It is with great honor and reverence that I am submitting John W. Cain for consideration for induction into the *Dawahare's / KHSAA Hall of Fame*. John is worthy for recognition in 2 different areas. First, he should be recognized for his stellar record as a head football coach in the state of Kentucky for both the Somerset High School Briar Jumpers and the Pulaski County High School Maroons. Secondly, he should be recognized for his athletic prowess and achievements as a 3 sport star for the Cumberland High School Redskins in the early 1960s. Thank you for taking time to study this entire packet.

JOHN CAIN, Head Football Coach, Athletics Director, Somerset High School, 1975 to 1994
Coach Cain, "*the winningest coach in Somerset High School football history*", has an excellent football coaching record from his time at the helm for the Briar Jumpers. He and his various coaching staff members led Somerset to the playoffs in 12 different seasons (*he had some great assistant coaches over the years*). After taking over as head coach in 1975, it only took Coach Cain 3 seasons to lead his first team to the State Championship game in 1978 vs. Mayfield. During a stretch of time from 1981 – 1984, Coach Cain led the football Briar Jumpers to a record of 48 wins with only 6 losses. For a 16-week stretch in these 4 years, the Briar Jumpers were rated the #1 team in the state of Kentucky in all 4 classifications. Coach Cain led the Briar Jumpers to the longest winning streak in Somerset football history. That streak stands at eighteen games from 1982 to 1983. In addition, Coach Cain's 1983 team holds the most wins in a single season at SHS, fourteen. His 1984 team finished with a thirteen win season. The 1983 and 1984 teams both finished with undefeated regular seasons (11-0). Arguably, his best team missed the state title game in 1984 falling in the semi-finals to eventual state champion Newport Catholic. During the early 1980s, Coach John Cain's Briar Jumpers averaged winning more games each year than most football teams around the state played, and they did it against top notch competition. I won't detail all 20 schedules from Coach Cain's tenure at SHS, but wins came mostly against the best competition in one of the toughest 2A districts in the state which included Corbin and Middlesboro and a tough Central Kentucky Conference with the likes of Henry Clay, Harrodsburg, Danville, among others.

I started 3 years at quarterback under Coach Cain at Somerset High School between 1986 and 1989. Under his leadership, our team won 3 consecutive (*of the 8 total*) 12th region football championship titles he coached and led Somerset to between the years of 1971 – 1994. Since the inception of playoff football in the state of KY, SHS has won 11 regional titles. Coach John Cain was head football coach for 7 of those regional titles. One of those regional titles came when he was an assistant coach to his older brother and *KHSAA Hall of Fame inductee*, Ron Cain (1974). In my junior season of 1988, Somerset finished Runner-up in the State Championship to Ft. Knox. In fact, Coach John Cain led the Briar Jumpers to four Kentucky state football championship runner-ups (1978 vs. Mayfield, 1981 vs. Bardstown, 1983 vs. Ft.

Knox, and 1988 vs. Ft. Knox). As a final note, Coach Cain also served as Athletic Director for SHS from 1975 to 1994.

JOHN CAIN, Head Football Coach, Pulaski County High School, 1995 to 1998

Between the seasons of 1995 - 1998, Coach Cain took the reins across town at Pulaski County High School. He inherited the longest football losing streak in the state at that time (24 games). I was an assistant to Coach Cain during two of those four seasons. He led Pulaski to the playoffs 4 consecutive seasons and finished with an overall winning record of 24-20. Before Coach Cain and his staff arrived at Pulaski, the Maroons had only made one trip to the playoffs. Unbelievably, at the time of his retirement from coaching in 1999, his 24 wins earned him the distinction of having more wins than any head coach in Pulaski County football history.

Upon retiring from coaching at age 54, Coach Cain had amassed 171 victories in his 24 seasons as a head coach. Had he continued coaching as long as some of the recognizable names on the KHSAA football all-time win list like Hilton (31 years), Schneider (41 years), Jaggars (33 years), Redman (32 years), among others, I think that he would be somewhere high on the "all time wins" list as well. Coach Cain retired from football to become a full-time school administrator in 1999, and he retired for good in June of 2007.

JOHN CAIN, Athlete, Cumberland High School, 1960 - 1963

My other qualification for this recommendation is that I am also John's son. I was obviously not there to see my father compete in interscholastic athletics, but I have heard many descriptions from many people of his athleticism and the skill my dad possessed and showcased in his days at Cumberland High School, UK, and after. I researched and provided copies of some of the articles from which I received most of my statistics. If you need copies of all the articles, I will be glad to provide them for your verification.

Football

A 3 year starter in football at Cumberland High School, he was a First Team All-State selection in the Coach's Poll his senior season. He was also a 3rd Team All-State selection at quarterback as picked by the Courier Journal / AP his senior season that same year (*making Honorable Mention All-State his sophomore and junior years through that same poll*). During his senior football season of 1963, he was named a starter and elected game captain of the *East All-Star Team* in the *East/West All Star Game*. He was also 1st Team All-Cumberland Valley Conference his sophomore, junior and senior seasons. Actual yardages and numerical statistics are hard to come by 44 years after the fact. However, I can verify that he accounted for at least 17 (13 *rushing and 4 passing*) of his team's 34 touchdowns and several extra points (*in the air and on the ground*) as a senior. Two of these touchdowns were 85 and 90 yard kick-off returns and one was a 66 yard punt return for a touchdown. These numbers come without playing in 2 games (*Harlan and Whitesburg*) due to a severe ankle injury, giving him only an 8 game senior season. Cumberland lost 3 games that season. In a pivotal game versus arch rival and CVC foe Lynch, "Johnny" accounted for all 4 scores in a 25-20 win (*2 rushing and 2 passing to Granato*). The Redskins won the CVC with that victory. Against Bell County his senior season, Johnny scored 3 touchdowns in a 27-0 rout of the Bobcats. Similarly, as a junior, he accounted for at least 11 of his team's 29 touchdowns. In his junior season, Johnny scored 3 times in one game (*Lynch*) and accounted for 4 in another (*Wallins*). In a 26-18 loss his junior season against 4-time Class A State Champion Lynch Bulldogs, "Johnny" accounted for all 3 of his teams scores including an 90 yard kick-off return. As a sophomore, Johnny took over as starting quarterback 5 games into

the season. During that season, "Johnny" completed 59 out of 95 passing attempts for a completion percentage of 62.5%. These passes ended in seven touchdowns and 551 yards. He also rushed for several touchdowns during this season.

All these statistics deal with his presence on the offensive side of the ball. Unfortunately, I do not have any statistics about his defensive career, but he started 3 years on defense. "Johnny" led the team in interceptions and finishing as the second leading tackler throughout his 3 year starting career at Cumberland behind Mike Granato, an eventual UK football signee. Please see the attached seasonal statistic sheets and newspaper clippings I have provided.

Basketball

A 3 year starter in basketball, Johnny amassed over 1000 points in his high school basketball career at Cumberland High School. He was a 2-time honorable mention all-state selection at point guard. Detailed statistics are hard to come by, but "Johnny" averaged 16 points his senior season, 14 his junior season, and around 8 his sophomore season. He led the team in assists and steals in all 3 seasons. His contributions as a "floor general" were equal to his numerical statistics. Coaches know that intangibles mean as much or more than the actual numbers. Those whom I have spoken to about "Johnny" as a basketball player, recall his play-making ability and knack for creating shots for his teammates. Please see the attached seasonal statistic sheets I have provided for basketball.

Baseball

There were no all-state baseball teams at that time, but he was a varsity starter in this sport for 5 years. He also played for a very competitive American Legion team at Lynch in the summers. From his freshman season forward, "Johnny" led in all major statistical categories (*Home Runs, RBIs, Doubles, Triples, Stolen Bases, etc.*). No articles were available in baseball.

