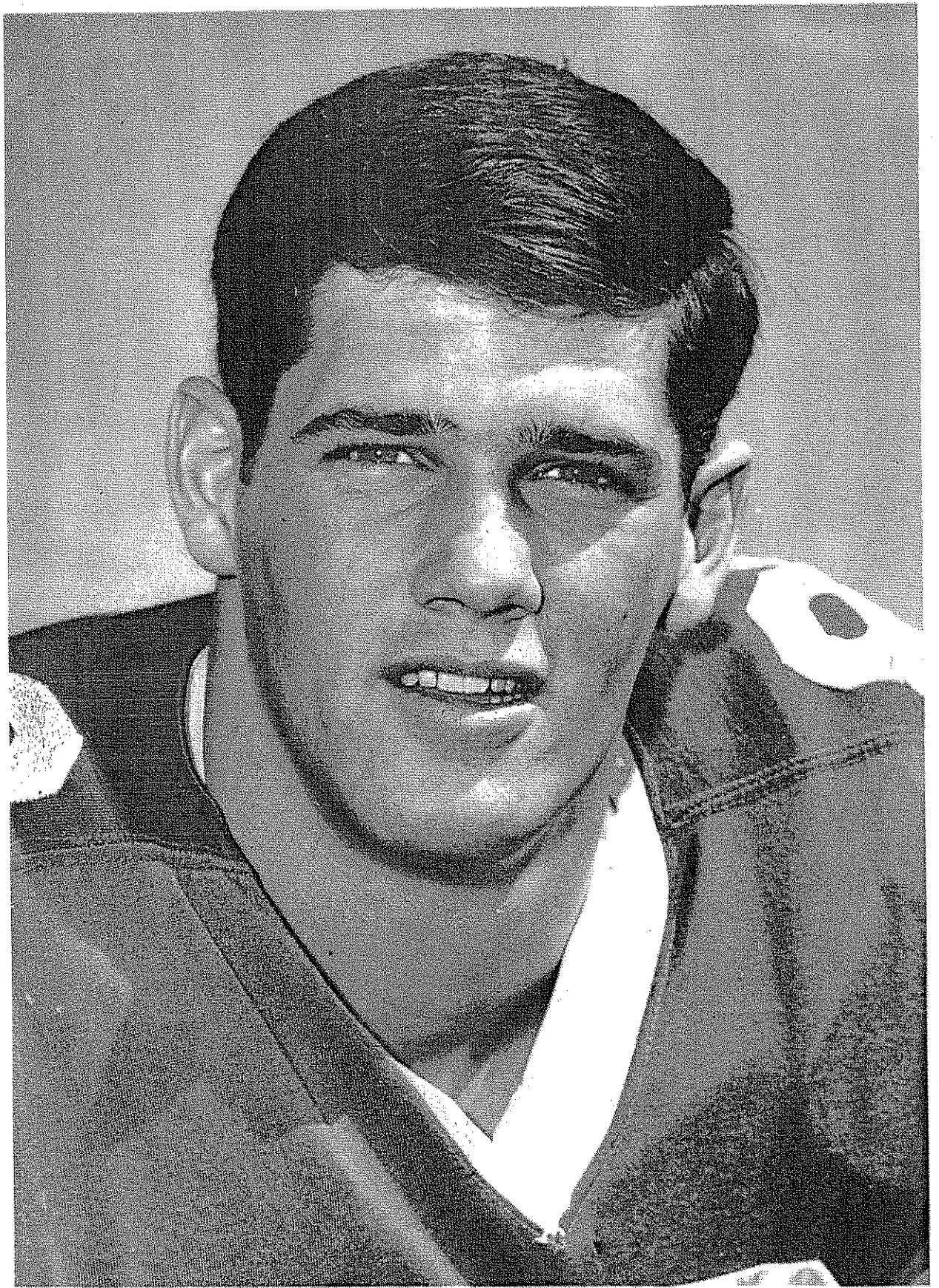
As a varsity football player at Louisville Seneca, Phil anchored his team on both offense and defense for 3 seasons, leading Seneca (under Hall of Fame coach Ron Cain) to a stellar 24-5-1 record (12 wins by shutout), which culminated in a 10-1 record in 1965 and winning the **State AAA Football Championship**, making Seneca the first Jefferson County team to ever to win that title. In his senior season as a 6'2" 190-lb Split End, Phil caught 53 passes for 796 yds and 9 TD's and was a 1st team selection to the **All-County**, **All-AAA** and **All-State** teams. He was also honored by being selected to the **All-Southern** team and to Scholastic Magazine's **All-American** high school team. Later that year he was inducted into the Kentucky Chapter of the National Football Foundation **Hall of Fame** and in 1970 was chosen as an End on the Ky. High school **All-Decade** football team.

