not the other. They choose to work, participate in other sports, be involved with other school groups, etc.

If boys express an interest in participation and the interest level is greater than four males, then tryouts are held for these for slots for either squad.

PROPOSAL:

That Logan County High School make changes in the organizational structure of its cheerleading squads beginning with the 1996-97 school year. These changes would include the development of two separate squads:

1. a football squad--composed of 14 girls
2. a basketball squad--composed of 14 girls plus 4 boys if interest is present among the student body

The football squad would be composed of 14 girls who would cheer at both home and away varsity football games. Once the football season is over this squad's responsibility would be over.

The basketball squad would be composed of 14 girls and four boys (if applicable) who would cheer at all home varsity basketball games (boys and girls) as one squad. On away varsity games the squad would be split into two units. Each unit would be composed of 7 girls and 2 boys (if applicable). On away games each squad would cheer for both boys and girls varsity games. Away games would be equally divided before the season begins with each unit having the same number and type of away ball games. Units would be chosen based on scores received in try-outs with the alternating scores top to bottom being placed on each away cheerleading unit.

RATIONALE for CHANGES:

The basis for the above changes are as follows:

- 1) to increase the number of opportunities for girls in the area of cheerleading and allow the girls greater opportunities as cheerleaders
- 2) to improve the overall quality of the cheerleading squad
- 3) to increase the level of safety within the squad
- 4) risk reduction
- 5) equal support for all teams
- 6) improve communications among cheerleaders
- 7) allow for the cheerleaders to become a competition squad
- 8) increase the level of commitment on the part of those being cheerleader

SUMMARY:

Change is difficult and the thought of change sometimes creates concerns. However, as the times change, changes must be made to keep up with the developments in any particular activity. The organizational structure for the cheerleading squad at Logan County High School has not changed since the opening of the school, yet the way other schools handle their cheerleading squads have changed or are changing to reflect the changes in cheerleading over the last several years.

The planned changes may/may not work to improve the quality and opportunities for cheerleading at Logan County High School but continuing the present set-up will not allow for any improvement. With cooperation, commitment and a willingness to give the changes a try the opportunity for these changes to succeed increases.

BASKETBALL "PRIME TIME" CONTEST INFORMATION

For the 2000 - 2001 varsity basketball season, Logan County High School was involved in nineteen varsity contents on "prime time" nights of Friday and/or Saturday. Of these contests, twelve (63.2%) involved the boy's basketball team and seven (36.8%) involved the girl's varsity basketball team.

Of the five additional "prime time" dates that involved the boy's team, one had to do with the scheduling of a Christmas tournament that the boy's were involved in. The boy's were involved in a tournament that went Thursday – Saturday and the girl's were in a tournament that went Wednesday – Friday just prior to the Christmas holidays. Additionally, two of the schools the boy's played, dropped our girl's as opponents during this contract cycle therefore what has been a traditional boy/girl doubleheader became a boy's JV/V contest. The other two schools have a practice of playing girl's games on different nights. This makes scheduling prime time contest with these traditional opponents difficult.

It has been a continuing practice of the school to schedule as many boy/girl doubleheaders as possible during the basketball season. For the 2000-2001 season, the school began alternating start times for varsity contests (boy/girl -vs- girl/boy). During this past season we played two basketball games at home in which the boy's varsity team played first. Parent/player reaction was overall neutral as to the practice. The school plans to continue this practice and increase this change slowly. Additionally, the school plans to seek other opponents who may wish to alternate games at away sites.

In regards to the school's scheduling of "prime time" contest evenly among the boy's and girl's programs. As one might be aware, differing school philosophies makes this changeover a slow process. It is anticipated that such a balance can completely be accomplished in two –three years of basketball scheduling. It has been especially difficult in the process when traditional school opponents view this situation differently. Already the 2001-2002 schedule shows an improvement over the past years schedule in this regard.
