Bob Finnell played quarterback for Dixie and graduated in 1939. He was team captain in 1938 and also lettered in basketball, golf and baseball while at Dixie.

He was Little Six All Conference in football and basketball, and lead No. Ky. in football scoring and was elected to play in the first ever East -West Shrine game played at Stoll Field in Lexington on December 3, 1938. He started at quarterback for the East squad.

That same year he was All Conference in basketball.

His fondest remembrances are a 77 yard TD run from scrimmage against Dayton and a 99 yard interception for a TD against Ludlow.

Mr. Finnell's jersey was retired by Dixie and a plaque honoring his achievements is on display at their gym.

Mr. Finnell is 84 years old and lives at 270 Woodgate Circle, Fayetteville, Ga. 30214. His telephone is 770-719-2412.

I am submitting this application after contacting Jim Walls. I am a friend of Mr. Finnell's son, Bob who was a standout football player at UK in the late 1960's. I have enclosed copies from the 1938 Kentucky Post that substantiate Mr. Finnell's stellar accomplishments.

Dixie High Gridmen Bear Down

Dixie Heights' Little Colonels, now scheduled to open their football season Sept. 16 at Corbin against the Redhounds of the Big 16 Conference, opened practice this week at the Dixie Highway School.

Coach Si Prewitt, late of Ludlow, and assistant Ival Black, former Covington high school player and later a Syracuse University performer, were met by 25 candidates, many of them veterans of the past season.

30 Expected Soon

Practice sessions have been held once daily this week, and next week, from Sept. 5 to 10, inclusive, the boys will "camp out" on the school grounds. Thirty are expected to spend the week under the coaches' supervision. Two practice sessions a day will be held.

Captains of the Colonel grid team for the 1938 season were chosen Friday, with Bob Finnel, honorable mention on the All-Little Six Conference team last year, named to head his squad. Paul Theele, lanky end, was chosen alternate captain.

Besides Theele and Finnel, returning veterans include Noll, tackle; White center; Piper, lineman, and Calahan, an end, along with Duffy and Steinfort in the backfield. Only four regulars, Phillips and Smith, backs, and Fronk and Wilson, linemen, are missing from last year's team.

Complete Schedule

The completed schedule for the Colonels, announced Friday by Coach Prewitt, lists five Little Six Conference games and three outside teams. Dixie's home games are still doubtful, pending the condition of their newly leveled field.

The right type was finally found and the donation made by J. J. Gerwe, 2218 Oakland avenue, Covington, the girl's uncle.

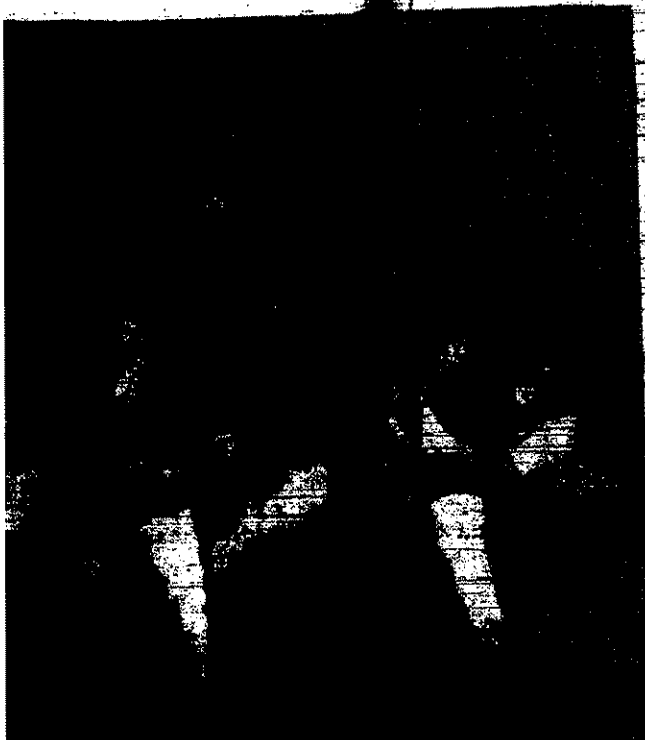

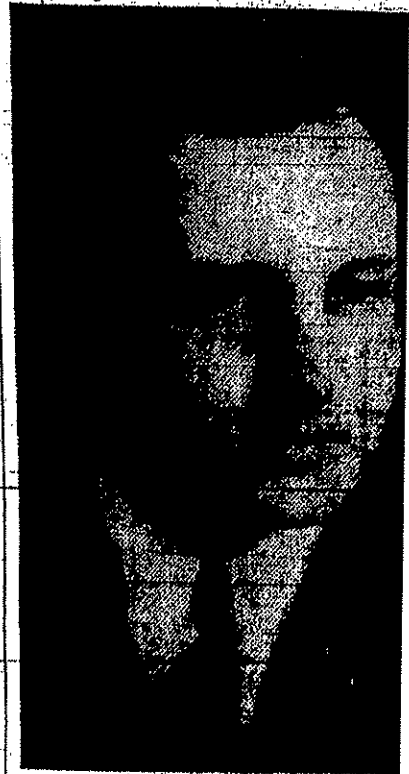

Fordham Gallops 76 Yards for Georgia Touchdown.

Early in the fourth, Chuck Guimento, Miami guard, intercepted one of Billy Mims' passes on the 50-yard stripe and the Miamians were on their way again. Line stabs were effective with Noppenberg finally crashing over center from the three-yard line. Hayward's placekick was blocked.

