

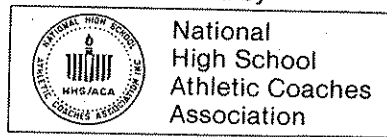

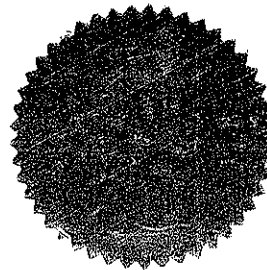

Massey named AP prep athlete of year

LOUISVILLE — Tony Massey, an All-State safety from Somerset High, and Lewis Morris, a pitcher from Cumberland High, have been chosen the Kentucky Associated Press 1985 prep male athletes of the year.

Brigitte Combs, an All-State forward from Whitesburg and the 1985 Miss Kentucky Basketball, was selected the female prep athlete of the year in voting by sportswriters and sportscasters across the state. Massey, 6-3, 175 pounds who will be starting his freshman

year at Kentucky under Coach Jerry Clabome, was first-team All-State at safety his junior and senior years. He had 26 career interceptions.

Massey also doubled as quarterback for Somerset, and his senior year he passed for 1,039 yards and 10 touchdowns. He also rushed for 902 yards and 11 touchdowns.

He led Somerset to a 14-1 record and a runner-up spot in the state in Class AA his junior year. Somerset was 13-1 and ranked No. 1 most of the season last year, but was upset in the state semifinals.

He was a three-year starter at forward for Somerset's basketball team and averaged 13 points a game.

Morris, 6-foot-7, 175 pounds, had a 9-2 record his senior year at Cumberland, with a 31-3 career record. He was named all-district, all-regional, all-sectional, all-state and all-conference in baseball.

He had been a member of the baseball team since the seventh grade.

Morris also started at pitcher for the Cumberland team in the ball team, averaged 4

points, 11.5 rebounds and five assists his senior year. In the classroom, he had a 3.5 grade-point average.

He will attend East Tennessee State in the fall on a basketball scholarship.

Combs, a 5-9 forward, has signed with Western Kentucky. She led Whitesburg to three state tournament appearances and has been an All-State selection for three years. Whitesburg compiled an 99-8 record in her three years.

As a senior, she averaged 26 points and 12.5 rebounds. She also maintained a 3.4 grade-

point average.

Kim Hawkins, a star distance runner and basketball standout from Bath County, finished runner-up to Combs in the balloing. Hawkins won the state cross country titles as a sophomore, junior and senior.

In this year's state track meet, she won the 800- and 1600-meter races.

In basketball, she was named all-district, all-region and honorable mention All-State. She was a three-year starter.

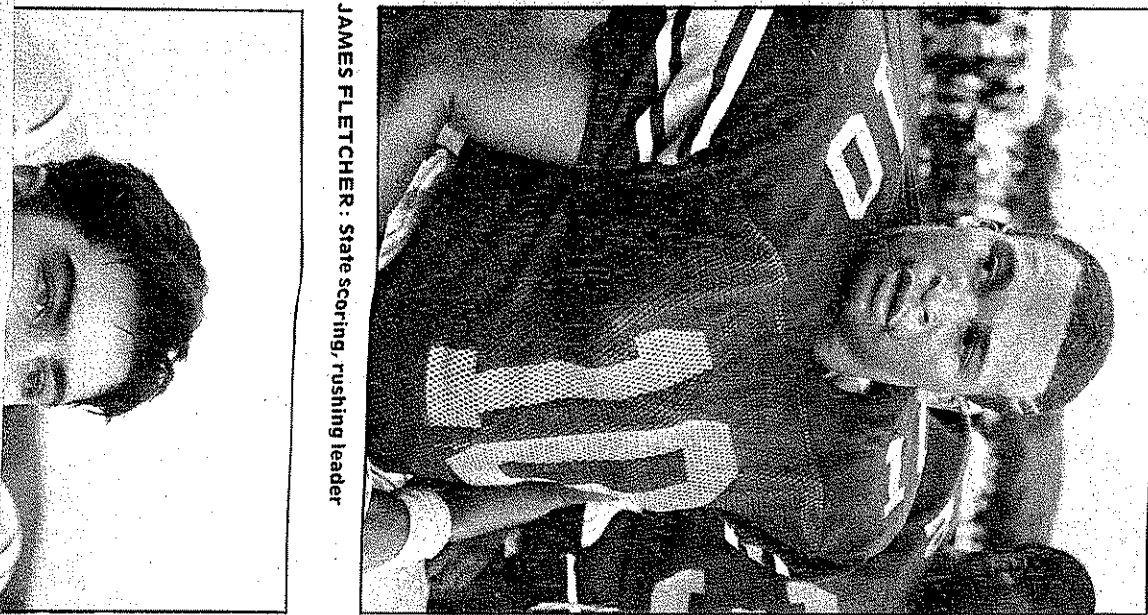
Two Somerset High School stars, senior halfback James Fletcher and senior quarterback-safety Tony Massey, were named to the 1984 Kentucky Associated Press All-State high school football squad announced today.

