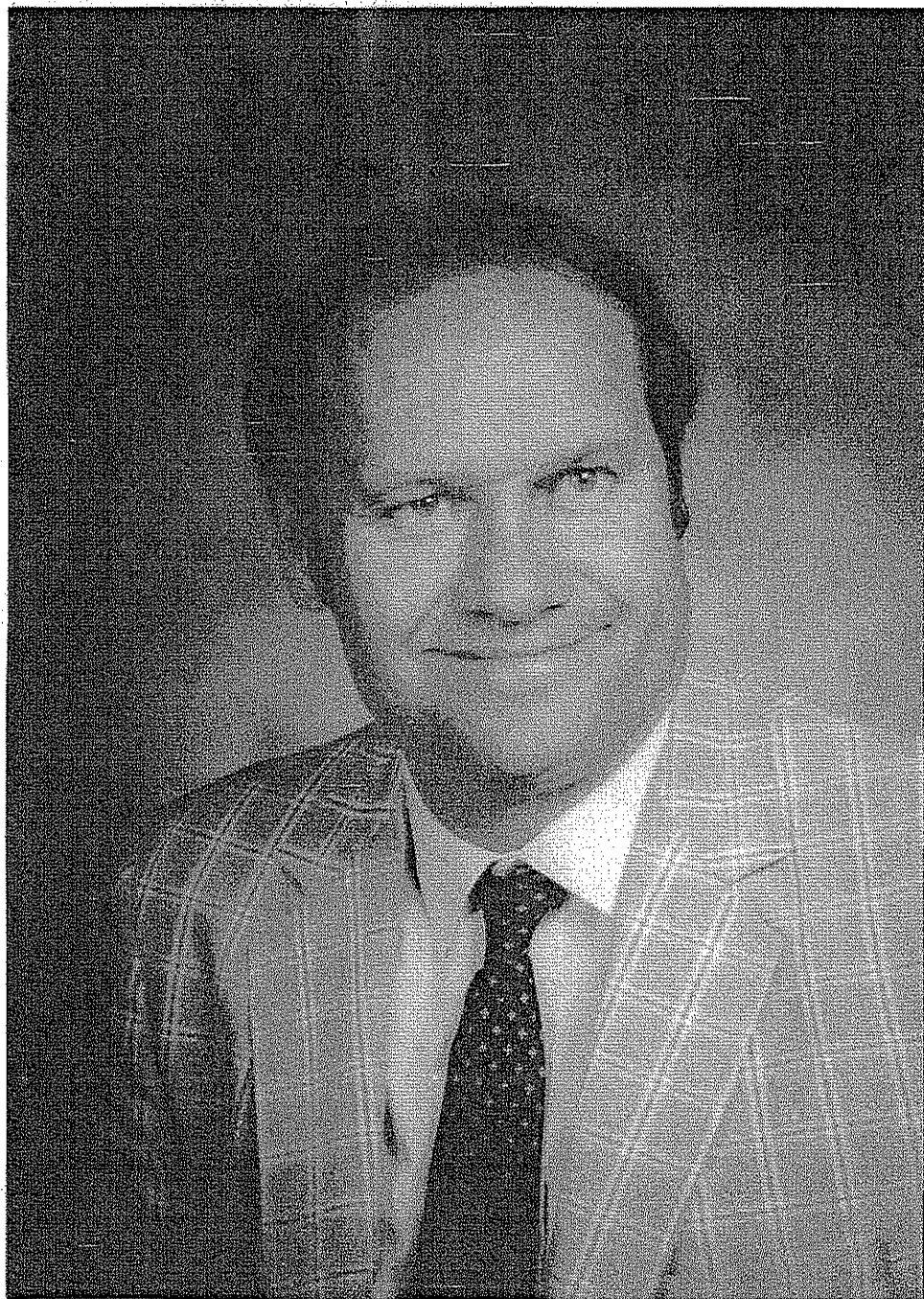

I strongly encourage you to give Mr. Frye his due. Even though it has been 52 years since he graduated from high school, he and his teams' accomplishments have not dimmed.

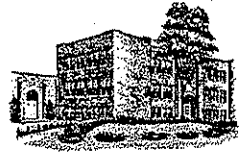



Don Frye – Monticello High School

Don was a member of the Trojan Varsity Basketball team for 4 years. During these 4 years, the teams compiled a record of 105 wins and 28 losses. This is an amazing 79% winning percentage. "Big Don Frye" whose play was often called "brilliant" by sportswriters state wide was a big reason for this success. He played in 3 "Sweet 16" State Tournaments including a quarter finalist finish in 1958 and a runner up finish in 1960.

In a pre-season poll conducted by Earl Cox of the Courier Journal in 1959 before Don's senior year, coaches across the state named Don Frye as the #1 rated player. Mr. Cox asked the questions in this manner:

Which will be the finest high-school basketball team in Kentucky this season? The answer was: Monticello

Who will be the finest player in the state? Answer: Don Frye

Don was named as a Prep All-American his senior year.

His State Tournament stats include:

1. Ranked 10th in State Tournament scoring with 160 points (83 of these points were scored in 1960 when his team was a state runner up while Sidelined at times because of a viral infection. In Monticello's second game, against Bell County, Don only played 10 minutes but still scored 10 points.)
2. He led all scorers on both teams in the championship game against Louisville Flaget with 24 points.

A note about his family: Don and 3 of his brothers, Thurston '56, Fred '58, and Paul '61 have played in State Tournaments for Monticello High School.

Don's high school achievements and recognitions include:

1958 – All District, All Region, Honorable Mention All State
1959 – All District, All Region, 2nd Team All State Selection
1960 - All District, All Region, 1st Team All-State Selection,
All State Tournament Team

He scored a total of 1,751 points in his high school career.

Don earned a basketball scholarship to the University of Colorado. He transferred to Furman University where he completed his basketball career.

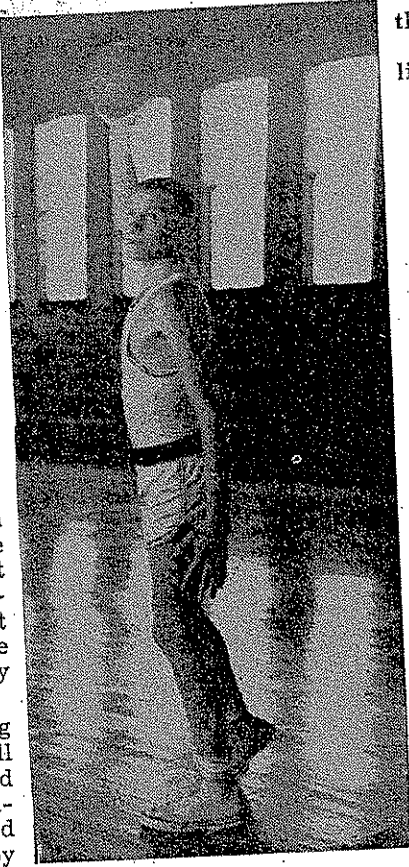

Region Monticello Is Hoping 3d Time Has All Charms Claimed For It

Coach Joe Harper hopes, as the saying goes, that third time will be charm for his Monticello Trojans in the State High School Basketball Tournament at Freedom Hall this week.

It will be the Trojans' third straight trip to the State meet. They bowed to St. Xavier, the eventual champion, in the semi-finals in 1958, then lost to Dun-
in the quarter-finals last

by successfully defended 12th Region crown Saturday night with a relatively 2-63 victory over Wayne and will meet Campbell

County, winner of the Ninth Region, in the opening game at 7:30 Wednesday night.

Has Tournament Experience

"I feel that this is the best opportunity we have ever had to win it," Harper said. "Our team has tournament experience, size, shooting ability and a great desire to play."

Not only is this the third straight trip for Monticello, but the 12th in the school's history and fourth in the last five years.

For Trojan star Gene Pendleton, who poured in 23 points in the Region final, it will be the fourth State Tournament appearance—almost certainly a state record. He was on the team as an eighth grader in 1956.

Harper, in his third year at Monticello, led his team to a brilliant 29-3 record this season. Only losses were to Ashland, 70-66 in the final of the Ashland Invitational Tournament; Pikeville, 45-44, and Seneca 52-51—all three losses by a combined total of only six points!

Earned Starting Berth

Mainstays of this year's squad are Pendleton, a 6-2 senior; Don Frye, a 6-4 senior; Kay Morris, a 6-3 senior; Peyton, a 6-2 senior; Frye, Don's brother, a junior, just received himself a starting berth.

The two Fryes, incidentally, are brothers of Fred Frye, star of the 1958 team and an All-State Tournament choice, and Thurston Frye, who went on to Bethel Junior College and now plays for Pfeiffer College in North Carolina.

Harper was himself a great guard while playing for Eastern Kentucky. His only prior coaching experience before coming to Monticello was Broadhead, a small school in the 12th Region.

Flaget's phenomenal-shooting Braves, running up the highest score in the history of the State Tournament with the exception of a consolation game, yesterday became the third Louisville team in three years to reach the final by capturing a ridiculously easy 96-72 victory over Hopkinsville Attucks before a crowd of 10,500 at Freedom Hall.

Monticello's veteran Trojans, also well acquainted with the location of the baskets, moved into the championship game by

Big Don Frye, 6-4 center who has been weakened by flu, returned to full-time action and scored 20 points to lead Monticello's attack.

Flaget hit a sizzling 47.9 per cent (34 of 71) and Monticello made 27 of 66 for 40.9 per cent.

Coach Says Monticello At Peak

While the big event in Louisville this week is not a horse race, the State Tournament opening tonight at Freedom Hall represents quite a basketball race. And 192 boys, or 16 teams, are ready to settle the annual teen-age crisis.

While 43d tournament, which is expected to produce records in attendance and receipts, gets underway at 7:30 with Monticello taking on Campbell County, Harrodsburg meets Bell County at 9:35. The first round will be completed tomorrow with three sessions beginning at 9 a.m.

