9. KHSAA To Follow-Up Regarding Corrective Action If Necessary On The Following:

(Selection of Cheerleaders) On or before January 2, 2001, the school shall provide information to the KHSAA concerning the manner in which cheerleaders are selected for boys' and girls' teams. If cheerleaders are selected in such a way as to result in an arguably better (i.e., "A" team vs. "B" team) cheerleaders performing at boys' events, the school shall also submit a plan under which cheerleaders of equal ability shall perform at an equal number of boys' and girls' games in comparable sports (i.e., boys' varsity and girls' varsity basketball games).

(Prime Time Contest/Girls' Basketball) On or before January 2, 2001, the school is requested to provide information to the KHSAA concerning the number of "prime time" games scheduled (games to be played on Friday and /or Saturday nights) for its girls' varsity basketball team during the 2000/2001 season. The school should also provide similar information for the 1999/2000 season. To the extent that a fewer percentage of girls' games are played during prime times (when compared with the percentage of boys' games scheduled for prime times), the school shall advise the KHSAA of action it intends to take to immediately correct the difference.

(Inclusion of Cheerleaders in Calculations) On or before January 2, 2001, the school shall advise the KHSAA if it included cheerleaders in its calculations on form T-1.

(Completion of Forms) Although the school meets the second prong for compliance, on or before January 2, 2001, it should provide the information sought on Form T-3. In addition, the school has failed to provide the information sought by Form T-4 which is

required in order to assess compliance according to levels of competition. This information should also be provided on or before **January 2, 2001**.

(Equipment and Supplies) The school has not addressed the recognized deficiency in this area. On or before January 2, 2001, the school shall submit a Supplemental Corrective Plan which shall address this deficiency.

(Booster Clubs) On or before January 2, 2001, the school shall develop a program to account for all booster club expenditures for all teams. In order to assist the school in developing such a program, the school shall consider adopting a Booster Club Agreement similar to the form attached hereto.

(Complete Team Forms) None of the team forms have been signed or dated. The school shall resubmit signed and dated team forms on behalf of each team (varsity, junior varsity and freshman) on or before January 2, 2001.

(Weight Training/Field House) On or before January 2, 2001, the school shall submit a schedule outlining times during which each team that desires to do so may use weight training facilities and the football field house. The school shall also confirm by this date that appropriate weights are available for all students' use.

(Athletic Booster Club Agreement) Enclosed please find an athletic booster club agreement the KHSAA submitted to the Fayette County Schools for their use with the various booster groups in the schools. It might be helpful to you and your booster clubs.

Educational Amendments of 1972 (Title 20, U.S.C. §§ 1681-1687, et seq.) by
High School and the pard. Likewise, the Booster Club acknowledges
that, as a condition of membership in the Kentucky High School Athletic Association,
representatives ofHigh the Board must verify that the school
complies with Title IX. 702 KAR 7:065, Section 2 (13). Accordingly, the Booster Club agrees to
provide all information requested by High School, the Board, or the

3. The Booster Club shall, on or before Catober 15, 2000 (for the 2000-01 school year), and
August 15, 2001 (for the 2001-02 school year), designate a representative for purposes of
communicating with and providing true and accurate information to the Board and

4. Upon request of the principal or athletic director of High School,
or upon request of the Superintendent of the County Public Schools, the
Booster Club shall make available a full and complete list of its members.
5. In addition to complying with the requirements of Title 702 of the Kentucky Administrative
Regulations, Chapter 3:130 (internal accounting), and all other relevant statutes and regulations,
the Booster Club shall, upon the request of the principal or athletic director of
High School, or upon the request of the Superintendent of the
County Public Schools, provide a full and complete accounting of all moneys
raised, as well as a full and complete accounting of all moneys expended. In addition, if requested
to do so, the Booster Club shall also provide audited financial records concerning its activities.

I have reviewed the supplemental materials submitted by Pulaski Southwest High School in response to the final Title IX audit report dated November 30, 2000. This report lists nine items that require additional action by the school. My comments regarding each item are as follows:

DUR

- (Selection of Cheerleaders) The school has provided the information sought in this area. 1. Based on the information submitted, the school's selection process for cheerleaders does not result in higher quality squads performing at boys' games. Accordingly, although cheerleaders only perform at football and basketball games, the school has indicated that other teams do not wish to have cheerleaders perform at their contests.
- (Prime Time Contests) The school has provided the information sought in this area. Based 2. on the information submitted, the school has demonstrated substantial progress in this area and should be commended for such progress.
- (Inclusion of Cheerleaders in Calculations) The school has provided the information 3. sought in this area.
- (Completion of Forms) The school has provided the information sought in this area. 4. However, the calculations on form T-4 are incorrect. Based on the information submitted, 75.7% of athletic opportunities for females are provided at the varsity level (112/148); 16.2% of such opportunities are provided at the junior varsity level (24/148); and 8.1% of such opportunities are provided at the freshman level (12/148). Conversely, 65.2% of participation opportunities for male students are provided at the varsity level (131/201) while 22.4% of such opportunities are provided at the junior varsity level (45/201) and 12.4% at the freshman level (25/201). However, it is not necessary for the school to further address this issue.
- The school has submitted information outlining additional 5. (Equipment and Supplies) equipment and supplies purchased for the purpose of correcting the deficiency previously identified in this area. Some of the items listed are not sport specific. In addition, the school has also identified equipment and supplies purchased for use by boys' teams. Therefore, the total amount of such purchases does not reflect moneys spent to correct recognized deficiencies. However, it does not appear that additional information is needed at this time with respect to this issue at this time.

- 6. **(Booster Clubs)** The school has adopted Booster Club Agreements which, hopefully, will enable the school to gain control of its athletic programs.
- 7. (Completion of Team Forms) The school has provided the information sought in this area.
- 8. (Weight Training/Field House) The school has provided the information sought in this area.
- 9. (Athletic Booster Club Agreement) See comments above.

In summary, the school has adequately addressed all matters outlined in the KHSAA's November 30, 2000 final Title IX audit. Accordingly, no additional information is needed at this time.






