State Hoopsters Down Wilmington, 95 To 78

A Raleigh Recreation Department basketball team, loaded with N. C. State College stars, used its tremendous height advantage and superior organized play to defeat the Wilmington Recreation Department cagers, 95-78, last night in the New Hanover High School gymnasium.

Coached by Everett Case, who has produced Southern Conference champions ever since he came to State, the red-clad Raleigh cagers encountered excellent opposition from the pickup group of Wilmington college and high school hoopsters. In fact, for the first 12:35 of play the Wolfpack crew found itself so well matched that the score was tied 9-29 before the visitors forged ahead to stay.

Wearing the same State uniforms that shone so brightly in Madison Square Garden back in March, Raleigh fell behind, 2-0, after 45 seconds when Charlie Niven swished a push shot. Bob Cook scored the invaders' first point on a free throw, but a long push by Mike Austin boosted the Wilmington margin to 4-1 after 1:30.

By the end of the first quarter, the lead had exchanged hands seven times and been tied once. Austin tipped in a rebound to make the count 25-24 with two seconds left in the initial quarter, but Dick Prater's pivot shot edged State in front 26-25, as the initial chapter ended.

State picked up steam in the second half and streaked to a 50-40 margin at the intermission. In the third quarter, Wilmington found itself on the short end of a 72-58 count, but scored on almost even terms with State in the fourth period to make the final score, 95-78.

Big gun of the Capital City hoopsters was Guard Dick Prater, 6-3, from Pikeville, Kentucky. Prater burned the nets for 35 points, 20 of which came in the first half. A recent high school graduate, Prater averaged more than 28 points as a schoolboy cager, totaling 872 points during his senior year. He was a unanimous choice for All-State honors.

The Raleigh squad included two members of the 1950 State varsity squad—Guard Joe Harand, a regular, and substitute Forward Bob Cook. Two State Freshman standouts, Center Larry Lovington, a 6-9 giant, and Forward Bob Speight, a 6-7

streambean, also were listed in the lineup. The other boys who saw a good deal of action were Ray Pavichevich of Chicago, Ill., Doug Kincaid of Greensboro, and Ronnie Taylor from Chicago. These hoopsters are working in Raleigh now and planning to enter State in September.

Coach Case, who has transformed Raleigh into the basketball capital of the South, praised Charlie Niven, who scored 20 points for Wilmington. "Niven's mighty fast and was hitting tonight," commented Case, who was interested in knowing that Charlie would be back at NHHHS next year.

The rebounding and aggressiveness of Billy Mason under the backboards also drew notice from Case. Matched against 6-

9 Lovington, Mason collected 21 points while limiting Lovington to 10.

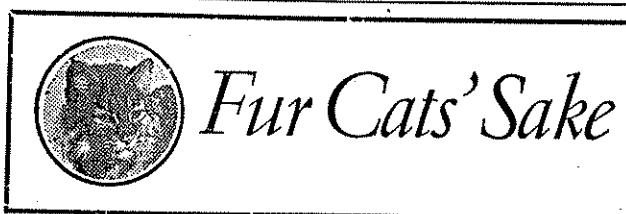

In Lexington Tuesday night the Lafayette Generals got together for a little dinner at which the state champions were feted for their achievements. During the course of the evening Pikeville's Dickie Prater got into the conversation. He was picked on the Generals' all opponent team.

Seems Lafayette hasn't forgotten the 48-45 defeat by the Panthers here Saturday, February 18. They especially remember Prater for the performance he turned in and the 30 points he collected.

In our report on the game we wrote: "Prater turned in an exhibition of shooting that is seldom seen in high school basketball. It was a team victory, however, with the passing and handoffs better than at any time this season."



The Kentucky Wildcats recently landed Dick Prater, who is generally considered the top graduating high school basketball player in the State. It was announced last Sunday that the 6-3 Pikeville standout had applied for and been granted an athletic scholarship at UK for the next semester.