For this tournament, the Coliseum will seat 16,971. K.H.S.A.A. assistant commissioner, Joe Billy Mansfield estimates 15,000 tonight.

UNLIKE MANY teams in the 1960 renewal, Monticello is no stranger to State Tournament fans. The Twelfth Region champions are back for the third straight year and coach Joe Harper is not by himself in thinking this year may be "it" for his club.

"I feel like our team is nearing its peak," said Jumpin' Joe, as he was called in his playing days at Eastern. "We've been coming along fine. The kids are in a good frame of mind.

They're thinking about the big trophy." Campbell County's imposing record of 30-1, best in the tournament, is enough to keep Monticello from taking anything for granted.

"I KNOW WE will have to do everything we're capable of to win," said Joe. "but physically, I think we are in better shape than we've ever been."

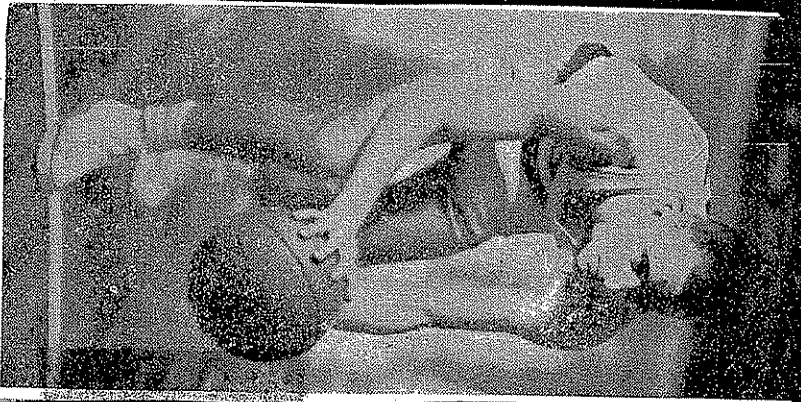

Trojans Win In Final 20 Seconds On Three Points By Don Frye

 Monticello, Ky., Dec. 18.—All-State candidate Don Frye took personal charge of a fourth-quarter Monticello rally to give the Trojans a come-from-behind 61-60 victory over previously unbeaten Louisville Male High here Friday night.

The brilliant Frye, who led his team with 21 points, chose the final stanza to dump in 14 points and melt away an eight-point lead the Bulldogs had carried into the period.

And to top it all off, it was Frye who made three points, with 20 seconds left to ease the Trojans over the top.

Frye, who had been fouled, connected on his first try from the free throw stripe. Then, missing on the second, he charged in for the rebound, wheeled and connected on a jump shot from 12 feet out.

Monticello Now 7-0

The triumph was the seventh in a row for unbeaten Monticello. It was Male's first loss after four wins.

The teams battled on even terms throughout the first half with Male's Everett Stallworth doing a good job of guarding Frye. The Trojans went on top at the quarter 19-15. The Bulldogs came back to

take the lead in the second period on the hot shooting of Ronnie Phelps, who wound up with 22 points to lead his team. Male had a 33-30 lead at halftime.

The Bulldogs played their best ball in the third, hitting eight of 13 shots from the field and running the lead as the quarter ended to 51-43. They had led by 11 points, largest of the night, during the period.

Stallworth Fouls Out

Stallworth and David Winfrey fouled out during the fourth when Frye was at his hottest and Male running hot cold. Stallworth left the fray with the clock showing 2:00 remaining and Male leading 57-54.

Other top Trojan scorers were Gene Pendleton with 18 and Kay Norris with 12.

Steve Smith hit 14 to grab runnerup honors to Phelps on the Male ledger. Stallworth got nine and Raymond Golden nine for the Bulldogs.

From the field, Monticello hit 20 of 47 for 42.6 per cent and Male 20 of 52 for 38.5 per cent.

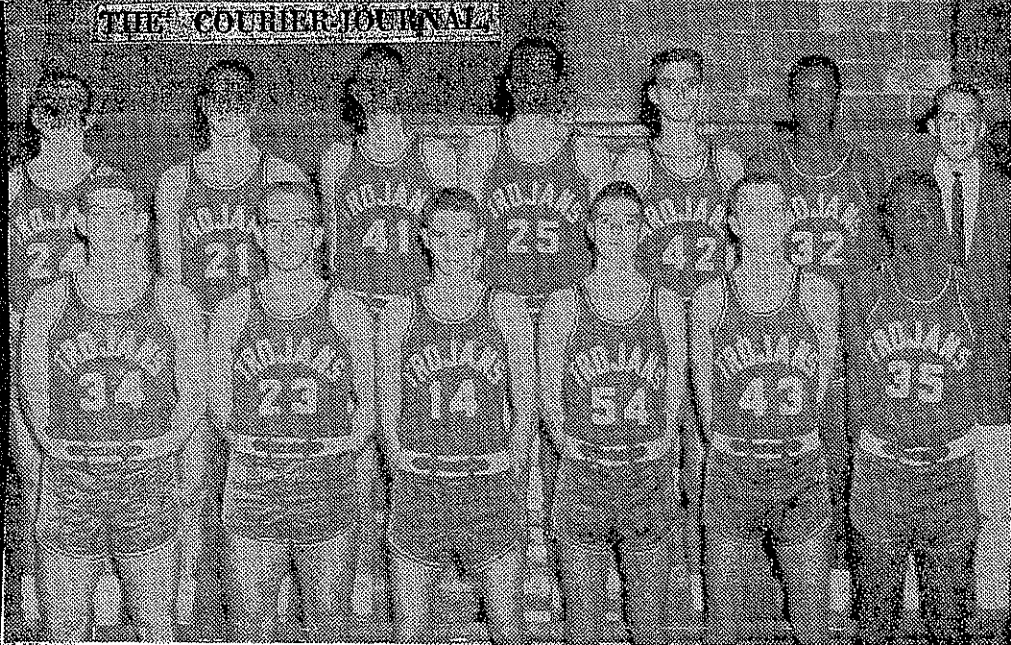

Trojans Top Owensboro By 61 - 55

When the 43rd annual State Tournament opened Wednesday night, Monticello was the upper bracket favorite and Flaget was the choice in the lower bracket.

These teams made the experts look good as they whistled into the championship contest with impressive victories in Saturday afternoon's semifinal contests before one of the smallest crowds to see a semifinal session in several years.

Monticello turned back Owensboro in the first semifinal tilt by 61-55 while Flaget pulled out all offensive stops in whipping Hopkinsville Attucks by 96-72.

Don Frye, ailing with a touch of virus, led Monticello with 20 points while hot-shooting Randy Embry paced Owensboro with 26.

Monticello was playing in its fifth state semis, but in the other four trips that was as far as a Trojan team advanced.

Don Frye, Monticello's all-state center, still was ailing from a siege of virus and wasn't expected to see much action. However, as it turned out, it was his first-half shooting that led to Owensboro's downfall.

Frye canned 15 points in the first half and the Trojans departed at intermission with a 27 to 23 lead.

The brilliant-shooting Embry, a 5-9 bombshell and Owensboro's lone junior did his best to send the Red Devils into the finals, but the tournament-experienced Trojans had enough left every time the Devils made a challenge to pull back into comfortable leads.

Monticello moved to a six-point 14-8 advantage in the first six minutes and with 5:13 left in the half, the Trojans held their first 10-point spread at 23-13. Owensboro closed the gap to six on buckets by Dick Anderson and Jan Adelman, but Don Frye & Co. quickly moved into a 31-23 working edge.

Owensboro caught fire in the opening minutes of the second half as Embry and Adelman combined to outscore Monticello by 8-2 and the deficit was trimmed to two at 33-31. But Gene Pendleton, another Trojan all-stater, hit two straight and it was 37-31.

Adelman tallied three for Owensboro and it was 37-34, but Don Frye again hit for the Trojans.

Monticello held another six-point lead with three minutes left in the third quarter, but David Yewell hit two straight and it was 4-39, 51 seconds later.

When the third buzzer sounded, the Trojans were leading by five.

Then the fire works started for Jumpin' Joe Harper's hoopsters. They rolled into an 8-point lead in the first two minutes of the final frame and two minutes later held a 9-point spread at 53-44.

Owensboro made a game effort to come back, but on each occasion the Trojans had that something extra to hold off the challenge.

The Red Devils of Region 3 had close calls through their first two outings. Owensboro nipped Lincoln Institute in its opener by 77-75 and then edged Symsonia in a overtime by 48-47 in the quarters before dropping out in the semis.

Pendleton tallied 14 and Capt. Kay Morris contributed 13 for Monticello to give Don Frye good scoring support.

Following Embry's 26 for losing Owensboro were Adelman and Yewell, with 11 apiece.

MHS Ousts Bell County 69 to 65

Monticello's Trojans, rapidly gaining momentum as the team-to-beat, blasted their way into the semifinals with a 69-65 victory over Bell County in Friday's opener. Actually, the game wasn't as close as the score might indicate.

