There are countless FCHS graduates around the country who owe who they are today, in part at least, to Coach P's mentoring and success as a role model. They are serving in the military, teaching, building homes and skyscrapers, and working for the government Some are even captains of industry. But no matter what these former Falcons do for a living, all are making a difference when it comes to making this world a better place.
Many are at the very top of their professions like Maj. Gen. Jeff Jacobs, commander of the Army's Civil Affairs & Psychological Operations Command (Airborne) at Fort Bragg, N.C. At 55, Jeff is still jumping out of airplanes. If my memory serves me correct, it was Coach P all those years ago who helped Jeff meet the physical fitness requirements that allowed him entry into West Point.
Dave Blackwell, the dean of the University of Kentucky's College of Business & Eonomics, was another Marshall Patterson success as were Ed Overcash, a former Naval "Top Gun" aviator and current pilot for Delta Airlines, and Mike Cassity, who has been a college football coach at the University of Kentucky and several other major universities for more than 35 years.
Coach P often lectured his players that the game of football was just like lifeYou always had to leave everything on the field and never give upI'll never forget the day in August 1974 when the Watergate scandal forced President Richard Nixon to resign the presidencyCoach P called the team together in a huddle before practice. He wanted everyone to understand what a sad day it was in America, while still reinforcing the important lesson that there is no gray area when it comes to right and wrong.
Over the course of his career at FCHS, Coach P won a state wrestling championship and took his football team to four state championship games, winning three of them in 1976, 1978 and 1979. Those were the days before everyone, including teams with losing records, automatically made the state playoffs every year, and average athletes got trophies or honors just for showing up for a sport. Upon his retirement, Coach P ranked No. 14 in wins among Kentucky high school football coaches.
As the school's athletic director, Coach P also oversaw the development of the girls sports program at FCHS, which resulted in several other state championships.
His accomplishments are even more amazing if you consider he spent nearly his entire career as a coach on an Army post. Because of the transient nature of the military, Coach P had to rebuild his teams from scratch during most, if not all, of his years of coachingAnd, despite this incredible handicap, he still managed to produce winning teams year after year.
In October 2012, FCHS graduates from the 1960s and 1970s gathered to celebrate the 50-year anniversary of the founding of Fort Campbell High School. Coach P was the first football coach at the school, so a lot of time was spent by some old and greying men, reliving our glory days on the football field.
It was at this reunion that many of us were stunned to learn that our great coach had not yet been inducted into the Kentucky High School Athletic Association's Hall of Fame. For whatever reason, Marshall Patterson is not among those legendary Kentucky sports icons who have been forever honored in the Hall since the induction of the inaugural class way back in 1988.
Coach P is now in the sunset of his life, plauged the past few years by serious health problems that have kept him at home. He was unable to make it to the recent reunion to see the many members of Falcon Nation who still love him. I'm sure it broke his heart. But, for those of us so influenced by this great man, the bigger heart-break belongs to us as we try to make sense out of this great travesty. How is it even possible for there to be a KHSAA Hall of Fame, when Marshall Patterson isn't in it?

As a Kentucky native and former KHSAA athlete at Christian County High School from 1987-1991, I have long been proud of the KHSAA and the athletic competition in the Commonwealth. I participated in football, track, power lifting, and wrestling throughout my high school career.

It was through football that I would come to know Coach Patterson. Granted, I never got to know Coach Patterson well. I did get to know his teams well as we competed against them frequently during summer scrimmages. His teams were always tough, fast, and disciplined. They never beat themselves with penalties or foolishness.

It'd be easy to dismiss Coach Patterson's impact because he coached at Fort Campbell. We want to assume that this provided him with some sense of utopian school. It's actually quite the contrary. Coach Patterson had to essentially rebuild his team every year as he'd lose players because of troop movement and duty assignments.

Yet, the Falcons continued to win and win big. Over the course of his career at FCHS, Coach Patterson won a state wrestling championship and took his football team to four state championship games, winning three of them in 1976, 1978 and 1979. Upon his retirement, Coach Patterson ranked No. 14 in wins among Kentucky high school football coaches.

I respect the KHSAA and the Hall of Fame selection process. I urge the KHSAA to honor Coach Marshall Patterson with induction into the KHSAA Hall of Fame. He's in his twilight years and time is of the essence.