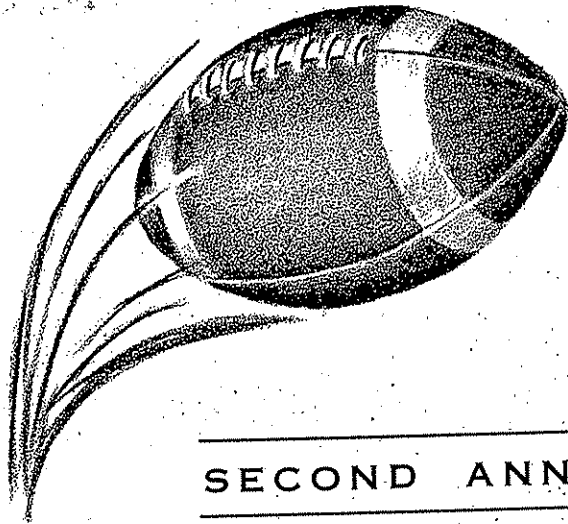
Other Factors

Phil went on to play football at the University of Kentucky where he was actively involved in helping UK to recruit and sign the first African-American players in the Southeastern Conference, Nat Northington and Greg Page. As a Wide Receiver, Phil led the Wildcats in receptions in 1967 & 1968, while earning **All-SEC** honors and in 1970 he was drafted by the **Detroit Lions** professional football team.

Today Phil is a Director of Business Development for a medical equipment manufacturer and resides with his wife and 4 children in a suburb of Dallas, Texas.

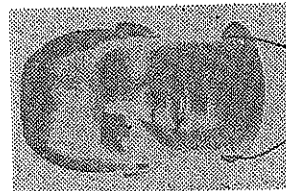

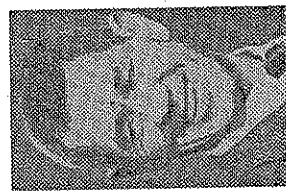

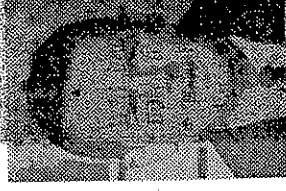

Moore Heads State Gridders On All-South

Pete Moore, star halfback on Hopkinsville High's state Class AA champions, heads a list of five Courier-Journal All-Staters chosen to the All-Southern football team.

Moore, backs: Oscar Brohm of Flaget Ed Ziegler of Newport Catholic and Lee Bougess of Shawnee, and end Phil Thompson of Class AAA titlist Seneca were the five Kentuckians making the 60-man honor squad.

The squad, drawn from a 12-state area on the basis of five players from each state, is composed of 36 backs and 24 linemen.

Other Kentuckians Honored

Seven C-J All-Staters were named to the 76-player honorable mention list. They were:

Quarterback Stan Forston, Henry Clay; tackles Ted Taylor, Harrison County, and Greg Karem, Seneca; end Greg Page, Middlesboro; guards Mike Houston, Franklin-Simpson and Ben Baker, Male High; and center Kenny Dee, Hopkinsville.

Oscar Brohm, Phil Thompson To Be Honored

Seneca end Phil Thompson and Flaget quarterback Oscar Brohm have been named to the Class Triple-A's outstanding high school football players by the Kentucky Chapter of the National Football Hall of Fame.

The pair will be honored at the second annual dinner of the chapter February 5 at 6 p.m. Selections were announced today by Ray Wimberg, chapter president. The choices were based on both scholastic and athletic ability, he said.

Thompson, a 6-foot-2 inch 190-pounder who will enter Kentucky this fall, helped lead Seneca to a state Triple-A title last season. He was named to the all-Triple-A, all-state and all-Southern teams in 1965.

Brohm, who broke Rick Norton's passing records in leading the Braves to a city championship, will enroll at Louisville in the fall. He threw a record 23 touchdown passes last season and was named All-Southern.