Conclusion


The athlete John Cain received scholarship offers in 3 major sports (*football, basketball, and baseball*). He ultimately passed on his other "best" offers from Baylor in basketball and Ole Miss in football to take a full-scholarship to play football at the University of Kentucky under the "infamous" Charlie Bradshaw. Hearsay says his freshman team at UK held the distinction of being rated the #1 freshman squad in the nation by *Playboy* in 1964, though this is not a verified fact. Among the highlights from that season was a 70-0 win over the University of Tennessee Baby VOLS. Unfortunately, 38 of the 45 freshmen on that team left the University of Kentucky. John's collegiate football career ended with a shoulder injury his red-shirt sophomore season of 1965.

John Cain, athlete and coach, is a man of few words, but no one guesses where he stands on any issue. His teams were disciplined, well-prepared, innovative, and aggressive, all character traits he exudes and showed in his time as an athlete. He does not covet the limelight. As you look at his resume, you will find that based on his numbers, there is no doubt that he is deserving of being inducted into your respected Hall of Fame. As you read his character references, it will become even clearer. John Cain represents everything that your organization could want in an honoree. Don't take this recommendation as coming from a son blinded by unrealistic images of his father. It comes from a 36 year old man that has watched his father from near and far in life situations as well as athletics and has done the research to separate the fact from "tall tales". Now, just as when I was a boy growing up revering the man, I still hope to be like my dad. As a

father of two boys, I hope that my sons carry themselves on and off the field like he did and still does. Please see the letters of recommendation from his peers along with a few other items that will expand upon my recommendation. You could do no better than inducting John Cain into your hall for the 2009 class.

To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing on behalf of my former coach, John Cain. I would like to nominate Coach Cain for induction into the KHSAA Hall of Fame. Coach Cain's many accomplishments as a football coach at Somerset High School are well documented. However, I would like to introduce you to Coach Cain, the individual.

I met Coach Cain when I was a seventh grader at Meece Middle School in Somerset. Coach Cain had introduced himself to me at the KHSAA Basketball Tournament that year. Coach Cain had encouraged me to consider coming out for football that year. I mention this simply to point out that Coach Cain was an advocate of all sports. Often, you could find him at other sporting events when it came to his players. Coach Cain was an advocate for having his players involved in other sports, which speaks to his interest in the student-athlete.

Subsequently, I would go on to play four year of football for Coach Cain at Somerset High School. I would count that experience as key to my development as a person and an athlete. Moreover, I would link many life lessons that I gained from that experience to Coach Cain, the individual. I specifically recall playing in a junior varsity basketball game as a sophomore one night that Coach Cain attended. During that game I had engaged in both some physical and verbal play with an opponent that at times became heated. The next morning I was called into Coach Cain's office. He began to question me about my play the night before, and specifically about the disagreement that he had witnessed. He took the time to explain his view on self-control and the importance of discipline in both sports and life in general. I walked away from that interaction with food

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
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for thought. Coach Cain had challenged me to evaluate my intentions and to consider the notion of discipline and self-control. I would take that life lesson with me from that day forward. Coach Cain's interest in me as an individual, particularly outside of the main sport he coached, speaks volumes to who Coach Cain was. He was a coach, an educator, and a mentor. He is worthy of consideration to be included into the KHSAA Hall of Fame.

The end of an era

Legendary coach of Somerset and Pulaski County John Cain says good-bye after 31 years on the sidelines

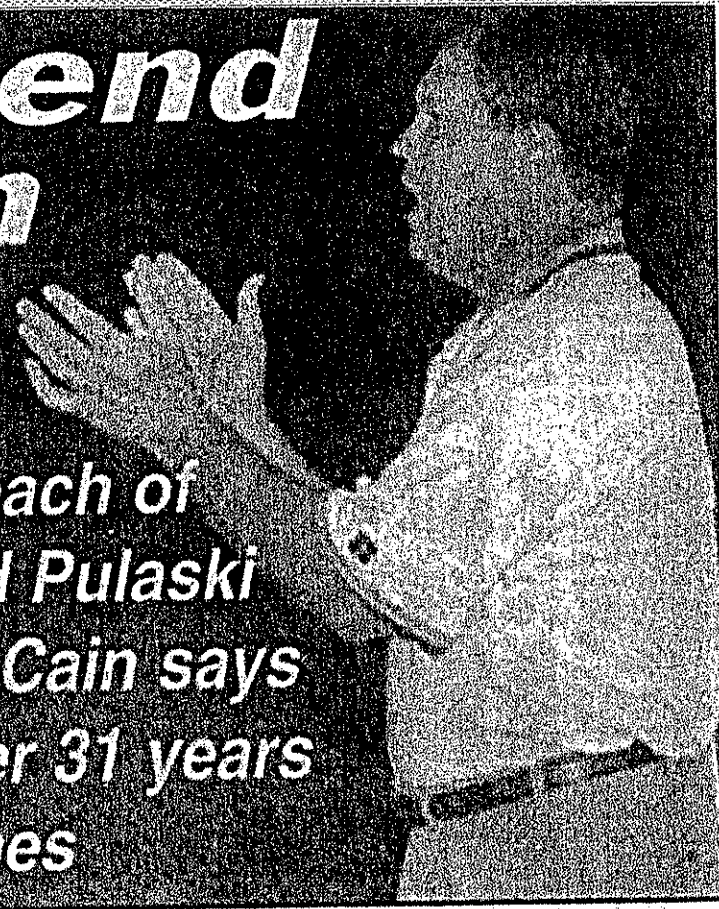

'I think the timing is right'

Twenty-four years ago John Cain took the head coaching job at Somerset with one personal goal in mind.

"My first goal back then was to make it five years as a head coach," Cain said.

He did more than simply surviving his first five seasons though.

Cain eclipsed that goal and then many more on the way to 24 seasons as a head coach—the first 20 at Somerset and the last four at Pulaski County—before deciding last week to call it quits, ending the most legendary coaching career in local football.

"Whether that's an accomplishment or not in other people's eyes, the fact that I survived a large number of years in coaching is, as far as I'm concerned, an accomplishment," Cain said.

But the list of Cain's football accomplishments just begins with his long tenure.

There's the four trips to the state title game at Somerset, the turn-around and building of a program at Pulaski County and the 171 career wins to name just a few.

The Storied Career

Cain's first coaching experience came as an assistant in Miami, Florida 31 seasons ago. After a year there, he moved to Seneca in Louisville where he worked two seasons before joining the

Somerset staff as an assistant in 1970. Cain walked the sidelines as an assistant for four years before taking over the program in 1975.

That's when he set the goal of staying in coaching for five seasons.

Within three years, Cain had the Briar Jumpers playing in the first of four Class AA state title games and it looked like a five-year stint was assured.

In his 20-year career at Somerset, Cain led the Briar Jumpers to eight district titles, seven regional championships and the four state title appearances on the way to winning more than 140 games.

"We had great success over there and enjoyed every minute of it," Cain said. "The players and the people at Somerset know how much coaching there meant to me."

But in 1995, following a disappointing 2-8 season, Cain left Somerset to attack what many considered the biggest challenge at that time—he set out to turn around the 0-22 Pulaski Maroons' program across town.

"Leaving Somerset was tough. That was the hardest decision of my life," Cain said during a preseason interview in August. "It's a decision I don't regret, but a very tough decision to make."

But the already storied career added some new chapters at Pulaski County.

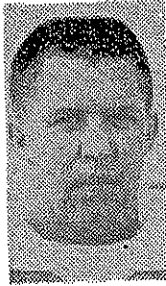

Cumberland defeated Lynch East Main 25-20 last night, marking only the fourth time in 27 years that the Redhounds had beaten their eastern Kentucky rival in a regular season game.

It was natural for Cumberland coach Needham Saylor to say "We've already had a good season." Yet, tonight Saylor will be shooting for a bigger prize—its first win over Corbin.

Saylor realizes beating Corbin will be no easy task. The Redhounds are currently one of the hottest teams in the state. Since a 38-0 loss to Louisville Male, Coach Ledger Howard's club has won five consecutive games to rank ninth in the Litkenhous Ratings. The Redhounds appeared to hit their peak last week in whipping the state's fourth-ranked club, Danville, 19-6.

