Dear Selection Committee:

I am writing you to ask you to consider electing Homer Goins to the Dawahare's KHSAA Hall of Fame.

I am both a good friend and a former player for Coach Goins and I am sure that you have received several letters of recommendation on his behalf.

I would like to comment on a few things that may add to what you have received. Just 24 at the time, Homer came to Paris in 1969 to take over a football program that had fallen upon some hard times. With his youthfulness came an excitement that our community had not seen for several years. He motivated his players to perform to their highest potential. I should know because he got every ounce of potential out of me, both as a player and as a young man. We worked extremely hard, both in summer two a days as well as the weight room.

Homer had several good teams. He coached Paris to two undefeated seasons and a state championship. I was fortunate to have played on the 1973 state championship team-it remains one of the great experiences of my life and continues to serve as a source of pride for our entire community.

However, there were other players that graduated prior to the state championship year who paved the way for our successes. In particular was his 1970 team that went undefeated, but lost to Lynch in the state semi-finals. This was by far the best team, with all state football players in Steve Parker, Jeff Thompson and Bill Worthington.

The level of commitment to both team and school that Coach Goins drew from his players was apparent to me, as a freshman sitting in the locker room watching the seniors and others bawl their eyes out after the loss to Lynch.

It was those players, who even in defeat, paved the way for our state championship 4 years later.

With these young men, Coach Goins built a football program at Paris in the finest sense of the word. Built on a foundation of hard work, discipline and commitment, Homer Goins made us better football players, but more importantly, he made us better men.

The fact that we never gave-up was a real hallmark of Coach Goins' teams. No matter what the score was, the Paris players could always walk off the field proud of our efforts because Coach Goins demanded nothing but our all-and he got it.

Homer Goins can be best described as a class act. His years of coaching, his commitment to shaping his players into fine young men and his commitment to our community make him a wonderful candidate for the KHSAA Hall of Fame.

I appreciate the committee taking there time to read my letter and considering Homer Goins for nomination.

Accomplishments of the football program during his 10-year tenure as coach include:

ranked in the top 10 at some point 9 out of 10 years two teams (1970 & 1973) had undefeated regular seasons won three district championship titles won three regional championship titles undefeated 1973 KY State Class A champions (14-0) the 1972-73-74 teams had the state's longest win

the 1972-73-74 teams had the state's longest win streak (24 games) in Class A

total won-loss record 83-31

In addition, Homer was selected as the 1973 Class A Coach of the Year. As a further testament to his coaching abilities, several of his players received scholarships to universities such as UK, Vanderbilt, Purdue, Morehead State, Murray State, Georgetown College, and others. I feel honored to have been asked to submit a letter of recommendation in support of coach Homer Goins to be inducted into the K.H.S.A.A. Dawahares Hall of Fame. I first met coach Goins in the fall of 1972 when I became principal of Paris High School. It didn't take me very long to recognize the work ethic and dedication of coach Goins to not only the football team but the classroom as well. When he walked onto the football field, weight room, or the classroom he became a no-nonsense person that demanded respect, discipline and dedication from those around him. His won loss record and the ultimate undefeated state championship in 1973 speaks for itself.

However, I think the story of his early beginnings and how he became successful is worth telling. We both share common birthplaces, Evarts, Kentucky. After completing a very nice career at Evarts High School, he was afforded the opportunity to play football at the University of KY under coach Charlie Bradshaw. Being a disciple of coach Bear Bryant coach Bradshaw was as extremely tough disciplinarian. Team numbers began to drop as many of the football players began to leave the team. The team got the nickname of "The thin 30". One night some of the players came by Homer Goins room telling him that they were leaving the team and asked him if he would leave with them. He immediately asked if they had ever been inside an eastern Kentucky coal mine. They said no. Homer then told them about those conditions and how rough the life of a coal miner could be. He said that nothing coach Bradshaw could do to him would make him leave the team and go back to that existence.

