Carl Elovitz whistles while he works, and not just because it's pretty much mandatory in his role as a football official.

Here is a man in love with his job. Why else would Elovitz spend nearly 40 years wearing a striped shirt, sidestepping trap plays and having his ears bent by disagreeable coaches.

Elovitz will turn 68 in a few weeks, and while other guys his age are watching football from a sofa, he's out there running up and down the field officiating.

Not only that, he's one of the best in Kentucky high school football. Elovitz was the top-rated referee in the Central Kentucky Football Officials Association last season.

"I think it keeps me young, or at least makes me feel young," Elovitz said. "I guess that's only natural when I'm out there with all those youngsters.

"I'd like to go on forever, but I know I can't. But I think I've got a couple or three years left calling games. It's a lot of fun."

! Elovitz can't seem to get enough of football. This past weekend, for example, he worked junior varsity games in Powell County on Thursday night, the Lafayette-Tates Creek game on Friday night, and the Woodford County- Western Hills game on Saturday. "I wish I'd kept track of how many games I've worked over the years," he said. "But I didn't realize I'd have a career this long."

Elovitz has been a member of the Central Kentucky officials organization for 36 years, but he actually got his start a couple of years before that.

The first high school game he worked was Danville-Harrodsburg back in 1951.

"I've worked in every corner of this state at one time or another," he said. "Back before there were very many certified officials, it wouldn't be unusual for me to work a playoff game in Belfry on Saturday night, then be in Paducah the next weekend. It was a lot of travel, but I had a good time."

Elovitz is a native of Fleming in Letcher County!, but has lived in Lexington since getting out of the Navy in 1945.

His high school basketball coach, Vincent Vaughn, introduced him to officiating when Vaughn was doing post-graduate work at UK and helping coordinate basketball leagues at the YMCA.

Elovitz soon after got into football refereeing, too, and he found a home.

Not only has Elovitz been a fixture in high school circles since the early 1950s, he's also been a friend of UK football for that long.

In Bear Bryant's last year as Wildcat football coach, Elovitz started refereeing UK's preseason scrimmages. He's been doing it ever since, helping out six head coaches: Bryant, Blanton Collier, Charlie Bradshaw, John Ray, Fran Curci and Jerry Claiborne.

"It's nice because you get to know all the coaches and the players," he said. "And when you work those scrimmages, you get sort of an inside look at what kind of team UK has coming up."

Elovitz is also part of the UK team on game days. He worked the scoreboard at old Stoll Field in 1971 and '72, and ! he's had the same duties at Commonwealth Stadium since it opened in 1973.

Elovitz can also be found at all Lexington Catholic home basketball games. Former Knights coach Tommy Starns asked Elovitz, a friend, if he'd help out at a Christmas tournament back in the mid-1960s. So, naturally, Elovitz has been there ever since. But high school football is first on Elovitz's list. Two nights after working the Lafayette-Tates Creek game, he was at home watching the replay on a local cable station, critiquing himself.

"I like to watch and see if I was in the right place at the right time in a given situation," he said. "If I wasn't, I want to know why. You have to improve as an official. When you get to the point that you think you've mastered it, you're in trouble."

And Elovitz doesn't change his stripes depending on who's playing.

"I guess one of the biggest games I ever worked was St. X-Trinity when there were about 28,000 people (at Fairgrounds! Stadium)," he said. "That was exciting.

"But I also believe that the majority of officials have the attitude that a

Casey County-Rockcastle County game is just as important to those small schools as St. X-Trinity is in Louisville. You've got to do your best whenever you step on the field, and that's what I try to do."

This letter is in support of the Kentucky High School Hall of Fame nomination of Carl Elovitz.

I had the privilege of being introduced to Carl Elovitz as a freshman at the University of Kentucky. I was a scholarship student athlete, playing football at U of K from 1977 through 1981, a three year starter at Kentucky and then drafted by the Atlanta Falcons in the spring of 1982. During my career at UK, Carl Elovitz was always present at each of the inner squad scrimmages. My experience with Carl during those tough days at UK was always positive, Carl always took time to not only officiate but also teach the players. Carl would also spend time to talk with the players after practice ... his enthusiasm for the game was contagious. His small frame of 5'6" would have discouraged most men to participate in a game of giants, but not Carl, Carl's love for the game elevated him above the games biggest.

It was there Carl and I joined up once again, Carl brought me to his officiating team to fill the position of umpire. It is extremely difficult to capture all of the positive experiences and benefits while working with Carl Elovitz, but I can share with you those of which I use on a daily basis.

- Accountability cover your position with a sense of accountability, knowing when to apply a rule and when to apply your good judgment.
- **Preparation** -- for the game is critical, knowing your mechanics, rules and your position and your teammate's position. Along with understanding the teams, their tendencies, and personalities.
- **Details** the importance of the details will place you in the right position at the right time to make you successful.

It was through Carl's mentorship that I elevated myself to the next level, by making the SEC pool officials list. My success as an official as well as a professional can be credited greatly to one man – Carl Elovitz

I close with this thought; Carl's success was mainly fueled by two things, a love for the game and a sense of duty to others. He has demonstrated this in his service to others his entire life, be it his family, US army, work and even his fellow officials, players, coaches and fans, through out his 50 years being associated with the KHSAA. And he did all of it out of love.

It is with great honor and privilege to nominate Carl Elovitz to the **Dawahares / KHSAA Hall of Fame.**

NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

There are not too many mentors like Carl Elovitz. I was thinking recently about how lucky I was to have learned from him—to have learned from the best—and how his lessons really have stayed with me throughout my career. Would I have been as buttoned-up had Carl not been such a stickler for professionalism? Would I have been as enthusiastic about working with kids had Carl not consistently demonstrated his love of high school officiating? And would I have had the drive to take my officiating career all the way to the NFL field and then to the NFL corporate headquarters had Carl not taken me under his wing and shown me what officiating really meant to him?

Carl's commitment to officiating has always been intense. He was an official whose standards are top-notch, as were his expectations of those with whom he worked. When I first started working with Carl, I knew right away that I would have to not only perform well, but also consistently demonstrate the drive and dedication to excel. First and foremost, Carl knew that the kids were watching us as leaders, and therefore he believed that our professionalism would impact them both on and off the field. And just as the kids were watching us, I was watching Carl, learning how to be a consummate professional on and off the field.

Carl approached each and every game with the same amount of fervor as he would a championship game. His passion was simply being out on the field, showing the high school students that every game mattered. It was impossible not to feel his excitement, and when I saw how the kids responded to him, I knew that I too wanted to have that kind of influence on younger generations. I was inspired to not only continue officiating at the high school and eventually college level, but to pursue sports education and coaching.

Eventually, I left teaching, but still continued to progress in officiating. It's funny, as ardent as I became about furthering my officiating career, that's how satisfied Carl was about remaining at the high school level, continuing to influence the up and coming officials that passed through his fields. But I truly believe that had I not learned from Carl, I never would have had the chops to make it in the NFL. Although our aspirations were different, Carl's love of officiating motivated me to achieve the highest level of success in that particular profession.

All in all, Carl taught me about the power of not only surpassing one's own standards on and off the field, but also about surpassing the standards of those with whom one is affiliated.