As a proud Christian County Colonel, it only seems fitting that Coach Marshall Patterson should enter heaven as a Hall of Fame Coach and be able to shake the hand of his good friend and recent Hall of Fame Inductee, Coach Jim Perrin.

I am writing this letter of recommendation for Mr. Marshall Patterson, Fort Campbell High School, Fort Campbell, Kentucky, to be nominated for the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame. Over the course of his 32 years at Fort Campbell High School, the accomplishments that he achieved deserve him to be in the Hall of Fame. In those years he won three (3) football State Championships, 1976-78-79, , was named Coach of the Year three times, and had a 1982 team ranked #17 in the nation by USA Today. Upon his retirement in 1995, Marshall Patterson had accumulated a record of 227-120 (.652) that ranked him the 17th winningest football coach (now #24) in Kentucky high school football. While coaching football he started the wrestling program and served as wrestling coach for 17 years and won a State Championship in 1971 and Runner-ups in 1970 and 1978. During those years he had numerous individual State Champions.

While coaching he had the double duty of Athletic Director. During that time he accumulated 27 team State Championships and in those championships he oversaw the development of the girls' sports program, especially the track program.

For 33 years he was the sponsor of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

His accomplishments were even more amazing when you consider he spent his entire career as a coach on a military base. Because of the nature of the military, Marshall Patterson had to rebuild his teams from scratch for most of his coaching years. I can attest to that. I first met Marshall Patterson in the school year 1960-61 (8th Grade) when he took the job of head football coach/P.E teacher at Fort Campbell Junior High School. I was the starting quarterback for him and for the next two years we had a record of 13-1. We were looking forward to the opening of the new high school in 1962 with a good nucleus for a good football team. When school started only eight (8) of the 35 that were to return were there. So the building process began again.

Before regulations were changed, dependents weren't allowed to stay on post when their fathers received orders for overseas. With new regulations things changed and dependents were allowed to stay on post. Many of the student athletes (after my time leaving) had fathers that were away from home for a period of time. When the fathers couldn't be there for them, Marshall Patterson became a surrogate father to them. He would guide their lives in the right direction and made a difference. There are countless FCHS students/alumni around the country who owe what they have become, in part, to Marshall Patterson's mentoring and success as a role model. While under his tutelage (teacher/coach) I learned so much about life through sports. He would lecture us that the game of football was just like life...you always had to leave everything on the field and never give up. Throughout my life I have applied what he had taught me.

I conclude that Marshall Patterson is a winner to all that know him and deserves to be in the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame. To many whose lives were molded by him and the accomplishments that he achieved, the Hall of Fame would be the ultimate reward to a great man. His induction would be the final touch to a great career for this institution, Fort Campbell High School.

Dear Selection Committee:

I am honored to nominate my former coach at Ft. Campbell High School, Coach Marshal Patterson (Coach P), for selection into the Kentucky Coaches Hall of Fame. It is with a sad heart that as I write this letter, Coach Patterson is suffering from Alzheimer's, and should he be selected, will likely not be able to appreciate and enjoy this honor he so richly deserves. That said there are literally thousands of people, to include former students, players, educators, and even opposing coaches who feel strongly that Coach Patterson's selection for this tribute is long overdue.

Many of these people will not take the time to send letters of recommendation. Unlike the vast majority of coaches whose names you will consider, due to the significant turnover in population at Ft. Campbell High School, most of those who would support Coach Patterson's induction, live all over the world. They are unaware of this effort, and in truth, most would imagine, as I did, that he was selected for induction many years ago. A significant number of those who were his contemporaries in teaching and in coaching that would provide strong endorsements, to include several of his assistants, have passed away or are ill. I sincerely hope that you will take these circumstances into consideration when evaluating his nomination.

In the letters you receive, I expect people to discuss Coach Patterson's influence on them directly. Although I intend to do this as well, I think there are many other aspects of his record that should be considered.

During the earlier portions of Coach Patterson's career, particularly the 1960's and early 1970's, the high school population at Ft. Campbell was highly transient due to the Vietnam War. Most coaches are concerned about replacing seniors when they graduate or players who are injured, but Coach Patterson not only had those issues, he also had to deal with many of his players leaving in mid-season due to their parents being transferred by the Army. It was not uncommon for a star player to be on the football field or the wrestling mat for the Falcons one week, and be in Washington, Germany, or Japan the next week.

