THE COACHES

UKARI FIGGS

Assistant Coach
Second Year at Purdue
Second Year Overall

Assistant coach Ukari Figgs is in her second year back at her alma mater. Figgs played point guard for the Boilermakers from 1995 to 1999, and in her senior season led Purdue to an NCAA national championship. The 5-foot-9 co-captain was named the 1999 Final Four Most Outstanding Player. As a senior, Figgs averaged 16.3 points, 4.5 rebounds and 4.2 assists and was named first team All-Big Ten as well as Associated Press and Kodak honorable mention All-American.

Her responsibilities include guard development, scouting and community service and speaking engagements.

Figgs is a proven winner who has led her teams to a championship at every level, high school, college and WNBA.

Drafted in the third round as the 28th overall pick by the Los Angeles Sparks, Figgs played five seasons in the WNBA. She was with the Sparks for three seasons, including the one culminating in the 2001 WNBA Championship. Figgs played one season for the Portland Fire before they disbanded and was picked up by the

Houston Comets in the 2003 dispersal draft. She played one season in Houston before retiring from basketball. For her five-year WNBA career, Figgs averaged 6.5 points, 2.3 rebounds and 3.1 assists per game.

Along with high school and future Purdue teammate Camille Cooper, Figgs led the Scott County High School girls' basketball team to a state title in 1995. She was named Kentucky Miss Basketball as a senior after averaging 18.6 points, 7.1 assists, 6.4 rebounds and 4.3 steals per game at Scott County. She went head-to-head in the Indiana-Kentucky All-Star Game series against Indiana Miss Basketball Stephanie White, who went on to become her classmate at Purdue.

In recognition to her contributions to Purdue, Figgs was inducted into the Purdue Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame in the fall of 2007.

A strong student, Figgs graduated from Purdue with a degree in mechanical engineering in 1999, and prior to joining coach Versyp's staff, was working as a

production engineer for Toyota Motor Manufacturing in her hometown of Georgetown, Ky. She joined Toyota after retiring from the WNBA. At Toyota she achieved her dream of designing cars. In her second year, she worked on the Camry redesign and then was on the team that designed the Venza, Toyota's first crossover vehicle. Her responsibilities included travel to design headquarters in North America and Japan to participate in vehicle builds and experiments to prepare the assembly plant for the model change. Figgs also returned to Purdue on several occasions to recruit engineers for Toyota.

Figgs spent two seasons (2003-05) as an assistant coach with the boys' varsity basketball team at Scott County and helped lead them to the semifinals of the Kentucky state tournament. From 2000 to 2002, Figgs assisted former Boilermaker, Jane Schott at Harrison High School in West Lafayette, Ind.

In August 2009, Figgs married Dale Morgan. The pair reside in Lafayette.

TERRY KIX

Director of Operations
Fifth Year at Purdue

Director of Basketball Operations Terry Kix is in her fifth year with the Boilermakers. She brings 15 years of field hockey head coaching experience and three years as the senior women's administrator at the University of Maine to the Boilermaker program.

Kix's primary duties include coordinating team travel, assisting with academic progress, community outreach and marketing as well as coordinating summer camps.

For two seasons she served as the supervisory administrator for the Purdue women's soccer and men's and women's swimming and diving programs.

As the head coach at Maine, Kix was named America East Coach of the Year four times, Northeast Region Coach of the Year and compiled a 174-109-5 record. Her field hockey team achieved the high team grade-point average five times while she was at the helm.

Kix was an outstanding student-athlete, honored as a two-time field hockey All-American at Connecticut. She won a national championship as a player in 1981 and again as an assistant coach in 1985 for the Huskies. Kix was selected as the 1985 Connecticut Female Athlete of the Year, and in 1984 was a finalist for college field hockey's top honor, the Broderick Award.