Fletcher closed his career in spectacular fashion in leading the Briar Jumpers to a 13-1 record. He led the state in rushing with 2,523 yards on 312 carries, and scoring with 282 points (46 touchdowns and three conversions). His point total was just 31 shy of the state record set by Herbie Phelps of Old Kentucky Home in 1963.

Massey, meanwhile, was named to the All-State squad for the second consecutive year as a defensive back after intercepting seven passes from his free safety position. Massey also received honorable mention as a quarterback after completing 56 of 104 passes for 1,039 yards and 10 touchdowns, and rushing for 992 yards (on 101 carries) and 11 TD's this season.

Five other Somerset players — receiver Randy Mills, defensive tackle Kelly Stigall, nose guard Chris Perdue, linebacker Bubba Perkins and punter Mark Mounce — received honorable mention. Also receiving honorable mention were Wayne County running back Bob Limer and Casey County end Keith Buis.

Recruiters coveting riches in Jefferson County

It isn't the best year for recruiting high school football seniors outside Jefferson County, but in the Louisville area a college scout can find just about what he wants.

There's size in Mike Pfeifer, a 6-foot-7, 250-pound defensive tackle from Trinity; Tony Nash, a 6-5, 242-pound offensive tackle from DeSales, and Oliver Barnett, a 6-5, 235-pound defensive tackle from Jefferson-

town. There's size and speed in Carwell Gardner, a 6-3, 210-pound linebacker from Trinity, and Keith Walker, a 6-2, 195-pound linebacker-safety from Pleasure Ridge Park.

There's speed in Joey Hamilton of Ballard, a talented athlete who can play just about any skilled position — running back, wide receiver or defensive back — and running back Brian Davidson of Seneca.

There's also the power player in Andy Murray, a 6-2, 230-pounder who can play on both sides of the ball as either a fullback or linebacker. Murray also played at Trinity, the 1983 state Class 4-A champion, which has five players capable of playing at the Ohio Valley Conference level or higher.

"This is the best year I've seen in Louisville in a long time, and this is my ninth year for recruiting," said University of Kentucky assistant coach Bill Glaser.

"There are nine Division I prospects in Jefferson County, and that's the best year I can remember as far as quantity," he said. "Of course, you don't know about the quality. You won't find that out until four or five years from now."

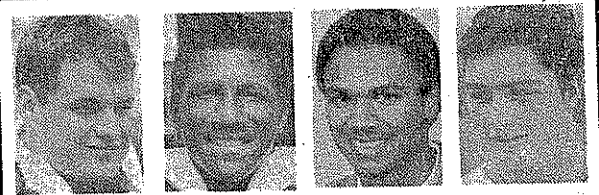
As for the rest of Kentucky, Glaser calls it an "average year" for prospects.

"There could be 20 Division I prospects, about what it was last year, but Jefferson County being strong makes this a good year," he said.

College coaches rank Tony Massey, a quarterback-safety from Somerset, Vic Adams, a 6-3½, 245-pound tackle from Middlesboro, and fullback-linebacker Rodney Gordon of Russellville among the top prospects outside the Louisville area.

Also held in high esteem are wide receiver Dee Smith of Paducah Tighman, running backs Darren Bilberry of Fort Knox and Scott Tackett of Beechwood, outside linebacker Tim Broady of Madisonville and defensive end Phillip Green of Christian County.