As with most coaches, and I have been one, often it is necessary to take on the role of a parent. This was especially true with Coach Patterson as many of his players had fathers and mothers who were overseas fighting for and defending the United States. In these cases, Coach Patterson frequently assisted not only the student/player, but also the family in coping with the separation. Unfortunately, there were all too many times over his career that Coach Patterson also had to deal with students/players whose parents were killed overseas. These became trying times, not only for the individual involved, but also for the team, the school, and the entire Ft. Campbell community. Coach Patterson was one of the key elements that helped bind these groups together during these difficult times.

In today's world, the internet can often be an impartial path to discover the impact a person has had on their community. I did a simple search for "Marshal Patterson," and although I have not had contact with him in many years (I played for him in 1968 and 1969), the results were exactly what I expected. Not only were there numerous newspaper headlines lauding his achievements, but also several comparing the success of others to Coach Patterson.

"Berner tops Patterson numbers," a headline referring to recent Ft. Campbell Coach Shawn Berner and a mark he achieved in 2009.

On one site that allowed individuals to make comments, I found the following:

"He was Ft. Campbell High School. He mentored and taught multiple generations of students who have achieved more because he provided us with a framework to build upon. He was a second father to his teams."

However, one article concerning Coach Patterson's selection as Kentucky Coach of the Year in 1982 (he was selected 3 times during his career) included this statement from Coach P.

"You don't make players, the only thing coaches do is help the players become what they want to be."

How does a 135 pound kid who never played organized football become your starting center?

In August of 1968, I arrived with my family at Ft. Campbell, and I wanted to be a football player. I was a sophomore, and although I had never played organized football, I thought I was a pretty good athlete and decided to join the team. It was a typical hot, humid day in Kentucky when I went out for my first practice as a "receiver," and it was almost my last day. I was overwhelmed by everything that was expected (they had been practicing 3 weeks already), and the weather did not help. To make things worse, the receivers/ends practiced most of the day with the linemen and at 135 pounds, I was one of the smallest. My father encouraged me to stick with it, but after 5 weeks of the season we were 0-5, and I had only been in on two plays in a junior varsity game...on defense.

Coach P was my physical education teacher and since he was also my football coach, I wanted to impress him in class. One day in class, we were learning "football fundamentals," including passing the ball, good stances, and long punt snaps. With just a little instruction, I quickly was able to perfectly hike the football to the punter nearly every time. Coach Patterson came over to me and said "David, at practice today I want you to start working out with the offensive linemen as a center." I was "4th-string" center, the junior varsity season was over, and I obviously was not going to play on Saturdays. Three weeks later, after both the 2nd and 3rd-string centers had been injured in practice; the starting center got hurt (leg broken) in the first half of the next to last game

of the year. Beginning the second half of that game, I was the starting center and played 11 more games for Coach P at that position. Prior to my senior year, my father was transferred; however, I became the starting center at 150 pounds for a school easily seven or eight times as big as Ft. Campbell.

I apologize if I bored you with this story, but my life changed that day in Coach P's physical education class. The confidence he showed in me over the next year has stayed with me throughout my life. I am a 1975 graduate of West Point, airborne qualified, and 30+ year teacher and coach. There are other people to whom I could attribute my successes and they certainly contributed; however, Coach Patterson truly instilled in me the qualities, both mental and physical, that have taken me through my life.

Approximately ten years ago, after having no contact with my school, my classmates, or my coach for over 30 years, I was fortunate to attend a high school reunion at Ft. Campbell. I cannot express to you how I felt seeing many old friends who had shared with me my two short years at the school. However, on the Friday night when we attended the football game and Coach P was in the stands with us, I have rarely had the exhilaration as I did when I shook his hand. He did not remember the 150 pound center from the 1969 season; I did not expect him to; he had coached hundreds if not thousands of others just like me during those interim years. To Coach P, I was "one of his boys" and to this day, I am both happy and proud of that honor.

