I am requesting that this committee review this application for membership in the KHSAA Hall of Fame. This application is being made on behalf of Matthew O'Neil Harrell a 1986 graduate of Warren East High School. Matt was an outstanding student athlete during his four years at Warren East. Matt competed at the highest level in both basketball and Track and Field. Matt lettered, in each sport, during the four years that he participated.

As a basketball player Matt started on the varsity each of his four years. Matt received All-District and All-Region recognition. In addition, Matt received All-Warren County honors. He was also voted the "Player of the Year" for the 85-86 season, his senior season. Matt's name is still listed in many school record lists (a basketball program has been included as documentation of school records). Matt and Warren East competed in the 1986 state tournaments. Matt was the team's leading scorer that season. After competing his senior year Matt signed with Division II power Delta State.

With the great team successes Matt had with basketball, Matt then took his individual skills to the track. As a track and field athlete Matt won three individual state championships in the 2A state meets during the 1985 and 1986 seasons. Matt won back to back state championships in the high jump and in 1986 also won the 110 meter High Hurdles. In addition, during the 1986 meet he finished second in the 300 meter hurdles and third in the triple jump.

Matt continues to hold Warren East track records in the 110 meter High Hurdles in 14.2 and 300 meter hurdles in 38.8. He is currently co-record holder in the high jump at 6-8. As Matt's track coach during this period I can attest to Matt's effort, attitude and the respect he exhibited towards his teammates, competitors and the sport itself.

I believe that within the purpose of a high school athletic hall of fame, Matt's accomplishments merit review for this honor. Matt did, and continues to do so, represent his family, school and community in the most positive of ways. He is remembered here and in the Warren County community as an excellent athlete and person.

AFTER THIRTY-ONE YEARS OF TEACHING AND COACHING IN KENTUCKY, I RETIRED IN 2001. I COACHED BASKETBALL EACH OF THOSE YEARS. IN 1983 A YOUNG MAN CAME INTO OUR PROGRAM BY THE NAME OF MATT HARRELL. LITTLE DID I REALIZE THE IMPACT MATT WOULD HAVE ON OUR BASKETBALL PROGRAM AND OUR SCHOOL AS A WHOLE.

MATT STARTED ON OUR VARSITY TEAM AS A FRESHMAN. OUR PROGRAM WAS DOWN FOR THE FIRST TIME IN THE HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL. MATT WAS JOINED ON THAT TEAM BY ANOTHER STARTING FRESHMAN AND A HOST OF UNDERCLASSMAN. MATT WAS OUR LEADER EVEN THOUGH HE WAS JUST A FRESHMAN. MATT'S GROUP TOOK OUR SCHOOL TO THE STATE BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT IN 1986 HIS SENIOR YEAR.

MATT HAD MANY ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN BASKETBALL DURING HIS HIGH SCHOOL AND COLLEGE CAREER. AS A FOUR YEAR STARTER, MATT AVERAGED 14.5 POINTS PER GAME FOR HIS ENTIRE CAREER AVERAGING IN DOUBLE FIGURES HIS LAST THREE YEARS. HE HAD SUCH HONORS AS ALL-STATE, ALL-DISTRICT AND ALL-REGIONAL TEAMS DURING HIS CAREER. HE WAS A COACH'S PLAYER AND WAS SUCH AN ASSET FOR ME AS A COACH. 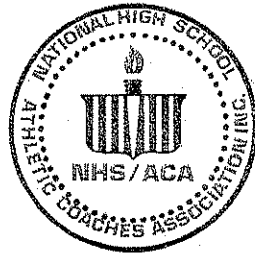

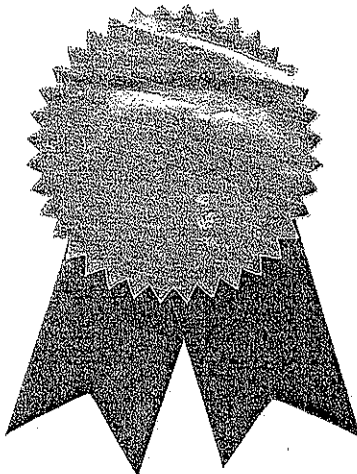

Harrell's clutch play lifts WE

After nearly 35 minutes of fiery basketball Thursday night against Metcalfe County, Warren East's future was riding on a pair of free throws by Raider guard Matt Harrell with three seconds remaining in overtime.

