Coached basketball in Kentucky for two years at Farmington and Fulgham High Schools;


Served as Athletic Director and Assistant Recreation Director for the city of Madison Heights, Michigan for 10 years;

Dear Selection Committee,

This letter is being written to recommend Charles "Doodles" Floyd for the KHSAA Dawahares Basketball Hall of Fame. Doodles and I were teammates on the legendary Cuba High School basketball team that was runner-up in the KHSAA State Basketball Tournament in 1951 and won the KHSAA State Basketball Tournament in 1952.

Our team is still remembered after fifty-four years by the older basketball fans in Kentucky. A book entitled, *When Cuba Conquered Kentucky*, written by Marianne Walker and published in 1999, features the lives and history of the Cuba Cubs basketball team. Not only is Doodles Floyd highlighted throughout the book, an entire chapter was written about him specifically. Over the years, hundreds of articles have been written about the colorful Cuba Cubs. A key to the success of our team was Charles "Doodles" Floyd.

In 1947, when we were eighth graders, Coach Jack Story came to Cuba High School as principal and basketball coach. He would show us films of the Globetrotters and then say, "Boys, get out on the gym floor and see if you can learn to do those things." Doodles copied Goose Tatum, the center and clown of the Globetrotters. We learned to play a style of high school basketball that had never been seen before in Kentucky. It was incredible how well Doodles learned Goose Tatum's style, and it was that style that attracted hundreds of fans to our games.

Doodles Floyd is still remembered today throughout Kentucky because of his ball handling skills, showmanship, and uncanny *windmill hook shot!* He had outstanding jumping ability. In the time when it was not common, Doodles could do a 360 degree turn in the air and dunk the ball behind his head with both hands.

Over the years, I have traveled extensively throughout Kentucky. It doesn't matter where I go, if there is a discussion about Kentucky state basketball tournaments and high school basketball teams, someone will always bring up the Cuba Cubs. Inevitably, someone will say, "Where is Doodles now?"

I have seen hundreds of great basketball players in my lifetime. In my opinion, Doodles Floyd was the best high school pivot man in the state of Kentucky in the 1952 basketball season. In 1951 and again in 1952, Doodles was the key to our unbelievable success as a high school basketball team. He made the Courier Journal's First Team All-State both

years as well as the All-State Tournament teams. He was also selected to play in the National North-South All-Star game.

Doodles had all the skills and moves that a coach would want in a high school basketball player. His showmanship and personality drew so many people wanting to see us play that most of our games had to be played in larger gyms just to accommodate the crowd. Even then, all the fans couldn't get inside. In the state tournaments of 1951 and again in 1952, when we took the court to warm-up, the organist would play *Sweet Georgia Brown*. Doodles would take the post position and we duplicated the Globetrotters' warm-up style. Doodles was the "key entertainment", and the crowd loved it!

I realize there may not be anyone on the selection committee who ever saw Doodles Floyd and the Cuba Cubs play basketball. However, the things I have written are accurate. Doodles is deserving of this tremendous honor to be selected as a member of the KHSAA Dawahares Basketball Hall of Fame.

I was privileged to play in the Kentucky High School Boys' State Basketball Tournament three consecutive years and was a starting guard in nine games.

I have observed many great players since 1946. Doodle Floyd was one of the best centers I ever saw play. He made the opponent's defense collapse in an effort to keep the ball out of his hands, but even with defenders all around him, he was still a prolific scorer. He was also a great defender and rebounder.

Since Cuba's gymnasium had very limited seating capacity, and the Cubs expecting a very good team in1951-52, most of their home games were played on neutral courts that had greater seating capacity. I was an assistant coach to Mr. McCoy Tarry at Sedalia during the 1951-52 season.

I saw Cuba play several season games, all district, regional, and state tournament games, and observed Doodle with great admiration and pleasure.

I also played on the Murray State College 1952-53 team as a teammate of Doodle. I saw him practice daily and watched him contribute to the team during a very successful season in the OVC.

Yes, I saw Wah Wah Jones, Cliff Hagen, Frank Ramsey, Wes Unseld, Butch Beard, Vernon Hatton, Johnny Cox, Darrell Griffith, Charles Hurt, Mike Silliman, Sonny Allen, Kelley Coleman, Jerry Bird, Phil Grameyer, Rickie Farmer, Chris Lofton, Howard Crittenden, Phil Rollings, Coy Creason, Mason Cope, Van Mathis, Jim Owens, and many other great high school players. Doodle Floyd should definitley be included in tha KHSAA Dawahares Hall of Fame.

I was fortunate to be inducted into the Hall of Fame in the class of 1991 simply because I played for a Hall of Fame Coach, and had some great teammates who played as a unit and went undefeated in 1948.

Cuba was runners up in 1951 and won the State Championship in 1952. There is no way that would have been possible without the contributions of Charles "Doodle" Floyd.

It is my pleasure to recommend that Doodle been inducted into the Hall Of Fame in the class of 2007.

This is a recommendation on behalf of Charles "Doodle" Floyd of the 1952 Cuba, Kentucky, High School Basketball State Champions, for his consideration as a worthy candidate to be inducted into the Kentucky High School Hall of Fame.

I have never met Doodle Floyd nor has he or anyone else asked me to speak on his behalf. However, I feel compelled to do so based on my in-depth exposure to his accomplishments during a year long DVD effort about the Cuba team which I produced.