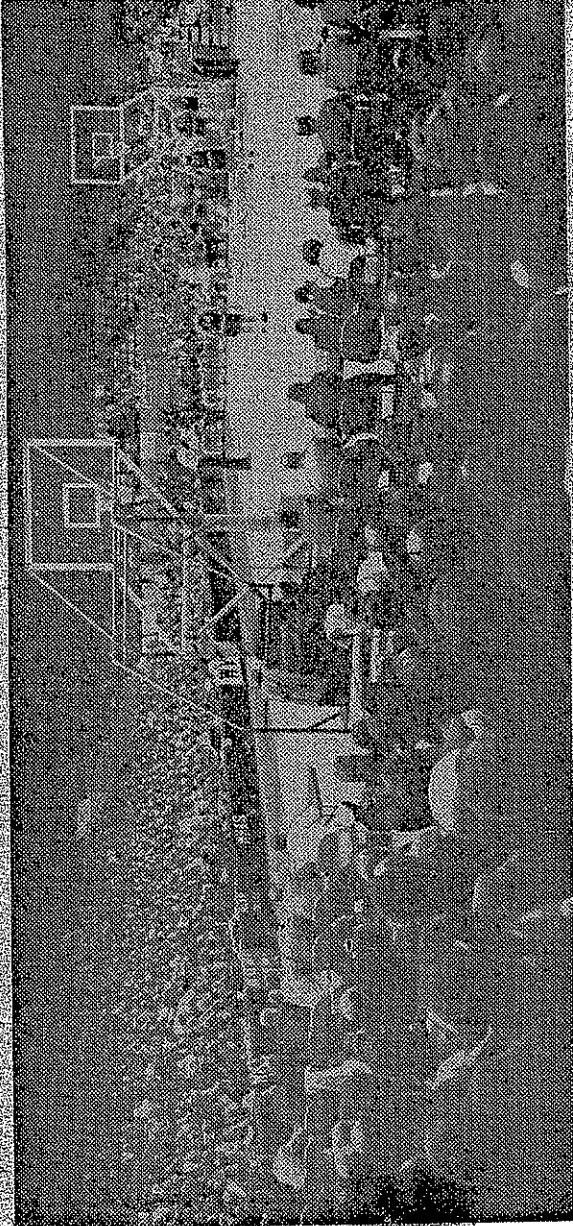
Jumpin' Joe Harper's hoopsters from the 12th region raced into a 19-4 lead in the first 5½ minutes and met every challenge the Bell Bobcats attempted.

With three minutes to go, Monticello led by 16 points at 69-53 when the General took over. "We started playing like we should have been all along at the start of the regional, but out there tonight we just played for about the first 14 minutes," Harper moaned.

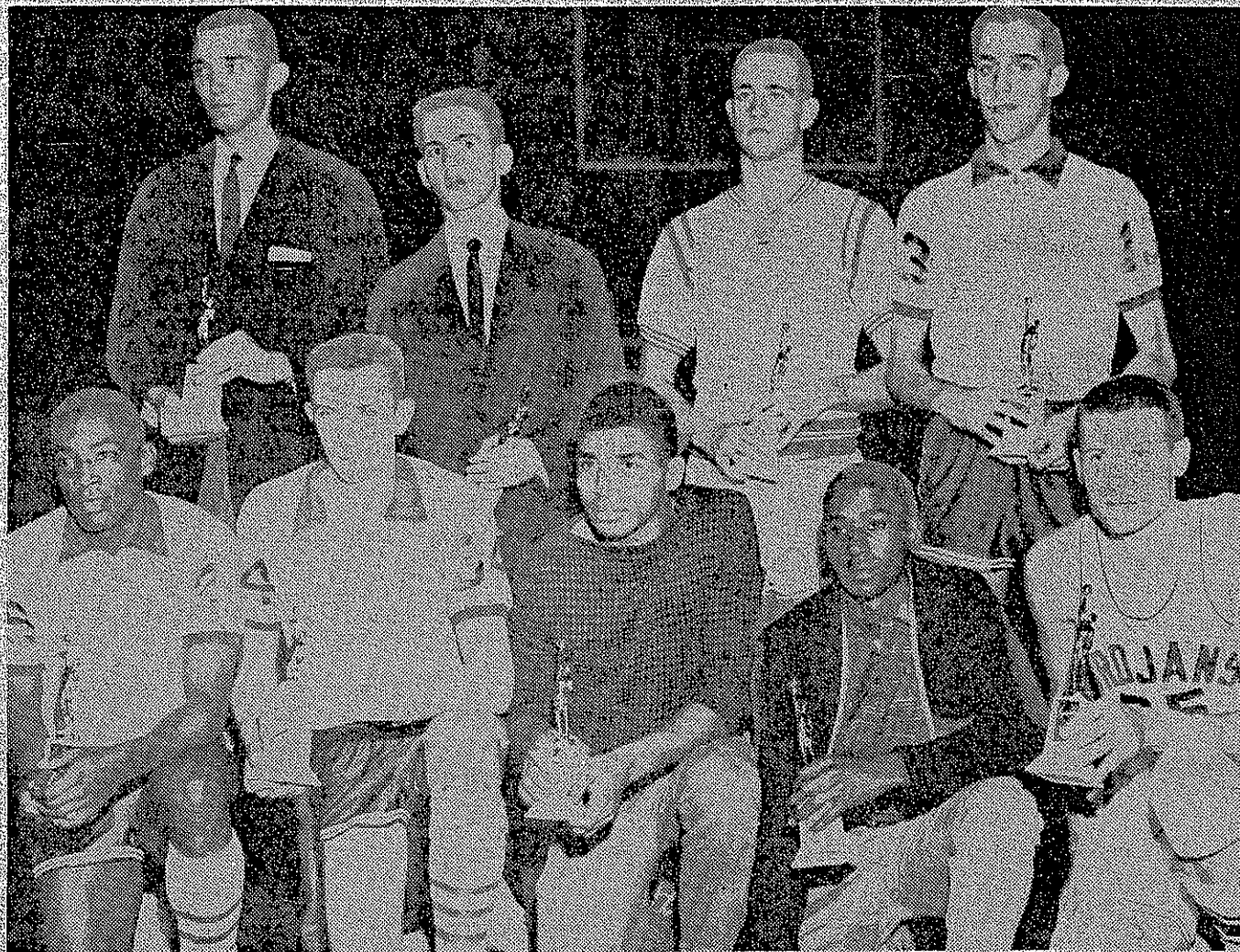
"My boys will play if they know they're playing a good team, but they just don't get much done at other times," Harper added.