Harrell hit the first, missed the second, and when a 70-foot desperation shot by Metcalfe's Chris Barlow sailed off course, East (22-6) owned a spot in the Fourth Region Tournament title game.

The Raiders will play Warren Central tonight at 8 o'clock to determine who will represent the region in the State Tournament in Lexington.

"That's the first time I have ever been in a situation like that," Harrell said shortly after the game at Diddle Arena. "I've never had a chance to win or lose it like that."

Harrell, who finished with 21 points, added that the winning shot was something that he owed the team.

"Since I missed the shot in regulation that could have won it," he said, "I guess I had to pay the team back."

The missed shot that Harrell was referring to came with two seconds left in regulation. With the score tied at 45, East let a minute run off of the clock to set up the last-second play.

Everyone in the arena figured that Harrell would be the man the Raiders would turn to. They were right, but as time expired, the senior guard missed a jumper from the left baseline setting up the

overtime.

East coach Tommy Compton agreed with all of the Raider fans that the game was quite entertaining. "Yeah, but I didn't get a chance to enjoy it," he said while clearing his throat. "My voice is just about gone, I'm not even sure I can talk about it."

The game featured some of the most talented individuals in the region. Along with Harrell, there was teammate Dwight Turner, who finished with a below-average eight points.

For Metcalfe, the offensive punch has been supplied by David Garmon and Chris Barlow for most of the year. Garmon finished about nine points below his average, scoring just 10 points, and Barlow scored just 14, about 10 below par.

Although the game was tight throughout, Metcalfe took a lead in the second quarter and hung on, going into the locker room with a 28-26 halftime lead.

Late in the third quarter, the Hornets lunged ahead 36-30 when Barlow hit two free throws. The Raiders scored the last three points of the period, two coming off of a close-range shot by center Eric Wheeler, who finished with 10 points.

The other point came with two seconds remaining in the period on a free throw by Jeff Whitney.

"I guess that was the only time that I had any doubt about us winning," Compton said of his team's six-point deficit. "That's when I knew that we just had to score four points in our next two possessions to stay in it."

After the brief intermission at the end of the third quarter, the Raiders came out smoking for 10 of the game's next 12 points. Suddenly East was ahead, 43-38, with 2:49 left in regulation.

Harrell scored six points during the run.

If the score wasn't bad enough, Metcalfe coach Tim McMurtrey was forced to leave Garmon in the game after he picked up his third and fourth fouls at the 3:27 and 3:06 marks.

"I had no choice but to leave him in," McMurtrey said.

But with 1:39 remaining, and Metcalfe still trailing 43-40, Garmon committed his fifth and final foul.

The victim of Garmon's foul was Turner, and when he hit both halves of a bonus situation, East led 45-40.

East decided to run as much time as possible off of the clock. But after a Raider turnover, Barlow hit a long shot from the corner, cutting the lead to three.

Again the Raiders tried to waste some time, but Brooke DeVore picked up a loose ball and was fouled by Harrell as he attempted to shoot.

DeVore hit the first free throw, but missed the second.

The ball squirted from a pack of East players, into the arms of Metcalfe's Kenneth Froedge. Froedge, who finished the game with a team-high 16 points, banked in a short shot to tie the score at 45 with 1:17 to go.

That set up the Harrell miss at the end of regulation.

In the overtime, East's sopho-

more point guard Greg Johnson, scored four of the team's five points. Both shots were difficult maneuvers in the lane. Johnson finished with eight points and six assists.

