Brief Summary/Analysis of the Corrective Action Plan (T-60) The addition of a girls' freshman basketball program and coach has been completed. The

plan for adding a summer softball camp for girls was abandoned and the baseball camp was cancelled. Construction of a softball field on campus is still a part of the Corrective Action Plan to date.

6. Observed Deficiencies in Overall Girls and Boys Athletics Programs

The scheduling of girls' basketball games in prime time was the primary deficiency found.

7. Facility Recommendations or Concerns

Both the baseball field and the softball field need refurbishing. However, the baseball field is located on school property, which allows for greater ease in scheduling and in field maintenance. The softball field is located on county recreation property, which requires greater coordination for scheduling and field maintenance. In addition, softball is at a greater disadvantage because 1) the fence is too distant from home plate to be official, 2) there is no safety guard covering the top of the fence, 3) the infield tends to hold water, and 3) there is little accommodation for spectators (bleachers and concessions, for example).

(Accommodation of Interests and Abilities) If, upon recalculation of enrollment figures for the 2001-2002 school year, it is determined that the requirements for Test 1 were not met, school personnel shall send a revised Form T-1 and T-4 to the KHSAA office. In

addition, a revised Form T-60, Corrective Action Form shall be submitted, outlining a plan to rectify the deficiency of opportunity for girls. A plan should be attached which is devised to address the interests of girls in volleyball and soccer as well. Information should be received **by June 30, 2003**.

(Prime Time Contest/Girls' Basketball) On or before June 30, 2003, the school is requested to provide information to the KHSAA concerning the number of "prime time" games scheduled (games to be played on Friday and/or Saturday nights) for its girls' varsity basketball team during the 2003-2004 season. To the extent that a fewer percentage of girls' games are to be played during prime times (when compared with the percentage of boys' games scheduled for prime times), the school shall advise the KHSAA of action it intends to take to immediately correct the difference.

(Support Services) School personnel shall resubmit Forms T-35 and T-36 for the 1999-2000 school year to the KHSAA office on or before June 30, 2003.

10. Comments

- A. Corrections and some small omissions were reviewed in the 1999-2000 report in order to provide an accurate baseline document in the school's permanent Title IX file by which to measure future progress. School personnel were advised to keep the file up to date.
- **B.** In order to provide a means of verifying current practice, school personnel are advised to place certain written policies and schedules in the permanent Title IX file. Topics that should be covered are 1) use of facilities for practice and competition, 2) locker room assignments, 3) use of the weight room, 4) criteria for recognition of individual athletes (lettering, MVP, etc.) and for teams (banners, photographs, etc.), 5) cheerleader selection and game assignments and, 6) provision of meals/snacks for athletes. It is highly recommended that the Gender Equity Review Committee be involved in the process of generating policies.
- C. It is recommended that at least one Gender Equity Review Committee meeting be scheduled in each of the three sports seasons: fall, Winter, Spring.

The community meeting did not materialize.