Prater had been seriously thinking about going to the University of North Carolina. Perhaps the completion of UK's new five-million dollar Memorial Coliseum had something to do with Prater's final decision in choosing Kentucky over Carolina.

Incidentally, the UK frosh basketballers have lost only one game during the past two seasons. Another potent aggregation of yearlings is expected for the 1950-51 season.

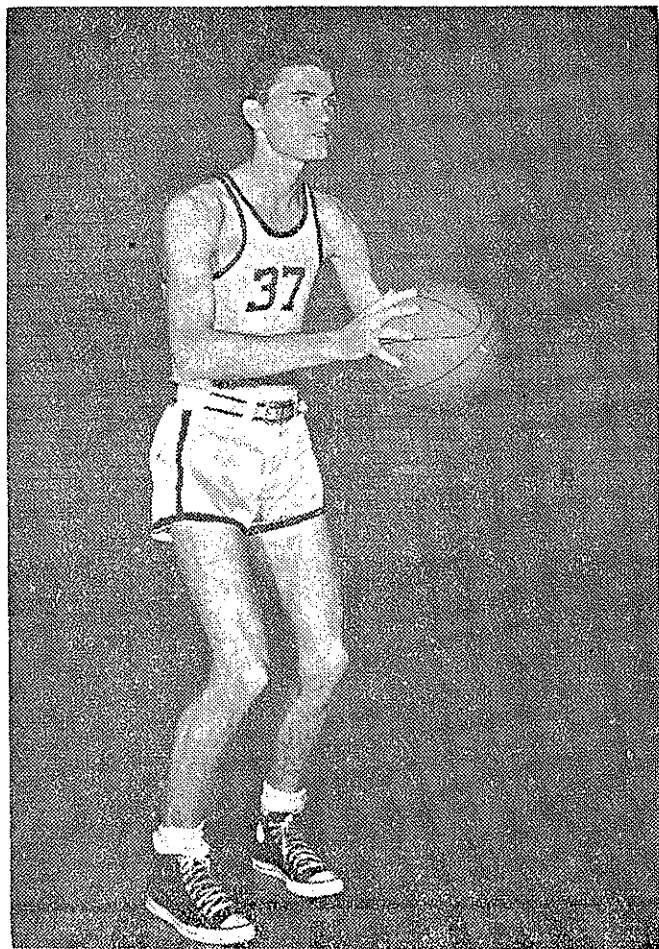
Prater was described by one of the radio announcers as being the greatest set shot artist he had seen in the 10-year history of the game.

Dickie "Chew" Prater, 6'-3" member of the Pikeville Panthers, was named captain of the Courier-Journal's all-state cage team in yesterday's paper. Congratulations Dickie!

Others named to the Courier's all-state squad included Bob Mulcahy, Lafayette; Gayle Rose, Paris; Don Swartz, Owingsville; Leon English, Sharp; Beldy Massey, Somerset; Jim Wells, Clark County; Frank Selvey, Corbin; Albert White, Jr., Meade Memorial; and Bob Houk, Flaget.

Last year Prater was named all-state and this year was named honorary captain of the mythical squad by 38 per cent of the ballots cast by coaches, officials and sportswriters who composed the Courier-Journal Board of selection.

His selection from more than 5,500 high school players is probably the most popular in the history of the all-state.

Region 15 was well represented on the team also by the selection of Albert White of Meade Memorial. Honorary mention from the region include Don Daniel, Paintsville; Jim Williamsen, Inez; Donald Curry, Wheelwright; Duff of Garrett; Doug Lafferty, Martin; Roger Piddesimer, Elkhorn City; Joe Stepp, Warfield; Frank Crum, Betsy Layne and Don Williams, Morgan County.

Dickie has had an outstanding high school career in basketball with the Panthers, scoring 281 points in 31 games this year. This year the Panthers played their toughest schedule and for the second time in two years won the 15th Regional title.

