Longtime ports official as called for 0-plus years

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
Billy T. Haynes has en officiating all types sports for so long that e jokes the first event he illed was a chariot race.

A world class storyller, Haynes hasn't been round long enough to ıdge Ben-Hur vs. Messala ut he does have 50-plus ears of basketball officiting to his credit. And he's till going strong.

Haynes, who refereed is first high school basetball game at South Hopins High School in 1961, till works about 50 games vear at the high school ind college level.

That works out to about hree games a week for the '3-year-old Haynes who ays he once officiated 70o-100 games a year during nis younger days.

And that's just the bascetball portion of Haynes' officiating resume. He remains a certified official in football, baseball, track and volleyball. He recently

An NCAA Division I basketball official for 16 years, he's still active in the college game working several area junior college and NAIA games. During the last decade, he has also refereed in the ABA semipro league

Still certified as a high

school football official, Haynes is the KHSAA's assigning secretary for the Second and Third Regions, overseeing officials for high school and middle school football games.

Being an administrator at South Middle School gave Peckenpaugh the chance to work with Haynes in a different capacity, "He wasn't too good to do a middle school game and he enjoyed it just as much," Peckenpaugh said. "My middle school kids got the same effort out of him as the kids playing for Kentucky Wesleyan or USI got. Whatever game he was officiating at that moment was the most important game he had ever officiated."

Aside from his passion for officiating, Haynes had an outstanding bowling career. The 1959 graduate of City High is the past president of the Kentucky State Bowling Association and is a member of the Hall of Fames of both the Kentucky State Bowling Association and the American **Bowling Congress.** 

Haynes averaged over 200 for 20 years and bowled three perfect games, including the last one at age 65. His bowling career also included a pair of 299 games and two 298s.