This year you will look at many nominees to be considered for induction into the Kentucky Coaches Hall of Fame. Although these recommendations are certainly important, it is the impact a coach has had on his players, his school, his community, and the Kentucky football program that is crucial. During the selection process, Coach Patterson's name will come up, and you will ask "Should we vote for this man?" Maybe the question you should ask is "What took us so long to realize Coach Marshall Patterson is so deserving of this recognition?" Due to his illness, Coach P will not know that you voted for him and in all likelihood will not realize the significance of the tribute, however, there are thousands of people whose lives he impacted that will be appreciative and gratified.

Thank you for your time and consideration. I cannot think of a more qualified individual for this honor than Coach P.

Congratulations on selecting an outstanding 2014 Dawahares/KHSAA Hall of Fame class, but this prestigious group continues to be short one deserving member: former Fort Campbell High School football coach, Marshall Patterson (Coach P). I understand you already have a formal nomination on file along with several letters of recommendation supporting Coach P's induction, so I don't need to restate the statistical accomplishments (227 wins, three state championships) or the fact that he built a football powerhouse from scratch despite the ongoing musical chairs of players created by regular military reassignments and deployments. On paper alone, Coach P is worthy of being in the Dawahares/KHSAA Hall of Fame, but his biggest mark was mentoring thousands of students–not just student athletes–at Fort Campbell High School for more than three decades.

While I don't discount the impact or value of other coaches as mentors to their athletes, Coach P took that responsibility and commitment to another level. He literally did serve as a father figure to me and many others for months and even years at a time while our fathers were stationed overseas or supporting a military conflict. Beyond making sure we were staying out of trouble, Coach P challenged us to excel in the classroom and on the field while helping our mothers maintain a household in our fathers' absence. Personally, I played quarterback for Coach P from 1989-1991, a significant portion of which my father was in the Middle East fighting the Gulf War. We didn't win any state championships, but did win a lot of games and I have a lifetime of memories. Without question, I would've preferred my father to be there at time, but the next best thing was having Coach P provide direction and encouragement that helped shape the man I am today. It was a bonus that he transformed a 5'9", 160-pound marginal athlete into a scholarship college football player.

There are countless other stories like mine from fellow Fort Campbell High School alumni that further exemplify Coach P's selfless character. While each story is unique, they all share a common thread of caring and compassion. Coach P racked up wins and state championships in unusually challenging circumstances, and happened to change lives in the process. How is that not worthy of a place in the Dawahares/KHSAA Hall of Fame? On behalf of all past, current and future Fort Campbell High School students and their families, I implore you to induct Coach Marshall Patterson in the next Dawahares/KHSAA Hall of Fame class. Thanks for considering my recommendation.

Personally Coach Patterson inspired me to better myself. I was one of the weakest players on the team my sophomore year. My senior year I broke the school records for bench press and military press. Unfortunately, I did not play a regular season game and could not wrestle my senior year.

I wonder how many more State Championships Coach Patterson would have got if even half his players would make it to their senior year. I am pretty certain it would be even more substantial than his record is now.

The respect and dedication I learned from him helped me become a Nuclear Biological Chemical Officer in the US Army and now a Health Physicist(Nuclear Safety).

Please consider Coach Patterson for this nomination. Coach Patterson also has distinct disadvantage in this nomination in that most people have moved away from Fort Campbell and do not know that now he suffers from Alzeimers. His winning ways are hard to imagine despite the turnover of students who constantly rotated in and out of the installation. He had to compete against feeder systems available to other coaches in more stable conventional home town environments, yet he produced winning teams year after year.

Marshall Patterson is a gentleman in every respect. He did everything proper and by the book while treating his students of the game with the utmost dignity.

I spent my last seven years at Fort Campbell and both my children graduated at Fort Campbell HS, each lettering in several sports. I was the Booster Club President for two years and had an up close experience with Coach Patterson. I was also the Garrison Commander responsible for the installation schools. I was a witness to how he represented the high school and the Fort Campbell community every day. He is a most deserving candidate, please induct him this year.

I was a high school wrestler for Coach Patterson in both 1971 and 1972. I loved wrestling and though I was competitive and always gave the varsity guys my best shot, I just couldn't crack the starting lineup. Let me tell you about a creative way Coach Patterson dreamed up to give all of us JV guys a chance to earn a varsity letter, and to stay fully committed to be the best we could be, whether it was pushing the heck out of the varsity guy, or being prepared for our fifteen minutes of fame in case our first team guy was injured.

