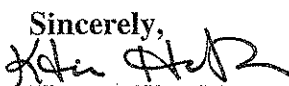

To whom it may concern:

I am writing on behalf of James Drake McCarthy to be considered for the Kentucky Softball Coaches Hall of Fame. Drake is much deserving for this award for many reasons.

Drake built the program from scratch around 1981. Drake literally built the field that the Lady Chargers now play. He spent countless hours on the field making sure that it would be one of the area's finest playing fields. He wanted his fields to be in immaculate condition when his teams played on the field. I can recall when Drake used a push broom on the field to make sure there were no pebbles on the field. He most definitely would go the extra mile for his players and his program. When the school could not afford a lawn tractor to drag the field, Drake would use his own vehicle to drag the field. In fact, his transmission went out on him one evening while dragging the field.

As far as coaching, Drake's teams won 7 regional titles. I believe his team finished state runner-up 3 times in '91, '92, and '93.

I was the baseball coach at Bullitt East the same time that he was coaching. His style and dedication to the school motivated me to emulate him. He ate, slept, and breathed Lady Charger Softball. I am sure his players would all rally for him, as he is deserving of this award.

Drake retired from coaching in 1993. The state added fast pitch softball and Drake did not feel comfortable coaching fast pitch. I really believe if slow pitch was still offered that he would not have retired.

There is one situation that I need to tell you about. I hope that it does not keep him from being selected to the Hall of Fame. A student at Bullitt East accused Drake of sexual abuse in 1995. I attended the trial for the 1 ½ days. He was acquitted of the charge. Drake was not rehired by the Bullitt County School System but was hired by the Christian County Public Schools and worked for CCPS for 4-5 years until he recently retired from teaching.

Since I am now an athletic director at North Bullitt High School and a member of the Metro Louisville Athletic Director's Hall of Fame selection committee, I would always like to have all information on the candidates. I do feel that Drake was wrongly accused and that he deserves to be in the Hall.

In summary, there could not be another coach in Drake's era that was more committed and dedicated to his team and program than Drake. Building the team from scratch, building the facility practically by himself, and establishing the Lady Chargers into a perennial state power are reasons enough to place him into the Hall of Fame.

To the Members of the Selection Committee,

I am writing on behalf of Mr. Drake McCarthy, a role model of mine, and a candidate for the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame. Mr. McCarthy, or "Coach" as I fondly know him, is an exemplary human being, and I am pleased to write this letter of support on his behalf.

I attended Bullitt East High School from the fall of 1989 to the spring of 1993. I played Varsity softball each year, and was even offered the opportunity to play in a few varsity games my 8th grade year while attending Mt. Washington Middle School. When I was in high school, softball was a huge priority in my life, and I spent many hours preparing for BE's championship seasons. Since my father had previously been a baseball coach at Bullitt Central, and had been teaching me ball since I could walk, I was a strong player when I reached high school. I was a first baseman with a strong arm and a powerful bat. Coach McCarthy saw straight through my overconfidence however, and when I was in the 10th grade, he began to start me at the catcher's position. I was livid! I couldn't believe he had the nerve to put me in a position that I had no knowledge of, and expected me to excel at it. That was probably one of the best things that Drake McCarthy could have done for me. Becky McKinley, future Kentucky Miss Basketball, was the starting first baseman. With me behind the plate, All-Star Kristin Reynolds on shortstop, and Becky at first, we now had a powerful triangle of defense. Not only that, I figured out very quickly how to turn a bad situation into a good one, and as a result, during my Senior season, I was elected to the All State team. Being taken out of my comfort zone was scary at first, but I learned how to adapt, and eventually thrive in uncomfortable situations. I have taken that very lesson into my adult life.

While playing softball at Bullitt East, I was part of a family. We were taught that, in order to reach our goals, determination and dedication were essential ingredients and that there is no "I" in team. We were taught accountability and responsibility, and each of us were appreciated for what we brought to the team. I will forever remember the lessons that Drake McCarthy taught me.

I am currently a science teacher at Central High School in Louisville, Kentucky. I have completed my Master's Degree and Rank I in Educational Leadership and will become a Principal Intern at Doss High School in January. I hope to secure an Assistant Principalship within the next year in the Jefferson County Public School System. I also plan to work on my Ph.D. and Superintendent Certification in the near future. Many of the skills that I need to be successful in these positions were obtained within the time period that Drake McCarthy was a dynamic influence in my life.

