E.		Other Recommendation and Comments: With the information given in this annual report it appears that Edmonson County is only passing T-1. It still appears that there is sufficient numbers interested in the sports of Tennis and Soccer for the Gender Equity Committee to continue to look at offering these sports in the near future. Minutes of all Gender Equity Committee minutes should be sent to the KHSAA with the 2011-2012 Annual Report so that steps and measures put in place can be documented at the school and the KHSAA office. It appears that a potential red flag area may be in the area of Awards. The T-35 and T-
		36 forms indicate that the school provided an allocation in some sports but not others. The boosters provide an allocation in some sports but not others while 3 sports receive

no allocation from school or boosters. The Gender Equity Committee needs to review this area to see if the awards allocation reporting is accurate and that all banquets, picnics, individual and/or team awards are being listed as expenditures. This action should be reflected in the minutes of the Gender Equity Committee and if Corrective Action is necessary a plan should be put in place.

The Gender Equity Committee needs to continue to monitor the spending in like sports. Softball/Baseball spending has been an issue for the past couple of years, and although it is getting better it is still a potential red flag issue. Baseball equipment and supplies is still out of balance, baseball travel is much greater than softball with out an explanation and baseball was allocated \$700.00 for awards and softball received zero for awards. Looking at the difference in Girls and Boys Basketball equipment and supplies spending give further evidence that the Gender Equity Committee needs to be more involved in looking at the Title IX issues in regard to the spending.

Plans to Address Interest:

On the student survey conducted, when students were asked if the School District offers the sport(s) they want to play, a total of 13 students indicated No-they wanted to play soccer and a total of 5 students indicated No-they wanted to play tennis. Students were later asked what sports they would like to play in the Fall. 54 students indicated soccer. When asked in the Spring, 53 indicated tennis. These separate finding from the survey contradict each other. At this time, the district has no plans to add any athletic teams to the current list of offerings. We will continue to monitor interest by students.