He would form two FCHS teams, alternating a varsity and JV wrestler, and each team would wrestle two local teams back-to-back at our gym. He called them "double-dual" wrestling meets. Through this format, I obtained a varsity letter by beating varsity guys wrestling for Christian and Caldwell Counties (I'll never forget the teams, believe me), and he did this more than once over a period of years before costs and injury concerns eliminated his dual meets. Few coaches have the creativity to do something like that, to get all the JV guys to push, and to strengthen the team two or three places deep at every weight class. That varsity letter, earned on a Kentucky state championship team, is still very special today.

Some twenty years later, the letter jacket I wore with pride for so many years started to mysteriously shrink, I'm sure it wasn't me, and I called Coach Patterson, engaged in small talk hoping he might remember me, and asked if I could buy a current model of the FCHS letter jacket as a replacement. He replied that he would be happy to order one for me, and without skipping a beat asked if he could include the wrestling and golf icons on the jacket. I was surprised he would remember my varsity sports after all these years, but Coach Patterson always invested himself in all of his athletes and P.E. students so I shouldn't have been surprised at all.

I'm certain you have all the documents and other records to support his coaching chops, but I wanted to add a personal note. Please give him the full Hall consideration he deserves.



To Whom makes the decisions:

It was brought to my attention that there is a current campaign to get the Kentucky High School Athletic Association to induct Coach Marshall " Coach P" Patterson into the Hall of Fame.

As an alumni of Fort Campbell High, Class of 1981 and a member of the State Champion football teams of 1978, 1979 and State runners up 1980, in my opinion this honor is long overdue.

Not that winning games or leading a team to the State Championship game in two different divisions in back to back years should be a requirement for this honor, but I believe Coach P ended his career with a 227-120 record. And please don't overlook the fact that unlike most other high school coaches, Marshall Patterson started every year with basically a new crop of players. Coaching for a DOD school on a military installation presented some unique challenges to say the least. With every transfer in and out of Ft. Campbell some of the talent that Coach P cultivated the year before moved to a different team, in a different state or country. What is an amazing tribute to his talent as a coach was that during the spring and summer leading up to the football season Coach P was not only adept at assessing the talent that he had on hand, but he was very skillful in finding ways to solidify this group of individuals into a team. Again not only a team, but a team that competed evenly against teams that for the most part have known each other all twelve years of their schooling, but also to excel and win championships against some of the powerhouses in Kentucky High School football.

While this event would be to recognize Coach Patterson for an athletic association honor, Coach P was and in many ways still is more that a football coach. Speaking from my personal experience the football field was just the classroom Mr. Patterson used to teach us life's intangible lessons like, integrity, stick-to-it-edness, brotherhood and the visible and not so visible rewards of hard work. Mr. Patterson has influenced my decisions far beyond the football gridiron. One question he asked us, "Do you stop at a stop sign in the middle of the night when you are the only one on the street?" This wasn't a Driver's Ed question as many of us "may" have had only our learner's permit...it was an integrity question. What he really was asking was "Will you do the right thing even when no one is there to watch you?" I hear Coach P challenging me to do the hard right thing even today. Not only has this lesson lasted me and influenced my choices, but I used this as a teaching point when mentoring my Soldiers. Also I have tried to instill this life lesson in my sons. This is just one of the many lessons Mr. Patterson taught me, not only through words but actions, that have lived on in my life and I am sure is multiplied in many of the young men and women who passed through his sphere of influence.

Beyond question Marshall Patterson has made extraordinary contributions and has had superb accomplishments in Kentucky high school sports. He is worthy of statewide recognition and set an example that others still strive to emulate.

I am one of the very few who can recommend Coach Patterson from the perspective of a player and football referee. You know I have been a licensed KHSAA High School official since 1969 (44years) and a player at Hopkinsville High School 1965-1969 which included state championship. During my High school days I recall that Coach Patterson and Fleming Thornton(already in the Hall of Fame) were close friend yet both were very competitive. The one virtue both of these great coaches had besides the desire to win was building character in young men. I also worked as a baseball umpire with Eldridge Rogers for 22 years and interacted with Coach Patterson as the Athletic Director where every detail was in place down to food, towels and hot showers if desired.