Seneca Jolts Flaget 13-12 For A

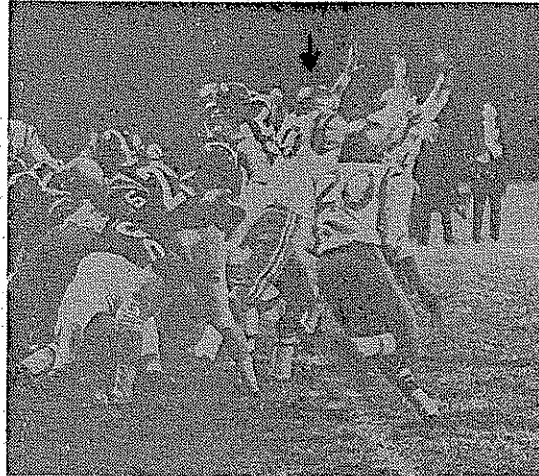
'Little Guys' Schott And Petry Team For 2 TDs, End Braves' Long Streak

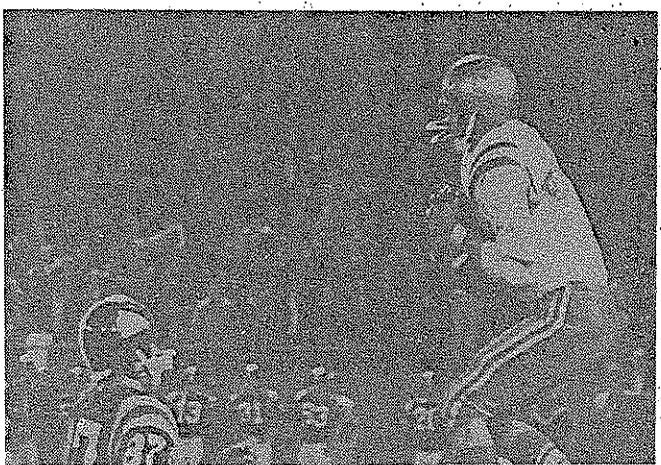
Seneca's Redskins became the first tiny high school to win the state Class A football title when they spilled victoriously favored City rival Flaget 13-12 at Airgrounds Stadium last night. Chiefly responsible for upsetting Kenyon's No. 1-ranked team were none other than the two littlest players on the iron—Garnett Schott and Charlie Petry. Schott, a 5-foot-4, 135-pound senior quarterback, tossed two touchdowns to the 5-9, 163-pound Petry, ending the 23-point underdog Redskins' whip Flaget at its own game. Petry also provided the winning margin by kicking the extra point after the first Seneca touchdown.

Although Flaget's fine passer, Oscar Brohm, threw his 23rd TD pass of the season, it wasn't enough—and the Braves' 16-game winning streak came to an end before an estimated 4,000 fans. Since the playoffs began in 1959, the closest a County Region champion had come to winning the Class AAA state crown was in 1962 when Valley fell before St. Xavier 7-6. Even though Seneca trailed at times by 6-0 and 12-7 last night, Ron Cain's Redskins weren't to be denied in their drive toward the biggest upset of the season here. Behind 12-7 at the half, Seneca scored its second touchdown with 4 minutes, 21 seconds left in the third quarter. The Redskins took the second-half kickoff and

marched 68 yards in 13 plays to score on the five-yard pass from Schott to Petry. However, the key play of the series—and the game—came when Seneca faced fourth down and nine yards to go on the Flaget 36. Schott's long pass was far over Petry's head, but the Redskins' receiver was tripped in his quest for the ball, and Flaget safetyman Dave Norris was called for pass interference. Sets Up Winning Points That gave Seneca an automatic first down on the Flaget 21. Seneca's 185-pound fullback Ron Garrison then carried four straight times, reaching the Flaget five to set up the winning TD. "The clutch play was when Petry out-gutted that Flaget kid for the football on our second touchdown," said a relatively calm Cain outside the Seneca locker room. "Petry showed an awfully big heart then. I'm telling you that kid can play college football." The victory for Seneca, ranked 31st in the Littenhous Ratings, was its 30th against one defeat. That loss was a 26-6 shocker to Waggener in mid-season. Flaget, which didn't get the football until 1:15 remained in the third period, never threatened after falling behind 13-12. In fact, the Braves ran off only 18 plays the second half to Seneca's 31. The last chance Flaget had to achieve its second perfect season in history—the Braves were 11-0 in 1961—came when linebacker Jim Mitchell intercepted a wobbly Schott pass with 2:38 to go.

Cain explained Seneca's strategy a little further. "Flaget left its two linebackers inside. So that stopped Garrison's running (he gained 18 yards in 12 carries). But we started faking inside and going outside to utilize our speed."

"I'm planning to use a pro-type offense and utilize the talents of Phil Thompson (Seneca's All-State end) and Oscar Brohm (Flaget's All-State passing wizard) as much as possible," Cain said.

Cain, East coach Walt Green of Middleboro and the East and West basketball coaches greet their players at 4 p.m. today at UK's Memorial Coliseum. But it won't be until Monday morning when the coaches get to see their prospects in action for the first time.