"I like to play in the clutch games," Johnson said. "They (Metcalfe) are a tough team, and we had to play clutch to win."

According to Compton, East's defense made the difference. "Matt, Dwight, and really everybody, stopped their (Metcalfe's) shooters," said the coach. "Matt proved tonight he can play man-to-man defense."

Harrell was assigned to the hot shooting Barlow. The Metcalfe guard hit just 5 of 14 shots.

Turner went face-to-face with Garmon most of the night, allowing him to make just 4 of 14 shots. Garmon led all rebounders with nine.

The Metcalfe dressing room was quiet after the game, as the players tried to accept the fact that they were not going to repeat as regional champs.

Several Hornets were in tears. It was even difficult for McMurtrey to talk about the game.

He said that he wasn't sad because his team lost, but because they played so hard and had a victory within reach.

"It hurts now," he said. "But tomorrow, we'll realize what we accomplished and be proud."

Compton's advice pays off

If you're wondering why Warren East's Matt Harrell is taking all of the important shots for his team lately, it's because his coach told him to.

"Coach Compton told me last night (Thursday night) that I should just go ahead and shoot the ball any time I want until he told me to stop shooting," Harrell said.

Harrell did enough shooting Friday night at Diddle Arena to give his team a 50-43 win over Warren Central in the championship game of the Fourth Region Tournament.

"I wouldn't do that with too many players," Compton said of his advice to Harrell. "But Matt is unlike most players."

It was the fourth time that these two teams have met this season,

Meanwhile, Central was missing its shots. Jerry Schneller missed a pair, teammate Chris Turner was off target twice and Dragon forward Scott Turner was 0 for 1.

"(Dwight) Turner made us alter

waited for this for five years. Oh, yeah. This is great."

Turner has been playing with the varsity team since he was in the eighth grade. "I've never played at Rupp Arena," Turner said. "I just went out there tonight and tried to grab every rebound that I could. Central is a good team. We really had to work to get this."

Central fell behind early in the first quarter because the Dragons could not hit their open shots. "That got us in the hole early," said Flynn.

By the end of the first period, the Raiders owned a 10-4 lead. Central never did catch up, although the Dragons did manage to get within one point several times.

Compton said that he was never really worried that his team may lose the game "as long as they didn't get ahead. Even if they tied it, I felt like we would be okay as long as they didn't get the lead."

By halftime, Central cut into the

and the third time East has taken the victory. But just like each of the other games, the teams fought and scratched each other like the true cross-town rivals that they are.

East will play its first game of the State Tournament Wednesday afternoon in Lexington.

"I judge the success of a team by their effort and their accomplishments with the material they have to work with," said Central coach Mike Flynn. "Looking at it like that, I think we had a successful year. But we just can't handle Matt Harrell. And we can't control Dwight Turner."

"Warren East has had a pretty successful year, too. I take my hat off to them."

Harrell finished the game with 18 points and Turner, his teammate, scored 16.

Turner, a 6-4 senior forward, also pulled in a team-high seven rebounds. "This is, by far, the biggest thrill of my life," Turner said in the middle of a partying East crowd at center court. "I've

Turner-Harrell era leaves mark at Warren East

Coach Tommy Compton said farewell Monday night to perhaps the strongest 1-2 punch in Warren East basketball history.

Dwight Turner and Matt Harrell were among four seniors and other individual awards winners honored at the Raiders' annual Basketball Banquet.

Both Turner and Harrell are leaving their marks in the East record books.

From a team that finished 3-23 when they were freshmen, Harrell and Turner led an East comeback that climaxed this year with 14th District and Fourth Region championships and a trip to the State tournament.

Compton also commended

seniors Eric Wheeler and Shannon Whitley for their contributions to the Raiders' success.

Whitley was given the Hustle Award, particularly for his efforts in the State Tournament and the Fourth Region Tournament.

