Equipment and Supplies	X		Uniforms issued to teams were of the same quality, many times the same styles and brand for boys and girls. Shoes were provided to both boys' and girls' basketball teams.
Scheduling of Games and Practice Time	X		There was some concern about the number of AWAY basketball games reported for girls in the 1999-2000 report, 4 versus 13 for boys' basketball. School personnel believed this to be a reporting error. In the 2002-2003 season, girls' basketball played 50% of HOME games in "prime time".
Travel and Per Diem Allowances	X		Mixed data did not permit an accurate assessment of the number of trips made or of meal allowances given. School personnel will review records of trips taken.  It was confirmed that no meal allowances were provided as policy, though occasional pizza snacks were donated by local businesses for both boys and girls.
Coaching	X .		Data indicated that coaches of boys' sports had 70% more years of experience than those of girls' sports. Also, all coaches of boys' sports were located on campus. School personnel were well aware of these facts and expressed a keen awareness of the disadvantage this can be to female athletes. Data were somewhat skewed by the employment of one highly experienced retired coach for a boys' sport.
Locker Rooms, Practice and Competitive Facilities	X		It is recommended that snow fencing or some other barrier be erected to close a fencing opening between right field and center field on the softball field when games are played. Additionally, it is recommended that the baseball field be provided a scoreboard.
Medical and	X		The school had some weight training equipment

Publicity	X	Cheerleading is provided for boys' and girls' basketball when there is sufficient interest in cheerleading to form a squad. Schedules for boys' and girls' basketball games were available.
Support Services	X	Forms T-35 and T-36 for the 2001-2002 school year were incomplete: there were no expenditures listed for Travel or Awards. This appeared to be an oversight.
		It is recommended that school personnel provide a formal means for students to contact off-campus coaches during the day and off-season.

## 5. Brief Summary/Analysis of The Corrective Action Plan (T-60)

The sole item for correction that was listed by school personnel was the encouragement of more girls to participate in sports.

## 6. Observed Deficiencies in Overall Girls and Boys Athletics Programs

The primary deficiency noted was the lack of participation by girls in the athletics program. Efforts made to communicate with female students and parents about opportunities to compete had resulted in some improvement in the last three years. However, to date, school personnel had not acted on an interest in volleyball, which had been reported on the student interest survey each year.

### 7. Facility Recommendations or Concerns

Since physical training is vital to successful athletic participation, future planning for a unified space for weight training is recommended.

- B. School personnel are advised to schedule a meeting of the Gender Equity Review Committee in each of the three sports seasons: fall, winter, and spring for program review purposes.