Saylor thinks his chances of beating Corbin are "pretty darn good." He says his team, which has a 5-2 won-lost record, is improved over last year's 7-3 club that lost to Corbin 18-6. But he quickly adds, "I think Corbin is a much sounder club this season than last. Yes, it lost Rodgers Bird (All-State halfback), but we'll get all those good boys back in the line. Corbin seems to be a good team in Danville." Saylor thinks he has, in Johnny Cain, one of the state's best backs. Johnny, a six-foot, 170-pound senior, is a brother of Cumberland and University of Kentucky star Ronnie Cain.

Johnny led the state in scoring in both 1954 and 1955 when he was at Lynch East Main High. He is now coaching Louisville Seneca. Saylor didn't coach Ronnie, he feels Johnny is a better prospect than was his brother.

Johnny is both a good runner and passer and is being looked for by scouts, as is halfback Mike Granato. Cumberland's other backs have been end Randall Collier, tackle Richard Dyer and guard Jimmy Dunaway.

If Cumberland wins, the Redhounds will probably win the First District title in the Class AA, Fourth Region, and get another shot at the regional champion the past three years. Cumberland has already clinched the Second District title.

If Cumberland wins, the district race would be up in the air and Cumberland would have its greatest season ever.

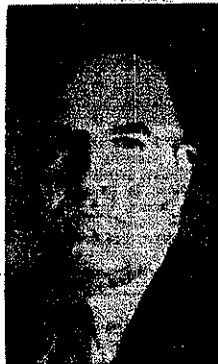

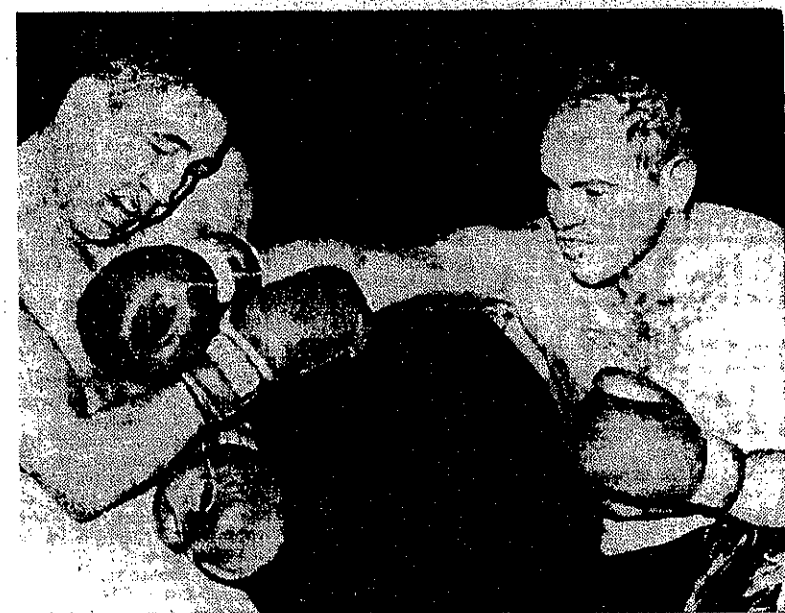

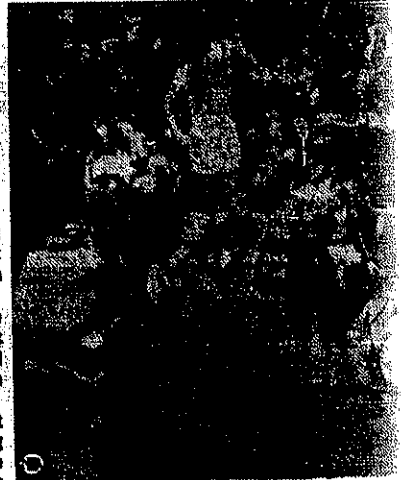

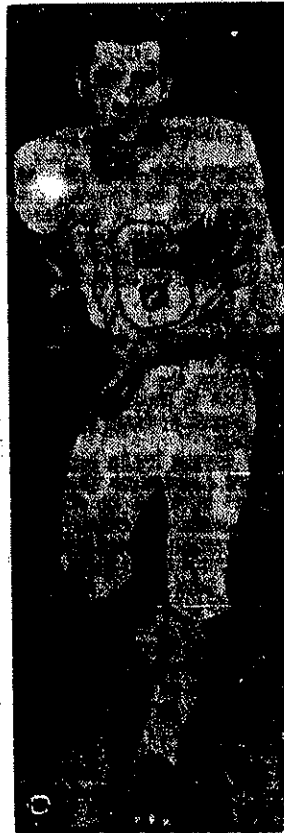

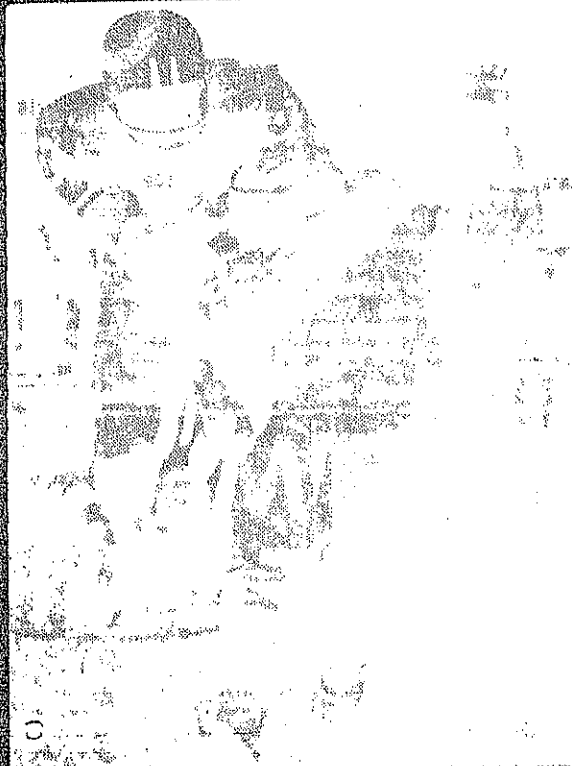
Flanery snatched a pass from the hands of Owens and travelled 58 yards for the TD and Watts

Another star whose name is etched in annals of Harlan's history as one of the greatest athletes of the 20's is Don Whitehead. "I'll never forget our game with Danville when Don took the kick-off and started up the field pointing out each man to his blockers," Myers said. He went all the way.

Baseball was played here as early as 1918 but not in the high school. The "town team" in 1922 was a member of a four-team league including Lynch, Banner Fork and Everts-Black Mountain. Nobe Ballou was one of the earlier pitchers and Cam Smith was a catcher for many years. Earl Combs also played ball here before going up.

Basketball Debuted
It wasn't until 1928 when basketball made its debut. The Dragons went to the state tournament that year. The gymnasium was completed about January 10, 1928 and after a few games on the indoor court Don Whitehead, Ben Forbus, Leon Barnhart, Barney Hargrove and "Buck" Brown went to the state.

They won five games in the district tourney in London and moved to Lexington since there were no regional tournaments then. The Dragons came close to the state crown but had to wait until 18 years later to win it.

Harlan's All-American "Wah Wah" Jones led the Dragons to their first title in 1944.

The final score was set up in the fourth period when McDaniel blocked a punt and Paul Royce recovered it on the Bobcat 35. The Cain-Granata combine went to work again and put up the final score.

Cain crashed over from the two and Granata's perfect kicking gave the Redskins a 27-0 victory.

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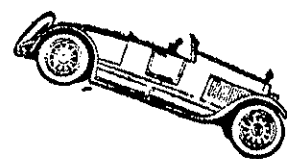

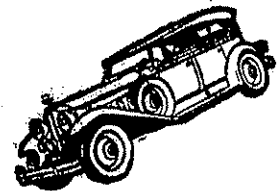

Cumberland Eyes 1st Win Over Corbin

When Cumberland defeated Lynch East Main 25-20 last week, it marked only the fourth time in 27 years that the Redskins had beaten their eastern Kentucky rival in football.