Wheeler won an award for the top free throw percentage. His 83.9 percent free throw shooting this year ranks him third in the 17-year history of Warren East. He also ranks third in field goal percentage with 53 percent.

Other award winners were Greg Johnson, who had a season record 157 assists, and Jeff Whitley, who had a season record 57 percent field goal percentage. Whitley also displaced Turner as the leading shot blocker with 33. Turner had won the award the previous

three years.

Whitney's perfect 4.0 grade point standing earned him the academic award.

Turner picked up an award for most rebounds and shared the award for steals with Harrell.

Harrell, who was honored as the team's leading scorer, was introduced as the Player of the Year in Warren County

by WBGN's Scott Thompson. Turner was also selected for the team. Sponsors Denita Fines and Kim Compton was recognized

as the county's Coach of the Year for the second time in three years.

The cheerleaders also were recognized. Julie Anderson was honored as most outstanding. Lesley Hanson won the 110 Percent Award and Kim Thomas received the academic award.

Senior captain Syna Carson presented gifts to the squad members and sponsors Denita Fines and Kim Compton was recognized

Turner-Harrell legacy

Turner, who has signed to play at Kentucky Wesleyan, is the fourth leading career scorer with 1,461 points. He ranks eighth in career scoring average with 12.2 points a game.

He is first in career blocked shots with 115, including a season-best 46 as a junior, and first in career rebounds with 749.

Turner ranks 30th and 33rd in scoring average per year and eighth and 10th in free throw percentage.

Single season marks include third in steals, 48; second and fourth in rebounds; 10th in free throw percentage.

Harrell's 1,335 career points rank him sixth and his career scoring average of 14.2 is also sixth best. His 16.3 scoring average this year is 14th best and last season's 14.2 average ranks 23rd.

He is No. 1 in career assists with 249. Individual rankings include fourth in steals with 47, second in field goal percentage with 55 percent and 18th in free throw percentage with 63 percent.

Harrell's leaps have helped lead Raiders

As Warren East warmed up for its game Friday night against Franklin-Simpson Friday night, a young boy hollered for senior Matt Harrell to dunk the ball.

Harrell snared the pass from a teammate, took a couple of dribbles, blasted off of the floor and did a sweet rock-the-cradle jam to the delight of the young fan.

But taking big leaps is nothing new for Harrell.

The well-tanned, net-sizzling guard became a starter for the Raiders' varsity club late in his freshman year, and has had a hold on his job ever since.

"I was real honored," Harrell said. "Not everyone gets to do that. It put a lot of pressure on me."

Harrell came to the Raiders in a rebuilding year. Stars such as David Britt, Tony Whitney, Bobby Young and Junior Jones received their diplomas just as Harrell was graduating from Oakland Elementary School.

Harrell averaged about 14 points a game as a freshman, but Warren East went 3-23 his first year.

"I remember losing to Central by six in the district tournament," he said. "I think I went 0 for 8 that game."

But that would be the low point in Harrell's high school career.

He has gone on to score 1,104 points for the Raiders in 79 games. His stats this year are even more impressive, as he leads the team in scoring (17.1) and steals (26).

He also leads the Raiders in shooting percentage, nailing a cool 50 percent of his shots. That statistic is embellished by the fact that he shoots mostly from the perimeter.

"I've gotten the feel for jumping on my shot," he said. "I've got to jump a certain height. If I jump too high, I'll shoot a brick."

Harrell's coach, Tommy Compton, agrees.

"He jumps so strong that he can shoot in heavy pressure," Compton said.

But Harrell's leaping talents are perhaps best displayed on the track. He has high jumped 6 feet 8 inches, just one inch short of the Class 2A state record. He won the 2A high jump title last year.

He has been courted by Harvard for his prowess on the track.

But Harrell is hoping to play college basketball. Western has seen him play and many colleges are looking at him.