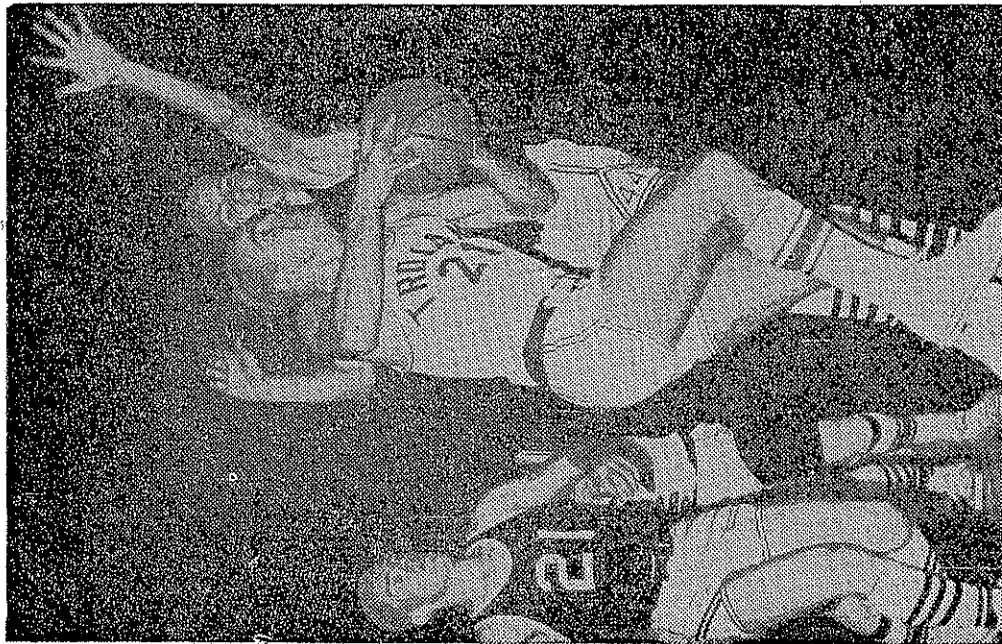

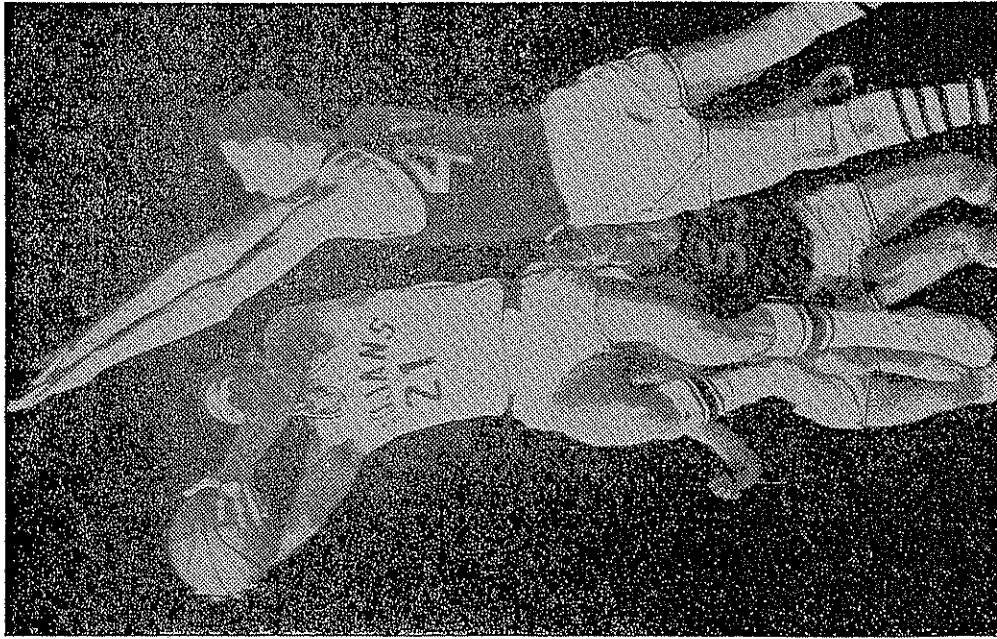

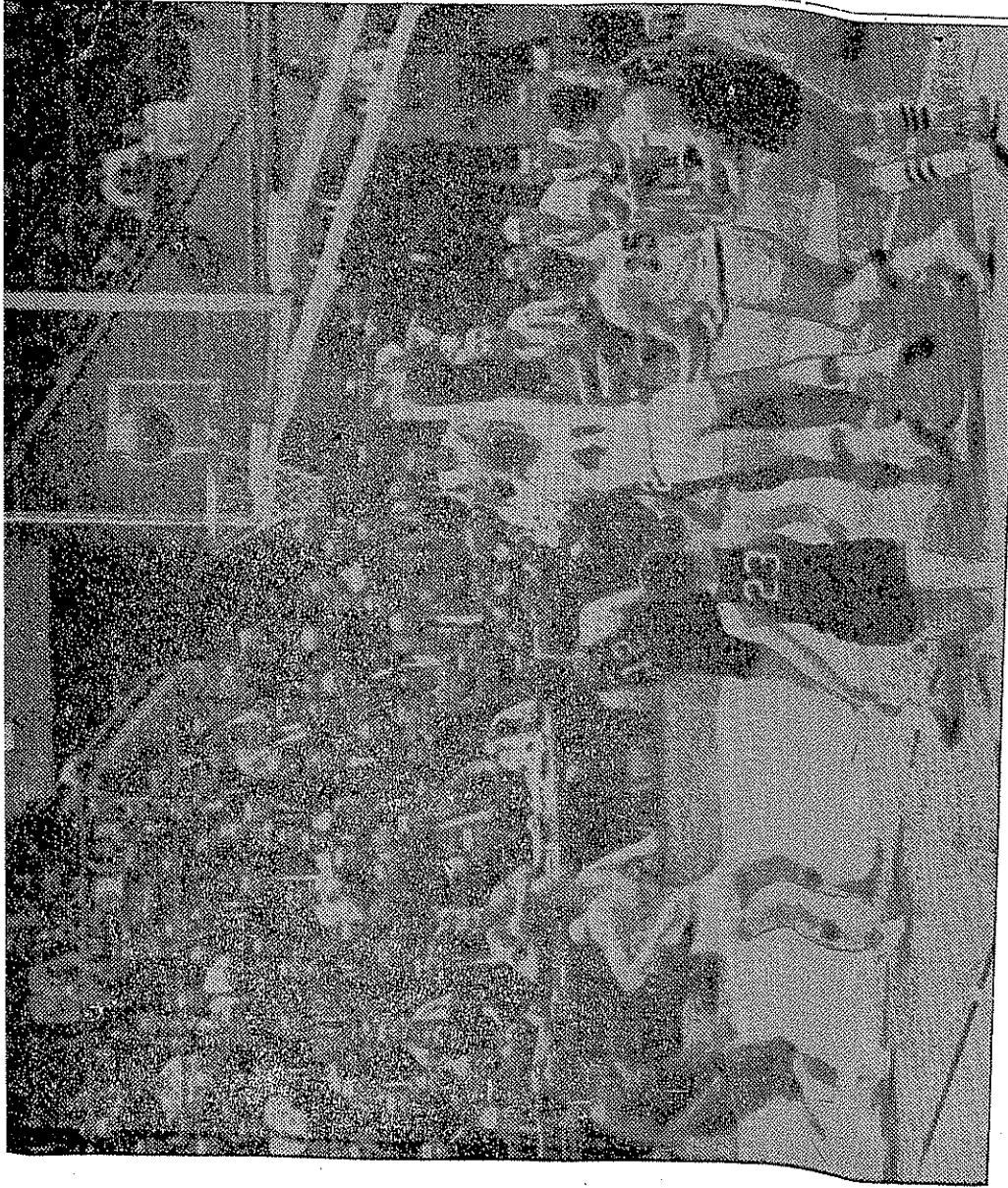

Flaget's Braves, runners-up in their own district tournament just two weeks ago, Saturday night captured Kentucky's richest schoolboy basketball prize. Becoming the second Louisville team to win the championship in three years, Flaget outscored Monticello by 18 to 8 in the last quarter to come from behind and defeat the veteran Trojans, 65 to 56, before a crowd of 15,000 in the wind-up of the 43rd annual state tournament.

Flaget, which finished its season with a 28-7 record under 24-year-old Morris, a soft-spoken graduate of Bellarmine College, was beaten by Louisville Central 84 to 69 in the final of the 25th district tournament but came back to upset Central 58 to 49 in the semifinal game of the seventh regional tourney. Central, which beat Flaget three times; St. X., which did it twice; Manual and Owensboro were the teams that beat Flaget this season.

First Quarter About Even
The first quarter was about as even as it could be, the score being tied at 11 to 11 at the end of the period, but Monticello—or Don Frye, to be more specific—quickly assumed command at the start of the second period.

Behind 48 to 47 entering the final period, Coach Jim Morris' Braves quickly tied the score on a free throw by rugged Don Kalmey and turned two bad passes by Monticello into baskets by smooth-working Ted Deeken and by sharp-shooting Tommy Finnegan for a 52-to-48 lead they never relinquished.

Worker For Shot

After Monticello's hard-driving Gene Pendleton missed a lay-up, Flaget grabbed the rebound and began to work carefully for a shot. Finnegan finally got clear and dropped in a jump shot from the free-throw line to give the Braves a 54-to-48 lead. Finnegan's basket came with 4:35 left in the game—and Monticello still hadn't scored a point in the quarter.

Monticello's brilliant Don Frye, 6-4 center who battled a throat infection throughout the tourney, put his team back into contention with two free throws and a driving shot, but Finnegan wrapped it up when he drove—wide open—to the baseline for a layup. Fouled by Frye, Finnegan added a free throw and Flaget led 59 to 52 with only 2:12 remaining.

Matched Points

After that it was just a question of how much Flaget's final margin would be.

After that the teams matched point for point the rest of the way and Flaget, after building a reputation as a football school because of its three state grid-iron titles, was Kentucky's basketball king, succeeding North Marshall.

Monticello, which led nearly all the way until the last period, was stopped cold after the middle of the third period by Flaget's sinking defense, which choked the high-scoring Frye.

Flaget, after trailing from the early minutes, finally caught Monticello at 43 to 43 with 2:35 left in the third period when Finnegan stole the ball and drove in for a layup, and the Braves took over for good with 6:25 left in the final period.

Fourth Jefferson Finalist

Four straight Jefferson County teams have now played in the championship game. Eastern lost to Lafayette in 1957, St. Xavier beat Daviess County in 1958, and Manual lost to North Marshall by only one point last year.

Monticello Record 32-4

Monticello finished with a 32-4 record, having also lost to Pikeville, Louisville Seneca, and Ashland—all by a total of just 6 points.

The crowd was the second biggest in the history of the tourney, being exceeded only by the 18,000 who saw the 1957 final at Freedom Hall.

Finnegan led the Flaget scorers with 20 points. Deeken added 14 and the under-rated Kalmey made 13. The Braves, who hit over 40 per cent in all four of their tourney games, connected on 40.6 per cent (26 of 64.) That qualified them as one of the finest shooting teams in the history of the "Sweet Sixteen."

Frye was high for Coach Joe Harper's Trojans with 24. Pendleton made 13 and Junior Peyton 10. The losers hit 21 of 56 shots for 37.5 per cent.

The two other Flaget regulars are hustling guards Buddy Weihe and John McGill. Although Flaget changed defenses often, McGill and Weihe were usually the one in front of Frye, keeping the ball away from him. With Frye stopped, Monticello was dead.

Available records show that only three other teams have lost in district finals and then gone on to win the state championship. They were Midway in 1937, Inex in 1941, and Lafayette in 1942. Midway lost to Bryan Station 28 to 21; Inex bowed to Meade Memorial, 51 to 37, and Lafayette fell to Lexington Henry Clay, 20 to 16.

Flaget, which advanced to the final by thrashing Hopkinsville Attucks, 96 to 72, in the second semifinal game, is the first champion to have a Negro on its team. The Braves have three, and one of them, guard John McGill, is a regular.

Attucks, joined Lexington Dunbar as the only Negro team to reach the semifinals, Dunbar lost to Manual last year in the round of four at Lexington.

Monticello moved into the title clash by beating Owensboro, 61-55, in the first semifinal.

First Final For Both

Neither Flaget nor Monticello had ever played in a championship game until last night. In its only previous appearance in the tourney, Flaget lost to

the start of the second period.

Two straight baskets by Deeken gave Flaget a 15-13 lead, but Frye hit two straight pivot shots and Peyton drove under for another Trojan basket. Peyton's basket represented Monticello's fourth connection in five tries and gave the Trojans a 19-15 lead with 5:32 left in the half.

Frye, playing brilliantly, tipped the ball twice in a battle for a rebound and the second time he slapped it in and the Trojans, with the big crowd cheering them on, owned a 21-15 lead.

Monticello Leads At Half

Flaget's Kalmey countered Peyton's free throw with a field goal, but Frye again hit before McGill and the speedy Weihe scored from the field to cut Flaget's deficit to three points at 24 to 21 with 2:40 to go.

Pendleton, hitting from the corner against the Braves' zone, and Peyton, with a free throw, gave the Trojans a 27-21 lead, and the teams traded four points to close out the half with Monticello on top, 31 to 25.

Sizzling shooting by Frye—he hit six of eight from the field and his only two misses were rebound tips—and strong board work by the Trojans were important to them, but they actually scored the same number of field goals as the Braves—12—and owed their six-point lead to free throws.

Frye, with 14, was high for Monticello, and Deeken topped Flaget with eight. Team shooting was about the same, Monticello hitting 12 of 30 and Flaget 12 of 33.—The Courier-Journal.

