

It is with great pleasure that I write a letter of support for Arthur "Ozz" Jackson's nomination to the Dawahare's/KHSAA Hall of Fame. I have known Ozz for over thirty years. For the first 24 years that I knew Ozz, ours was a relationship of sports fans, rivals and community members. Over the last six years, as I worked more closely with him through my son's involvement in sports, I gained a whole new appreciation for him not just as an athletic director, but as a man I consider one of my best friends.

Ozz's commitment to the youth of our county is immeasurable. Even before the consolidation of our schools, if Ozz saw a student athlete in whom he saw potential, he offered to help them in any way he could. As athletic director at Letcher County Central, regardless of the sport, the time of year or the weather, Ozz makes sure that those student athletes know they have his full support. That support is more than verbal; he attends games, matches, and meets to lend his encouragement to the participants.

As Athletic Director, Ozz leaves nothing to chance. He is in constant communication with the 13 head coaches of the sports Letcher Central fields. Each of those coaches knows that Ozz will do all he can to help them build successful programs. In 2007, Letcher Central hosted the Girls' Regional Basketball Tournament. The average sports fan attends an event and doesn't give much thought to what went into preparing for it. Only when you are close to the event or are involved do you see the work that goes into it. Who sees to parking arrangements, traffic control, ticket takers, chain gangs, announcers, the playing/singing of The Star Spangled Banner, a room for officials to change, refreshments for those officials at the half, places for visiting radio stations to set up and a myriad of other tasks? In Letcher County, it is Ozz Jackson. What we saw in Ozz's oversight of the 14<sup>th</sup> region is the standard of excellence he has set for every event at Letcher Central. I often tell people, they have no idea of how much work and effort Ozz puts into his job. He just makes it look easy.

I can't speak to what it was like to play for Ozz Jackson the coach, nor can I speak to what it is like to serve with him on the KHSAA Board of Control. What I do know is that Ozz Jackson is passionate about the student athlete and sports in Kentucky. As a member of the board, I know he weighs each decision carefully as to what is best for all concerned with an eye to the impact each decision may have on the future of sports. Think there's no one out there who really, really loves their job? Think again.

Letcher County Central's Athletic Director Arthur Jackson, known to all simply as "Ozz" considers himself to be one lucky guy. "I am thrilled to be here and I absolutely love what I do," says the region's authority on high school athletics.

To know just how Jackson came to earn his dream job, you have to go back to the 1960s when a young lab tech, who hailed from West Virginia was working in the Whitesburg Hospital and going to college at Southeast Community College at Cumberland.

'is basketball abilities were discovered by Calvary College who quickly wooed the young athlete to their nearby campus where Jackson continued to work, go to school and play college basketball.

A brief stint in California was followed by returning to Whitesburg where he went back to work at the Whitesburg hospital. where he met his wife, Sandy, who was also a hospital employee. While in Whitesburg, Jackson became involved in local sports, helping with the

program.

Whitesburg moved to Morehead where Jackson completed his aching degree while working at a hospital there.

In the early 1970s Jackson showed up in Jenkins where he had been assigned to do his student teaching, but this was soon to change. Jackson was visited by two Whitesburg coaches, the late Goebel Ritter and the late James Gose,

Whitesburg hospital jumped at the chance to be closer to his work that he would use to supplement his teaching salary for many years

Jackson said that in his first year of teaching he clearly remembers being paid \$5,200 by the school district. So, the \$10,000 he earned from the hospital for his weekend work in the lab

was needed to support his growing family. Still, the lure of coaching and the love of working with young people kept him in the classroom.

Before long, Jackson's love of the game of basketball translated to winning teams for Whitesburg High School, where he had finally found a permanent home. Throughout the 70s, Jackson's boys basketball teams were a force to be reckoned with. From 1976 through 1979, the Yellowjacket team was led by a talented group that became known throughout the 53rd district and 14th region collectively as "The Jackson Five."

This Jackson Five was known for its "string music" as the quick hands of Greg Thomas, Jeff Gose, Bill Witt, Greg Creech and Keith Combs eagerly guided the basketball to the net despite the best efforts of their opponents. Their appearance in the state's Sweet 16 was foiled by a talented Hazard team in the 14th Region Finals but not before the Yellowjackets upset heavily favored Lee County and M.C. Napier.


Though Jackson was known as the head basketball coach for Whitesburg, he also assisted legendary Coach James Gose with the Yellowjacket football profor 15 years and served as the coach at one time or another for school's golf, track and baseball team "I have always thought that as manufactors," he said. 

Jackson points to the growth of girls athletics as a source of pride for himself and the region.



"In Letcher County, we have always made sure that our girls teams went first class all the way and that is evident by their success in basketball and volleyball."

He said that he looks forward to the future of both girls and boys athletics at LCC are new school gains recognition and completes facilities that will enhance the athletes' as for practice in track and field, softball, baseball and tennis. There are even plans for a putting green on the school campus so that golfers can utilize free time to perfect that portion of their game without traveling to the course which is a twenty minute drive.

"We offer everything at LCC that we can," Jackson said. "And I encourage students to participate in as many athletic programs as they can."



Jackson said that the support of the school's major sports is truly phenomenal, making away games an easy sell to schools looking to boost their gate receipts. "I always tell a school when we're working on getting on their schedule that our fans love to travel and they will be there."

In addition to setting schedules for the boys and girls athletic teams LCC now fields, Jackson takes care of the seemingly mountains of paperwork that is required to qualify the hundreds of athletes for competition. This includes medical records, eligibility requirements and weekly grade checks to keep the school in compliance with the many state and federal requirements for high school athletics. But you won't hear Jackson complain. Instead, he meticulously logs each and every form into its proper notebook which he maintains in his office.

With the help of coaches, painstaking paper work completed by Jackson relieves coaches of that burdensome

"Although it takes everyone involved to keep our athletics running, ultimately, it's the coaches who have the responsibility to mold their teams," he says. This, too, has been proven through success at LCC which has added three regional volleyball, one regional girls basketball, a regional football and regional baseball championships to its trophy case already in the three short years of its existence.


"I see nothing but good things in the future for our school," Jackson says. "We have facilities that are second to none in the state and our kids will benefit from that."

History will made, once again, at LCC this week as the county will host its very first 14th Region Boys' Basketball Tournament.