Harrell attributes much of his success in basketball to his early leap into varsity basketball.

"I've picked up a lot of common sense of the game," Harrell said. "It helped me

understand what I'm supposed to do. Now I just play relaxed and don't worry about scoring a lot of points."

Compton noted improvements in other areas.

"His biggest improvement is his ability to hit the open man and run the full court," Compton said.

Harrell has 48 assists on the season.

But Compton offered a lot of praise for Harrell as a person.

"He's been a pleasure to coach," Compton said. "He's had no problems off of the court. He disciplines himself and he has never had to sit out a game because of missing class or practice."

Harrell said that he has learned some things in basketball that will help him.

"I think that it has helped me by getting me into many pressure situations," he said. "I think I can be calm and cope with life's situations."

Harrell also wants to prepare for his biggest leap to come — the leap to life after basketball and school. He said that he intends to major in business administration in college.

But for now, Harrell is enjoying life in high school as well as life in the air.

"I like to go out with the team on Saturday night," he said. "I enjoy just going out and getting something to eat, and things like that."

Vance hit her knee on a hurdle midway through the race, but managed to hang on until she collapsed at the finish line.

"She loves those dramatic finishes," joked a teammate. "She's just trying to get on ABC's Wide World of Sports."

As friends and teammates helped Vance to her feet, she was greeted with the news that she finished

before his scheduled 1,600 relay. As a result, Livers replaced Pheal with sophomore Corey Ferguson, and the team finished a lower than expected fifth place.

Livers said that Pheal was apparently flustered by the earlier mistakes.

The bright spot of the day for Central's boys was a school record by Daniel Duffy in the pole vault at 12-6. The vault was good enough for third place.

Andee Rudolf was the shining star for Bowling Green. Rudolf

Former star Harrell relating to East

Several Warren East boys' basketball players remembered their 1986 State Tournament experience as they thought about returning.

The pregame atmosphere in the East locker room was tense as the Raiders mentally prepared to take on Metcalfe County in the Fourth Region Tournament finals last Thursday, when Matt Harrell walked in.

You'll remember Matt. He was the high-leaping guard who helped guide teammates Shannon Whitey, Eric Wheeler and Dwight Turner into East's last Sweet 16. Greg Johnson and Jeff Whitney started for that team, and will do the same tonight when East takes on Oldham County in the first round of the boys' State Tournament in Louisville.

It was the same Matt Harrell who dunked through a Johnson lob pass in a regular-season game that

Harrell talked from experience, and the talk was successful. East won 74-65.

But Harrell's experience was a painful one.

East lost to Owensboro in the first round of the State Tournament in 1986. Awed by the atmosphere, the Raiders got off to a slow start against the tournament-seasoned Red Devils.

"We were nervous enough before the game," Harrell said. "Then I remember walking down the long hallway into Rupp Arena. There were 12,000 people staring at us, and I'd never played in front of that many people before. We were intimidated by it and felt the pressure."

A Kentucky Sweet 16, and a Final Four as Harrell found out, offer a lot to think about. If an athlete isn't careful, he can forget why he's there.

There are more fans than he's ever played before. More autograph seekers than have ever accosted him.

Hotels, related events and news media close in on 17- and 18-year olds.

"It's the same in a Final Four as in the Sweet 16," Harrell said. "They treat you like royalty, even in Division II. It can become distracting."

Harrell has kept in contact with his old teammates since graduation. And though he can't contribute his silky smooth jumper, his words before the Metcalfe County game could mean more to the Raiders now.

"If I were to relate my experience, I would have to tell them again and again to just concentrate on doing the things they have to do to win," he said. "I would tell them to expect the pressure,

because it's going to be like no pressure they've ever felt before, and keep their minds on basketball.

"With this team, it's doubtful it'll be a problem. You have a lot of players who have been there before, even if they didn't get to play.