Coach Patterson no doubt was a great winning coach, evidenced by his 227 wins in football and 27 state championships in various sports while also serving as Athletic Director at the school for 33 years. He was the epitome of what a coach should be in his coaching, mentoring of players and treatment of game officials. We certainly could use people of his character today in all of our high school sports. Besides his outstanding record do you realize that this was achieved at a high school on a military post?

Besides my career running newspapers I also do work as the Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army. In this position I understand better than most just how incredible his accomplishments were. His coaching career was at a time when the Army never let a soldier stay at one post more than two or three years, which meant he never had the time to build a steady stream of players he could count on. He had to play and win with whatever families lived on the post (only 4400 houses on post) as military who lived off post were not eligible to attend on post schools.

There have been many legendary football coaches from Western Kentucky to include Fleming Thornton, Ken Barrett, Joe Jagger, Jack Morris, Fred Clayton and Al Giordano to name a few. I do not know why Coach Patterson is not already in this elite group, but it is time that Marshall Patterson join the ranks of these others. Time gone by can be a terrible thing as people who have done great things get lost on younger decision makers who never knew of them.

I would hope that my many years of having witnessed his contributions would help secure his rightful place among this group. If I can be of any assistance to the selection committee, feel free to contact me at any time.



I am writing this letter to endorse the 'Hall of Fame' nomination of Coach Patterson, or Coach 'P', as most of us former athletes have affectionately and commonly referred to him. I first had the pleasure of becoming acquainted with Coach 'P' in late August 1967, at the being of my 7th grade year in the first high school located at Fort Campbell, KY. There are only two high schools in these United States of America, located on an active military installation. I was impressed with my physical education (PE) teachers deep set eyes, hauntingly observing my every exercise or movement during PE class. He was tough, but fair. I do not believe I acted, felt, nor looked like the athletic type. It was not until the next school year in 8th grade, that I first began to wrestle. Wrestling, undoubtedly was the toughest thing I ever physically did . . . and I had it tough, as my Dad was an 'old school' guy with WWII, Korea and 3-tours of Vietnam already under his belt by August of '68. He made us do everything by hand, such as, edge the sidewalk, mow the lawn with a reel mower, and so on.

When I joined the wrestling team that November of '68, I had no idea what I was in store. What impressed me most about Coach 'P', was that I never heard him raise his voice in anger, never use profanity, nor ever through his arms of hands in the air and give up. And, most importantly, he never ever, and I mean never argued with a wrestling official, and football, for that matter, as he was most courteous. This may sound unusual, but I personally have officiated wrestling since I graduated high school in 1972, and I have never seen another coach as cool and calm and collected as Coach 'P'. He always had a suit, tie and street shoes during any dual meet and tournament. He just had that ability to command respect without demanding such. I was eighth string back then, yea # 8, out of 8 people in my weight class. I went to a military school in 9th grade, but I was back at FCHS in 10th grade. Coach 'P' was the same guy—cool, calm and collected, but this time I was the varsity 130 pounder.

I quit at the end of the wrestling season in 8th grade, but I felt guilty for doing so, but I was not going to let Coach 'P' down anymore. We trained hard, did things I'd never done before, practices seemed very basic, doing the same moves over and over again, yet he always managed to interject something new. The team placed 2nd in the entire state of Kentucky in 1970, against all other competitors, no distinction between single 'A' or 'AAAA' teams. Unbelievable for a coach that never wrestled before, and only began coaching wrestling in 1964, as I understand, but we knew our basic moves. Coach 'P' always encouraged everyone to continue in sports, so I took up track. I was not gifted enough to compete in any event, so I was 'assigned' the 2-mile run! I plodded around the quarter-mile track for 2-miles for the next 2-years. During 11th grade I had some real

competition in my weight class and unfortunately I was injured for most of the year, partial-separation of the left-shoulder, but during track I had an underclass man (8th grade) competing for my spot in the 2-mile. During one meet, my time improved by 35-seconds in the 2-mile, as Coach 'P' was one of the timers during the race, and I could not let him down by not doing my best. I lost by 2 1/100's of a second, but glad I did my best . . . Coach 'P' was my mentor.

