Colin "Cokie" Cox was born January 9, 1942 in Neon, KY. He moved to Hazard with his family in December 1953.

His athletic career began when he was in eighth grade in 1956. He was a member of the high school baseball team and was on the junior varsity basketball team as an eight grader.

During his high school career he earned 14 varsity letters: three in football, three in basketball, four in track and four in baseball.

Cokie was a three year starter on the football team, playing center at 160 pounds. He also played corner back on defense. He was selected to the All Conference team, EKMC, his junior and senior year. He was also selected to the Courier Journal All State team his junior and senior years.

His high school football team was undefeated his senior year, making the playoffs the first two years of the playoff system. They were regional winners in 1959 and 1960. This was before the class system was formed. During the 1960 season the Bulldog defense only had three touchdowns scored on them the entire regular season, they shut out the teams in all their other victories.

Cokie was also a member of the Kentucky All Stars that defeated the West Virginia All Stars for the first time, in 1961.

Cokie was a starter on the basketball team his junior and senior years. The team won the district tournament his senior year. He was selected to the All Conference team his junior and senior years.

Cokie went on to play basketball at Lees Junior College. His team lost to the Mobily Missouri by four points in the NCAA Regional finals. Mobily won the National Junior College Championship that year.

He started for the baseball team all four years of high school. They were the regional runners up their senior year.

He was a member of the track team all four years also. They were regional runners up his junior year, and won the region their senior year. Cokie won regional titles in the mile, the half mile, and the 110 hurdles three years in a row, and took part in the state track meet each of those three years.

His senior year he won the qualifying heat in the half mile. Again, this competition was before the state was divided into classes.

Cokie returned to Hazard after college graduation, and started his coaching career in 1967 at Hazard High School. He was an assistant coach for football and basketball, and head track coach. As an assistant three Hazard basketball teams won the region and advanced to the state tournament. They were also regional runner ups three years while Cokie was coaching. He also coached the football team in a district playoff game as an assistant.

In 1968 Cokie formed a track team for the girls. This was the first girl's athletic team at Hazard High School since the 1930's.

In 1977 he was appointed head football coach. His team won the district in 1980. He coached several players who won all state honors, and some who went on to play college football. One of his former players had a tryout with the Denver Broncos of the NFL.

In 1981 he was appointed head basketball coach.

Cokie's track teams also had great success through the years. Every year he took several boys and girls to compete in the state track meet.

In 1975 Hazard built a new school and a new track. The KHSAA assigned Hazard as a regional track site, and Cokie was appointed regional track manager. He served in this capacity until he retired in 1983 to take over a family business.

Cokie also refereed high school football and basketball for several years. During the 17 years Cokie served as a coach at Hazard High School he also helped run the Bitty League and Little League basketball programs for elementary school children. He also worked with the Little League Football program for those years.
