Title IX Revisit Explanation of Fees (Forms T71-72)

The total spent on column 6 of the T71-72 forms for boys programs was \$16,637.50, whereas the girls programs spent only \$4460.50. The numbers, at face value, indicate an advantage for the boys programs when compared to the girls programs. Upon further examination, however, these differences are explained.

Column six is made up of expenses for fees (mostly tournaments), dues, clinics, camps, etc. Two boys programs alone make up most of the difference; they are wrestling and football. Their numbers are largely due to the fact that the wrestling team competes most of the season on the road and in tournaments, which require fees. The football team hosts The Governor's Bowl, paying \$6000 to the visiting three teams. Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, we are changing the Governor's Bowl format to include community-based teams, rather than outside high schools, resulting in a maximum pay out of \$1000 – \$1,500.

Without the football team and the wrestling team in the configuration, the difference between the girls and boys teams is much less. The total expenditures for the girls program is \$ 4460.50 and the total expenditures for the boys is \$ 6211.50. Furthermore, the girls basketball program did attend a team camp worth \$2600.00 that the parents paid directly to the camp, which creates an even smaller discrepancy between the total expenditures of the genders.

What other camps had to pay their own expenses, however?

It is our intention, starting next school year, to conduct annual meetings with gender equivalent programs (i.e. girls and boys basketball, softball and baseball, volleyball and wrestling, etc;) to closely examine finances and determine equitable paths for programs. We have already conducted one of these meetings this year with baseball and softball discussing equipment purchases this year and for future seasons.

Each year, there are 2 days of clinic work where cheerleaders learn cheers, stunts, a routine, and work on tumbling. On a third night, a panel of coaches and KAPOS judges assemble with the girls for try-outs. Girls are judged 3 at a time. At the end of the nights, points are tallied and the top scoring girls make the team. The number has variety in the past depending on budget and available uniforms. There are usually 20 girls on the team.

4. How is each cheerleading squad assigned to home and away athletic contests? Include football as well as boys' and girls' basketball (and any other sport) at the varsity and junior varsity levels. Include any rotation plans or alternating game assignments that your squads follow.

For football- historically, the football team has paid for the cheerleaders to travel to district away games. However, this year the cheerleaders will not be attending away games due to transportation costs. But, they expect to be able to in the future. Girls and boys basketball- cheerleaders attend all home games and travel to all district away games.

Our whole squad is part of the competitive squad

Yes-

Dance Team and Pep band work together on a rotation system for performance at HOME basketball games and football games. The dance coach and band director submits desired dates to the Athletic Director who approves performances at each event. The Athletic Director maintains a schedule for football and basketball competitions for support teams and community members to sign up for time.
