As a Senior, he led the Redhounds in tackles and was a dominating blocker on their State Runner-up Team. Opposing coaches would describe him as one of the best defensive lineman they had ever faced and would design their offense to stay away from his side of the field. Melvin received honors for All-Conference, All-State, All-Southern and All-American. He was selected to play in the East-West Kentucky All-Star game as well as the Whisman East-West All-American Game where he played both ways and caught the eyes of several college coaches before accepting a scholarship from the University of Kentucky where he started both ways for 3 years under Coach Blanton Collier. Melvin helped lead both of those talented teams to a victory.</p>
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<p>Please list any other factors about this individual that you would like for the Hall of Fame Committee to consider.</p> <p>Melvin is still considered one of, if not the best, all-time linemen as well as one of the best over all players to play at Corbin High School which has produced some of the state's best football players. Melvin was inducted into the Redhound Varsity Club's Inaugural Hall of Fame Class with the likes of the Bird Brothers, Roy Kidd, Frank Selvey and several outstanding and highly noted athletes. While not receiving many collegiate honors, coaches and teammates at UK also consider him to be one of the most fierce competitors for his size to play for UK. One might hear his name mentioned by Cawood Ledford during UK football broadcasts as late as the eighties as Cawood would describe the determination and competitiveness of a player.</p> <p>While Melvin is well know for his work on the field, he is also well respected for his work off the field. After graduating from UK, he entered the field of education and spent time coaching at Middlesboro, Williamsburg, Corbin and Richmond Madison before moving into education. Melvin was well respected by both his players and teachers who keep in touch and comment on him often. After leaving education to start a construction company, Melvin was instrumental in starting the Redhound Varsity Club to help support and fund athletics in the Corbin school system. He volunteered hours of his time as well as his company's resources to help build a new track and baseball field at Corbin High School. He remains a Board of Director for the Club and continues to support all athletics in the Tri-County.</p>