My background as a player and coach of this game along with experience in productions of this nature, made me a likely candidate for the project. I accepted and since it was for a charitable goal with no pay involved, I donated my services. This is important only to reinforce the fact that there is no ulterior motive on my part whatsoever for highlighting a man in an era that is now over five decades ago. Additionally, I am confident that Ronnie Carter of the Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association will affirm that I have a degree of credibility by my having witnessed an incredible number of high school basketball games and outstanding players in my four decade association with the sport as an educator with the Nashville Metropolitan Board of Education.

After having invested over 500 hours in this DVD project, which included reviewing 1,000's of frames of actual game film and reading 100's of articles about this team, I was startled to discover that Doodle had not been included the Kentucky Hall of Fame. He had been named All-State in Kentucky two years in a row and was his team's leading rebounder and scorer. He was consistently on the outstanding player list of the sports writers and coaches across the state and, in the minds of many, was one of the five best players in Kentucky both in 1951 and 52. This was accomplished on a team selected from a class of only 18 boys and whose competition included the largest schools in the state. In both of these years of competition in the Purchase Area, Cuba lost only one game and it by one point.

I watched these 50 + year-old film and marveled at his incredible ability. His patented hook shot reminded me of the great All-Americans, George Miken and Neil Johnston except that Doodle shot it with either hand. His positioning and timing on rebounds was uncanny but explains why he, at 6'3, consistently out rebounded the much taller opponents. I mused as I read through a seemingly endless list of accomplishments that surely this man has been overlooked - it would be an injustice not to at least bring attention to him as a person who deserves a serious look, even at this late date.

DOODLE HAD A STYLE OFHIS OWN WITH A WINDMILL HOOK SHOT. I PLAYED WITH DOODLE FOR 5 YEARS (FROM 7TH GRADE TO SENIOR YEAR) AND I WATCHED HIM DEVELOPE THIS SHOT OVER THE YEARS. IT WAS NO GIMMICK. IT WAS EXTREMELY ACCURATE AND HE COULD SHOOT WITH EITHER HAND WITH EQUAL ACCURACY. HE HAD VERY LONG ARMS AND GOOD HANDS AND EXCELLENT TOUCH. HE WAS ALSO VERY STRONG AND DECEPTIVE IN FAKING AND COULD DRIVE LEFT OR RIGHT TO THE BASKET.

ALSO, I HAVE NEVER SEEN A HIGH SCHOOL PLAYER DOMINATE THE BOARDS THE WAY DOODLE DID. A GOOD EXAMPLE OFTHIS IS EVIDENT IN THE VIDEO OF THE CUBA VS MANUAL STATE CHAMPIONSHIP GAME OF 1952. WE HAD TO COME FROM BEHIND GAMES IN STATE TOURNEY PLAY, AND DOODLE WAS A DRIVING FORCE IN MOST OF WINS WHEN WE HAD TO COME FROM BEHIND. NOT ONLY DID HE GET A LOT OF ATTENTION WITH HIS UNORTHODOX MOVES, BUT HE WAS A DOMINAT FORCE ON THE FLOOR. I'M NOT SURE OFSTATS, BUT I'M SURE HE AVERAGED 20-25 PTS PER GAME AND PROBABLY WOULD HOLD STATE REBOUND RECORD IF STATS WOULD HAVE BEEN KEPT ACCURATELY.

I am glad to learn that there is an effort being made to induct Charles "Doodle" Floyd in the Dawhare's Kentucky State Athletics Hall of Fame.

Without question, Doodle Floyd's accomplishments in the sport of basketball have earned him a spot with the elite as a player of the sport.

Doodle is probably best remembered as the leading scorer and re-bounder on the fabulous "Cuba Cubs" during the 1951 and 1952 seasons. The Cubs were runners up in 51' and winners of the 1952 Kentucky State High School Basketball Tournament. Doodle was also the leading team re-bounder and scorer for the Cubs during the 51' and 52' State Tournament games.

Doodle was selected to the All State Tournament teams in both 51' and 52'.

He was selected to the Courier-Journal and Lexington Heralds All State teams.

He was selected and participated in the Kentucky East/ West and Kentucky/ Indiana All Star games in 1952.

He was selected and participated in the North/ South All American game in 1952. He pursued a collegiate career and was an All American at Northeast Mississippi Junior College in 1953-1954.

Doodle possessed and perfected a "Windmill Hook" shot, while he was in high school, that made him an offensive threat that not just any one player could defend. With, his long arms and the ball being released a body and an arm length distance between the ball and his defender made it untouchable. Not only was it difficult to defend, he had perfected the shot at all distances and positions on the court.

I have watched the selection into the Kentucky State Dawhare's Hall of Fame of Athletes and coaches over the years and wish to recognize the originators and perpetuators of this group as extra ordinary supporters of Kentucky State Athletics. I know and have known many inductees that were so deserving to be recognized as truly outstanding contributors to the sport and this organization has done just that.

I write this request that Doodle be inducted in behalf of my Father, J.B. "Jack" Story, who was Doodle's coach as well as my coach and who if he had lived longer would have himself petitioned this Kentucky Hall of Fame long before now. My Dad through out his colorful and illustrious career would have considered Doodle as one of his very best stars. One of "Doodle's teammates, Howie Crittenden, is another one of my Dads very best stars that has already been inducted along with my Dad. They were three members of the most colorful & best remembered of all Kentucky State High School Basketball Teams.