As Paul Harvey would say "is now you know the rest of the story". He was never a quitter and he installed into his players and those around him to be a fighter and never quit. Homer Goins deserves to be inducted into the Hall of Fame and I want to go on record as one of those people in support of this nomination.

I would like to nominate a candidate for the Dawahare's Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame.

Before I do that, however, I would like to introduce myself. My name is Dicky Baldwin, and I'm a former sports writer with The Lexington Herald-Leader, and former sports editor of the now-defunct Paris (Ky.) Daily Enterprise. In addition, I've worked part-time (covering football, basketball and golf) for The Louisville Courier-Journal, and have written numerous articles for many state-wide magazines and publications.

The person I would like to nominate for your hall is Homer Goins, who built Paris High School into a football power in the 1970s. His 1973 state championship team, which finished 14-0 and featured four Associated Press (all classes combined) first-team all-staters, is still regarded as one of the finest Class A teams ever produced in Kentucky.

A biographical sketch on Goins would look something like this:

He graduated from Evarts High School in 1962, having lettered in football (three years) and basketball (four years). A two-time all-state tailback, he was recruited by Alabama, Tennessee and Kentucky. He cast his lot with the Wildcats, and was a member of the freshman team which scrimmaged Coach Charlie Bradshaw's infamous "Thin Thirty" squad on a regular basis. He was a tailback for the Wildcats from 1964 to 1966. Unfortunately, he spent much of his career playing behind All-American Rodger Bird. Nevertheless, he earned three letters and had a solid career with the "Big Blue."

He began his coaching career at Maysville High School in 1967. Starting the football program from scratch, he and head coach Tom Becherer led the team to a two-year record of 15-5-1. He then moved on to Paris where he directed the Greyhounds to consecutive records of 8-2, 11-1, 8-3, 9-2, 14-0 and 10-3.

Goins then became principal at Paris and coached four more years. He finished his 10-year career with an 83-31 record, capturing three district and regional titles in addition to his state crown. He had over a dozen first-team all-state selections, and sent numerous players to college on football scholarships.

He was selected the Courier-Journal Class A "Coach of the Year" in 1973. He was an assistant coach of the victorious East squad in the 1971 East-West All-Star Game. He also played tailback on the winning East team in that same 1962 event.

His record against some of the legendary football coaches of the era were as follows: Garnis Martin (Bardstown), 2-0; Charles "Chili" Ishmael (Mt. Sterling), 6-1; and Ben Pumphrey (numerous schools), 8-3.

Former UK football coach Fran Curci was so impressed with Goins' ability on the sidelines that he offered him a position on his staff. Goins was tempted by the move but had to turn down the offer due to financial considerations.

In addition to football, Goins had some powerful track teams at Paris. That was the only other sport he coached.

In the classroom, he taught physical education, psychology and sociology.

It gives me great pleasure to recommend Homer Goins be inducted into the Dawahares Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame. Coach Goins was my football coach and psychology/sociology teacher at Paris High School from 1969 through 1971.

Coach Goins was one of the most successful coaches in Kentucky during his tenure at Paris High School. He came into a program rich in tradition and a history of winning but in the late 1960s the program was in a nosedive. In just one season Coach Goins pulled the program out of that nosedive and was one victory from winning the district championship. His success during that season was the beginning of a Class "A" football dynasty: (1) teams were ranked in the Top10 nine out of 10 years; (2) two undefeated teams; (3) won three district championships; (4) won three regional championships; (4) won a State Championship in 1973; (5) a won/loss record of 83-31; and (6) held a State of Kentucky longest winning streak of 24 games from 1972-1974. Also, he produced many All-State football players and at least one Division 1A or 1AA scholarship student/athlete each year during his tenure. Further, he continued to be successful on the field for several years under the dual role of principal and football coach. I highly recommend him without reservations to be inducted into the Dawahares Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame.