Dickie Prater's natural ability in basketball made him head of the all-state cage team. But much of his success is due to his coach—John Bill Trivette. It was John Bill who recognized that ability first, who spent hours working with Dickie, who developed the boy into this year's top high school player.

HOOPIN' IT UP

We Missed on Corbin's Roy Kidd; Invitational Final Was Dinger

Corbin and Clark County rewarded patrons of the Kentucky Invitational tournament for their patience. Through the semi-finals, you couldn't pick a single argument; none of the games was close enough for one. But that final scuffle! It was as good a high school basketball game as you're likely to see this season.

Barring injuries or ineligibilities, both Corbin and Clark County should make the state tournament "Sweet Sixteen." Clark County is a fast, hot-shot club that is smart in the bargain. If Linville Puckett doesn't make all-State before he graduates, I'll demand a recount. The sophomore carries himself like a basketball player—and proves it on the floor. Here's the remarkable thing about this Cardinal club: three of the starters (Linville Puckett, "Bobo" Pelfry, and Lewis Snowden) are sophomores. Clark County looks like pi'zen in the 16th Region for a long time. Snowden handles himself exceptionally well for a young boy of large stature.

We (the sportswriters and tourney officials) missed the boat in omitting Corbin's Roy Kidd from the all-tourney team. Helping make the selections were scorer Jack Burkhardt, timer Quentin Stacey, Buddy Mahan, Paul Baber, Hunter Harris, Gayle Kincaid, and the Hooper.

The Winchester Optimists eventually hope to extract enough money from the Invitational to provide the city with a swimming pool. Last year's proceeds, the slimmest in the four-year history of the meet, were turned over to the Boy Scouts. The Optimists really turn out to fill the many jobs incidental to running the meet. Helping tournament manager Connie Johns were Louis Flynn, Bill Pendleton, Ed Hunter, Harris, and a flock of others whose names escape me at the moment.

Notebooks and pencils were a common sight in the crowd as a goodly number of coaches were present scouting future opponents. Among those taking notes were John Bill Trivette (Pikeville), Herschel Roberts (Fort Knox), Troy Adams (Anderson), Arthur Mullins (Elkhorn City), Bob Laughlin (Breck Training), and "Doc" Adams (Anchorage).

The Red Hounds' Bob Barton was the tournament's top scorer with 52 points in three games (a 17.3 average).

Carrollton will stage its annual year-end invitational this afternoon and tonight. Newport, Gallatin County and Shelbyville are the guests but nobody knows who will play whom until 12:30 p.m. today. A blind draw made at that time will determine opponents. Dave Longenecker and Bernie Ratterman will officiate. The opening contest is scheduled at 1:30, the second at 3 and the final about 3 p.m. after a 7:30 consolation.

Pikeville will play in the March of Dimes games at Lexington January 25. Lafayette will meet Hazard while Pikeville's foe will be chosen later. Paris is the present hope for a bout with the Panthers. In regard to Pikeville, Johnny Cook of Prestonsburg adds a chapter to the history of Dickie Prater: "... You were saying Inez, in defeating Pikeville, cut Prater's average points per game, by holding him to 14. In a game that Pikeville won in an overtime, Prestonsburg held Prater to nine. Prater is a great ball player and is a great college prospect but I just wanted you to know that Prestonsburg held him to his lowest number of points. . ."

Roy Brawner, ex-Olive Hill athlete, leads the nation in free throw accuracy, according to the latest N.C.A.B. statistics. Now playing with Auburn, Brawner has hit 14 free throws in as many attempts. Brawner formerly held the individual scoring record for the Ashland floor with 32 points (set in the '47 regional heat). Owingsville's Don Swartz erased it 'tother night by collecting 35 against Ashland Catholic.