Running backs James Fletcher of Somerset, Pierre Francis of Eastern and Ron Hamilton of Owensboro Catholic are said to have the talent to play big-time college ball, the col-

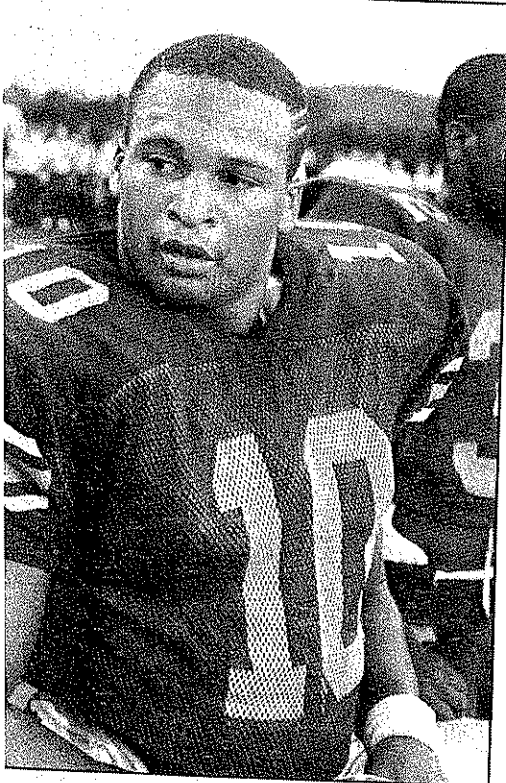

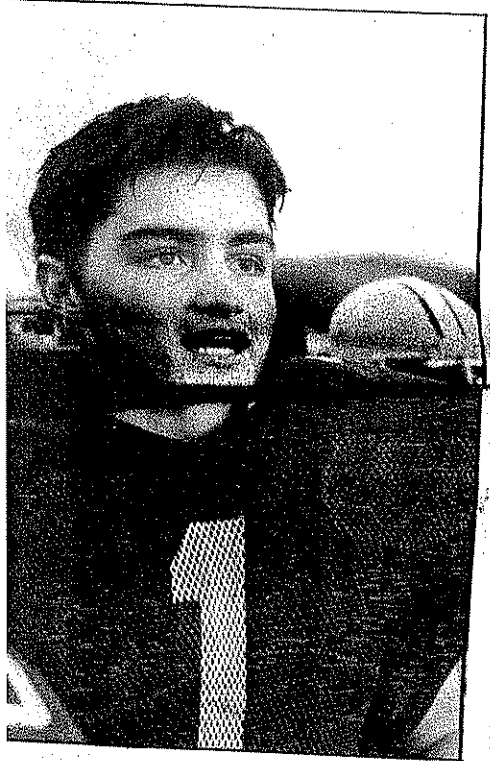

"Of course, we expected James and Tony to be named," Cain went on. "When you lead the state in rushing and scoring, you should be named an All-Stater. I am somewhat disappointed that James wasn't the leading vote-getter on the team, though (that honor went to Trigg County running back Al Baker)."

"I also thought Tony might be the All-State quarterback. And I felt that Kelly (who was playing his first year on defense after switching from fullback) had a real shot at making the first team."

pingston for us in learning how to handle pressure."

Harrodsburg has produced some excellent running backs during the coaching regime of Alvis Johnson, namely Henry Parks, his brother, Gus, and Nick Yeast.

Now add the name of Donald Smith, a junior who ran around and over Boyle County tacklers for 211 yards in a 14-0 victory last Friday.

"Donald is an outstanding running back," Johnson said yesterday. "He gained 1,300 yards last season, but when you're 5-6 nobody pays any attention."

That 5-6 record in 1983 was only the second losing season in 13 years for Johnson at Harrodsburg. This fall, the Pioneers are 4-0 and contenders for a playoff berth in Class A, thanks the flying feet of Smith.

"Donald is a different kind of back than the ones we had in the past," Johnson said. "He's a speed and power runner. Henry Parks (a first-team All-Stater in 1976) had speed and great moves. Gus was the same kind of runner.

"Donald is a lot like Nick Yeast (a 1977 All-Stater) was, but he's faster," Johnson said about the 5-11, 182-pound Smith. "Donald has good speed, but he's mainly a power runner and difficult to tackle."

Smith, though, can go the distance at any time. He scored on an 82-yard run against Jessamine County, and he scored from 37 yards out against Boyle County.

So far this season, Smith has scored 12 touchdowns and a two-point conversion for 74 points, and

he's amassed close to 800 yards rushing, including 257 in one game. He's averaging seven yards a carry. Against Boyle County, Smith ran 35 times.

"He's averaging 30 to 35 carries a game, but that's not unusual for our tailbacks," Johnson said. "Gus Parks ran 54 times in a triple-overtime game against Garrard County in 1978."

