For example, if girls' varsity soccer (22 participants), junior varsity soccer (18 participants), junior varsity golf (8 participants), and freshman softball (15 participants) have been added in the last five years, then 63 participation opportunities have been added for girls. If the total number of female participants in the program is 300 (taken from Form T-1, Column 4), then 21% of the current opportunities (63 of 300) have been added in the last five years.

 For example, if there are a total of 300 female participants, and 180 girls are on varsity
 teams, 80 girls on junior varsity teams, and 40 girls on freshman teams, then 60% of
 girls' participation opportunities are at the varsity level (180 divided by 300), 27% are at
 the junior varsity level (80 divided by 300), and 13% are at the freshman level (40
 divided by 300). If there are a total of 400 male participants, and 250 participate at the
 varsity level, 100 boys participate on junior varsity teams, and 50 boys participate on
 freshman teams, then 63% of boys participate at the varsity level (250 divided by 400),