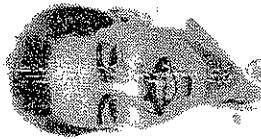
"I'm quite confident they can win. They're well-balanced, and they run the floor well and get out on the break. They'll have to do that against Oldham County because Oldham has the height."

Harrell isn't sure if he'll make another pregame speech, or if he even needs to.

On his spring break, he would like to see his old team play a few more times.

"I'm close with a lot of these guys," he said. "I'll be there rooting for them because a lot of them were there rooting for me."

The "Senior Night" streak remains intact for the Delta State Statesmen. The Statesmen won for the fifth straight year the seniors' last home game.

Monday night's victim was one other than 10th ranked and 7th South Conference leader Jackson State. Senior guard Matt Harrell fired in 21 points to go with Derrick Hunter's 23 as the Statesmen knocked off the high flying Gamecocks 92-88 here before 1,886 at Walter Sillers Coliseum.

"I wanted this one real bad," exclaimed Harrell afterwards. "We've been blowing games like this all year. The only thing bad about it is that this win puts MC (Mississippi College) back in first place."

Jacksonville State entered the contest with a 10-2 GSC mark, owning a one-game lead over Mississippi College. With the loss and

MC's 83-77 win over North Alabama in Clinton Monday, the GSC race is now deadlocked at 10-3.

DSU Head Coach Steve Rives didn't care about those matters just the matter about his team playing well. "I worry about Delta State period."

The key to the victory lay in the ability of the Statesmen to handle Jacksonville's full-court pressure. They did not handle it well in the first half allowing a 10-point spurt giving JSU a 47-42 lead at halftime. They did in the second half.

"We quit being conservative and we took it to the hole. So many times late we haven't hit our free throws, tonight we did. We kept playing and kept taking it to the bucket."

The Statesmen were also helped tremendously by having a healthy team for a change. Charlie Lowe returned after a five-game absence while freshmen Paul Davis and Ken Williamson had big efforts off

the bench.

"It's amazing what one guy can do in helping out your depth. Charlie can defend the post and that's something we haven't had in these last several games," added Rives.

"Paul Davis came in and played well while Ken Williamson allowed us to rest Todd (Kimble) and in effect gave us two point guards."

Williamson, a freshman from Columbia, was the catalyst in the Statesmen's retaking control of the game. His two-point bank shot with 11:13 left tied the game at 60-all.

More importantly, however, it got the crowd going along with restoring the freshman's shooting confidence. "The shot was there tonight. I was coming off the pick and it was open. My confidence came back to me," said Williamson.

A three-pointer a minute later handed DSU its first lead since 4:19 mark of the first half. He would later add another three-pointer giving him 11 second half points.

The Statesmen built a seven-point lead before JSU rallied to tie at 75-all behind the quick scoring of Robert Lee Sanders. Sanders would lead all scorers with 39 points.

Williamson's final three-pointer occurred with 3:47 left giving DSU a 78-77 lead. JSU would tie once more at 84-all before the Statesmen sealed it at the free throw line.

Hunter broke the last tie with a layup in transition. Harrell then converted a one-and-one for a four-point edge.

Hunter closed it out by sinking four straight free throws in the final 12 seconds. Sanders kept JSU in there until the end scoring the Gamecocks' last 10 points.

"I seen a lot of so-called All-Americans, but Sanders is a true All-American," said Harrell. "He gives you that pump fake and I'd be up in the air. He's a super player."

Collectively, the Statesmen were just as good on this evening sinking 65 percent of their shots in the second half. For the game, they finished 36 of 61 for 59 percent. They were 13 of 21 from the free throw line, yet they were nine of 11 in the second half.

Jacksonville, who also 25 points from Cliff Dixon, made 29 of 57 shots for 50.9 percent and were 28 of 35 from the free throw line.

The Statesmen, now 9-16 and 4-11 in GSC play, will take until Saturday off when they travel to Arkansas Pine Bluff. Jacksonville drops to 18-4 overall.
