

Dr. Doug Hines was the head coach of four high schools in Kentucky; he also coached four college teams and was the head coach of three, in addition he coached a professional team in Venezuela for four summers. The only time Coach Hines was an assistant coach was in 1960-1961 as an assistant coach to the Legendary Adolph Rupp at the University of Kentucky. He also played all his basketball in Kentucky. He played high school basketball at Science Hill High School in Pulaski County, then he moved on to Lindsey Wilson Junior College and finally to Eastern Kentucky University where he played for Coach Paul McBrayer. His career records and seasons are noted below.

Career Kentucky High School Record 376-199 in 575 games. He took Somerset to back to back state tournament appearances in the early 60's and took Union County to the state tournament in 1998 losing to the eventual state champion Scott County by eight. The Kentucky Association of Basketball Coaches named Coach Hines the Second Region Coach of the Year two straight seasons while at Union County. The Gym at Union County High is named in his honor, Dr. Douglas Hines Gymnasium.

Career Collegiate Record As Head Coach 429-266 in 695 games. Coach Hines was named the Kentucky Junior College Coach of the Year three times while at Lindsey Wilson he teams finished fourth and fifth in consecutive years in the National Tournament. At Mississippi College Coach Hines was named the Gulf South Coach of the Year in 1976 and 1977. Coach Hines has been inducted into the Lindsey Wilson Hall of Fame as well as the Bethel College Hall of Fame.

Career Professional Record 68-24.

Career record (including one season as the freshman coach at the University of Kentucky) 885-493 in 1378 games. Coach Hines coached basketball for 49 years one short of the 50-year goal he set and would have loved to achieve. He died of cancer at the age of 73 on July 18, 2002 at Deaconess Hospital in Evansville, IN. Even though he had amazing numbers when looking at win-loss records (he never had a losing record at a school he coached) Dr. Doug Hines measured success by the number of students and basketball players he instilled with a sense of pride and hard work to make their lives a success. Coach Hines was truly one of the greatest men

and basketball coaches of all time and is very deserving of being enshrined in the Dawahares Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame.