So it was natural for Cumberland coach Needham Saylor to comment, "We've already had a good season." Yet, tonight Cumberland will be shooting for a bigger prize—its first win ever over Corbin.

But Saylor realizes beating Corbin will be no easy task. The Redhounds are currently one of the hottest teams in the state. Since a 38-0 loss to Louisville Male, Coach Ledger Howard's club has won five consecutive games to rank ninth in the Litkenhous Ratings. The Redhounds appeared to hit their peak last week in whipping the state's fourth-ranked club, Danville, 19-6.

Saylor thinks his chances of beating Corbin are "pretty darn good." He says his team, which has a 5-2 won-lost record, is improved over last year's 7-3 club that lost to Corbin 18-6. But he quickly adds, "I think Corbin is a much sounder club this season than last. Yes, it lost Rodgers Bird (All-State halfback), but it has all those good boys back in the line. Corbin seems better balanced. It beat a real good team in Danville."

Saylor thinks he has, in Johnny Cain, one of the state's best quarterbacks. Johnny, a six-foot, 170-pound senior, is a brother to ex-Cumberland and University of Kentucky star Ronnie Cain.

Ronnie led the state in scoring in both 1954 and 1955 when at Cumberland High. He is now coaching Louisville Seneca. Although Saylor didn't coach Ronnie, he feels Johnny "is a better college prospect than was his brother."

Johnny is both a good runner and passer and is being looked at by U. K. scouts, as is halfback Mike Granato. Cumberland's top linemen have been end Randall Collier, tackle Richard Gilliam and guard Jimmy Dunaway.

If Corbin wins, the Redhounds will probably win the First District title in the Class AA, Fourth Region, and get another crack at Hazard, the regional champion the past three years. Hazard has already clinched the Second District title.

But should Cumberland win, the district race would be up for grabs and Cumberland would have its greatest season ever.

Flanary's Good At Fullback, Too

Last season, Lowell Flanary of Lynch was good enough to make the Class A All-State first team as a sophomore. He was an end then. Now he's playing fullback and is a top candidate for All-State at that position. "Flanary is one of the better players in the mountains," said Saylor. "He's powerful and aggressive." Flanary stands 5-11 and weighs 195.

Speaking of All-State, tackles Eddie Kopple of Male High and St. Xavier's 6-5 Maurice Moorman are leading candidates for the over-all honor team. U. K. scouts rate those two at the top of their list.

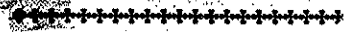

Seven big, powerful linemen and four speedy backs—representing 11 schools from throughout the state—make up The Associated Press 1962 Kentucky High School All-State Football Team.

The line, averaging 204 pounds to the man, is anchored by tackle Maurice Moorman, a 6-foot-5, 230-pound performer from Louisville St. Xavier's Class AAA state champions.

The smallest man on the first team is Sammy Burke, a 5-foot-11, 165-pound speedster from Danville. The other three members of the backfield bring the average there to 178.

The AP selections committee had its toughest job in picking a quarterback and two tackles from the bumper crops at those posi-

Regarded As Best

Moorman, regarded by many college scouts as one of the best tackles put out by Kentucky high schools in the last 25 years, was joined on the first team at that position by David Burton, an aggressive 6-foot-1, 225-pound junior from Corbin. Burton was the only junior named to the first team.

The competition at tackle was so close that Ed Donaldson, Bowling Green, and Eddie Kopple, Louisville Male, barely edged several other fine candidates to make the second unit.

The guard posts are ably manned by George Wilthers, 6-foot, 190-pounder from Versailles Class A finalists, and Tom Ryan, a 5-foot-10, 190-pounder star from Louisville Trinity.

Center was another position where serious consideration had to be given to several prepsters before giving the nod to Owensboro's Don Hayden, a 6-foot-3, 215-pound senior.

Ed Settle, just half an inch over six feet, of Caldwell County and Buddy Pfaadt, 6-foot-1 of Louisville Male, were selected as the best two ends in the state. Both weight 185 pounds.

Settle's coach Fred Clayton

produced in several years, is outstanding on defense and is a glue-fingered pass catcher.

Hatfield who holds the state record for touchdown passes thrown in a season (the 23 he threw last year), is a real triple threat man. His coach, Al Vipperman, said Hatfield, 5-foot-11, 175 pounds, can run, pass and kick equally well.

Hatfield threw 13 touchdown passes this season in leading Belfry to a 7-2 mark.

In his last game, Vipperman moved Hatfield, who runs the 40-yard dash in 4.5 seconds, to half-back just to see what he could do. Hatfield carried the ball 21 times for 211 yards.

Burke, a back who possesses good speed and great balance, was equally as good on defense as offense, Coach Ray Callahan said. "This boy has a lot of heart and a lot of pride. He's a true all-stater," Callahan said.

Mantle Signs \$82,000 Pact With Yankees

NEW YORK (AP)—Roger Maris, batting behind Mickey Mantle for a change, makes his biggest salary pitch today while his slugging New York Yankee teammate fondles the "best contract I ever got."

Maris, who hit a record of 61 homers last season, also will ask for the best contract he ever received during a conference with General Manager Roy Hamey. The hard-hitting outfielder was paid about \$48,000 last season.

"I expect no trouble from Roger," said Hamey after signing Mantle for an estimated \$82,000 Wednesday, a raise of about \$10,000. "I wouldn't be surprised if he signs right away. I spoke to him briefly earlier this week and he didn't sound tough to me."

Mantle signed after a brief meeting with Hamey, who said, "Mickey has reached Babe Ruth's figure." Later, he admitted, "it's a little over \$80,000."

Mantle thus became the second highest paid player in Yankee history. Joe DiMaggio received \$100,000 in 1961. Ruth got his \$80,000 in 1952.

est driving guards in the business, is the 'Cat leading scorer. Nathan Stallard, a hook shot artist. Bo Kelly and John O'Rourke are always threats.