My point is, Coach 'P' never gave up on me. He continued to encourage me, even when I was injured, or got beat, and I came back to win my varsity wrestling guy to regain my position, only to lose it again after I was beat in the finals of a tough tournament via best of 2 out of 3 matches. It was that year that the team won the 1st and only Kentucky State Wrestling Tournament in 1971, for FCHS. Again, it was about a 350 person school against several with over 4,000. . .we were "David vs Goliath", and Coach 'P's team won. As I remember, the team placed 4th in the state during the 1972 school year. I continued to admire Coach 'P', as I went on to graduate from Austin Peay State University in 1976, and during the 4-years I was there, I was either on an intramural wrestling team or was the organizer of such. Coach 'P' let me borrow some wrestling uniforms for both myself and the team and let me come to some of his practices during the wrestling season. Most importantly, as a wrestling official, he would provide me some important pointers after the matches or tournaments which improved my wrestling officiating techniques tremendously.

What many other may have not addressed, is how this one coach was able to mold a wrestling team from a military installation whose units were still deployed/involved in Vietnam and families torn apart due to the political and racial unrest during that time, to bring a team together and win a state title. Only a coach of Mr. Patterson's stature could have accomplished such a feat. I still officiate today, 43-years later, and I can honestly say that Coach 'P' was the primary inspiration for me to continue in my athletic pursuits and most notably my continued service as high school wrestling official in Tennessee, Kentucky, Virginia and, to this day, Maryland. I frequently use Coach 'P' as an example to others to live up to and still accept him as my mentor. I know Coach 'P' has numerous other accomplishments that have been elaborated by others. Not one to write such a letter as this, but of all the teachers, coaches and administrators, Coach Marshall Patterson is firmly in the top 3 percent, and viewed strictly as a coach, absolutely no one has ever come close to his abilities. I deeply respect his accomplishments, and wish the decision makers see fit to honor this highly respected coach of coaches.

I am writing this letter to recommend Marshall Patterson for the Hall of Fame. To be honest, I am rather stunned that he has yet to be inducted but hope I am not too late to recommend one of the finest men and football coaches I have ever known. During my career as a sports writer for The Leaf-Chronicle (Clarksville, TN) and the Paducah Sun I wrote about his teams and his athletes over a 20-year career.

The fact alone that he won three state championships at Fort Campbell is a solid resume in itself but how he did it was even more phenomenal. He built the FCHS program literally from the ground floor up. It was truly a rags to riches story. Jack Morris, the legendary football coach at Mayfield High School, always told me how much respect he had for Coach Patterson. And when the two schools were in the same classification, their annual clashes were games of prep football lore.

To appreciate what he did, you need to appreciate the environment of being the coach at a military post. Because of the changes in duty stations, Patterson's team was at the mercy of the Army. Returning lettermen were a luxury and rebuilding took on a different meaning. Some say when the right Commanding General was at the post, he had more luck with that issue than others. And there was some pride on the line when Fort Campbell and Fort Knox met annually in the Army Bowl.

Patterson turned boys into young men. They respected him and he very seldom had to raise his voice to get their attention. He was as gracious a loser as we was a winner. He was committed to the principle that football allowed for life lessons. He was a class act.

When he retired from Fort Campbell, he coached at Clarksville Northwest, a school that was truly at the bottom on the food chain for football. He made the Vikings a contender, as well, before he completely retired from the game.

When I think about Hall of Fame coaches in Kentucky football, I know that there has been one huge oversight. I urge you to correct that and induct Coach Patterson into your Hall of Fame.





As a player and as a coach, he has compiled a phenomenal record, but as a human being, he scored the touchdowns. Coach Patterson did not compromise his values for the sake of winning; rather his philosophy that living a good life will translate into wins both on and off the playing field made him a winner no matter the score.

Later, as Athletic Director at Austin Peay State University, I interviewed Coach Patterson for the head coaching position. This certainly indicates my trust in his abilities. He preferred to remain at the high school level which I respected.

I know of no one in your state more deserving than Coach Patterson. He coached with the highest standards and lived his life the same way.