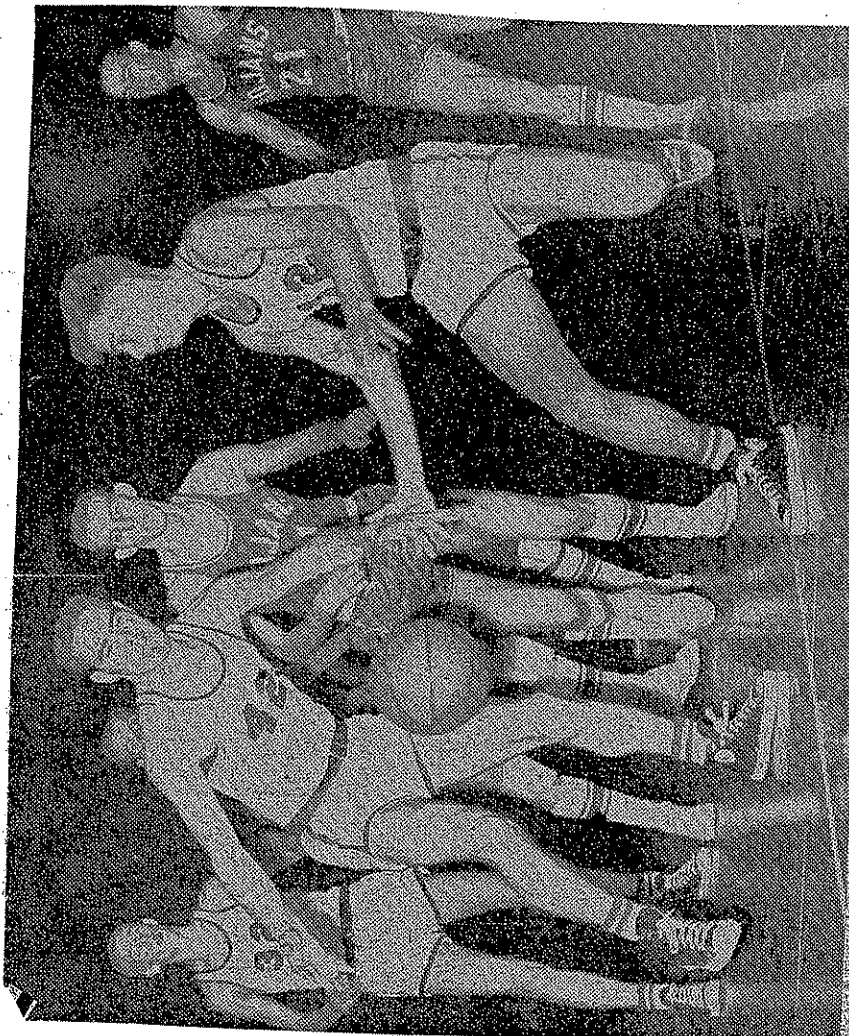

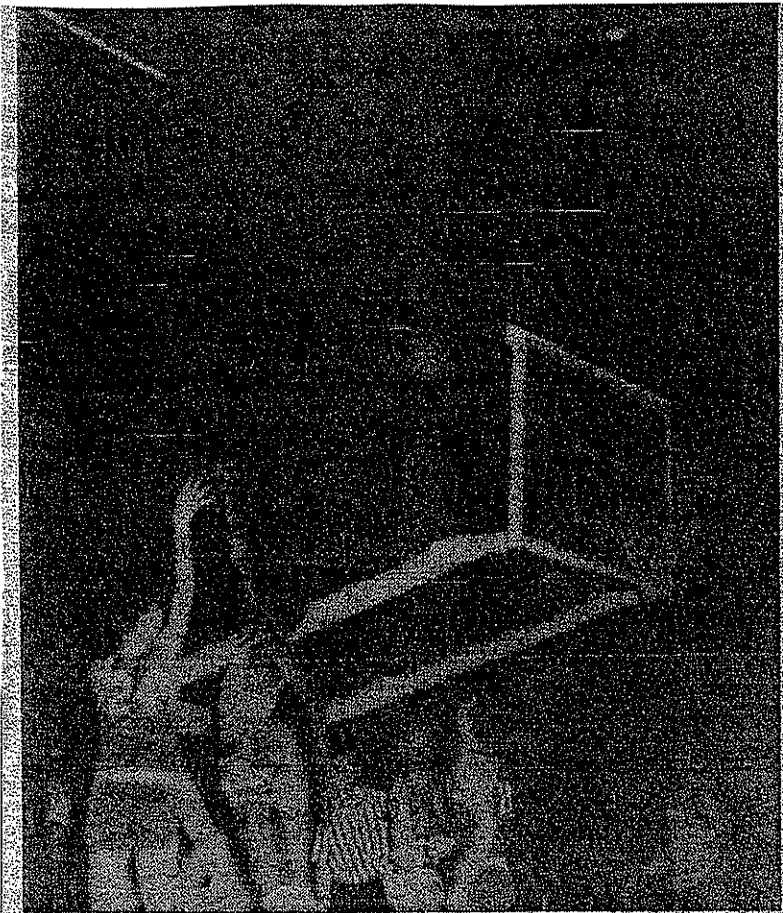

Morris's field goal moved MHS to within one point, 7-6, and Kennedy hit from the field to put the Trojans in front for the first time with an 8-7 score. Morris made it 9-7 on a charity toss, then Taylor evened it up at 9-all with a field goal. Morris with one from the field put Monticello into a 11-9 lead, and from that point on, the Mustangs never caught up with the 12th Region Champions. At the end of the first quarter, the Trojans led by eight points — 24 to 16.

In the second quarter, the Mustangs outscored the Trojans by one point, 18 to 17, making the half-time score read 41 to 34, the Trojans by seven points.

The third, and most interesting quarter, from the spectator's viewpoint, was the one that wrote finish to the Mustang's tournament chances — Big Don Frye tallied eleven points — on five from the field and one from the free throw line. Both of Monticello's first string guards, Kennedy and

tangs in the third quarter, giving MHS a 62 to 50 lead.

Monticello, relaxing with a twelve-point lead early in the fourth quarter, soon found there was no time for star gazing, especially playing against such an alert team as High Street—as the Mustangs, taking advantage of the Trojan's laxness—cut the lead to three points, 66 - 63 with three minutes and forty seconds to play.

Monticello suddenly became alive in the last three minutes and poured in six field goals, holding the Mustangs to two from the field, to give Monticello an 11-point victory—78 to 67.

In the closing minutes of the game Junior (The Mighty T) Peyton in one of his spectacular down the middle of the floor rushes, took a bad spill, and was helped from the floor, but was begging Coach Harper to put him back into the game by the time he reached the bench.

Monticello hit for 47.1 per cent from the field. The High Street average was 41.9 per cent.

On Friday evening, the Monticello boys were fighting for the right to meet the Lily Bulldogs for the Twelfth Regional honors, and to do so they had to defeat a fine Parksville High team. Playing good ball, the Trojans came through 70 to 61.

On Saturday night, before a packed house, the Trojans trailed throughout the first half, but caught fire in the third quarter, to prove that the experts had

To Whom It May Concern:

I take great pride in asking you to please give consideration to selecting Don Frye to be a member of the Dawahare's/KHSAA Hall of Fame.

I had the great good fortune to see Don play when I was in grade school. Four years after I graduated from high school I became Jumpin' Joe Harper's scorekeeper and remained so for another 15 seasons. When Joe retired and Rodney Woods replaced him in 1986 I assumed the same duties for Rodney Woods. Throughout the late sixties, seventies and eighties I attended the State Tournament religiously. Thus fifty years of being exposed to the very best of Kentucky high school basketball has enabled me to see some of the very best coaching, teams & players.

Don Frye was a relatively skinny 6'4" non-jumper when he began playing varsity ball his freshman season, but he had the benefit of coming from a basketball family, the Frye family of Monticello. He had two older brothers that played before him, one of which, Fred, led MHS to the State Tournament in 1955-56 and was named All State.

Don possessed extraordinary hands, uncanny timing and exceptional basketball savvy; enough so that he played some varsity ball his freshman year and became a starter early his sophomore season. His rapid improvement is illustrated by his numbers - he averaged 5.2 ppg during the regular season as a sophomore, but was ready to go to war by the time the District Tournament began as he averaged 13.2 ppg in 10 post season games.

MHS won the District and Region, returning the State Tournament and coming in fourth (losing to Gene Rhodes' St. X. squad who won that year) with Don beginning to play an integral part of Coach Harper's center oriented offense.

That was the beginning of a truly memorable run by Monticello, one that would see them sweep the District and Region for three consecutive seasons and come within one game of winning it all Don's senior season - a truly miraculous three year run by a school with less than 150 students in their top four grades.

Over Don's last two seasons he scored 1,403 points, averaging 20 ppg despite sharing MHS's offensive duties with another All State player playing right along side him (Gene Pendleton).

Prior to the beginning of his senior season, Don was chosen as the top player in the state by the Courier-Journal's coaches' poll and the team was also chosen number one. Coach Harper ramped his regular season schedule up to match expectations by adding Male and Seneca, playing in the A.I.T. as well as playing Pikeville in a specially scheduled triple-header at Memorial Coliseum (with the winner to receive that season's LIT bid).

MHS ended the regular season with only three losses: Ashland, 70-66 (Larry Conley would lead them to the State Championship the following season), Pikeville (45-44) and Seneca, 52-51 (with Mike Redd & George Unseld). The week of the Region Don came down with a virus which resulted in his having to sit the bench whenever Coach Harper felt he could rest him, trying to save his strength for later games.

Despite the virus infection and sitting the bench frequently Don averaged over 18 PPG scoring 132 points in the Region & State and Monticello ended up losing to Louisville Flaget, 65-56, in the Championship Game.


Don was named All Tournament at the State, was placed on every All State team named thereafter and played in the East-West All-Star game that summer. He was also named to Scholastic Magazine's High School All America Team along with Jeff Mullins, Ron Bonham and Cotton Nash. He received a scholarship from Colorado, decided he wanted to be closer to home and transferred to Furman where he enjoyed a very successful career.