Henry Parks played for the University of Kentucky. Yeast and Gus Parks played for Eastern Kentucky.

"Nick Yeast is Donald Smith's uncle, so Donald is driven hard to match the kind of statistics Henry, Gus and Nick had," Johnson said.

"So far, he's done real well." Football isn't Smith's only sport. He plays guard in basketball, and he runs the 100-, 200- and 400-meter dashes and triple jumps for the track team.

"Donald is a good all-around athlete, a good student and a good kid," Johnson said.

Smith and his Harrodsburg teammates will have their work cut out for them against Somerset.

"That will be a very difficult task," said Johnson, whose team lost to Somerset 32-0. "The set has some great skilled players. They're even better than the last year."

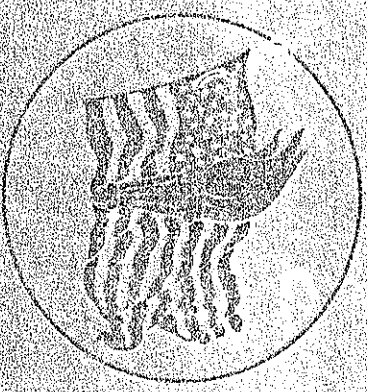

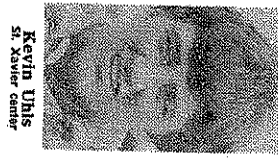

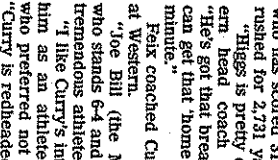

Coach Ken Adams, an assistant coach for 13 years, finally accepted the head job at Owensboro High School last fall, he named his lucky stars for one thing — Mark Higgs had one more season to play.

"Mark made me look better," Moore said. "He made my job 100 percent easier."

Higgs, the exciting cannonball of a runner, scored 32 touchdowns and ran for 2,858 yards as Owensboro won 11 of 14 games and was runner-up to unbeaten Trinity in the state Class 4A playoffs.

For his reward, Higgs has been chosen — in voting by 125 of the state's 195 head coaches — as the honorary captain of The Courier-Journal's 61st annual All-State team. Higgs received more votes (45) than

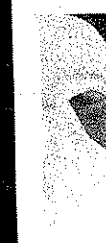

SHS well-represented on AP All-State teams

I W O Somerset High players—senior center Jeff Perkins and junior defensive back Tony Massey—have earned first-team honors on the 1983 Kentucky Associated Press All-State high school football teams announced today.

And two other Briar Jumpers, kicker Mike Nelsson, running back James Somers, were named to the first-team. Somers' junior brother, Mark, received the mention.

I think (having so many selections) is great," said Somers' coach John Cain, who guided the Briar Jumpers to a 14-1 record and the runner-up spot in the Class AA playoffs this season.

That's an exceptional number for one program.

"Jeff, in particular, should be commended for coming back and having an excellent senior year after undergoing serious knee surgery his junior year. He paid the price to rehabilitate himself, and to come back and make first team all state is a tremendous effort on his part.

"Tony is a gifted athlete on both sides of the line of scrimmage, and he's now shown people all over the state that he is just that," Cain added. Massey intercepted nine passes during the season—four of them in one game, against Madison Central. And as the team's quarterback, he rushed for 628 yards and passed for 756 more.

The 5-10, 200-pound Nelsson led the Jumpers in tackles with 206,

"and the only thing that kept Mike from making first team, in my opinion, is that there are a lot of big linebackers around," Cain said. "I think he was very deserving of making first team. We're really going to miss him next year.

"Fletcher played well all season, and he probably would have done even better had he not been injured," the coach went on. "He wasn't up to par in at least three games because of an ankle injury, and his stats would have been even better had he been healthy all year. He was a vital force for us, and we're fortunate to have him back next year." Fletcher led the Jumpers with

1,683 yards on 250 carries, for a 6.6 yards per carry average. He also scored 172 points on 27 touchdowns and five two-point conversions.

Mounce kicked 33 extra points and two field goals during the season, while also serving as the team's punter and playing defensive tackle. "With Mark's size (6-5, 245), there's no limit to what he can achieve next year," Cain said.