The work goes forward. Lus Oxley has held four clinics in the 14th Region with admirable results. More than 300 coaches, officials and fans attended the sessions held at Hazard (twice), Whitesburg and Jackson. Lus reports that coaches in that area believe that progress already can be detected in the quality of officiating. Apparently we are making strides in the matter of technique; next year we can work out a plan to protect our officials from mayhem.

Incidentally, we might toy with the idea of using three officials to work the final game of the state tournament. Harry Long, "Duke" Ellington and Tommy Kessinger officiated the Kentucky Invitational final and the results were encouraging.

Pikeville's all-State Dickie Prater is even better than last year. Possessed of the best natural "eye" in the state, "Chew" has added a left-hand shot to his lethal repertory. His effectiveness is not limited to offense either; he collected about 50 per cent of the rebounds in the tilt with Clark County and was very much in evidence in the Panthers' defensive picture. Incidentally this Pikeville team will have to be reckoned with in any estimate of commonwealth basketball power.

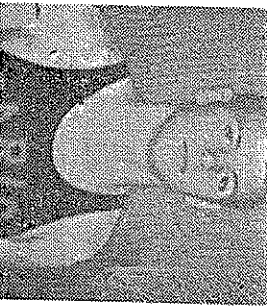

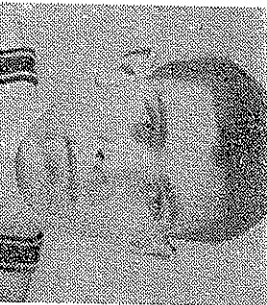
DICK PRATER: Pikeville

Pikeville's Dickie Prater Heads All-State Cage Team

This all-State team should be christened the "Bucket Brigade!"

From Pikeville's Dickie Prater through Flaget's Bob Houk, the Courier-Journal's seventh annual array of Kentucky high school talent, probably is the greatest assembly of bucket-busters since the poll was initiated.

Between the prolific Prater and Houk stand the outstanding point-markers of the commonwealth this season: Bob Mulcahy

of Lafayette, Gayle Rose of Paris, Dan Swartz of Owingsville, Leon English of Sharpe, Beldy Massey of Somerset, Jim Walls of Clark County, Frank Selvey of Corbin and Albert "Junior" White of Meade Memorial.

Prater, who has the eye of the traditional Kentucky marksmen, was the favorite with the coaches, officials and sportswriters who composed the Courier-Journal all-State Board which chose the ten best players from the more than 5,000 eligible for selection.

"Chew," one of four stars to gain

all-State recognition for the second straight year, found his way onto 38 per cent of the ballots cast.

Wells, English and Rose also were selections on the 1949 club. George Cooke, who was chosen last year as a sophomore, failed to repeat; the talented Maysville athlete was named to the second team after missing a tie for the all-star combination by only two votes.

State champion Lafayette placed only "Automatic" Mulcahy but the Generals' Jim Wel-

land scored a near miss. The bespectacled forward needed only a single ballot to the with Houk for the tenth opening on the first team.

In comparison with last year's youth-studded squad, the 50 all-State group has but one underclassman—Swartz. Only White and Rose are under the six-foot mark, indicating a predisposition for height among the electorate.

Something missing from the usual all-State aggregation? That's right; for the first time since 1944 when the newspaper

instituted its selections, Brewers failed to earn a place. The red-men, state champions in 1948, have landed seven spots on the six previous teams. Last year's record number of ballots was surpassed this year by 16 votes.

Highlighting the talented ten: DICKIE PRATER—Owens one of the best "natural eyes" in the state. "Dead-Eye Dick," honorary captain of the all-State

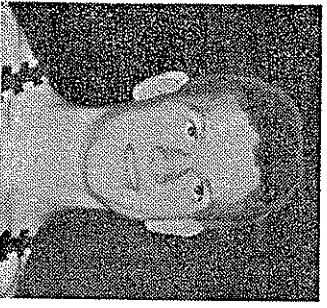