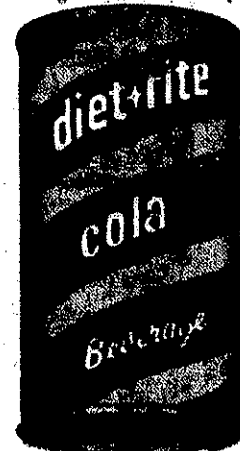

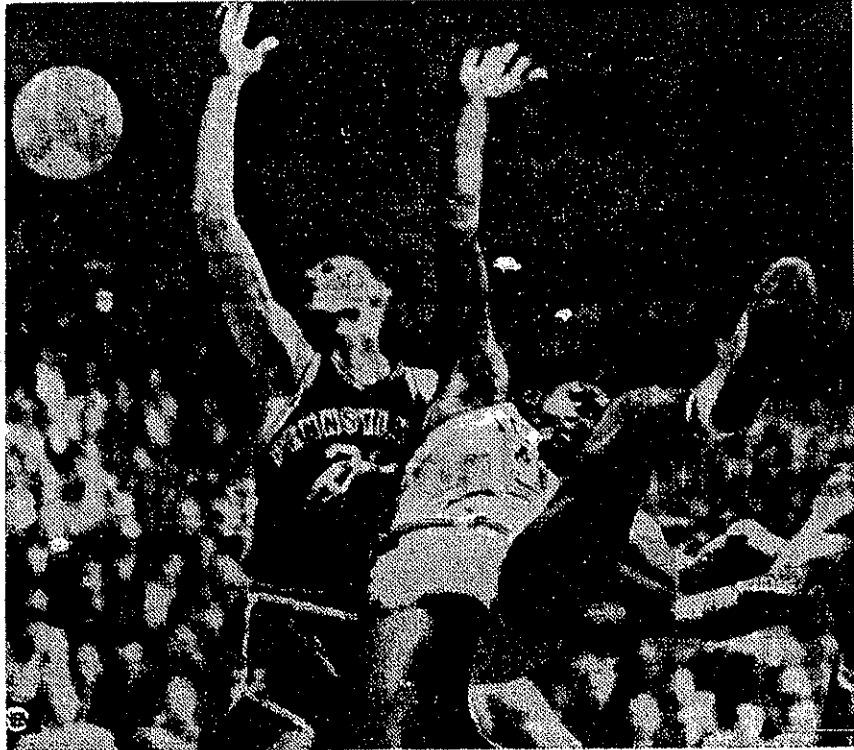

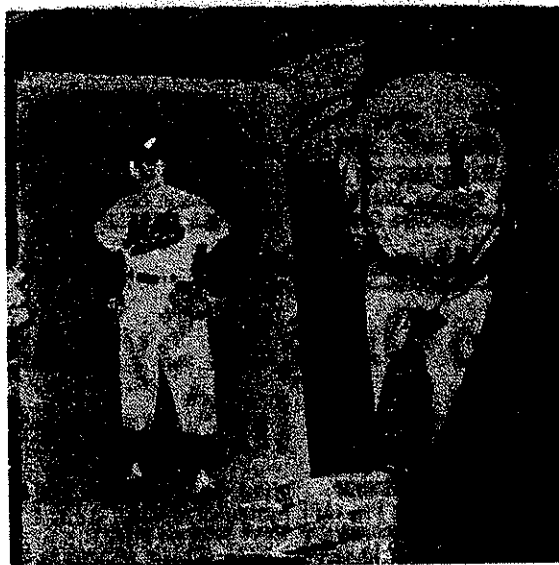

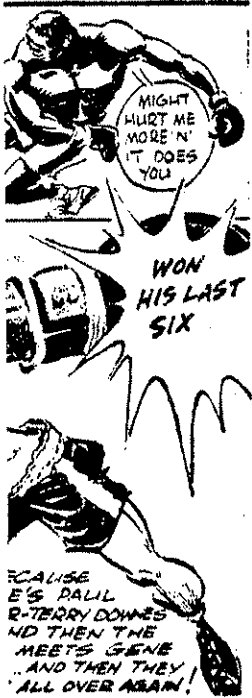

ATLANTA (AP) — Kentucky's second-ranked Wildcats, thanks to the clutch playing of sophomore Cotton Nash, will take a spotless 5-0 Southeastern Conference mark into their SEC basketball game with Georgia Wednesday night. Nash, held to just three points in the first half Monday night against Georgia Tech, came on strong in the second half to score 18 points to lead the Wildcats to a well-earned 71-62 victory.

The sensational 6-foot-5 pivot man tallied eight crucial points in the final three and a half minutes of play to put Kentucky out of reach of the Yellow Jackets. Kentucky, now sporting a 14-1 over-all record, and Tech, now 2-4 in SEC play and 7-10 over-all, battled neck and neck until Nash broke the game wide-open in the final minutes of play.

The Tight Zone
A tight zone defense limited the Kentucky cotton-top to a field goal and a free throw in the first half. However Nash sat out about 10 minutes of the first half with three fouls.

Georgia Tech, which has been

a thorn in Kentucky's flesh for the past several years in SEC basketball play, gave the Wildcats all they wanted in the roughly played contest. Tech led several times throughout the contest, the last time 40-39 when Frank Landrey sank a free throw with 11:24 to go. Kentucky then regained the lead 41-40 on a tip-in by Roy Roberts and never trailed again although the Wildcats couldn't put much distance between themselves and the Jackets until Nash went on his spree.

Nash finished the night with 21 points but yielding scoring honors to Tech's Mike Tomasovich who had 23 points.

Baessler, Pursiful Score
Scotty Baessler and Larry Pursiful scored 16 and 12 points, respectively, for Kentucky. Bill Edinson with 12 points, was Tech's only other player to shoot in double figures.

Kentucky, after shooting a miserable 26.7 per cent from the field in the first half, ended the night with a 42.2 shooting percentage connecting on 27 of 64 field goal attempts.

Tech shot 34.4 per cent from the field for the game but hit only 27.6 in the first half.

Kentucky outrebounded Tech 57-37.

After Wednesday night's game with Georgia, Kentucky moves on to Florida for an SEC contest against the always dangerous Gators.

Third In Eight Days

Snell Breaks Half-Mile, 880 Meter World Marks

CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand (AP) — Powerful Peter Snell, a 22-year-old New Zealander with a tremendous finishing kick, bettered the listed world records for the 800 meters and half mile today—the second and third . . . he has broken in eight days.

His graceful, rhythmic stride carried him to a time of 1 minute 45.1 seconds in the half mile and 1:44.3 for the shorter 800 meters, bettering the old marks by more than a second.

Only a week ago the curly-haired supply surveyor, a virtual unknown despite his 1960 Olympic victory in the 800 meters, clipped one-tenth of a second off Herb Elliott's world mile record.

Built Like Football End
Snell, who is built along the lines of a college football end, established the mile mark with a time of 3:54.4 over a grass track—considered slower than other surfaces.

Today's two records were established on a composition course at Lancaster Park, considered one of the fastest tracks in New Zealand. Since the 800 meters—874 yards, 2 feet, 8 inches—is shorter than the half mile he was able to break both in one race.

The rest of the rankings underwent a shuffling of positions but none of the top 10 teams of a week ago dropped out of the elite.

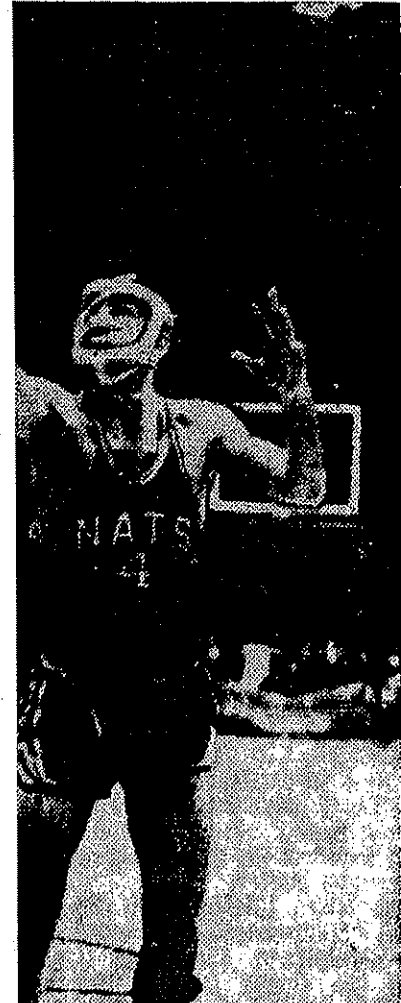

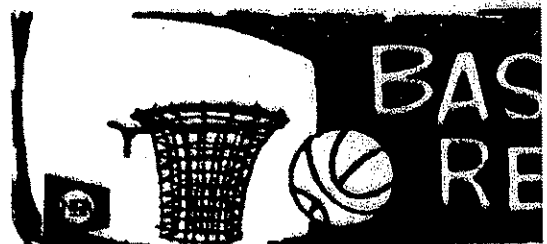

NEW YORK (AP)—Five seniors topped by Ohio State's Jerry Lucas, make up the 1962 college basketball All-America announced today by The Associated Press.

Named to the first team with Lucas were Terry Dischinger of Purdue, Billy McGill of Utah, Chet Walker of Bradley and Len Chappell of Wake Forest. Lucas, Dischinger and Walker are repeaters from the 1961 All-America. In addition, Lucas is the first 3-time All-America since Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati.

Lucas, Dischinger and McGill topped the voting by 322 sports-writers and radio-TV broadcasters. On the basis of five points for a first team vote and two points for a second team nod Lucas polled 1,589 points, Dischinger got 1,273 and McGill 1,151.

