ACCOMMODATIONS OF INTEREST AND ABILITIES NOTES: The most recent Student Interest Survey was conducted during the 2015-2016 school year. Students in grades 8-11 were surveyed with a return rate of 80%. The most recent sport and/or sport activities added for both males and females have been bowling, cross country, and bass fishing. Interviews with administration also indicated a plan for the future development of soccer as a possible new sport. There are currently ten (10) varsity sports and/or sport activities offered to both males and females. School administration was reminded of the importance for accurate team and roster submission so that data results may provide an accurate and complete school analysis on the yearly submitted Annual Reports.

**BENEFITS REVIEW- EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES:** There was written evidence of an equitable review/replacement plan for all sports. There was a listing of sports that are on a three-year cycle and a listing of sports that were reviewed yearly. Interviews with athletes and coaches appear to be knowledgeable about the plan. Viewed uniforms were of excellent quality and appeared to be equitable in the quantity provided. School administration were reminded that, regardless of the funding source, that the implementation of the uniform plan should be maintained to ensure overall equity. A two-year review of spending, for this category, showed that approximately \$347.00 was spent per male athlete and that approximately \$338.00 was spent per female athlete.

**BENEFITS REVIEW- SCHEDULING OF GAMES AND PRACTICE TIMES:** There was viewed evidence of all team schedules in the school Title IX file. Current and past viewed schedules showed overall equivalence and parity regarding the number of competitive event opportunities provided. There was written evidence showing the equitable scheduling for the shared facility of the gymnasium.

BENEFITS REVIEW- TRAVEL AND PER DIEM: There was written evidence of a Travel and Per Diem guideline that included the types for mode of transport, and the specifics relative to the provision of meals, and overnight stay for housing. A two-year review of spending, for this category, showed that approximately \$105.00 was spent per male athlete and approximately \$184.00 was spent per female athlete.

**BENEFITS REVIEW- COACHING**: There was written evidence of a school approved salary schedule which showed equivalence in stipend amounts and parity for the number of positions provided. Reported documentation showed that the athlete to coach ratio, with regard to access, is 12:1 for males and 10:1 for females. Interviews with administration indicated that coaches are evaluated at the end of each sports season by the Athletic Director. A written evaluation instrument is currently not being used.

BENEFITS REVIEW- LOCKER ROOMS, PRACTICE AND COMPETITIVE FACILITIES: There was written evidence of locker room and storage assignment for all teams. The qualities and amenities for all locker rooms are comparable and are equitably assigned for all teams. The off campus facilities include those for bowling and golf. The bowling team makes use of the Lakers Lanes facility and the golf team utilizes the Lakewood Country Club. Interviews with administration indicate that school transport is available to these sites for those participating students. The facilities for football, track, and volleyball, basketball, cross country, swimming, tennis, baseball, and softball are located on the school campus. Since the previous audit, completed in 2011, a softball facility has been built on the school campus. All facilities are excellent and very well maintained. An advantage for all teams is the close proximity of each team's locker room and storage area to its practice and/or competitive facility.

BENEFITS REVIEW- MEDICAL AND TRAINING FACILITIES AND SERVICES: There is one (1) weight room that is located in a separate building, on the main school campus, and in close proximity to all athletic facilities. A schedule showing equitable usage and access was in the school Title IX file and also posted at the site. Interviews with athletes and coaches indicated use and access to the weight room. The weight room is very spacious and with ample equipment appropriate for female use. There are currently no athletic training services available, however, local physicians and EMT personnel provide services at home events. Interviews with administration indicated that free athletic physicals are made available to all students, two (2) days a year, during the summer. These are provided through the Cumberland Family Medical Center. Students also have access to obtaining athletic physicals throughout the school year through the Healthy Kids Initiative, located on the school campus. There was written evidence of emergency action plans for all athletic venues.

**BENEFITS REVIEW- PUBLICITY:** There was written evidence of an awards/recognition guideline that included the provision for banquets, banners, letters/bars, school awards, senior nights, and retired jerseys. Information provided also included the specific requirements of each team for receipt of certificates, letters, and bars. Interviews with administration also indicated the monitoring of cheerleading and band to ensure overall equitable support. A two-year review of spending showed that approximately \$31.00 was spent per male athlete and approximately \$67.00 was spent per female athlete.

BENEFITS REVIEW- SUPPORT SERVICES: The assignment of available office space appears to be equitable and accessible to coaches. Interviews with administration indicated that several teams have external Booster Accounts. There was written documentation relative to the administrative oversight of booster club fundraisers and expenditures. Interviews with coaches indicated knowledge of the process for school approval to purchase items. A two-year review of overall spending showed that approximately \$535.00 was spent per male athlete and approximately \$649.00 was spent per female athlete. According to reported data, Russell County High School currently meets the acceptable expenditure parameters both on a per athlete and percentage basis.