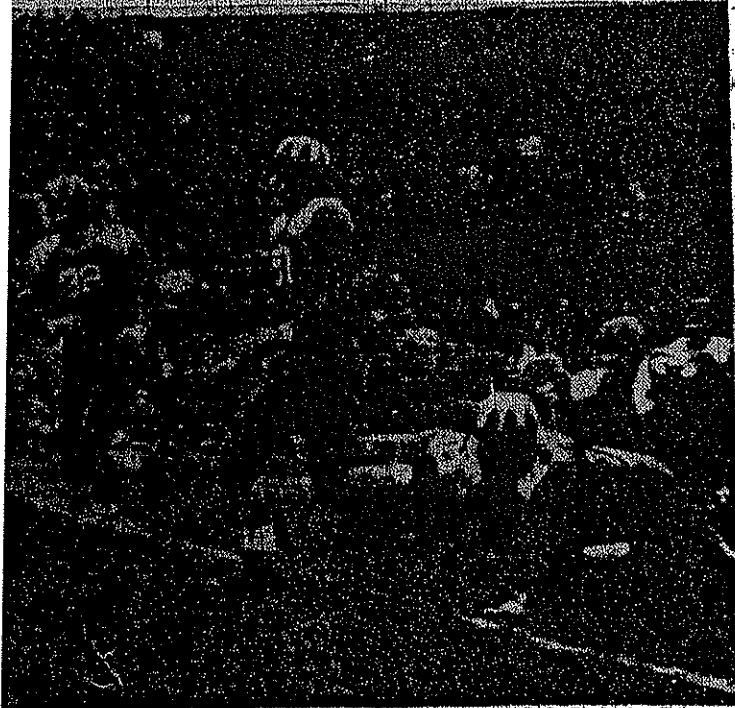

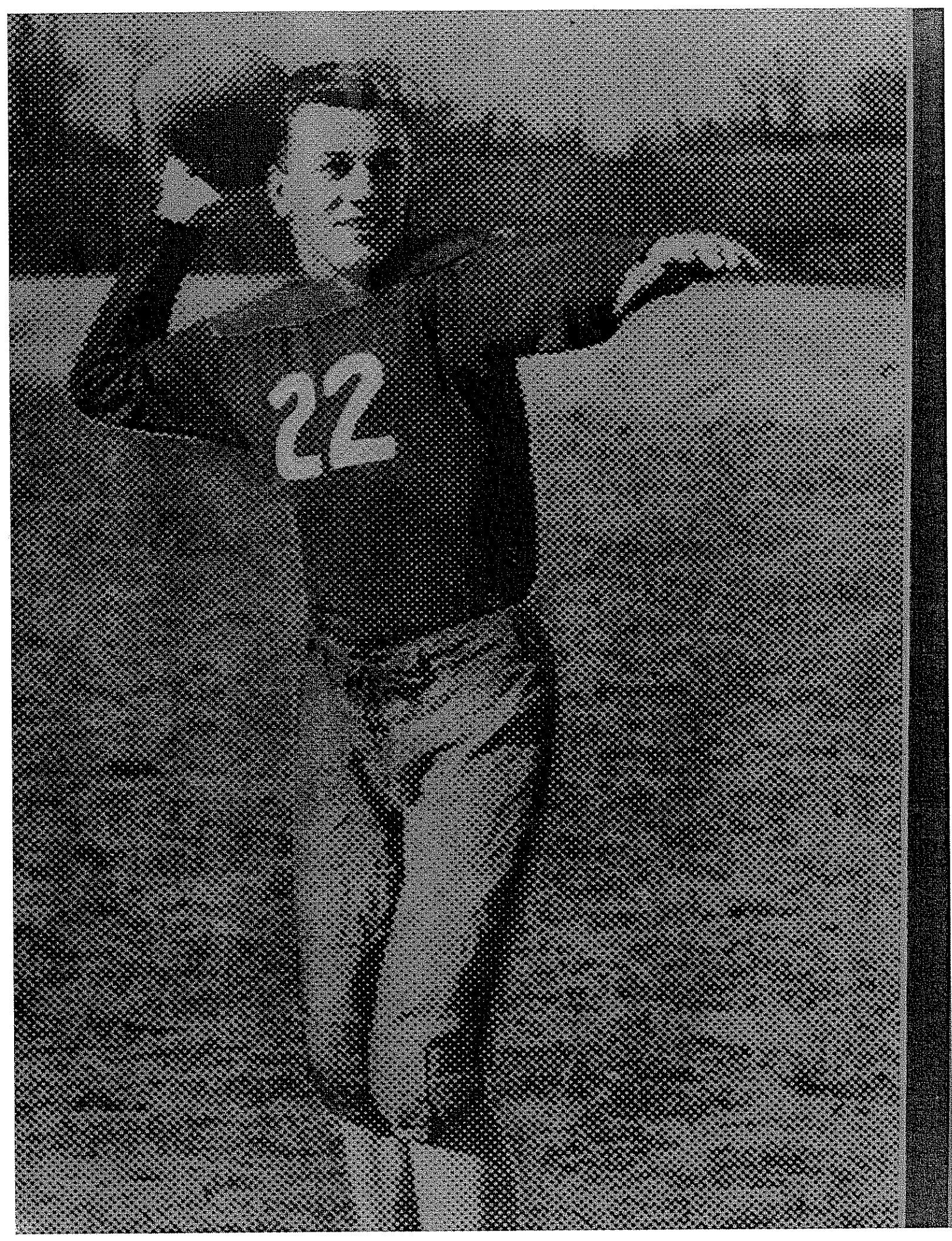
Even though they are not here, I want to remember my parents who provided me a home filled with love, faith and encouragement.