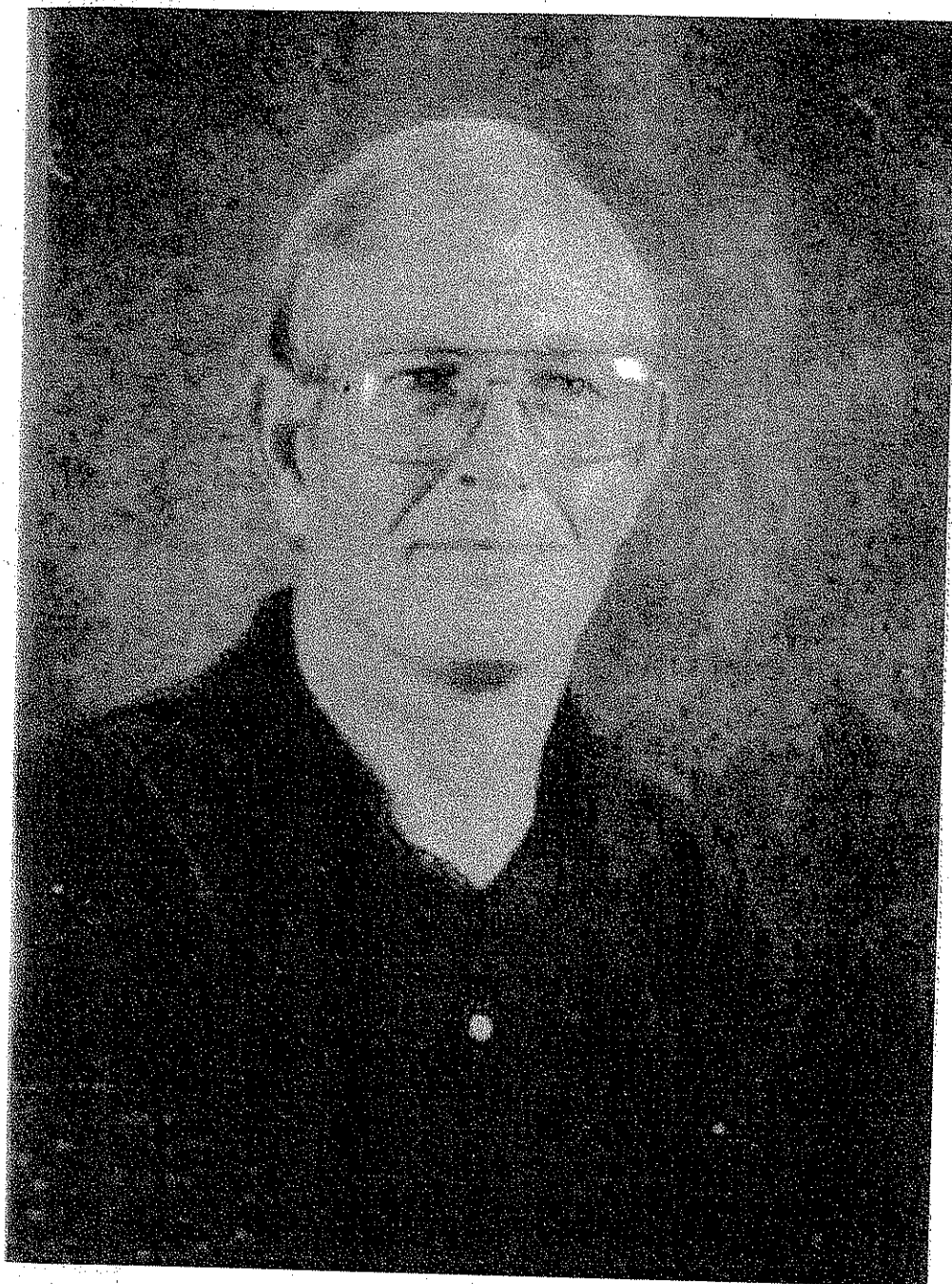

MOUNT WASHINGTON — The numbers don't lie. In 12 years at the helm, Bullitt East softball coach Drake McCarthy was the most suc-

cessful coach in county history.

The years of building the Lady Chargers into one of the state's top programs came to an end recently when McCarthy announced his resignation. He had talked about it often over the past several seasons but finally put it in writing at the end of this year.

(McCarthy also resigned the boys' golf coaching position he has held for the past two seasons.)

The program's post-season success said it all.

Over the past nine seasons, the red and gold have competed in every regional softball tournament.

Since the 1985 season, Bullitt East has won seven of the nine regional crowns up for grabs. In one of the two years that the team did not win the regional, 1988, the Lady Chargers lost in the regional final to eventual state champion North Bullitt.