Walker was next with 823 while the 240-pound Chappell barely won out over John Havlicek of Ohio State, and Art Heyman of Duke, for the last berth on the first team. Both Heyman and Havlicek received more first team votes, but Chappell sneaked in with 691 points helped by 163 second team votes.

Havlicek, with 686, and Heyman with 685 topped the second team. Joining them on the second five were Charles Nash of Kentucky (484) John Rudometkin of Southern California (416) and Rod Thorn of West Virginia.

Lucas, 6-8, led the Buckeyes to their third straight Big Ten title, while Dischinger, 6-7, was the Big Ten leading scorer. The 6-9 McGill set Skyline scoring records and the 6-0 Walker, known as the jet, became Bradley's all-time scorer. Chappell, one of the fastest 6-8 players in the game, led Wake Forest to the Atlantic Coast Conference regular season championship. He was a whizz during the latter part of the season.

Nash led Kentucky back to prominence as a sophomore while

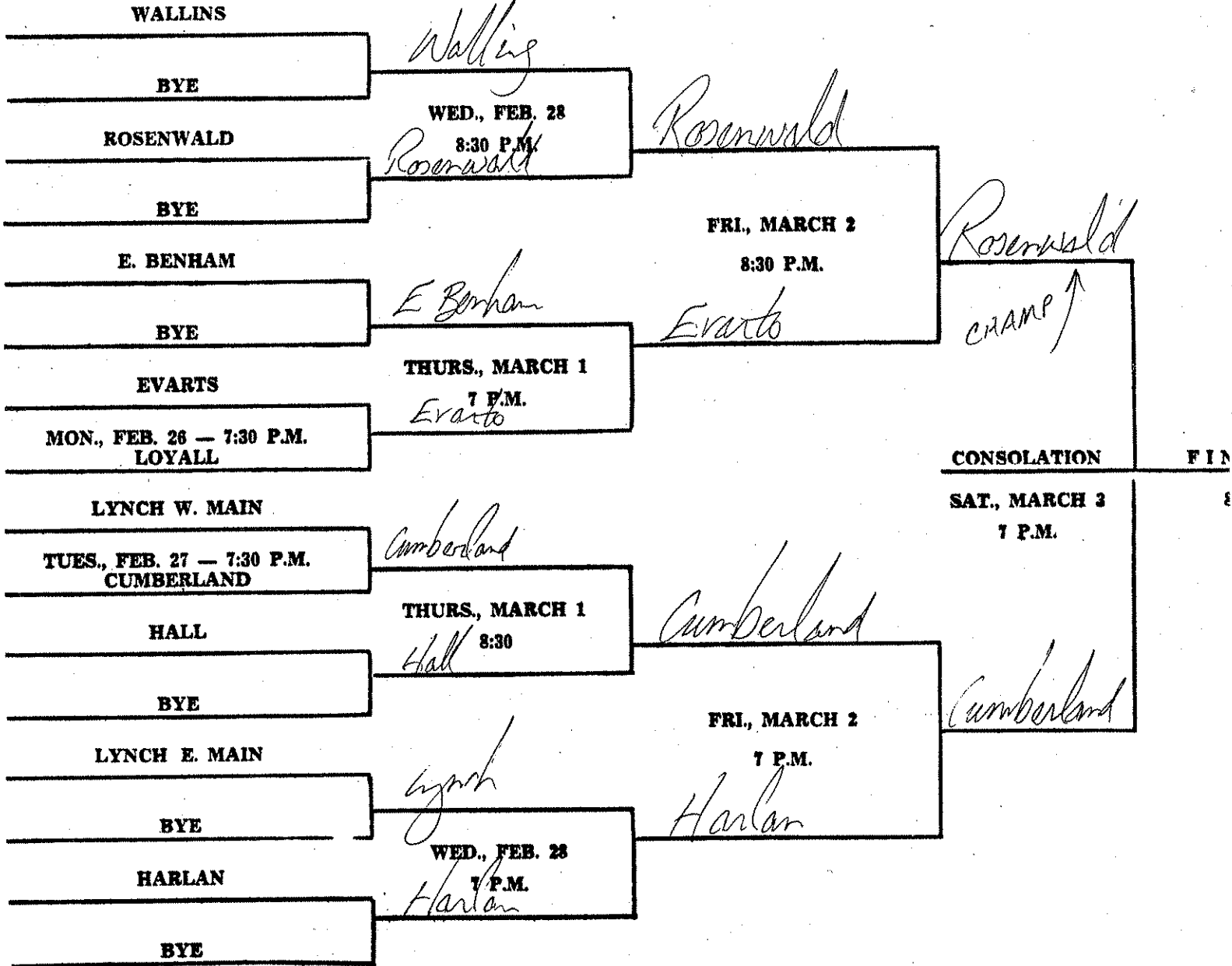

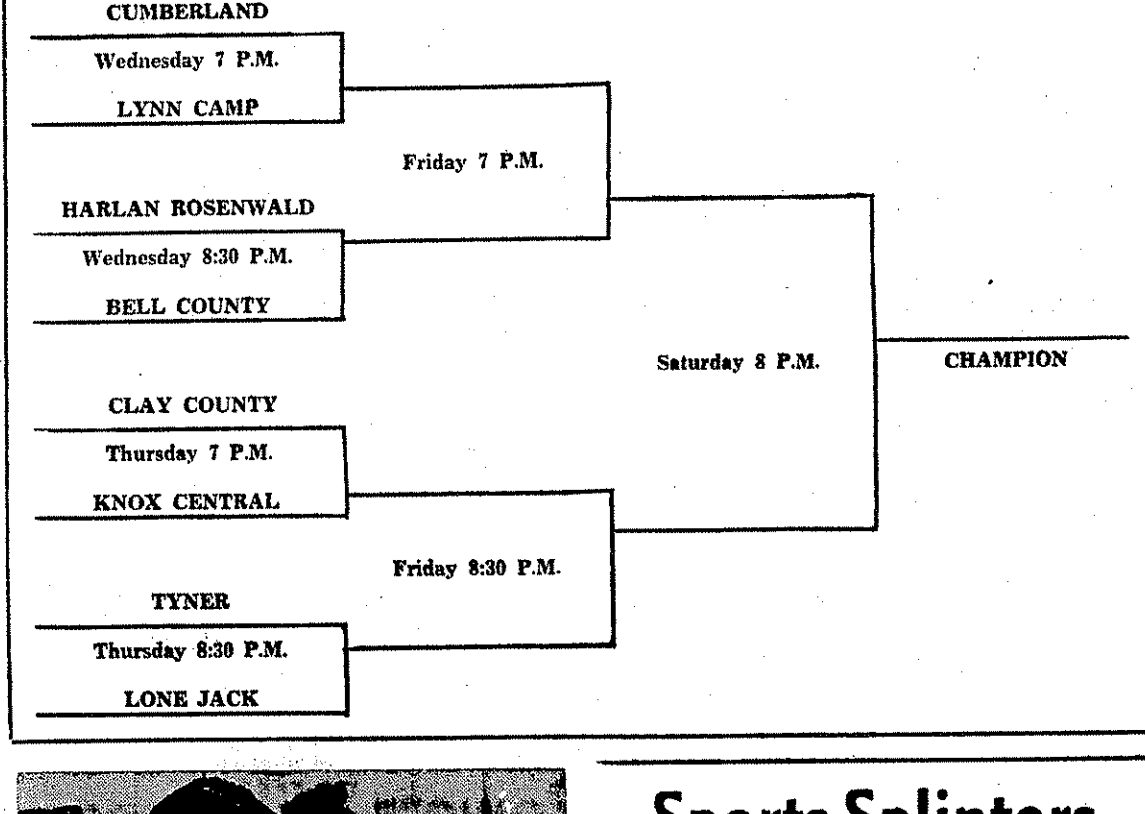

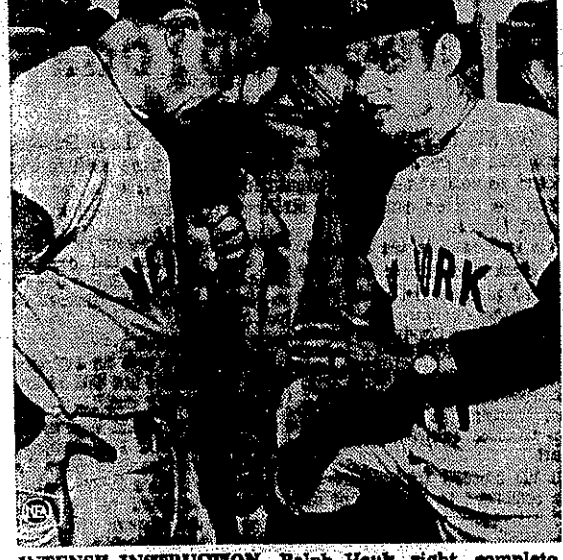
Knox Central and Clay County have almost identical records. The Panthers have a 24-4 mark while Clay's Tigers sport a 24-5 standing.