Former Fort Campbell, Northwest football coach dies at age 79

CLARKSVILLE, TENN. — Marshall Patterson's legacy has always been a source of pride around the Clarksville community, and especially on the Fort Campbell military post.

As one of the city's most respected educators and coaches, Patterson shepherded a program from its infancy, established a high school football power, created a legion of admirers, affected the lives of so many of his former athletes and spawned a long list of future coaches.

Patterson died Sunday night at the Gateway Medical Center at the age of 79.

"He created the tradition at Fort Campbell," fellow former Falcons head coach Shawn Berner said Sunday night. "He started it all there. To be the coach at Fort Campbell like he was, was an honor for me, and to be around him throughout my years at Fort Campbell are some of the more special moments of my coaching career."

Few coaches in Tennessee and Kentucky are more revered, and even fewer still, draw the kinds of compliments and warm recollections as Patterson. He initiated the football program at Fort Campbell High School in 1962, was its first head coach and developed the school's first wrestling program during that time.

He served as an educator at the school for 32 years before he retired from coaching briefly in the mid 1990s. He also was the school's athletics director.

But Patterson returned to coaching at Northwest High School before retiring for good in 2001.

"I have the utmost respect for him," Berner said. "He was an idol to me, a mentor. He opened his arms wide to me, and he and his family were so gracious toward us. He welcomed me into his home quite a bit over the years.

"Those early years when I was coaching at Fort Campbell, I'd leave his house with a ton of notes about what it meant to coach at Fort Campbell and how special it is, and about how you've got to support those Fort Campbell students in a big way because of its unique military background."

Berner became the most successful coach at Fort Campbell since Patterson. Both men won three state championships in Kentucky. Berner won his in consecutive seasons (2007, 2008 and 2009). But it was Patterson who put the Falcons football program on the map with state titles in 1976, '78 and '79. Patterson advanced to the state title game in 1980, when the Falcons finished runner-up.

"He was just a great man and a great coach," Fort Campbell statistician Donnie Caver said. "I played for coach Patterson in 1982 and 1983, and after I graduated he contacted me about becoming the stat guy at Fort Campbell. Thirty-plus years later, I'm still doing it."

In addition to those three state crowns in football, Patterson won a state title in wrestling in 1971, and in his 32 years he won 227 football games in Kentucky before retiring in 1993. He was ranked in the state's

top 10 in coaching wins at the time of his first retirement. He spent three years away from the game until he re-emerged in 1996 as head coach at Northwest, where he guided the Vikings to the playoffs twice. He had an overall 20-12 playoff record with the Falcons.

"He was the first one there and the last one to leave," current Clarksville Academy head coach Todd Hood said. "That's the one thing he taught me about how to be a head coach. You've got to have the work ethic and you've got to care about these kids. Coaches are in a unique position to effect these kids' lives."

Hood was Patterson's defensive coordinator at Northwest from 1996-2001 and was on the staff along with former Vikings and Falcons assistant Scott Lowe. Lowe would go on to become the offensive line coach under Berner. Current Fort Campbell assistants Josh McKillip (defensive coordinator) and Nate Moore (line coach) also played under Patterson and won titles as a part of Berner's staff.

"I saw firsthand what coach Patterson meant to his former players," Berner said. "So many of those guys were on my staff, and he had such a positive influence on everyone he met. You just don't see many people like that anymore. I visited him after we won our last state title, and he and his wife pulled out their old scrapbook and it was like a history lesson, learning about his championship runs in the '70s."

Berner resigned as the Falcons head coach in 2012 after 11 seasons. While Berner often used the spread offense and threw the ball to create quick scoring opportunities, Patterson was a more run-oriented coach who loved the wishbone.

"People would ask coach Patterson, right before a game, if he was going to throw the ball at all," Caver said. "He'd tell them, 'If you want to see some passing, come to our pregame warmups.' That always made me laugh. He believed in what he was doing, and if you executed his plays, it was going to work."

Caver said Patterson reminded him of legendary Alabama coach Paul "Bear" Bryant, and the comparison may not be farfetched considering the vast numbers people who hold Patterson in such high regard.

"I can't stress how important he has been in this community and in this area," Berner said. "His values have been a standard at Fort Campbell that everyone has tried to match. I don't know if it gets any bigger than coach Patterson."