After tasting some success at the state tournament in 1985 with a third-place finish, the program broke through in 1991 with a state runner-up finish. Incredibly, the team reached the final each of the next two seasons, only to lose in the championship game each time. Two of the three losses in the final game were by a single run.

There was also a .714 winning percentage over 12 years.

With success, though, came certain pressures. In recent seasons, McCarthy has gone through periods of sleepless nights and times when he could not eat. It even got to the point where he didn't want to play ball with his 3-year-old son when he did get home.

"I am proud of my accomplishments," McCarthy said last week. "I would like to win every game and win a state title but we did well. I'm proud of the facilities. That impresses a lot of teams when they come in and see what we have.

"But, I was putting too much pressure on myself," he added. "I couldn't sleep. When that happens, it's time to get out. It's just a game."

Being the father to 3-year-old Matthew has changed some of McCarthy's goals in life. There is now a greater need to spend time at home.

"I have a son and I need to be there," the coach said. "I'll be with him. You have to be a father. Before we (with wife Vickie) had a child, the softball players were like my children. When they cried, I cried."

McCarthy is the first coach in Bullitt County history to retire and have fans wonder if he was disappointed in not winning a state championship.

"I always wanted to win it all," he said. "I can stick around 20 more years and never win it all. Or, maybe one or two more years and I would have won it. I'm still pleased with what we accomplished."

Unlike all but a handful of programs in the state, Bullitt East's top goal each season was more than winning the district tournament. Each bit of winning raised those levels.

"I think after a point, with the state runners-up and getting to state, that your goals and expectations go higher," McCarthy explained. "When you have been second, you don't want to fall below what the team did the year before. Every since 1985, my expectations have been to win the regional."

In the beginning

It wasn't always that way. Before 1982 there was no softball at Bullitt East. North Bullitt had a team at the club level under the direction of Bob Wagoner (soon to be taken over by

Clyde Muncy). There was no state tournament for the teams.

McCarthy smiles now as he thinks back to that first season. There was only one senior (Deidre Maloyed, the older sister of present BE shortstop Missy Maloyed) and the uniforms were handed down from the basketball program and they had no numbers.

That first season, the home games began at Mount Washington Middle School until the team was run out of that area. The season ended with the games being played on the baseball field. A year later, McCarthy had worked the field at the middle school into condition for an entire season.

McCarthy chuckles now when he points out that his replacement will have \$4,000-\$5,000 in the bank.

"We didn't even know what that kind of money looked like," he laughed.

Work began in 1985 on the field

behind the school. It is now one of, if not the best, high school field in the state. That first season, one game was played before McCarthy discovered that underground springs would ruin that season.

Still, the upward spiral continued on the field as the program won its first regional crown with a group of seniors that had started in 1982 with the program. That group included Andrea Brewer, Stacy Morgan, Debbie Mills, Jodi Hicks and Kara Calvert.

"That group in '85, they were the babies of the program," McCarthy recalled. "They started the program. It all started with them."

At roughly the same time that Bullitt East started its incredible run, the Mount Washington Youth Baseball and Softball program began putting more and more emphasis on softball. That program has been feeding the Lady Chargers' program since, although a number of players continue to be developed out of the traveling teams in Louisville.

Success blossoms

The hurdle at the state tournament championship game was cleared in 1991 fueled by the All-State play of shortstop Kristin Reynolds and catcher Julie Feedback.

"They were all special," McCarthy said of the players. "Two that will always come to mind, along with those first five are Kristin Reynolds and Julie Feedback. They were all special, but those two were just...."

"Julie was very talented. Kristin,

she just worked so hard," the coach said. "I never saw a player work so hard. She wore me out before a game or after practice hitting ground balls to her."

The coach has also been blessed with strong assistant coaches. He did it all himself the first few seasons. Since that time, his only assistants have been Glenn Tyler and Jeff Richardson.

McCarthy does not leave at a time when the talent pool has run dry. Quite the contrary, the best may lie ahead for the program.

"You know what I have coming back. The cupboard isn't bare. Far from it," he pointed out. "We finished up the state tournament with five freshmen on the field. All of the seniors we lose (four), we have people who have stepped in and played. The cupboard is far from bare."

The one number that does not add up for McCarthy is his record in 29th District championship games. While the program has been to every regional tournament since 1985, only in 1985 and 1987 did it go as champions.

The graduating seniors in the program this year played in three state championship games, won five consecutive regional crowns, but will leave without a single 29th District championship crown.

"I don't know what it is," he said with a big grin. "I haven't figured it out. I'll never figure it out. I just look at the years I went to state. That's seven of the last nine."

That is a good number to look at.
