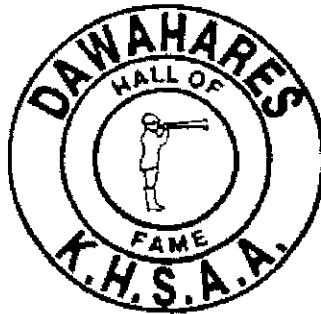

He earned All-OVC and Honorable Mention All-American honors in 1958 and 1959. During his sophomore year he was the leading rebounder for the 1958 season. Dale was named Most Valuable Player for the All OVC team as the best forward in the conference in 1959. He also played on the University of the Track Team for one year and lettered.