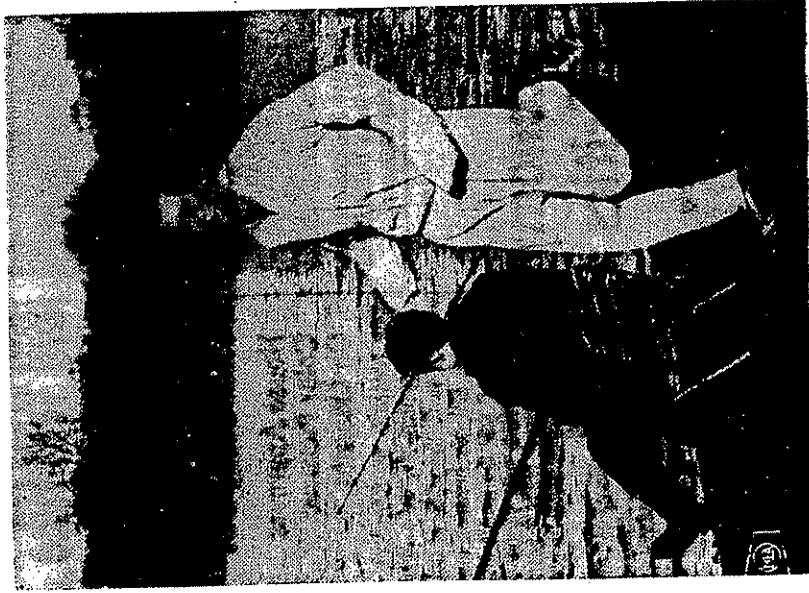

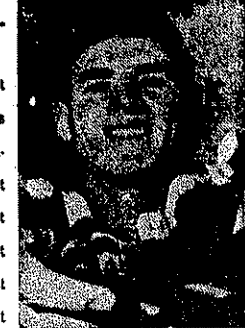

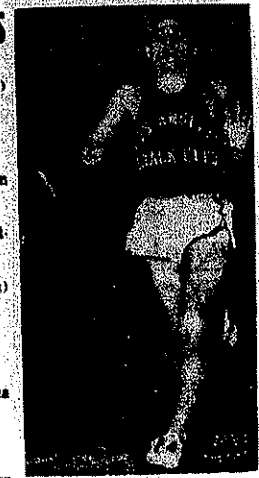

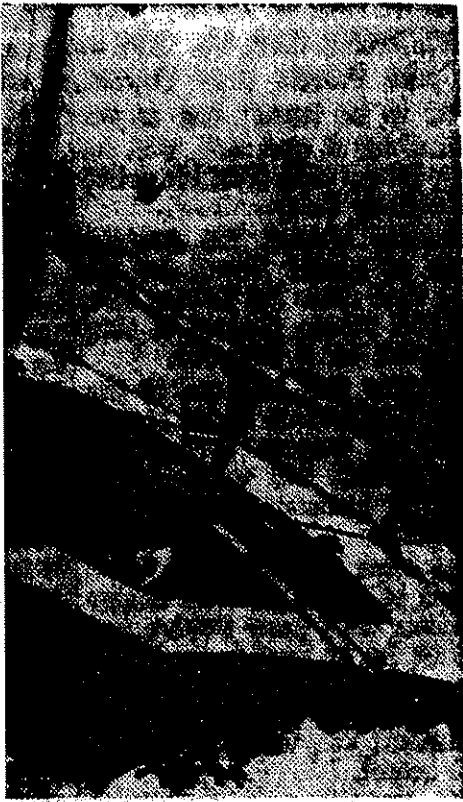

I am writing on behalf of my former coach, John Cain. I would like to nominate Coach Cain for induction into the KHSAA Hall of Fame. Coach Cain's many accomplishments as a football coach at Somerset High School are well documented. However, I would like to introduce you to Coach Cain, the individual.

I met Coach Cain when I was a seventh grader at Meece Middle School in Somerset. Coach Cain had introduced himself to me at the KHSAA Basketball Tournament that year. Coach Cain had encouraged me to consider coming out for football that year. I mention this simply to point out that Coach Cain was an advocate of all sports. Often, you could find him at other sporting events when it came to his players. Coach Cain was an advocate for having his players involved in other sports, which speaks to his interest in the student-athlete.

Subsequently, I would go on to play four year of football for Coach Cain at Somerset High School. I would count that experience as key to my development as a person and an athlete. 

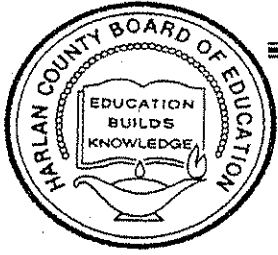



As sports editor of the *Commonwealth Journal* in Somerset, I covered John Cain's football teams for nearly 15 years, and I've never worked with any coach whose teams were as well-respected, well-coached and well-disciplined. Most coaches strive to field competitive and winning programs - Coach Cain settled for nothing less than quality teams that were comprised of quality individuals.

It is not surprising that John Cain is the "winningest" coach in the history of two prep programs in our community.

As Head Coach at Somerset High School, he compiled 147 victories, won eight district titles, seven regional titles and advanced to four Class AA state championship games.

During a four-year span from 1981-1984, Cain's teams compiled a 48-6 record.

In his final five seasons as a high school coach, Cain ventured across town to Pulaski County and turned that program from a consistent loser into a winner. 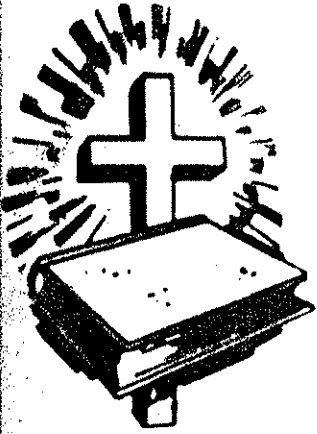
Hey Johnny,

You have a very important job. Not just playing ball games--- but more important building young men to face the world after the game is over. Keep up the good work!