"The East should have a better running offense because we lost Pete Moore (Hopkinsville halfback who is in summer

The West's No. 1 pass receiver should be Thompson, whose catches and defensible play sparked Seneca to the state Class AAA title last fall. "Phil can catch anything near him," said Cain. "I may be wrong, but I'd like to make a long range prediction. Thompson has a chance to be the best end to ever play a

"UK," said Cain, a UK end himself not too long ago.

High school football in Kentucky may not be considered on par with that played in surrounding states, such as Ohio and Tennessee.

However, the brand of ball played throughout the Commonwealth during the 1960's was good enough to produce four collegiate All-Americans, two Little All-Americans and seven professional players.

All of which brings us to picking an All-Decade team of the 11 best players who performed in the state from 1960 through the '69 season.

Many spectacular things happened during the past 10 years.

Remember Herbie Phelps? The darling of Old Kentucky Home rooters became more famous than the bourbon made in his hometown of Bardstown. He did it by first ripping through defenses for 292 points as a junior in 1962, then by breaking his own state record with 313 points in 1963.

Then, too, there was Don Gullett. Yes, the same guy who is enjoying a sensational rookie year as a pitcher for the Cincinnati Reds.

Gullett was quite a football star. On Nov. 8, 1968, he erased Phelps' one-game record of 68 when he scored all 72 of McKell's points against Wurtland.

Yet, when it comes to selecting the finest players produced in Kentucky during the 1960's, the names of Phelps and Gullett must be cast aside in favor of those who gained greater fame in college and in the pro ranks.

Here's the All-1960's high school team, as chosen by this writer with the assistance of Jim Bolus, a Courier-Journal & Times staff writer who has followed foot-

ball closely since making first-team All State as a center for Male High in 1960.

Picking a "Player of the Decade" is hard, but the vote goes to Lindsey.

The Bowling Green native made All State twice, then led Western Kentucky University to its greatest heights in football before becoming a standout line backer for a perennial power in the National Football League—the Cleveland Browns.

There's tremendous talent on that first 11, however.

Four players achieved All-American honors. Norton, Ball and Bird made it while at the University of Kentucky. Kyle was so honored while a three-time All-Big 10 Conference middle guard at Purdue.

More significant is the fact that seven of the 11 All-1960 selectees are playing pro ball.

Moorman is a starting offensive guard for the world champion Kansas City Chiefs. Ball is a regular offensive tackle for the Baltimore Colts, NFL champion two years ago.

Norton, one of the finest passers in UK history, recently was waived the Cincinnati Bengals after four disappointing years with Miami. Bird plays for the Oak

land Raiders. Lyons, perhaps the best all-around back produced in Louisville in years, is with the New Orleans Saints.

And Bougess has been drawing rave notices as a rookie fullback with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Best teams of the past decade?

In Class AAA, Bolus liked Flaget's 1961 team which had Norton as its star. My choice is Male High's 1964 squad, which extended the school's unbeaten streak to 22 games with an 11-0 record, the same mark posted by Flaget's '61 club.

Hopkinsville's 1965 team gets the nod in Class AA. Its backfield then averaged over 200 pounds per man.

Lynch's 1960 team earns honors in Class A. Coach Ed Miracle's club shut out 12 of its 13 foes, including the first 10. "That bunch really got after you on defense," Miracle recalled.

A "Coach of the Decade?" Sure, why not?

Charlie Kuhn of Male receives the Class AAA award.

Kuhn guided Male to state AAA crowns in 1960, 1963 and 1964. From '63 through the first three games of 1965, Kuhn's teams won 25 straight. He was Kentucky's

"Coach of the Year" in 1964. He quit coaching following the '65 season.

Fleming Thornton of Hopkinsville gets a slight nod over Homer Rice of Ft. Thomas Highlands in Class AA.

Thornton was voted "Coach of the Year" twice, in 1962 and 1965. His Hoptown clubs were state AA champs in '65 and '66, and his teams won 28 straight games until Thomas Jefferson gained a 7-7 tie on Sept. 8, 1967.

Rice, now athletic director at the University of North Carolina, saw Highlands post 12-0 records during 1960 and 1961, capturing the state AA title both times. He was a "Coach of the Year" in 1960.

Miracle reigns among Class A coaches. His Lynch teams won state A titles in 1960, '63 and '68. They were runner-up in 1961 and '62.

A second team of best players from the 1960's includes Little All-Americans Ted Taylor of Eastern Kentucky and Dickie

Moore of Western. And Mike Taylor started on the same Southern California team which O. J. Simpson led to the national title.

So the '60's were good years for high school football fans.
