John "Hop" Brown

John "Hop" Brown was the dean of 16th Region girl's basketball coaches working 25 straight years for the same team. He led his West Carter girls to the State championship, as well as 8 Region championships, 18 District titles, 10 Eastern Kentucky Conference championships and 12 EKC tournament titles. The accomplishments include a string of ten straight 62nd District titles, five consecutive 16th Region titles, ten consecutive years of EKC tourney champs and eight consecutive EKC regular season, first place finishes. West was one of seven teams in the state to win five or more region crowns in a row.

His 514 victories is fourth on the all-time state list, but the second best percentage of any coach at the same school for his career – 71.7%. Howard Beth, who has coached at Marshall Co. 23 seasons, has an 85.9 winning percentage. Brown's eight appearances at the Sweet Sixteen are also among the top five. No other girl's 16th Region coach has more than four region wins.

Coach Brown was instrumental in leading the effort to persuade state officials to allow girls basketball to use a smaller basketball than what the boys used.

Coach Brown was selected KY-Indiana All-Star coach in 2002, Mountain Shoot-out Coach in 1989, Key-Ohio All-Star Coach, four times. The MVP trophy for the Eastern Ky. Junior All-Star Girls Classic is named in his honor. He has been EKC Coach of the Year, seven times, All-Area (Independent newspaper) Coach of the Year, eight times. State Coach of the Year, twice. He has received the Best Bencher award in the region from officials, seven times. KABC (Ky. Association of Basketball Coaches) Award in the region, eight times. He was Sportsman of the Year, 2001 in the Independent newspaper, Ashland.

During Coach Brown's 25 years at West Carter he had three seasons of 30 wins or more, thirteen, 20-win seasons, and only four season, below .500.

Coach Browns best records: 38-1 '00; 31-3 '96; 29-4 '99.

Coach Brown retired as the Lady Comet head coach in March of 2003. In 25 years at West Carter, Coach Brown compiled a record of 514 wins and 201 losses. On August 27, 2003, lost the battle with his toughest opponent, cancer. Coach Brown leaves behind his wife Sharon, daughters, Kim, Karla, Kandi, and a son Kyle.