Owensboro running back Mark Higgs, Kentucky's all-time leading high school rusher, and Joe Curry, Madisonville's star defensive end, were the top vote-getters on the AP All-State teams. And Joe Jagers, who guided Fort Knox to a 15-0 record and its first state title by defeating Somerset 18-14 in the Class 2A championship game, was selected as the AP High School Coach of the Year.

Higgs, a senior, gained 2,844 yards in 349 carries and scored 108 points this season in leading the Red Devils to the runner-up spot in Class 4A. During his prep career, he rushed for 6,721 yards. Higgs was was a unanimous choice of the sportswriters and sportscasters from across the state who cast ballots.

"We probably won some games we shouldn't have this year because of Mark," said Owensboro coach Larry Moore. "The other teams probably had more overall talent but we had a Mark Higgs."

Higgs has scheduled visits to Tennessee, Indiana and Kentucky, said Moore.

"Anybody would be lucky to get such a fine runner and fine young man," Moore said. "This was my first year as head coach and with the tradition Owensboro had of not having a losing season since 1950, I was praying I wouldn't be the first one to break it. And I wasn't because of Higgs on the first-team."

Madisonville held a No. 1 ranking in Class 4A most of the year. "The thing that makes Joe so special is his desire to study films and pick up the tendencies of the other team," said Steve Tweddell, the Madisonville head coach who resigned at the end of the season. "He has a talent for picking up those tendencies and applying what he's learned on the field."

Also named to the defensive first team were end Alan Sadler of Corbin, tackles Tim Johnson of Owensboro and Edgar Shearer of Lexington Bryan Station, middle guard Mike Kelly of Newport Catholic and punter Jeff Nelsson of Boone.

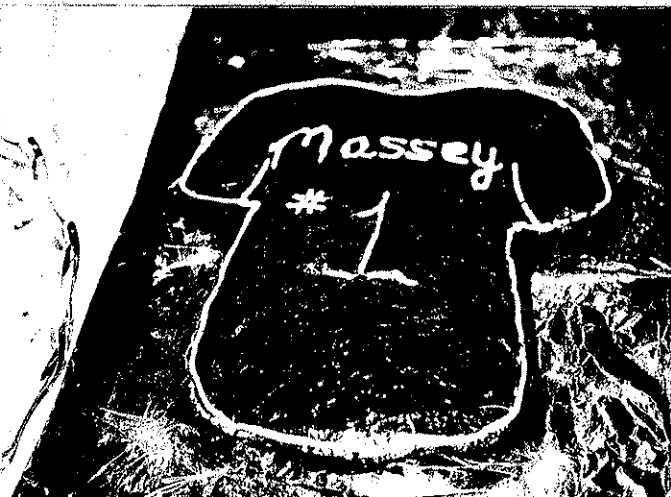

Answer: The signing of Hood should help UK's in-state recruiting substantially, depending largely on his development. The most memorable failure to sign a top prospect involved Paul Hornung of Louis-

iana, who was recruited by the University of Kentucky but signed with the University of Wisconsin.

When UK's best football teams are recalled, thoughts automatically turn to out-of-staters Babe Parilli, Lou Michaels, Bob Gain, George Blanda, Derrick Ramsey and Art Still.

Most UK stars, however, have been natives. A list would include Roger Bird, Rick Norton, Sonny Collins, Ralph Kercheval, Wallace Jones, Tony Massey, Ken Willis, Mike Pfeifer, Shipwreck Kelly, Jerry

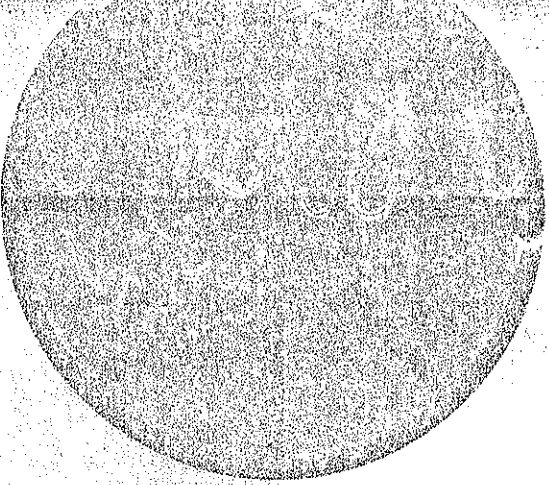

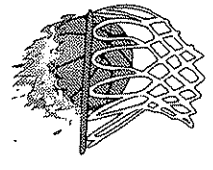
