It appears that opportunities in the areas of student interest are being provided for students at Pikeville High School. For the fall season of 2002, both soccer and golf were added to the athletic program for female participants. These two sports were initiated based on the responses to the 2001-2002 Interscholastic Athletics Survey administered to students last spring. Currently a total of eight varsity teams, three junior varsity teams and one freshman team are offered for a female enrollment of approximately 180 students.

Students at Pikeville High School are surveyed to ascertain their interest in athletic activities. For the 2001-2002 school year, students in grades eight, nine, ten and eleven responded to the survey during their English classes.

One deficiency was noted relative to the benefit of publicity. The current assignment of the two cheerleading squads must be altered in order to achieve equity.

By April 15, 2003, the school will submit a plan delineating the assignment of the two cheerleading squads that will result in equity for both male and female teams.

(Selection of Cheerleaders) On or before April 15, 2003, the school is requested to provide information to the KHSAA concerning the manner in which cheerleaders are selected for boys' and girls' teams. If cheerleaders are selected in such a way as to result in arguably better (i.e. "A" team vs. "B" team) cheerleaders performing at boys' events, the school shall also submit a plan under which cheerleaders of equal ability shall perform at an equal number of boys' and girls' games in comparable sport (i.e., boys' varsity and girls' varsity basketball game).

(Prime Time Contest/Girls' Basketball) On or before April 15, 2003, the school is requested to provide information to the KHSAA concerning the number of "prime time" games scheduled (games to be played on Friday and/or Saturday nights) for its girls' varsity basketball team during the 2001/2002 season. To the extent that a fewer percentage of girls' games are played during prime times (when compared with the percentage of boys' games scheduled for prime times), the school shall advise the KHSAA of action it intends to take to immediately correct the difference.

#### 10. Comments

The Athletic Committee, which serves as Pikeville's Gender Equity Review Committee, includes coaches, booster club presidents, lay people, students and the Athletic Director. During the KHSAA Audit Team's visit, it was mentioned that students do not attend the meetings and school personnel are encouraged to seek measures that will engage students as active participants. In many respects, it is apparent that the committee has made efforts to promote the athletic program in a positive and equitable manner for both male and female students.

A broad range of interscholastic sports is offered for females attending Pikeville High School. A total of 12 teams, for approximately 180 female students, indicates that opportunities are available within the athletic program. With regard to benefits, other than publicity, provisions for male and female teams are satisfactory. It is expected that school personnel will endeavor to increase the number of home "prime time" games for girls' basketball. As noted in previous pages of this report, the governance of the athletic program would be strengthened with the addition of several policies. More specifically, it is recommended that the Athletic Committee give consideration to formulating guidelines relative to the purchase of uniforms, the display of banners, and trophies and allowances for meals.