Don Frye had a truly magnificent high school basketball career, best exemplified by his having led his team to 3 District Titles, 3 Regional Titles and a fourth place and runners-up finish at the State Tournament. The fact that his totals of 160 points (14th) and 65 field goals (11th) in the State Tournament are still among the top twenty all-time almost a half a century later says a great deal about what he accomplished.

What Don Frye, his teammates and Joe Harper accomplished from 1957-58 through 1959-60 created a legend that is not only revered in Wayne County, but throughout much of Kentucky whenever you speak to someone who remembers Kentucky high school basketball back then.

I strongly encourage you to give Mr. Frye his due. Even though it has been 46 years since he graduated from high school he & his team's accomplishments have not dimmed.






It is indeed my pleasure to recommend to the nominations committee that Donald F. Frye be accepted into the Kentucky High School Basketball Hall of Fame.



Don went on to a college career at Furman University from 1961-1964. After graduating, he spent twelve years as a coach in South Carolina before becoming a school administrator.

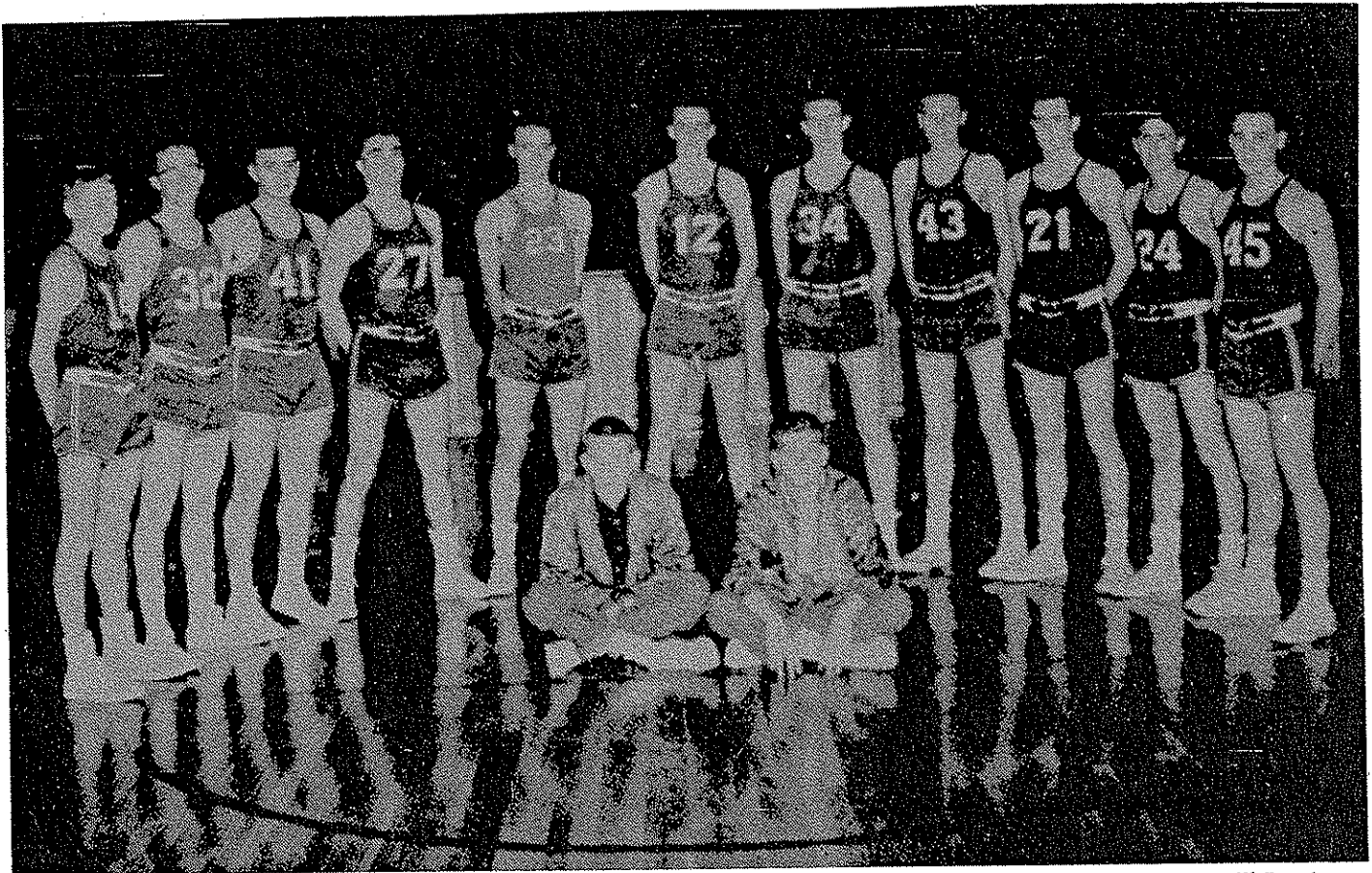

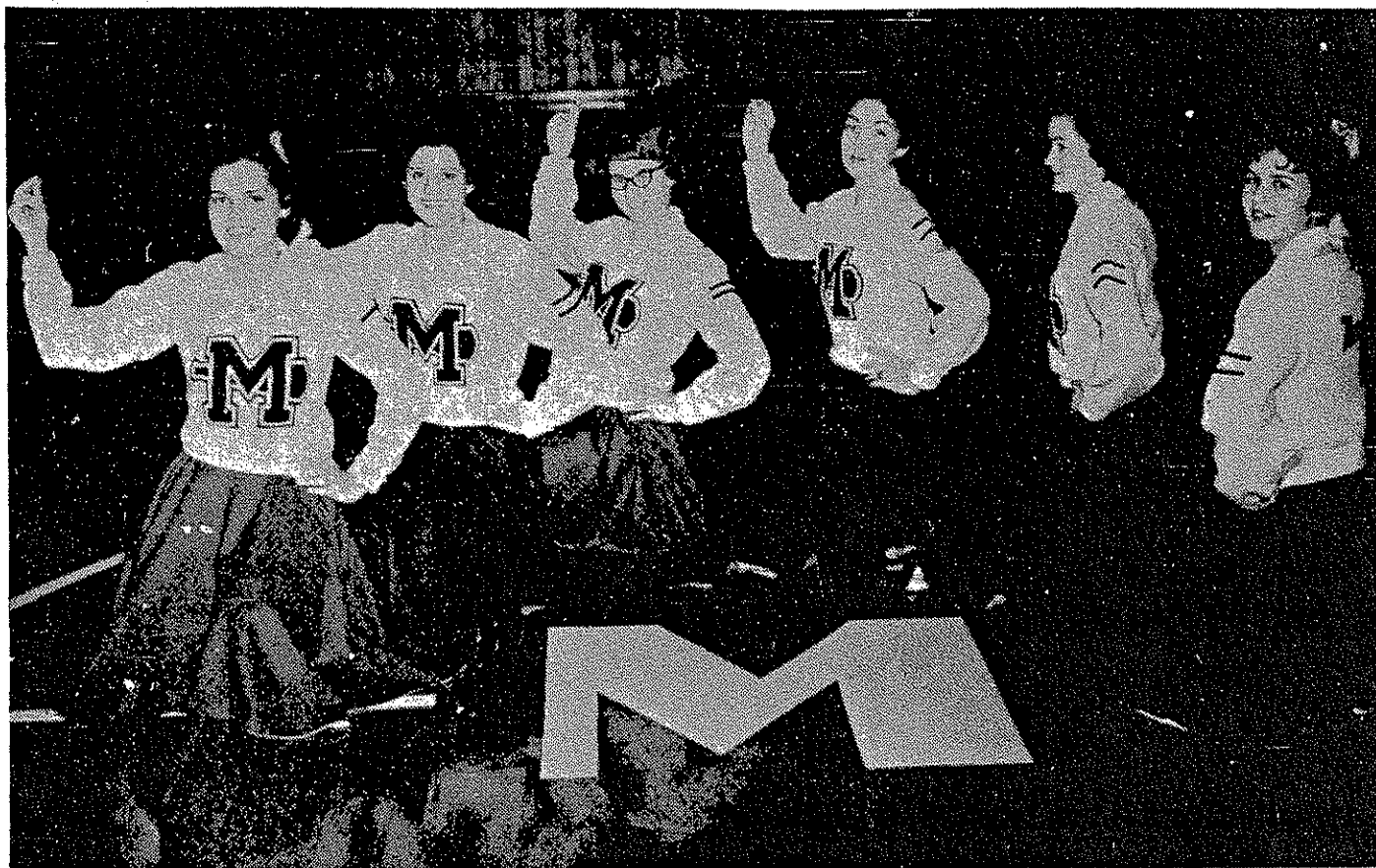

Although one fan told us that the games started with the ball being tossed up in the air, the referee blowing his whistle and a foul on Fred Frye, Fred set a record for shooting 207 free throws. He also made 151 of these, good enough for second place on the Most Made list. Gene Pendleton scored enough points by season's end to put himself within a game or two of scoring 1,000 points. Sophomore Don Frye became the team's third leading scorer, while Aaron Stringer and Larry Ledbetter scored 214 points each. The Trojans finished the season with a fine 20 - 6 won - lost record. Like last year, two of these losses were to Lily.

In the District Tournament MHS led off with a victory over Wayne County. The loss to Somerset in last year's Tournament was avenged in the second game. They then beat Russell County to win the District.