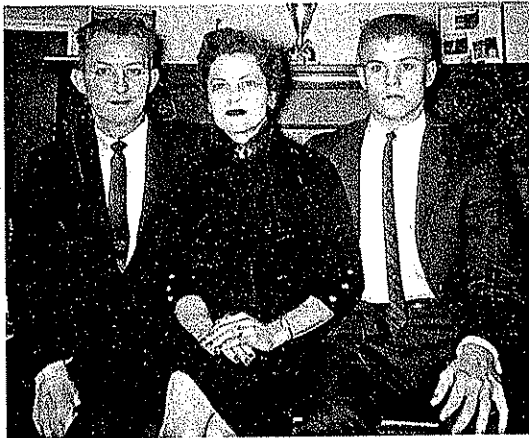
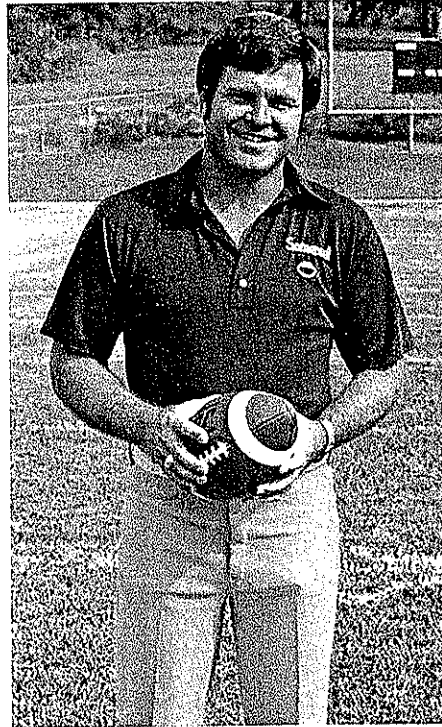
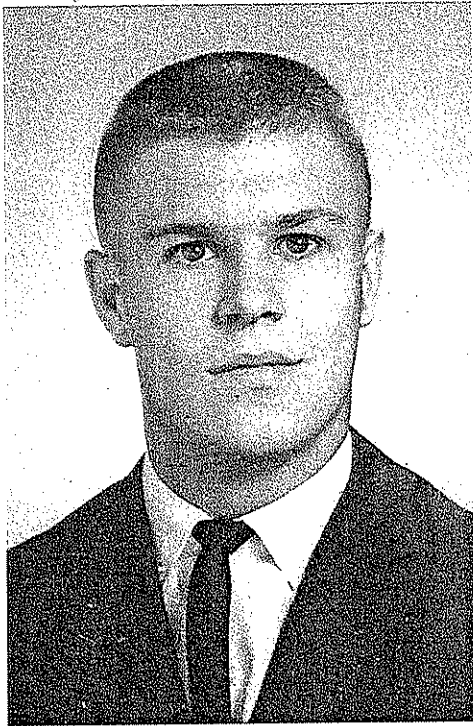

Listening to your **Heart** Can save your life

He was a multi-talented athlete and a hard-nosed coach, but none of that could shield him from the legacy of heart disease which ran rampant in his family.

To local sports fans, John Cain is a legend. He and his brother, the late Ronnie Cain, rebuilt the Somerset High School football program in the 1970s. John was the SHS head coach for two decades, and his own son, Johnny, was a star player there under his watch. After leading Somerset to four state championship games, he moved across town and began the process of rejuvenating the Pulaski County High School football program. His son could often be seen at his side as one of his assistant coaches.

For the Cains, the love of football seems to run in the family.

Unfortunately, though, deaths related to heart disease have also been predominant in the Cain family. John's grandfather, father, two uncles, four aunts — and his brother, Ronnie — all

died from complications from heart disease.

"That should have been enough to get my attention," John said.

"But I felt like since I had been an athlete all my life, nothing like this would bother me. I had always been active. But that doesn't help when you have a history of heart disease in your family."

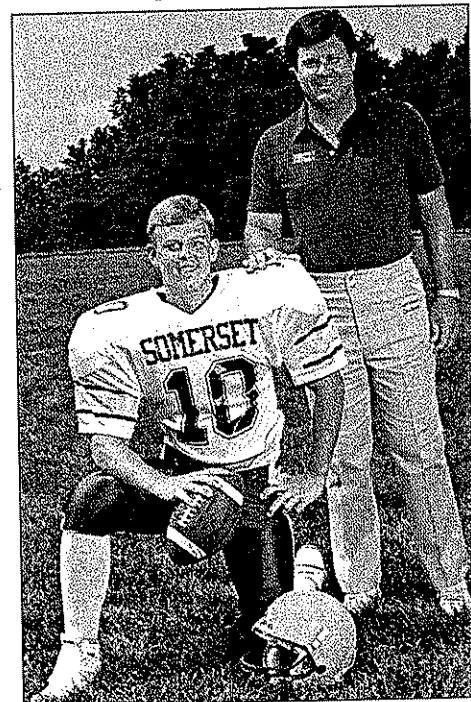
During high school, John played football, basketball, and baseball. He was a quarterback at the University of Kentucky in the 1960s.

By the late 1990s, as a semi-retired coach, John had finally slowed his pace.

"I had retired, and I was not very active," he said.

"I was watching quite a bit of television, and not doing very much — just being a little bit lazy. But I didn't realize what was going on."

In spite of his previously active lifestyle, heart disease had nearly

blocked the three major vessels leading to his heart.

"I had been experiencing no problems. This is truly a no-symptom thing," John said.

In December of 1999, John, then 55 years old, began feeling a little under the weather.

At his wife's urging, he called his family doctor, Scott Stephens, who was also one of John's former players.

"Dr. Stephens talked me out of meeting him at his office, and he convinced me to meet him in the emergency room instead," John recalled.

"Thirty minutes later, I was in a helicopter on my way to Lexington."

John had already suffered a mild heart attack — although doctors couldn't pinpoint exactly when that had occurred.

"I don't know how a person can have a heart attack without knowing it, but it can happen," he said.

"My brother had several, and never knew about them."

At Lexington's Central Baptist Hospital, John was stabilized, and then he was scheduled for heart bypass surgery.

Two days later, surgeons performed a whopping six bypasses around the clogged arteries leading to his heart.

"The doctor told my son I needed five bypasses, but that six would make me feel better," John recalled.

Johnny and his mother, Lynn, stayed by John's side during his hospital stay.

"They were very concerned. They had lots of conversations with the doctors to stay on top of what was going on," John said.

"I was apprehensive, to say the least. But I had a lot of confidence that my doctor had put me in the right direction. Before my surgery, I learned that my surgeon had done 300 bypasses that year, so that made me feel very comfortable about it.

"The surgery went very well. When you speak of bypass surgery, you can be certain that there will be pain to follow, and I certainly had my share. But I was just happy to be alive."

John says he feels lucky that his health problems were discovered in time for them to be fixed.

Less than a week after his surgery, John was sent home with a bundle of brochures designed to educate him about changes he would need to make in his diet and exercise routine.

"There were no astronomical changes that needed to be made. It was just a matter of making adjustments," he said.

Six years after his surgery, John Cain is fully recovered. He says he feels healthier than he did in the period before his surgery.

He's lost the nearly 20 pounds of extra weight he had gained, and he enjoys playing golf, which gives him some light exercise. For the last four years, he's been working full time as an assistant principal at McCreary Central High School — but he's staying off the football field for now, perhaps to avoid the stresses that can come with such a job.

The legendary coach hasn't given up on mentoring his favorite player, however. This time, it's not about football.

"I've been trying to tell our son that it's important to get checked out, especially with our family's

background," John said.

He advises his son — and anyone else who will listen — to have yearly check-ups and to learn about your family's health history.

"If you have a family history of heart disease, pay close attention." ■

UNDETECTED HEART ATTACKS

Doctors said that, before his six-way bypass surgery, John Cain had suffered at least one mild heart attack which had gone undetected.

That's not surprising. One heart study says that about one heart attack in four produces symptoms — or at least none that the victim associates with a heart attack.

The American Heart Association and other medical experts say the body will experience one or more of these warning signs when a heart attack is occurring:

- ♥ Uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing, or pain in the center of the chest lasting more than a few minutes.
- ♥ Mild to intense pain spreading to the shoulders, neck, or arms. It may feel like pressure, tightness, burning, or heavy weight. It may be located in the chest, upper abdomen, neck, jaw, or inside the arms or shoulders.
- ♥ Chest discomfort with lightheadedness, fainting, sweating, nausea, or shortness of breath.
- ♥ Anxiety, nervousness, and/or cold, sweaty skin.
- ♥ Paleness or pallor.
- ♥ Increased or irregular heart rate.
- ♥ A feeling of impending doom.

Not all of these signs occur in every attack. If some occur, get help fast. If a blockage in the arteries serving the heart muscle can be cleared quickly enough — within the first few minutes of the onset of the attack — permanent damage to the heart can be held to a minimum.
