- 1) Determine the total number of girls enrolled, (place in Row 1, Column 1). Determine the total number of boys enrolled, (place in Row 2, Column 1).
- 2) Add the total number of girls and boys enrolled to determine total enrollment, (place in Row 3, Column 1).
- 3) Calculate the percentage of total enrollment that is female. (Divide Row 1, Column 1 by Row 3, Column 1 and place in Row 1, Column 2.) Calculate the percentage of total enrollment that is male. (Divide Row 2, Column 1 by Row 3, Column 1 and place in Row 2, Column 2.) Note: Row 1, Column 2 plus Row 2, Column 2 should total 100%.
- Ask coaches to confirm the names of those individuals who are on the team as of the first **date of regular season competition**, and cross out the names of those who were cut from the team or quit the team prior to the first regular season competitive event. Determine the total number of interscholastic athletics participants that are girls, (and place in Row 1, Column 3). In order to determine the total number of athletics participants, an individual should be counted each time he or she participates on a team. Calculate the percentage of male participation. (Row 2, Column 3 divided by Row 3, Column 3 and place

in Row 2, Column 4.) Note: Row 1, Column 4 plus Row 2, Column 4 should total 100%.

Note: While being within three percent is <u>not</u> a formal compliance standard, if the percent listed in Row 1, Column 4 is within 3% of Row 1, Column 2, then it provides a good target within which compliance is likely.

- 2) For Column 2, list the number of participants at each level. For girls, total each of the entries in Rows 1, 2, and 3 into Row 4. For boys, total Rows 5, 6, and 7 into Row 8. If less than 25%, then compliance with Test Three should be analyzed. <u>CAUTION</u>: 25% is <u>not</u> a formal compliance standard.

Locker room and storage space is limited for all teams in comparable sports. The softball field is not on par for that sport as is the baseball stadium for its sport. Usage of the outfield for a practice football field has continued since the original visit, requiring annual reconditioning of the turf and disallowing permanent fencing. Updating of the press box, dugouts and other refurbishments, along with adding more storage space and covering the batting cage were recommended to improve the current state of the softball facility.
Medical and Training Facilities and Services	X		Athletic training services are available to all athletes. The primary weight room space is accessible and available for use by all teams. Inventory of equipment should be conducted to assure suitability for female teams. Consideration should be given to making the surroundings appear gender neutral as well. Publicity		X	No uniform policy was found to guide the athletic program in terms of individual or team achievement or recognition. This caused difficult evaluation of distribution and expenditures for awards on past annual Title IX reports and continues to be an issue. Equitable cheerleader selection and assignments have been achieved since the original visit. Media guides for boys' and girls' basketball, football, and softball were available for review and were similar in size and content.

5. Brief Summary/Analysis of the Corrective Action Plan (Form T-74)

Focus has been on improving facilities (in particular, the softball field and tennis courts), purchasing capital equipment, and hiring additional coaches for softball. A persistent disparity in travel expenditures between female and male teams was noted; however, no solution has been reached to date.

6. Observed Deficiencies in Overall Girls and Boys Athletics Programs

Data reported on Forms T-71 and T-72 appeared to be expenditures reported on the 2008-2009 annual Title IX report rather than actual figures for the 2008-2009 school year. It was not clear whether previous fiscal data reported on annual Title IX reports were in the correct academic-year periods. Coupled with the lack of written policies for the athletics program, evaluation of the practices in operation at the school in terms of gender equity was limited to perceptions. There is a

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critical need for documentation and

KHSAA Recommended Action in relation to new deficiencies

By June 30, 2010, school personnel will submit a cohesive, comprehensive set of policies guiding the operation of the athletics program. The focus of the policies should be to provide explicit means for monitoring gender equity. Minimum topics

- include lettering/annual awards; team awards; senior awards; awards ceremonies; banners; team photographs; placement of trophies; relocation of outdated or obsolete trophies/plaques; etc.; retirement of jerseys; Hall of Fame designation (if applicable); and/or other forms of athletic commendations given by the school
- B. The selection and assignment of cheerleaders; assignment of dance team; and, other support groups, as applicable.
- C. The provision of outlets for promotion of attendance at HOME contests, i.e., distribution of schedules; school public address announcements; newspaper; radio; internet notices, etc.
 - D. Travel: transportation; per diem; overnight trips (to include extended trips)
 - E. Meal service for HOME contests
- F. Provision of equipment and supplies: basic items to be provided all teams; special items for certain teams (due to safety requirement, etc.) if indicated; procedure for the direct administrative oversight and approval for acquiring additional equipment or services
 - G. Generation and approval of practice and competitive schedules
- H. Employment and retention of coaches, to include priorities given positions; evaluation process
 - I. Use of athletic facilities; priorities listed
 - J. Generation and approval of budgets; accountability for expenditures

8. KHSAA Recommended Action in relation to reoccurring deficiencies

A. As an attachment to the annual Title IX report, due April 15, 2010, school personnel will submit a **separate**, itemized analysis of travel expenditures for the 2007-2008 and 2008-2009 school years for male and female athletes.

NOTE: This action should be placed on Form T-60

B. As an attachment to the annual Title IX report, due April 15, 2010, school personnel will submit a diagram or listing of office space or conference area available to off-campus head coaches or designees. It should be a private, confidential space for conferring with student-athletes during the day.

C. **By February 15, 2010,** school personnel will provide visual documentation that the softball field turf has been repaired and is ready to fully accommodate practice and play for that team. Include as well a report on the progress made to that point in time on any planned updating of the field.

The permanent Title IX file was organized for review. For the most part, the file was incomplete. According to school personnel, policies for guiding the athletics program were being developed but had not been finalized.