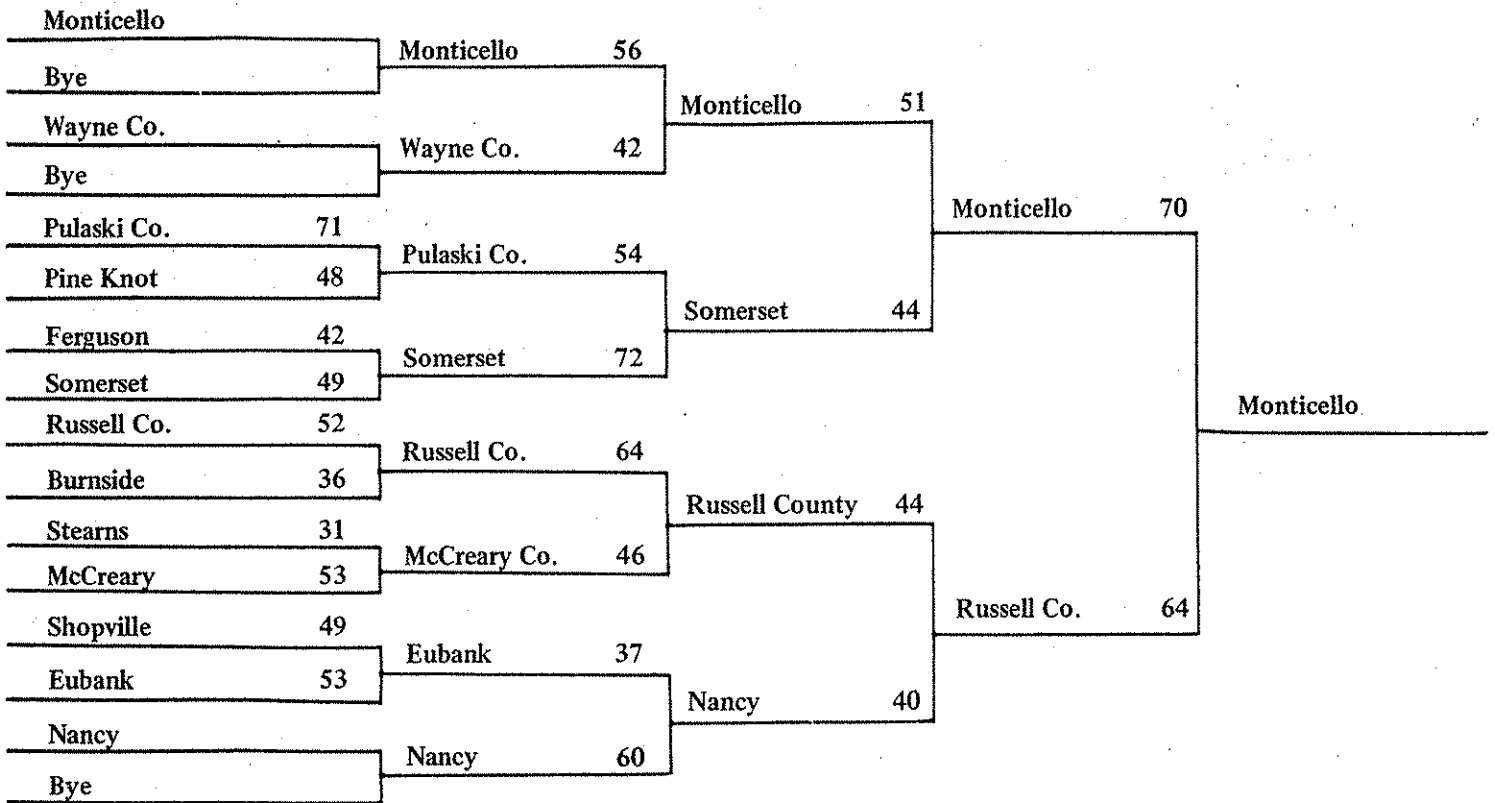
The Trojans put Mt. Vernon and Parksville out of the Regional Tournament, only to wind up in the finals against Lily. Fred Frye tossed in 18 free throws, 38 points, in all as MHS won 84 - 73.

MHS faced Hodgenville in the opening round of the State Tournament. Fred Frye made 30 points, while Don made 15. MHS won 67 - 61. The Trojans then eliminated Clay County, as Gene Pendleton scored a game high 17. In a game that was much closer than the score indicates MHS lost to the eventual Champion St. Xavier. With only 46 seconds to play, MHS was down by 3 points but lost by 10 points, 58 - 48. Clark County then beat MHS in the Consolation Game and the Trojans settled for 4th place. Fred Frye was named to the All-State Tournament Team. This team finished with a final record of 30 - 8, and is one of the best teams in MHS history. Nearly 250 cars met this team at Burnside. At a short program Mayor R. G. Breeding presented this team with a key to the City before an overflow crowd.

The Trojans were returning all but two players, Tommy Jones and Billy Foister, from last year's squad. The Trojans had been to the State Tournament the past two years and three out of the last four. In a preseason poll, Monticello was named as the best team in the state, while Don Frye was named as the best player in the state. Jeff Mullins, later an outstanding professional player, along with his team, Lafayette were named to the number two spot.

It appeared that the poll was accurate, as Monticello ripped off 22 wins, while losing three. The three losses were close, with a total of 6 points being the difference. Ashland handed the Trojans their worse loss, a 4 point decision in the Ashland Invitational. MHS lost a one point decision, 45 - 44, to Pikeville in a triple header in U.K.'s Memorial Coliseum. The winner was to be invited to the prestigious L.I.T. Seneca handed MHS their only loss at home, 52 - 51.

The Trojans were led by three seniors, often called the "Big Three". These were Kay Morris, Don Frye and Gene Pendleton. These three combined to average 52 points a game, with any one being capable of scoring 30 or more in a game. Junior Peyton and Butch Kennedy were the other two starters. Paul Frye earned a starting position later in the year. In the District Tournament, MHS whipped Nancy 75 - 36, Russell County 77 - 46 and met Wayne County in the finals. MHS won, as Don scored 40. In the regional MHS put away Hustonville 64 - 47 and Hazel Green 70 - 61. MHS and Wayne County met again, this time for the Regional Championship. The Trojans came away with an 82 - 63 victory and their third straight championship. Gene Pendleton was going to his fourth state tournament as a player, probably a state record.

MHS defeated first round opponent Campbellsville 76 - 59 as Pendleton scored 31. Don Frye had the flu. He rested the first half of the Bell County game and Monticello won 69 - 65. Owensboro was thought to be tougher, and Don played, as Monticello won 61 - 56. Monticello was now in the finals of the State Tournament. Louisville Flaget was the opponent and was definitely a good team. They had been rated high all year. Monticello may have won if they could have handled the full court press Flaget employed the latter part of the game. The press resulted into several turnovers and easy baskets for Flaget. Monticello lost by nine, 65 - 56. Don and Gene both made the All Tournament Team. All the Trojans returned home heroes.

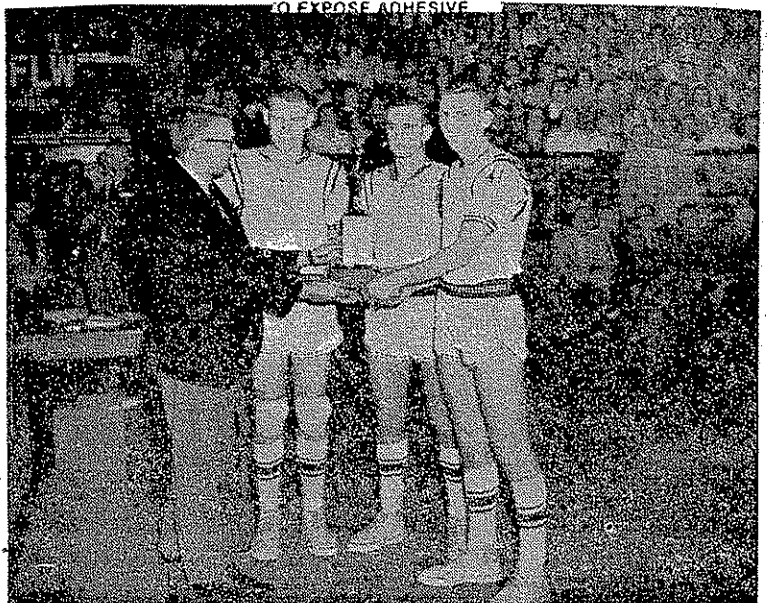

County, winner of the Ninth Region, in the opening game at 7:30 Wednesday night.

Has Tournament Experience

"I feel that this is the best opportunity we have ever had to win it," Harper said. "Our team has tournament experience, size, shooting ability and a great desire to play."

Not only is this the third straight trip for Monticello, but the 12th in the school's history and fourth in the last five years.

For Trojan star Gene Pendleton, who poured in 23 points

in the Region final, it will be the fourth State Tournament appearance—almost certainly a state record. He was on the team as an eighth grader in 1956.

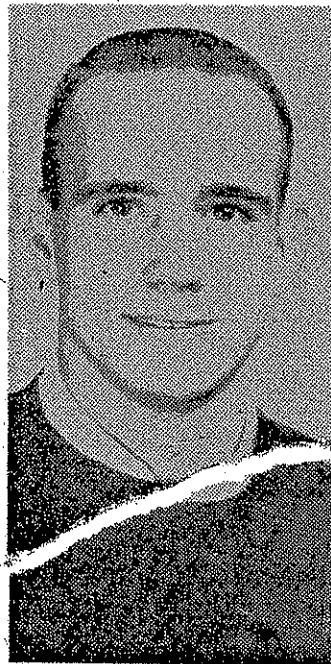
Harper, in his third year at Monticello, led his team to a brilliant 29-3 record this season. Only losses were to Ashland, 70-66 in the final of the Ashland Invitational Tournament; Pikeville, 45-44, and Seneca 52-51—all three losses by a combined total of only six points!

Earned Starting Berth

Mainstays of this year's squad are Pendleton, a 6-2 senior; Don Frye, a 6-4 senior; Kay Morris, a 6-3 senior, and Junior Peyton, a 6-2 junior. Paul Frye, Don's brother and a 5-9 junior, just recently earned himself a starting berth.

The two Fryes, incidentally, are brothers of Fred Frye, star of the 1958 team and an All-State Tournament choice, and Thurston Frye, who went on to Bethel Junior College and now plays for Pfeiffer College in North Carolina.

