Comments: According to submitted reports, the most recent Student Interest Survey was administered during the 2013-2014 school year. Students in grades 9-11 were surveyed with a return rate of 66%.

| Accommodation<br>of Interests and<br>Abilities |                 | X             | The most recent Student Interest Survey was<br>conducted during the 2013-2014 school year.<br>Interviews with school administration indicated<br>that students in grades 9-12 were surveyed<br>and reported data indicated a 66% student<br>return rate for the survey. Kentucky High<br>School Athletic Association Title IX standards<br>for survey reliability require that students in<br>grades 9-11 (include grade 8 if have direct<br>feeder school) be surveyed and that a<br>minimum 80% must be met on the return rate<br>of surveys administered. It appears that Doss<br>High School will be meeting the standard of<br>Test 3 for the provision of athletic opportunities<br>as it was indicated on the most recent T-3 form<br>of the 2014 Annual Report the pursuance of<br>interest relative to girls soccer, archery, and<br>cross country. Interviews with administration<br>also indicated the current addition of bowling<br>for boys and girls beginning this school year.<br>Discussion with administration also included<br>the importance relative to the accurate<br>submission of team rosters for all sport levels<br>provided and clarification relative to the double<br>and triple counting of athletes. According to<br>submitted data, and with the addition of<br>bowling for boys and girls, there are currently<br>eight (8) varsity sports for females and ten (10)<br>for males.<br>(see recommendation 7.a.) |
| Equipment and<br>Supplies                      | X               |               | Uniforms viewed appeared to be of mid- to<br>high quality and equitable with regard to the<br>quantity provided and showed parity for the like<br>sports. There was written evidence of a four<br>(4) year rotation plan for uniform review and/or<br>replacement. Coaches interviewed were well<br>aware of the uniform plan. All other viewed<br>equipment appeared to be of mid- to high<br>quality and available for equitable access.   |

There was written evidence<br>of equitable scheduling for the shared facilities<br>of the large (main) gym, lower gym, and small<br>gym. There was also written evidence of team<br>priority usage of sports in season for all listed<br>facilities. Interviews with students and coaches<br>indicated equitable usage and access to the<br>outdoor hitting facility but there was no<br>evidence of a written guideline showing usage<br>or equity of access.   |

| Coaching                                    | X | There was evidence of a school board<br>approved salary schedule which showed<br>overall equivalence in the base salary provided<br>and comparable in the number of coaching<br>positions provided for the like sports. It<br>appears that any differences in salary are due<br>to step pay increments based on years of<br>experience in that position. According to<br>submitted data, the approximate athlete to<br>coach ratio, with regard to accessibility is 10:1<br>for males and 11:1 for females. Interviews with<br>administration indicated that over 80% of all<br>head coaches, for male and female sports, are<br>located on-campus. Interviews with<br>administration indicated that verbal-type<br>evaluations of head coaches are done by the<br>Athletic Director at the end of each season and<br>that a written evaluation tool is completed by<br>the school Principal. |

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| Locker Rooms,<br>Practice and<br>Competitive<br>Facilities | X | There was written evidence of locker room<br>assignment for all teams. All viewed locker<br>rooms appeared to be equitable and with<br>similar amenities. There was viewed evidence<br>of storage for all teams but no written evidence<br>of designation in the Title IX file.   |

|  |   | Competitive and practice facilities located on<br>campus are available for football, soccer,<br>baseball, softball, and track. School<br>gymnasium(s) are available for boys and girls<br>basketball, volleyball, and wrestling. Off<br>campus facilities include the area YMCA for<br>swimming, Ken Bowl for bowling, and Sun<br>Valley Golf Course for golf. The previous<br>audits of 2000 and 2010 identified the softball<br>facility as one that needed improvements and<br>attention so as to remain a viable, competitive<br>facility comparable to baseball. As compared<br>to other competitive facilities, softball has no<br>available access to a concession area, the<br>scoreboard appears to be inoperative, and with<br>no access to the press box area, there is no<br>available public address recognition for games.<br>Closest available restrooms (adjacent to<br>football and baseball field) are about 200 yards<br>from the softball field area. The assigned<br>locker room for softball is inside the school<br>building, approximately 100 yards away, while<br>the baseball field. Interviews with coaches and<br>administration indicated that approximately ten<br>(10) home games needed to be re-scheduled<br>(2014 season) or changed due to inadequate<br>and unsafe playing conditions. This is due to<br>poor drainage from rain, water overflow that<br>comes from a creek that borders the right field<br>line and run-off from the parking lot area that<br>lies next to the third base line area. |  |   | with students indicated a difference in the<br>playing condition as compared to baseball. It<br>was viewed that the outfield playing area   |
|  |   | presented some leveling issues that could<br>make it difficult and unsafe to negotiate during<br>game or practice play. Students and coaches<br>also indicated that because the complex is not  |

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| fenced in, it denied them the opportunity to        |
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| collect revenue (ticket sales) for their program.   |
| Softball dugouts are much smaller than those        |
| of baseball and due to the fact that the facility   |
| cannot be secured (no fence), then vandalism        |
| regularly occurs to the dugout and press box        |
| areas. There was viewed evidence of                 |
| vandalism and destruction to the dugout areas       |
| during this visit. There also appears to be         |
| evidence of two (2) recognizable safety             |
| concerns relative to the current softball site.     |
| Since the last audit of 2010, an elementary         |
| school playground has been built directly in the    |
| left field area next to the spectator bleachers.    |
| This is a hazard for players practicing or          |
| playing games and for children at the               |
| playground. The second safety concern is that       |
| with the placement of the playground directly       |
| next to the left field fence line, it prohibits any |
| access to the field area for any emergency          |
| vehicle. The playground blocks the area of the      |
| gated fence area for emergency vehicle              |
| access. It appears that the continued,              |
| accumulation of neglect and safety concerns         |
| revolving around the softball facility results in   |
| this area being deficient.                          |

6. Observed Deficiencies in Overall Girls and Boys Athletics Programs

**Accommodation of Interests and Abilities** - An accurate review of an administered Student Interest Survey requires that students in grades 9-11 (also grade 8 if direct feeder school is available) be surveyed with a minimum return rate of 80%.

Locker Room, Practice, and Competitive Facilities - It appears that continued disparity and neglect of recommendations made from the previous audits conducted in 2000 and 2010 with reference to the softball facility results in an overall disadvantage to the females.

The following are not deficiencies, but are recommendations that should be addressed by school administration to ensure consistent, equitable benefits:

- a. Please submit to the KHSAA, no later than <u>February 27, 2015</u> an equitable schedule of usage and/or access to the outdoor hitting facility.
- b. Please submit to the KHSAA, no later than <u>February 27, 2015</u> an assignment of available storage space for all teams.

**a. Accommodation of Interests and Abilities** – Please submit to the KHSAA, with the 2015 Annual Report, the completed Summary Results (form T-60) of a Student Interest Survey.