Harper was himself a great guard while playing for Eastern Kentucky. His only prior coaching experience before coming to Monticello was at Broadhead, a small school also in the 12th Region.

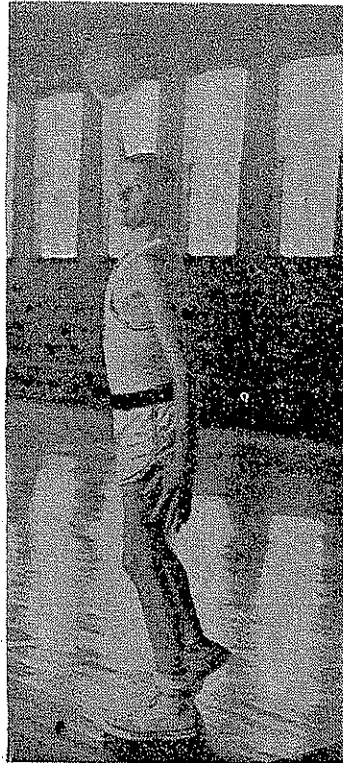

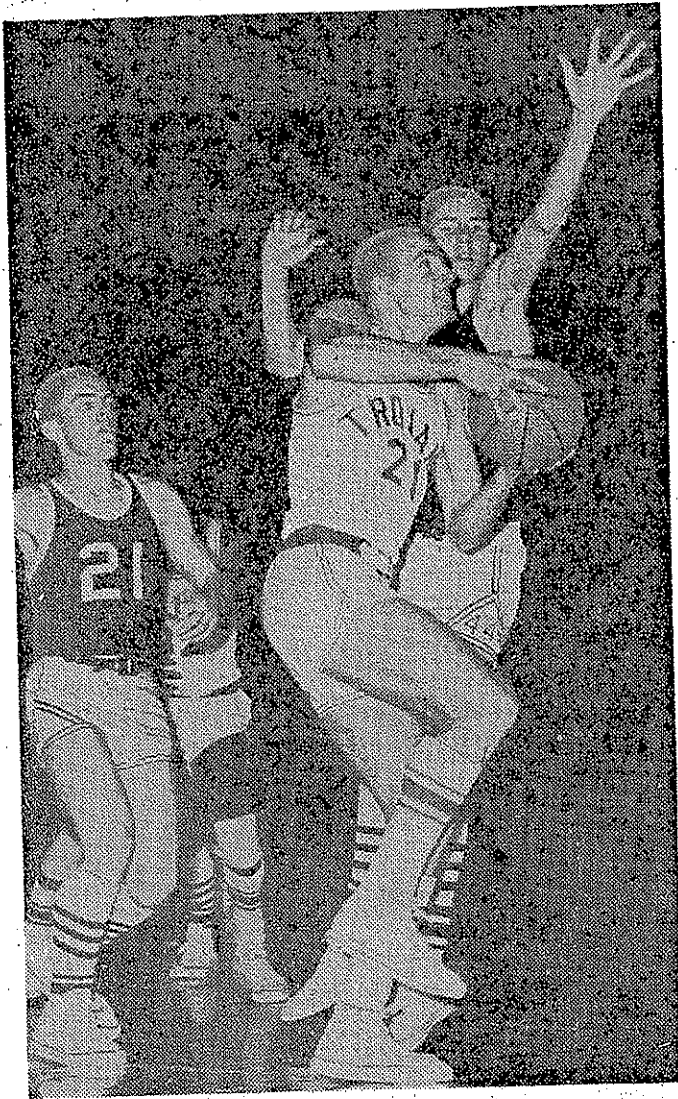

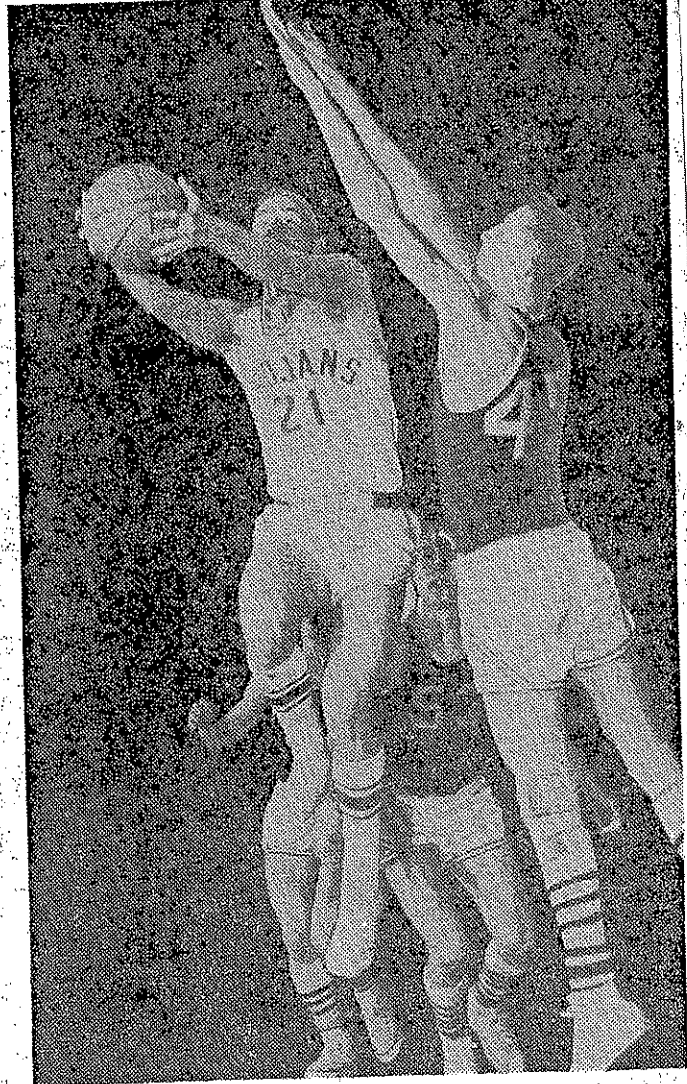

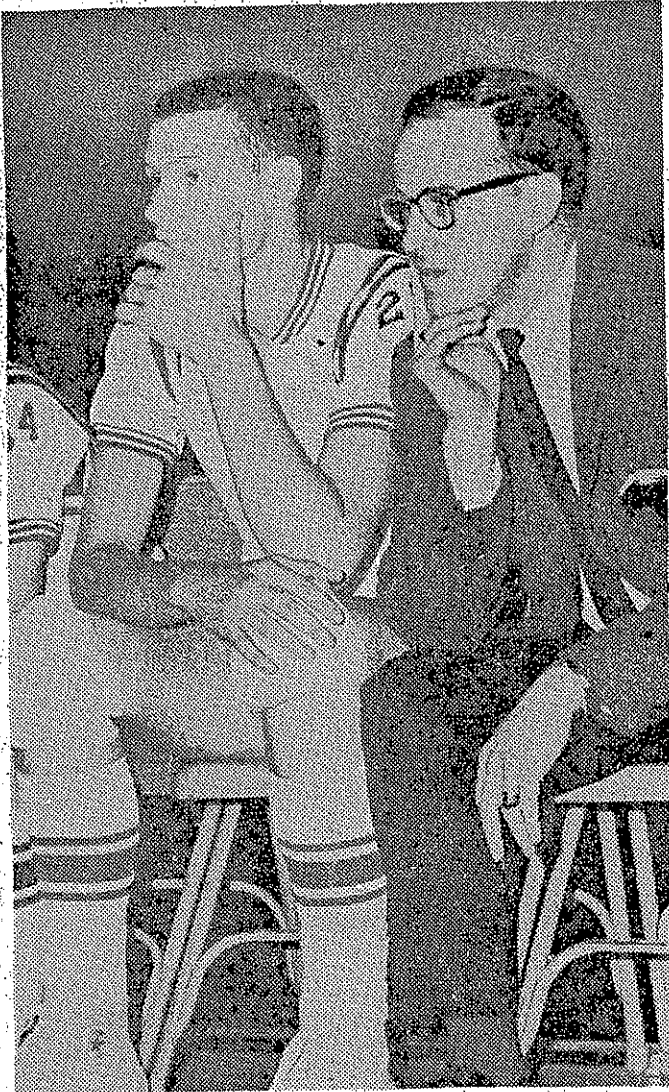

Another Selvy Sparks Furman

Lyles Alley has coached basketball at Furman University for 18 years and, to him, "It was just another dream."

David Selvy has played basketball at Furman for two years and, to him, "It was the greatest thing that's happened in 10 years."

And their pride is understandable in the afterglow of Furman's surprisingly decisive 70-55 Southern Conference victory Thursday night over Davidson, the nation's fourth-ranked team.

It was the noisy night in the Greenville (S.C.) Memorial Auditorium.

Like Alley and Selvy, many in the season's biggest crowd of 5,600 remembered a similar evening 10 years ago.

Hit 100 Points

On that 1954 night, in the culmination of a great career, another Selvy—Frank, by name—scored 100 points against Newberry. His parents, from Corbin, Ky., were seeing him play for the first time.

This night, in 1964, Frank sat in the packed house to see his little brother, David, play—also for the first time.

Neither David nor the Furman team scored 100 points. But they scored enough.

"I have never been so proud of a team," said coach Alley. "This is a team that never

quit. It didn't quit when we lost eight of 10 games in December. It didn't quit when we fell 10 points behind this time. These boys just kept coming back."

Furman's victory, against a team that had humiliated the Paladins 89-63 at Davidson, on December 18, postponed for at least nine days the Wildcat's clinching of first place in the conference standings and consequent top-seeding in the championship tournament, February 27-28 at Charlotte.

Need One Victory

To do this they still need only to defeat The Citadel February 22 at Charleston, S.C.

Against Davidson, Furman shot 54.8 percent, with Don Frye getting 18 points and David Selvy 17.
